NEWS RELEASE FROM SWTJC

Boerne High School walked
away with top honors at the
annual Southwest Texas Junior
College High School Science
Fair last Friday; but Brackett-
ville, Knippa, La Pryor and
Nueces Canyon High Schools won
various individual awards.

Boerne's individual awards
included first place in
biology for the project "Toxic
Plants" by Karen Lange; second
place in biology for "The
Reaffirmation of the Nystagnus
Theory" by Stefan Sciaruffa;
and second place in chemistry
for "Denaturing the 'Apple
Browning Enzyme'" by Sean
Horton.

Boerne also won first place
in chemistry for "Pascal's
Triangle" by Carter Burks and
Gary Bannister; and second
place in math for "Artificial
Intelligence" by Stephen
Schwarz.

Brackettville's Andy
Malinorsky won first place in
chemistry for "The
Effectiveness of Dishwashing";
while Knippa's Emmy Rodriguez
won first place in physics for
"Check your Antifreeze".

Nueces Canyon's Wayne
Herndon took second place in
physics for "The Over-Center,
Self-Locking Latch".

Prizes donated to the
winners included a TI-30-II
calculator from K-Mart of
Uvalde, \$25 from Medina
Electric, and \$25 from Central
Power and Light of Uvalde to
the first place recipient in
the math contest.

Ridgeway's Pharmacy of
Uvalde donated a D'Vinci
quartz calculator-watch and
Science Kit, Inc. gave an
engraving kit to the physics
winner, while Sargent-Welch
Scientific Company provided a
\$100 gift certificate for the
chemistry winner.

Southern Precision donated
a microscope for the Biology
winner. A \$200 scholarship was
given to a graduating student
of the winning high school's
choice by the SWTJC science
and math division to attend
SWTJC in the fall.

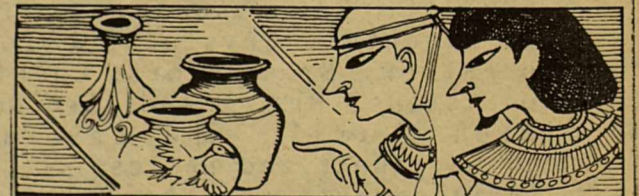
In the fair, Boerne had 16
entries; Brackettville, 1;
Knippa, 4; La Pryor, 12;
Nueces Canyon, 3; Uvalde, 1.

In a related competition
held on the same day, the
Physics Olympics, Boerne was
again the big winner with La
Pryor and Nueces Canyon also
winning awards.

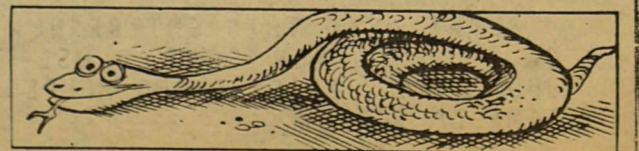
The Physics Olympics
consists of three contest;
water baloon, paper airplane,
and mousetrap racer. All
designed to give students the
opportunity to demonstrate
several principles in physics.

Also during the science
fair day, the SWTJC science
and math division hosted a
luncheon for visiting high
school teachers. The featured
speaker was Dr. Robert Beck
Clark, associate professor of
physics at Texas A & M
University and coordinator of
the science fair in the New
Braunfels area.

Clark asserted the
importance of science fairs to
all students, not just those
planning to be scientist and
engineers. He continued to
explain that the fairs provide
competition, recognition and
positive reinforcement in the
learning process.

SHAKE HANDS WITH YOUR FUTURE SUMMER CAMP

Young people can pursue career interests such as law, computers, architecture, folklore, and women's studies in a non-traditional environment this summer at Texas Tech University. Spending two weeks of the summer in a classroom may not appeal to most students, but the classes and instructors at "Shake Hands With Your Future" provide learning experiences not commonly found in schools.

"SHAKE HANDS" is sponsored by the Texas Tech Division of Continuing Education, two sessions are offered for fifth through eighth graders, June 10-23 and July 1-14; and one for ninth through twelfth graders, July 22-August 4.

