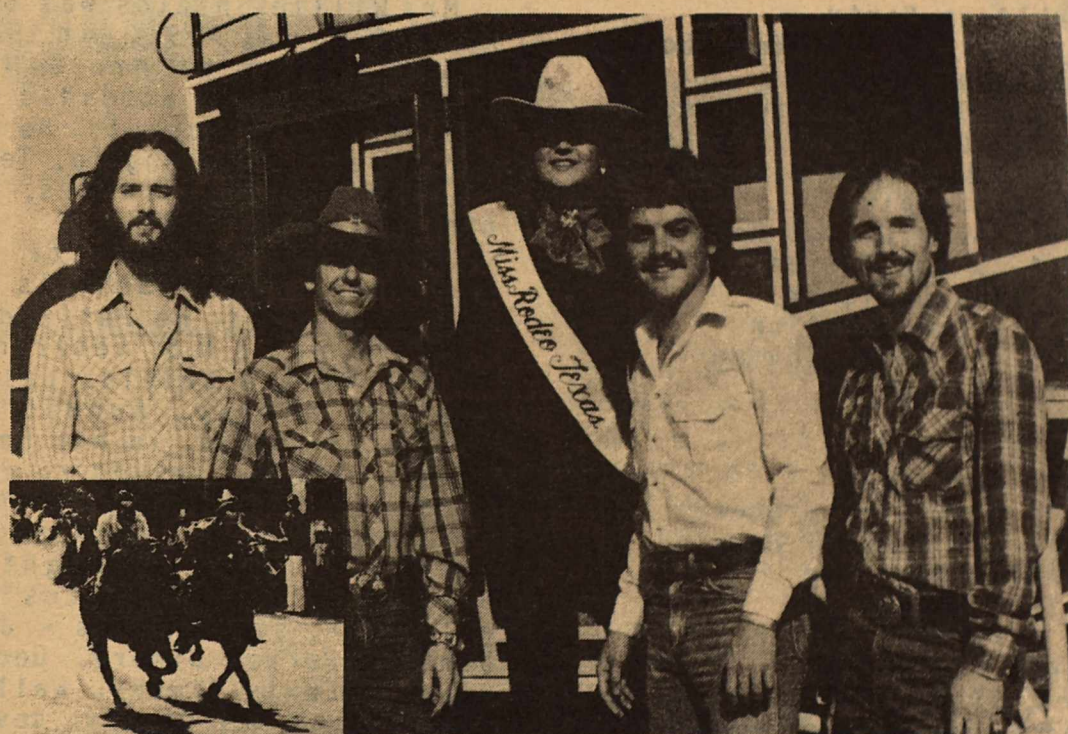

### MILK FACTS AND FALLACIES

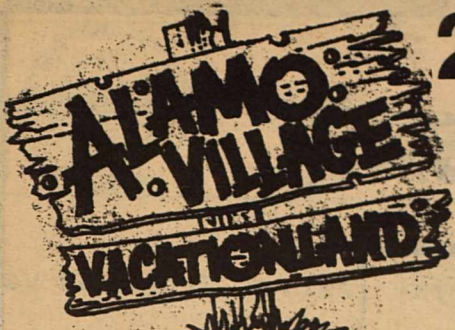

An Environmental Protection Agency study found no documented evidence to indicate significant nutritional loss because of container type. The U.S. Department of Agriculture buys milk in plastic containers for its own use.

The fact is, modern plastic is now used for more than 90 percent of all milk sold in gallons and for an increasing proportion of half-gallon containers. Among the reasons plastic containers are so popular; they don't leak; they re-seal tightly; they won't break if dropped; and they allow the consumer to see the level of milk inside.

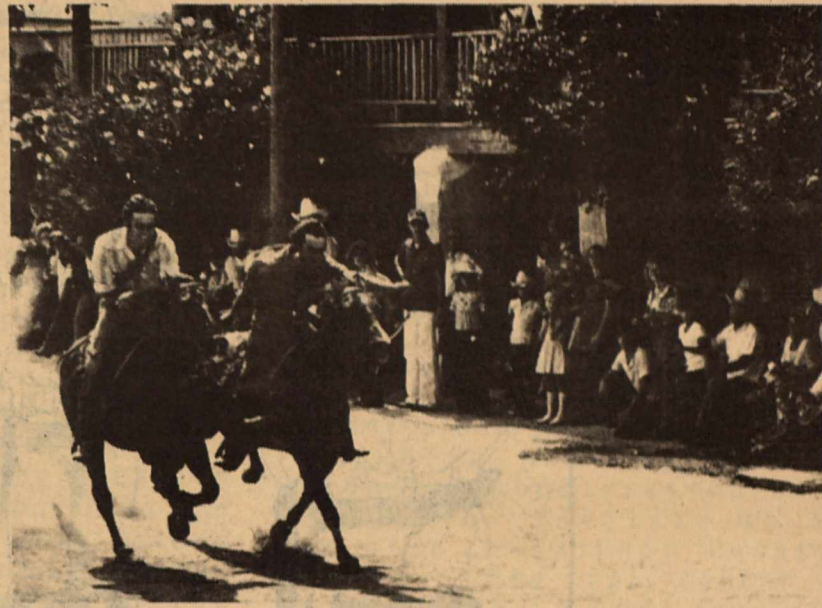

### CITY TAKING SURVEY

During this past week most of you have been contacted by city employees to help conduct a survey to enable the city to obtain a Texas Department of Community Affairs Grant.

