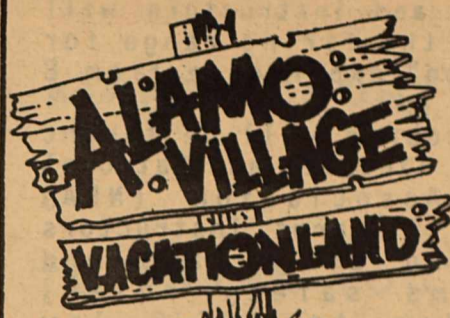

FIREARMS TRAINING COURSE FOR WOMEN

A firearms training course for women in the Southwest Texas area who would like to learn the safe, proper methods of handling firearms for their personal protection will be conducted by the Southwest Texas Junior College Law Enforcement Academy beginning Thursday, May 17.

The class will be held in the Law Enforcement Academy classroom in the Wagner Building on the SWTJC campus from 7 to 9 pm. Instruction will be continued Friday, May 18, at the same time and location.

On Saturday, May 19,

students and instructors will move to the firing range for "hands-on" experience from 8 am to 12 pm.

The course will be taught by state licensed and National Rifle Association (NRA) approved firearms instructors following state laws and firearms safety rules, according to SWTJC law enforcement academy coordinator, Bill Madison.

"Any woman interested in learning the proper handling of firearms is welcome to attend," Madison said. "Each student must provide their own weapon and the proper ammunition for that weapon to participate."

Tuition for the course will be \$25, and certificates of completion will be issued to students completing the course.

Those 12 hours were long, lonely hours for me. Had I done enough? Had I done too much? Could I have done a better job or done it differently?

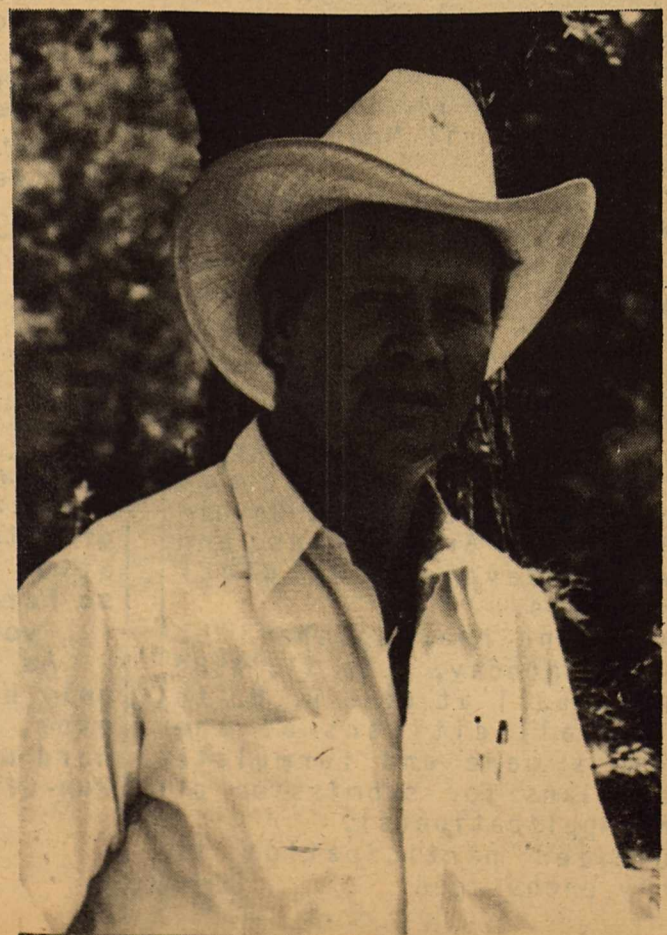
