





We wish to thank J. Lee Ballantyne for donating a book, in memory of her husband, C. B. Ballantyne and father-in-law R. C. Ballantyne. The book, entitled Fourteen Hundred and 91 Days in the Confederate Army by W.W. Heartsill, was a journal kept by the author for 4 yrs., 1 month and a day of day-byday camplife with the W.P. Lane Rangers from April 19, 1861 to May 20, 1865. This book, published in 1954, was limited to 1,000 copies and is very scarce. On page 44, Heartsill writes..."Sept. 26th (1861): Fort Clark is more of a military looking place than any I have yet seen, it can boast of a little town on the opposite side of the Loss Morass, yes sir! The City of Brackett looms down in the distance, it is decidedly a fancy place; there is I believe two white men in the town; the rest are Mexicans.* is full of the finest fish; principally trout, and my everyday employment is hauling them forth from their liquid homes."





Alert, heads-up action on the part of Police Chief Donnie Nance and Patrolman 'Ski' Dempkowski, early Friday morning, May 18th, led to the arrests of two Guatamala Nationals on charges of Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle.

While on routine patrol, at approx. 1:30 a.m., Chief Nance and Patrolman Dempkowski noticed two unfamiliar vehicles parked on a side road near the KCCI concrete plant. Upon checking the license numbers of the vehicles, through the Texas Crime Information Center, it was determined that one of the vehicles was displaying ficticious plates.

Chief Nance and Patrolman Dempkowski became suspicious. When they tried to stop the vehicles, for further investigation, the drivers fled west on Hwy 90. One of the vehicles



was stopped approx. 3 miles west, near the Longhorn Saloon. Several law enforcement units of the U.S. Border Patrol, local Game Warden Bill Lindeman, and myself responded to a call for assistance from the two police officers. The second vehicle was finally stopped approx. 10 miles west on Hwy. 90, near the intersection of Ranch Road 3008.

The two drivers, Leonel Enrigue Pineda, 41, a Guatamalan National with dual citizenship, claiming to reside in Los Angeles, CA; and Armando Solome Rivera, 43, a Guatamalan National, remain in the Kinney County Jail in lieu of \$10,000.00 each on the vehicle theft charges. DPS Auto Theft Agent Bill Priest, myself, and agents from the F.B.I. are continuing the case investigation. It is believed that the two Guatamalans are part of a large international car theft ring based in Guatamala and California.


PECAN'N' HONEY COOKIES



PECAN 'N' HONEY COOKIES 1 cup packed brown sugar 1 cup butter or margarine, softened 2 eggs 1/3 cup honey 1 teaspoon vanilla 2 cups all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons baking soda 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon salt 3 cups 3-Minute Brand Oats or Harvest Brand Oats 2/3 cup chopped pecans pecan halves (optional) In mixer bowl, beat sugar and butter until light. In mixer bowl, beat sugar and butter until light. Add eggs, honey, and vanilla. Beat until light and fluffy. Stir together flour, soda, cinnamon, and salt. Stir into beaten mixture, blending well. Stir in oats and chopped pecans. Chill until firm. Form dough into balls. Place on ungreased baking sheet and flatten slightly. Place a pecan half on each cookie. if desired. Bake at 350°F for eight to ten minutes. Cool slightly before removing from pan. Makes about five dozen cookies.





Have respect for power lines—both those overhead and those underground—anytime you're doing a job that requires you to work near them.

- Keep away from overhead lines while you're launching your boat or transporting it over land. Metal sailboat masts, outriggers, power boat antennas—and other high-rising equipment — can be deadly conductors of electricity.
- Don't trim or cut down trees near power lines. This is work best left to experts.
- Check your clearance carefully when you're carrying a tall pole or pipe on a tractor, or driving a truck with a raised bed, or operating machinery such as cranes, booms, draglines, hay loaders and well drilling rigs.
- Fallen power lines also are extremely dangerous. If you see a line downed by a storm, high winds, car accident or other mishap, call Central Power and Light Company. Meanwhile, stay away from the wire and anything it touches—and keep others away, too.
- Make sure you know the location of underground power lines before you install irrigation systems or unclog drain or sewer lines. Even routine projects like digging post holes or planting trees can be dangerous if you get too close to power lines.

Stay alert-and stay clear of power lines!
