FILIPONE CONTROVERSY AWAITS COURT

The City of Brackettville Municipal Court was convened Tuesday, October 25, 1983 with Municipal Judge Louis Starzel presiding.

After a lengthy pre-court conference the Court was called to order and Mrs. Hawkins Huey was arraigned on a violation of City Ordinances and against the peace and dignity of the State signed by the complainant W.M. Thurber, the City Manager.

Mrs. Huey pled not guilty to the charge and requested a jury trial. Judge Starzel accepted the plea and ordered a Jury trial be set for Friday, November 18, at 2 o'clock P.M., City Hall.

Various Jury members and witnesses have been summoned and the public is invited to attend.

CITY ANNUAL BUDGET REVIEW

City Annual Budget Review and Audit was completed this week by the auditing firm of Freeman and Horne of Del Rio.

This firm was chosen by Council to Audit the City accounts because of the outstanding job they did for other Cities in the area.

recommendations to put the City under more responsive and responsible accounting practices.

ELDERLY MAY FILE AFFIDAVIT TO POSTPONE PAYING DELINQUENT TAXES

A taxpayer aged 65 or older may take advantage of a special type of property tax relief--deferred payment of delinquent taxes on his homestead--by filing a sworn affidavit at the office of the appraisal district in which he lives.

If a lawsuit has already been initiated to collect delinquent taxes on the elderly taxpayer's homestead, an affidavit asserting age and ownership of the property must be filed with the court in which the suit is pending.

According to Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), the Texas Property Tax Code provides that, after an "over 65 tax deferral" affidavit has been properly filed, taxing units may not press or initiate delinquent tax suits on the homestead involved as long as the applicant owns and resides at that property.

Graeber said that forms for the deferral affidavit are available from appraisal

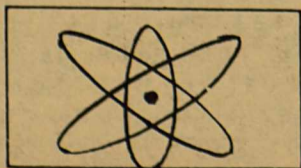

of the materials at the old
Filipone Store. I believe that
your newspaper has not yet
presented both sides of this
issue and I respectfully
request that you do so.

Ms. Huey and Dr. Moore, for
that matter, have rights to
their private property, which
are guaranteed by the
Constitution of the United
States and the State of Texas.
Let's slow down a minute about
this. If the government can
take Ms. Huey's private
property, then they can surely
take yours or mine.

Think about Ms. Huey. She
makes a good bargain on
materials from the Filipone
which she intends to use to
renovate and restore the old
Opera House and a vintage home
close by. While she looked
into buying and renovating the
whole building, she determined
it was economically unfeasible
and to do so would disturb the
peace and quiet of Dr. Moore's
adjoining residence. Suddenly,
in jumps the government and
says wait a minute. We want
it. How safe can our homes and
ranches and businesses be when
the government has that kind
of unchecked power?

I suppose that sometimes the
government needs to step on
the rights of individuals, if
there is a danger to the
public, or even a legitimate
public need. But when the
government starts coming in
and taking property, I'm
concerned. The Filipone store
sat there for years, decaying.
Now, when it's about to be put
to use, the government decides
to step in and take over.

work and what's going to be

buildings in Brackettville
which can be preserved with

Filipone. The legal fees
already spent and to be spent
in the future by the City
could better be spent on
preservation and restoration
of other buildings like the
Public Library.

Safety Tips on Kerosene Heaters

When it comes to portable
kerosene heaters, safety
is no accident. Here is some
sensible advice from experts
at the Engineering and Safety
Service of the American
Insurance Association:

To ensure the safe operation
and maintenance of
a portable kerosene heater,
have the dealer demonstrate
the lighting, operating and
normal maintenance procedures
at the time of purchase.

Do not allow the
heater to operate while
unattended.

Purchase only a unit
that can be serviced easily
and allows you to perform
simple maintenance
procedures.

Have worn or damaged
parts replaced promptly
by the manufacturer
or authorized service
representative.

