Moments after his departure the fire was detected and quick, proffessional action by the Brackettville Volunteer Fire Dept. saved the house from being burned to the ground.

Sanchez has been returned to Brackettville and remains in jail at the time of this writing awaiting formal arraignment in the case.

The investigation of the fire is being conducted by this officer, Police Cheif Donny Nance, Del Rio Arson Investigation, and Texas Ranger Tol Dawson.

Colorful Book Tags Texas Flowers

Just in time for the spring wildflower season comes this beautiful four-color field guide to the blooming bounty of the Lone Star State. At last, Texans have a guide worthy of the state's rich array of wildflowers. A February re-lease, Wildflowers of Texas (by Geyata Ajilvsgi) is just now arriving in area bookstores. Published by Shearer Publishing of Bryan, Texas, it sells for \$11.95 (hardback; 414 pages).

Covering 378 of the most common wildflower species, the book boasts a uniquely easy-to-use for-mat: all the information pertinent to each flower appears directly opposite its full-color photograph. No cumbersome cross-referencing or searching for additional information interferes with the guide's primary aim, the identification of flowers in the field. And its convenient 4½ by 7½-inch size makes it a practical, totable book.

The photographs fall into four major color sections: white (to green), yellow (to orange), red (to pink), and blue (to purple). Within each of these sections plants are arranged alphabetically by families, then genus and species. Descriptions are written for the layperson, not the scientist. Although all information is botanically correct, the author uses clear language that does not require a knowledge of botanical nomenclature. A helpful glossary and illustrations clarify any terms that might be unfamiliar or confusing.

Maps on the book's endpapers define the state's major vegetation zones which are keyed by letter symbols following the habitat information for each flower. This allows the reader to determine at a glance the geographic range of the plants.



NAME THAT FLOWER-It's Easy With This New Book

the plant descriptions add much interesting material to the content of the book. The many uses of the plants—as medicine, food, source of fiber, ornament in the home landscapeare typical subjects covered in the notes, plus the alternate common names of each plant. The entries are indexed both by common and scientific names.

Geyata Ajilvsgi is a native Texan who has been studying the flora of this state for more than 20 years. As a novice and layperson herself in the beginning, she collected specimens for the late Donovan S. Correll, whose Manual of the Vascular Plants of Texas (written with Marshall C. Johnston) is the standard reference text on the subject. Her work, both for Correll

Special notes following and later as a vascular plant field taxonomist for an environmental consulting firm, has resulted in the addition of several species to the state's flora. She is frequently called upon to locate and/or identify rare or endangered species.

A freelance writer and photographer, Ajilvsgi has produced numerous articles on a range of nature subjects. Her first book, Wild Flowers of the Big Thicket, East Texas, and Western Louisiana, was published in 1979. She lives near Hearne, Texas, where she pursues interests in butterflies, moths, beetles, dragonflies, spiders, and birds as well as native plants. She is currently Herbarium Botanist with the Department of Biology, Texas A&M University.

TEXAS SHEEP & GOAT RAISERS' ASSOC.

The Winters' Meeting of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association met at the Texas A & M Research & Extension Center in San Angelo on Feb. 10-

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington



Many businesses in our country are going the extra mile to help their workers learn more advanced job skills.

It's a smart move since it also helps the companies stay competitive, at home and abroad.

Some 90 percent of U.S. businesses with 500 or more employees, and 75 percent of those with 100 to 500 employees, provide some kind of job training tuition assistance. It's also common in smaller businesses.

In fact, an estimated \$30 billion a year is spent by employers on education and training programs.

And participation in these programs is growing.

Rockwell International reported last year that its West Coast division paid 16 percent more in 1983 on tuition assistance than in 1982. Participation in Caterpillar's program has increased 50 percent since 1979.

That was the year that Congress ironed out a lot of the problems in taxation of tuition assistance payments.

Under the old law, employees receiving tuition assistance were subject to tax unless the courses taken were related to their current job. This kept a lot of workers from studying to qualify for promotions.

Interpretations of the term "job-related" had become so varied and ambiguous that employees never knew when they might suddenly owe additional taxes.

And discrimination was built into the system. Female and minority employees tend to hold low-level or low-paying jobs. Few of the study courses available were related to their work, being geared instead toward more highly-skilled positions.

On their pay, these workers could ill afford to risk higher taxes by taking courses that would help them advance to a higher job

The new law, now Section 127 of the Internal Revenue Code, lifted the "job-related" requirement for these courses.

This freed all employees to improve their skills and train for better jobs using tax-free tuition assistance from their employers. It also made administration of such programs easier and fairer. In fact, requirements are written in to discourage discrimination.

It did not open up the floodgates for massive enrollments in "underwater basketweaving" courses. Tax exemption was specifically denied for sports, games or hobby courses.

Experience has shown, in fact, that employers simply do not provide frivilous courses. Those in greatest demand are engineering, management, general business, accounting and technical

But Section 127 expired at the end of 1983 and the old laws are back in effect. As a senior member of the Senate Finance Committee, I joined with other Senators last year in trying to extend Section 127 and make it permanent, and I will continue to push for passage this year.

This is an ideal way to enable American workers to compete for higher paying jobs. In addition, it makes our workforce more productive and our industries more competitive. And it does all this through our free enterprise system, not through a bureaucratic government program.

We need to find more ways to help our businesses remain competitive, not toss out methods that have proven effective.

FACTS ON KEROSENE HEATER FUEL

The good news from the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is that kerosene heaters, properly adjusted and used in a room fully open to the rest of the house, are not a health hazard.

The bad news is that some consumers continue to ignore warnings to use only a genuine, certified 1-K kerosene for fuel in their portable space heaters. And, they ignore basic safety advice on the proper handling and use of kerosene heater fuel.

With an estimated 3.5-4 million new kerosene heaters expected to be purchased during the 1983-84 heating season, we felt it would be helpful to know more about how to select the correct fuel and handle it safely, so we asked K.H. Lee of the Gulf Kerolite Information Center.

Q: What is 1-K kerosene? A: Number 1-K kerosene is the only heater fuel recommended for use by the CPSC and most manufacturers of non-flue-connected heaters. Number 1-K kerosene meets the standards esable, space kerosene heaters. It must contain no more than 0.04% sulfur by weight. Higher levels of sulfur prosulfur dioxide when burned.
