WHAT WE DO

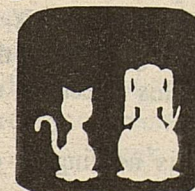

Chrissy Armstrong, Monica Schooler, Jill Voss, Sandy Brummett and Shelby Isaacs.

Chrissy threw the discus 95'6-1/2" for first place and ten points. Chrissy also threw the shot 26 feet.

Monica, Shelby, Sandy and Jill ran the 1600m. relay in 4:36.02 and won second place in the even for 18 points. This victory is exceptionally sweet, because the Lady Coyotes defeated the Sands mile relay for the first time this year.

I would like to remind everyone that the Borden County Coyote Relays is this Thursday, April 6th. There are five schools attending this meet, they are Borden Co. Klondike, Grady, Sands and Hermleigh. Everyone come watch the action. This meet is scheduled to begin at 4:30 p.m.

On Saturday, April 8th, the Junior High District meet will take place in Gail. If you haven't seen our junior high boys and girls run, then you are in for a treat on Saturday. This meet is scheduled to begin at 9:00 a.m.

Who said there is nothing to do in Gail, Texas?

Monica ran the 100m. dash in 14.48, and the 200m. dash in 33.98. She also triple jumped 15'8".

Jill Voss ran the 100m. dash in 13.34 and a third place, she ran the 200m. dash in 28.02 for a first place medal. Jill was second place in the long jump with 15'2-1/2". Jill brought the team 22 points.

Sandy Brummett was fourth in the long jump with 14'7-1/2", she was second in the triple jump with 31'9", she ran the 100m dash in 14.11 and she was third in the 200m. dash which she ran in 29.46. Sandy brought 29 points to the team.

Shelby Isaacs just keeps improving in the hurdles every track meet. She was second in the 100m. hurdles with a personal best time of 17.16. She won the 300m. hurdles with another personal best time of 50.10. Shelby long jumped 13'6-1/2" for sixth place, and she triple jumped 28'9-1/2" for fifth place. Shelby scored 21 points for the team.