When a heater is
stored over summer months,
remove all fuel from the
tank, clean according to the
manufacturer's instructions,
and then store it in a cool,
dry area.

If you are purchasing
a second-hand heater, make
sure it has the appropriate
safety devices and that they
still work properly.

What about the proper
use of kerosene?

The grade of kerosene
considered safe for use in an
unvented heater is Grade No.



If you buy a second-hand
heater, be sure that no
alterations have been made
to the unit by previous
owners.

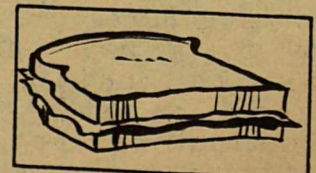
1-K, a low sulphur kerosene.
Only this fuel should be
used.

Never refuel a heater
while it is still operating or
while it is still hot, and never
smoke during a refueling
procedure.

Refuel the heater or
fuel tank to the unit outdoors
where fuel spills will
not present as great a
hazard.

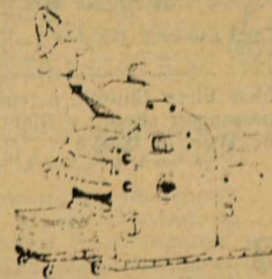

SMALL HOSPITAL PROVIDING HIGH-TECH HEALTHCARE

High-tech medical diagnostic equipment is no longer limited only to major metropolitan hospitals.

Rural hospitals which formerly had to send patients hundreds of miles for computed tomography (CT) x-ray examinations, are now installing their own sophisticated scanners.

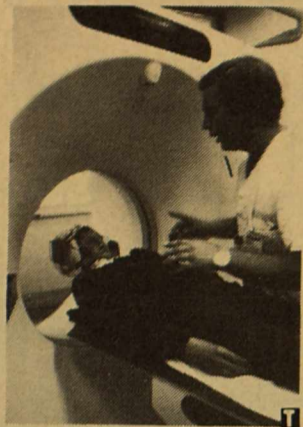
Because CT scanners can cost upwards of \$1 million, it was long thought that a hospital needed a large patient load in order to keep examination costs to the patient in line.

But the increased performance efficiency of the 2-second scanner can eliminate more costly diagnostic procedures and allows diagnosis of conditions not possible with earlier CT equipment.

And, of course, in the process they eliminate the cost and inconvenience of having to ambulance patients long distances to have vital CT scans performed at hospitals that have the equipment.

As a result, CT scanners can now be found in smaller community hospitals, such as the 100-bed Mercy Hospital in Durango, CO, and the 200-bed Springdale Memorial Hospital in Springdale, AK, reports GE, the leading supplier of CT systems.

CT has become a major factor in diagnostic imaging because of its ability to demonstrate very small vari-

ances in tissue density—variations so small they have not been visible with standard x-ray imaging techniques.

This means that for the first time the physician can see details such as the optic nerves, white and gray matter differences in the brain, the tiny structures in the inner ear and spine.

The CT scanner also is able to pinpoint the location of tumors, cysts, degenerated tissue and other abnormalities that conventional radiology could only approximate.

With this more precise information, the surgeon can plan the surgery with the least patient danger.

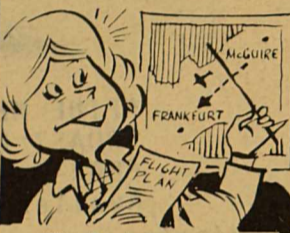
It is for these reasons that CT has been hailed as "the most dramatic advance in diagnostic medicine since the discovery of the x-ray in 1895."

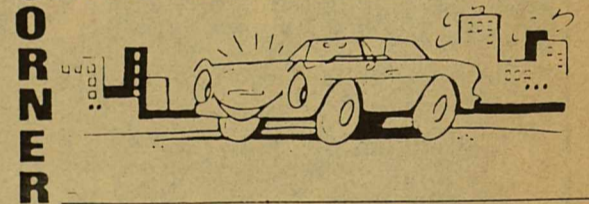

district offices. The form should be completed and signed by the applicant and his signature witnessed by a notary public or other official authorized to take oaths.