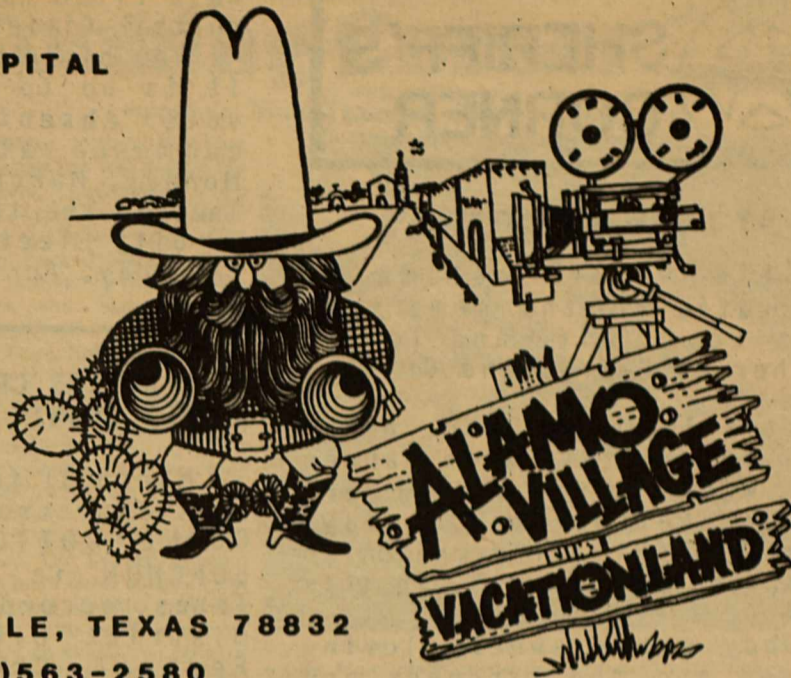
To participate, students must go through the nomination and acceptance process. Students who qualify for nomination should meet two or more of the following criteria: identified as gifted by the school system; accelerated one or more grade levels above the average grade or age placement; standardized achievement test scores at least two grades higher than the student's present grade; unusual creative or productive thinking ability; IQ of at least 120 on group test or 130 on individually administered test; demonstrated leadership ability; or exceptional skill or potential in the visual or performing arts.

If students meets the nomination criteria, contact the SHAKE HANDS office, Division of Continuing Education, Box 4110, Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Texas 79409-4110. A brochure and nomination form will be sent. Qualified students may be nominated by a parent, teacher, school administrator, counselor or by the students themselves. Nomination deadlines are March 23 for fifth through eighth graders and April 30 for ninth through twelfth graders.

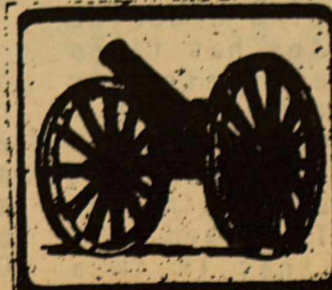

Seven highly qualified candidates have filed for the four positions open for the upcoming City Election scheduled for Saturday, April 7, 1984.

Two candidates have filed to run for Mayor - Mr. William Mendeke and Ms. Deloris Stevens while Mr. Carl Schwander has challenged Mr. Don Woodson the incumbent for Place 2 Councilmember; Mr. Bill Riley has been challenged by Mr. Ray Robinson in his re-election bid for Place 4 and as of this writing 24 hours prior to the filing deadline Mr. Manuel Fuentes has filed as the lone candidate for Position 5 on the Council.

FCIC OFFERS CROP INSURANCE FOR KINNEY COUNTY

March 31 is the last day to apply for crop insurance for CORN, COTTON, and GRAIN SORGHUM in Kinney County, Texas, according to Tom Jean, District Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Crop Insurance covers unavoidable loss of production resulting from adverse weather conditions, wildlife, or fire.

"Three coverage levels (50,65, or 75%) are available for insurance protection. Additionally, FCIC offers three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged," says Jean.

"To assist producers, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation will cost-share up to 30% of the cost of carrying insurance. For more information about the program, producers should contact an authorized crop insurance agent," states Jean.

To select an agent, producers should check the list of agents available to the sales agent no later than MARCH 31, 1984.

Sane Talk About Food and Your Health

Demystifying Food Labels

Reading food labels is not one of the great American pastimes, especially in a crowded supermarket. Let's face it: food labels are hard to read because they usually contain scientific terminology unfamiliar to many.

To help demystify labels, General Foods has published the "Consumer Guide to Food Additives." The guide lists 85 additives frequently included on labels and tells what they are and what purposes they serve.

The guide reports, for example, that propionic acid is a preservative found naturally in cheese that can prevent mold when added to baked foods. Glycerides, derived primarily from vegetable oils, are mixers that prevent ingredients of ice cream and peanut butter from separating and make baked goods soft. Niacin is a nutrient added to breads and cereals to help body cells obtain energy. Its use as an additive is credited with eliminating pellagra as a public health problem.

Also covered is the overall role of additives. Additives increase the nutritional value of many foods, thereby improving the public health.




They make foods safe to eat. And they provide desirable flavors and colors.