For the elderly homeowner considering application for tax deferral, Graeber stressed that it allows postponing payment, but that a lien remains on the property for delinquent taxes, penalties and interest. "those amounts continue to accrue during the period of deferral," he said. "Once the applicant no longer qualifies for deferral--that is, if he no longer owns or resides at the homestead--all those accrued amounts become due and payable. Taxing units at that time may sue and foreclose on the accrued delinquent taxes, penalties and interest."

Over 65 taxpayer may pay, or fail to pay, any taxes due on the homestead without altering the protection of the deferral.

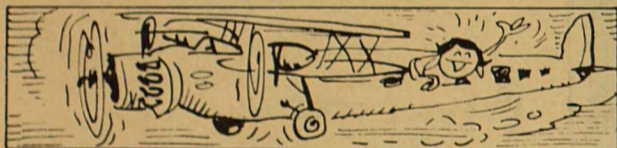

"Tips" On Car Washing

These hints from the International Carwash Association/National Carwash Council could help shed some new light on the task of washing your car.

1. Always wash your car in shade to protect finish.
 2. Drag hose out through shrubbery and tomato plants.
 3. Borrow neighbor's shovel. Replant shrubbery and tomato plants. Rake broken twigs and gather up crushed tomatoes.
 4. Move car closer to home and turn on water.
 5. Bring bucket from garage after thoroughly cleaning out potting soil.
 6. Return above to neighbor and borrow a bucket that has no holes in it.
 7. Soak hotel towel you have been saving in bucket of soapy water.
 8. Remove dirt from top, hood and trunk. Move rear wheel off hose and rinse.
 9. After washing and rinsing both sides, spread dry towel on driver seat to soak up water. Close driver window.
 10. Wash rear of car, including bumper and license plate. Use one inch band-aid on index finger.
 11. If using a putty knife to remove bugs from car, be careful not to mar paint.
 12. Return bucket to neighbor and borrow hand cream.
 13. Wash dirt, mud and cigarette butts off driveway as far as hose will reach. Plan to buy hose-end repair kit after pulling it loose from spigot.
 14. Remove shoes, empty water from them and place in sun to dry. Practice curling your toes upward to fit dry shoes.
- If you are unable to accomplish the above take your car to a full-service, exterior or self-service car wash and in just a few minutes you have a clean car, save considerable time and money, and retain your senses.

SHERIFF'S CORNER

NORMAN H. HOOTEN, SHERIFF

The recent deaths of two U.S. Marshals and the Sheriff of Lawrence County, Arkansas at the hands of Gordon Kahl, a member of Posse Comitatus has caused various law enforcement agencies throughout the United States to take a hard look at this organized group of racist militarist.

I feel that the information gained from the investigations of this group should be made public to the people of this community and county so that we will be better prepared in the event that members of the group attempt to organize here.

Posse Comitatus is a Latin term meaning the "power of the county". Posse Comitatus, also known as the Citizens Law Enforcement Research Committee (CLERC) was founded by Henry Lamont Beach in Portland, Oregon, in 1969. Beach, who is now in his 70's was reportedly a member of the pro-Nazi "Silvershirts" during the 1930's.

At approximately the same time Beach was founding CLERC, retired U.S. Army Colonel William Potter Gale is credited with establishing the U.S. Posse Comitatus in Glendale, California. Gale launched the PC in 1969 with an article he wrote for his newsletter, called "Identity", a tax-protest publication.

The independent Posse membership does not recognize any one single individual as its national leaders or director, however, James Wickstrom of Tigerton, Wisconsin claims to be the national director of counter-insurgency and is often regarded as the national spokesman for the Posse.

The members of the PC state that they will serve as a volunteer group of citizens prepared to assist in maintaining law and order when the communist or others they view as traitors attempt to overthrow the United States. Taken by itself this philosophy does not seem to be a bad one, but it is deceiving and wait until further information is exposed before make a decision on the good or bad of the PC.

The Sheriff of a County is the only law enforcement officer recognized by the PC. The PC further insist that if the sheriff fails to properly discharge his duties, as perceived by the Posse, the Posse would be empowered by the Anglo-American Common Law to act in his stead to defend the county. In his book, "How to Form a Posse Comitatus", Herbert D. Howard states:

"If the sheriff refuses to enforce the law, either deliberately or out of ignorance, you have the Common Law right to form a Posse Comitatus. This is done by composing a Sheriff's Posse Comitatus, Common Law, Great Charter. The people have the right to enforce it; the Sheriff, in fact, becomes a con-conspirator and traitor along with the others who are violating the Constitution that they took an oath to uphold."

The PC's philosophy is a joining of principles taken from the U.S. constitution, the Bible, The Magna Carta, the Articles of Confederation, and Common Law. The group has little use for recently enacted laws and has less respect for administrative rules, non-elected government officials, and judicial interpretations of the law.

The Posse first gained national prominence as a clearinghouse for information relating to methods of protesting and/or evading state and federal taxation. The PC today has expanded beyond simple tax protests to include survivalists, activistists such as paramilitary training exercises at various locations throughout the United States.

From journalists writings and information obtained as a result of law enforcement investigations, the following philosophy of the PC has been developed.

1. The PC holds to the beliefs that all legal rights are derived from the U.S. Constitution, the Magna Carta, the Bible, the Articles of Confederation, and Common Law.

2. The PC holds the sheriff as the only authorized law enforcement officer in the United States.

3. The members of the PC view courts with disdain because

they have attempted to alter our form of government.

4. The PC accepts the Justice of the Peace court to be the highest court in the land because it is the closest to the people.

5. The PC rejects the court's power to empanel juries, stating that juries should be formed by the Citizens, or to be exact, the Posse.

6. The PC questions the paying of income taxes. In their opinion the graduated income tax is illegal and is representative of the second plank of the communist manifesto.

7. Some members of the PC advocate firearms, paramilitary, and survivalists training in preparing for the conflict they feel is sure to come.

8. According to some members of the PC, the Jews, who run the government, the business, the press, and the media, are conspiring with the socialists to form a one-world monopoly.

9. The PC does not recognize the authority of the federal or state governments rights to enact or enforce laws on the citizens, especially in the area of taxation, land use, firearms, explosives, education and the monetary system.

Next week we will continue with more information on the organization and structure of the Posse Comitatus.

New Drug Helps Control High Blood Pressure

For every black person who dies of sickle cell anemia, at least 100 others die from the effects of high blood pressure (stroke, heart disease and kidney disease). Now, there's news of a new medication that can help control the problem with minimal side effects.

Heart disease, the nation's biggest killer, often starts with high blood pressure that is not treated or inadequately treated. More than 50 million Americans have high blood pressure and studies show that blacks suffer relatively more than whites from this disease. Ten times more middle-aged black people die from the effects of high blood pressure than do middle-aged whites.

High blood pressure is a silent killer and crippler. Half the people who have high blood pressure aren't aware of it. The only way you can be sure is to have a doctor check your blood pressure.

Dr. Elijah Saunders, of Provident Hospital in Baltimore, says that annual check-ups are especially advisable if (a) you are black, (b) your parents have or had high blood pressure, stroke, heart attack or kidney disease, or (c) you

have frequent headaches and dizziness.

Fortunately, high blood pressure can be treated and controlled. Proper treatment is vital to prevent crippling strokes or other serious future illness.

Although there are medications for controlling high blood pressure, because many patients don't feel sick, they sometimes don't take their medicine regularly. Following doctor's instructions carefully is important.

Two types of drugs commonly used for high blood pressure are known as beta blockers and diuretics. Beta blockers lower blood pressure by decreasing stimulation of the heart and blood vessels by the nervous system. Diuretics lower blood

pressure in part by causing the kidneys to excrete more salt. Many patients with hypertension are treated with both types of drugs.