Public concerns about additives and confusion about labels are also addressed. The guide points out that 90 percent of the listings on many food labels "are devoted to substances comprising less than one percent of the product." It says that "with the exception of the two most common additives, sugar and salt, the many thousands of additives in use make up only 7/10 of one percent of the food people eat."

This guide is part of "Sane Talk About Food and Your Health," the ongoing public information program sponsored by General Foods.



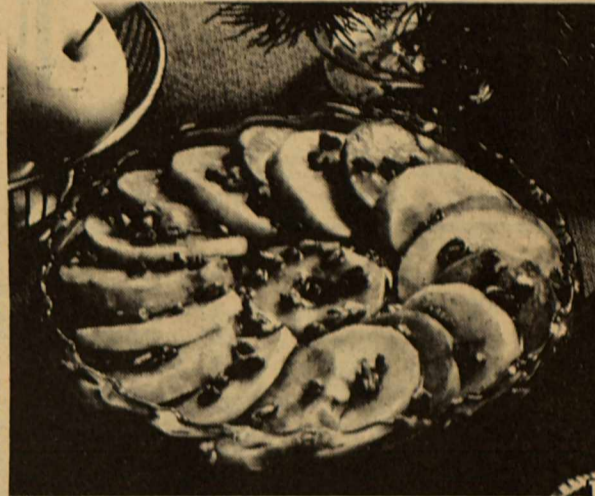

1 teaspoon cornstarch
1/8 teaspoon ground cloves

2 tablespoons chopped pecans or walnuts

Bake yams at 400° F. about 50 minutes or until slightly soft but still firm. Peel and slice crosswise.

Overlap apples and yams in shallow one-quart baking dish. Combine sugar, cornstarch and cloves. Add orange juice and blend. Heat until syrupy; pour over apples and yams. Sprinkle with nuts. Bake at 375° F. 20 minutes or until apples and yams are tender. Serves six.

Ralph E. Beard was presented the Man of the Year award for his 'thought' behind the "Empty Saddle" statue at Ft. Clark.

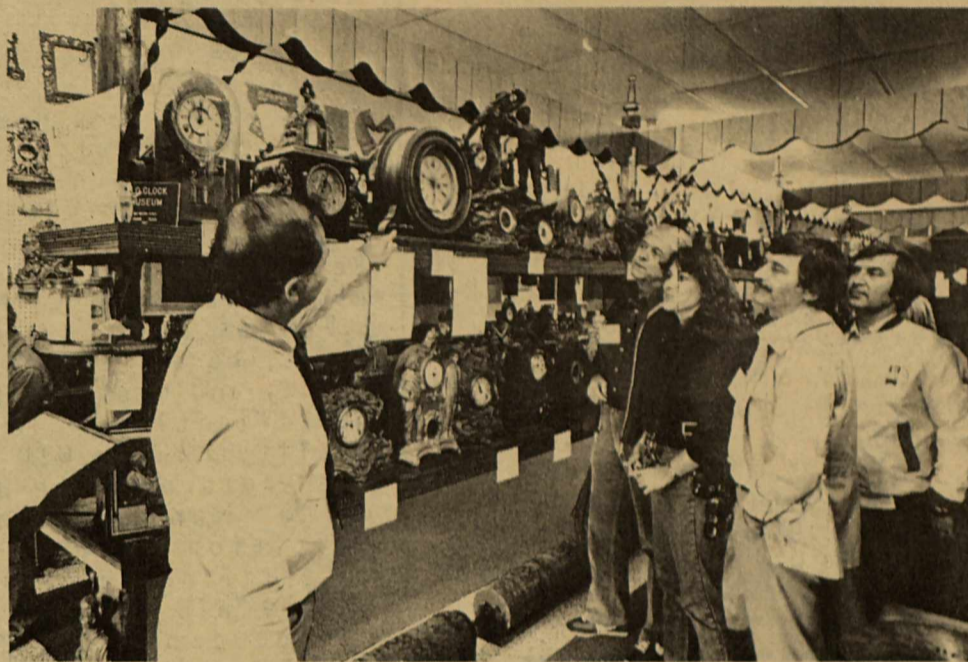

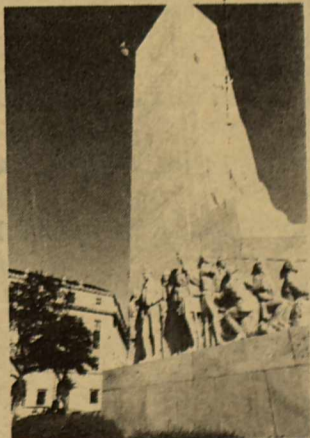