Now, a drug called Corzide has been introduced by Squibb. It combines a beta blocker with a diuretic. Some hypertensives need both drugs for control. Corzide is taken only once a day, so it's easier for people to follow their doctor's orders.

The first step in the battle against high blood pressure was development of drugs to control it. The biggest challenge is to reach and treat the millions who don't know they have high blood pressure.

HEALTH HINTS

Colds are spread by contact—not through the air—according to Ernst Zander, M.D., Vice President, Medical Affairs of Lehn & Fink, a division of Sterling Drug Inc. "It is becoming more accepted that hand to hand contact, or hand to contaminated surface contact, and then rubbing the eyes or probing the nose is one principal mode of cold virus transmission.



Interruption of rhinovirus transmission by contact can be accomplished by frequent hand washing, keeping fingers out of eyes and nose, and disinfection of contaminated surfaces.

Treating contaminated surfaces with disinfectant should help reduce the chance of catching cold.

Says Dr. Pascal J. Imperato, Chairman of the Department of Preventive Medicine and Community Health, State University of New York: "Lysol disinfectant spray is effective in significantly reducing rhinovirus contamination on environmental surfaces."

This disinfectant spray has been shown to kill most of the rhinovirus on contact when it is applied to contaminated hard surfaces.



\$11,327 was received during the fiscal year with \$10,000 expended for operation of the City Landfill; \$1,000 expended on streets and alleys; and \$327 expended on Parks and Recreation.

Countdown to divestiture

It's now less than two months away... "it" being the break-up of the Bell System. On Jan. 1, 1984, Southwestern Bell and 19 other Bell operating companies will formally sever ties with AT&T in the largest separation in American corporate history.

No longer will Southwestern Bell and its 19 sister companies be affiliated with AT&T. No longer will the oft-used term "one Bell System" be applicable.

Instead, the Bell operating companies will be reorganized into seven independent regions (with Southwestern Bell making up one of those seven).

What this means to you is that beginning Jan. 1, the various telecommunications services you've previously received under one roof will come from two or more companies.

Southwestern Bell will provide local phone service, limited long distance service and various other offerings such as Custom Calling services, public telephones, mobile phone service and white and yellow page directories.

AT&T, on the other hand, will offer long distance service and terminal products, will retain its manufacturing and research arms (Western Electric and Bell Labs), and will assume ownership of all Bell-owned equipment presently being leased to customers on a monthly basis.

In preparation for the break-up, we at Southwestern Bell Telephone will be making changes in certain operational procedures before the end of the year so that "all systems will be go" come Jan. 1.

This phase-in will give you an opportunity to learn about, understand and ask questions concerning new procedures before they're permanently in place.

Here's one example of how we're preparing for a post-divestiture environment: Between now and the end of the year, you'll start being referred to AT&T Information Systems

when you call Southwestern Bell Telephone to inquire about leased equipment.

Also, by the end of the year, all Southwestern Bell Telephone customers will notice a change in the way their monthly telephone charges are listed. Since different Bell companies will provide different services beginning in January, your monthly bill will be broken out accordingly — with each supplier's charges listed on separate pages.

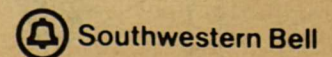

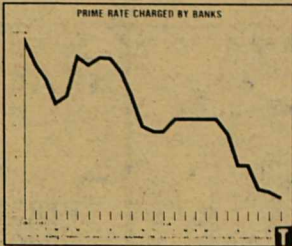

Personal income was rising—even after inflation it was up 1.4 percent over the first two years of the Reagan presidency, reversing a decline over the previous two years.

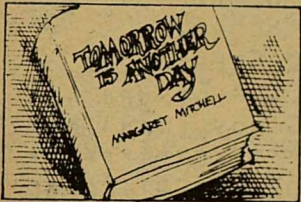