Many questions concerning the accuracy and data used by the State and Federal Agencies are questionable concerning the needs and requirements of the community.

At present 44% of the residents are classsified as low and moderate income families whereas it is required that to obtain a city wide grant at least 51% be so designated.

Census figures indicate that the average household in Brackettville is 3.8 persons and the population is 1,733. If these two figures are accurate it indicates we have but 430 residences. The Utility Dept. at present has 621 individual water connections of which 48 are commercial leaving a total of 573 residences vice 430 and at 3.8 members per household a population of over 2,100 vice 1,733.

Likewise other data for the county such as the income figures for low and moderate income for a family of four established at \$12,550 is suspect. Kendall County and Matagorda County are listed as \$21,100 and \$22,900 respectfully. Does it really make sense that the state can

help those in these two counties earning over \$21,000 yearly and cannot help this county because only 44% of our residents earn under \$12,550 and are therefore not even eligible for consideration.

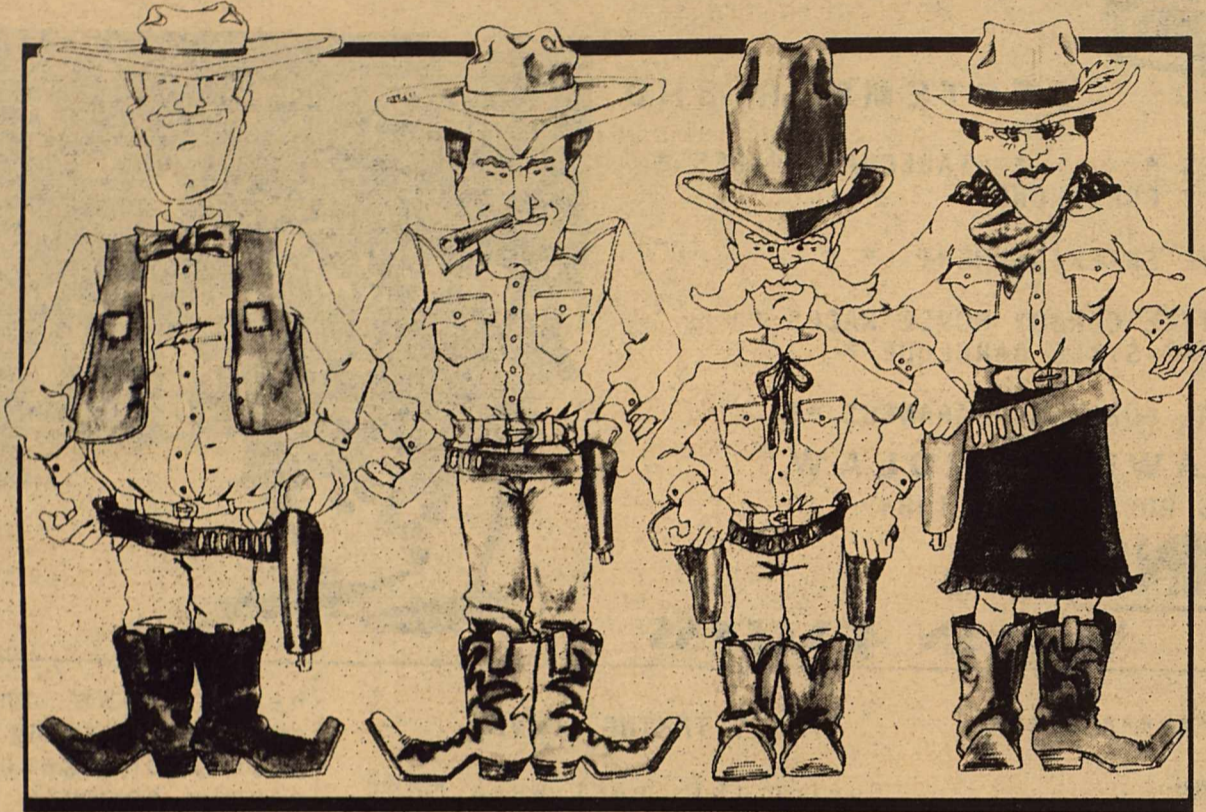
Low and moderaate income families and communities need help regardless of where they are. Just because some computer programmer has used average income figures vice good common sense a more sound, reasonable, understandable and fair basis must be generated to ensure that low and moderate income families in Brackettville are treated as fairly as the low income families in any other county.

The City of Brackettville will be getting a grant this year because of the outstanding cooperation between members of our nine County Middle Rio Grande Development Council of Governments. Mr. Mike Patterson the Executive Director and Mr. Emilio Hernandez the MRGDC Planner in conjunction with the Mayor of Brackettville Mr. William Mendeke and Councilmember Dr. Zack Davis made a special trip to Austin and TDCA last week to insure this happening.

Sometime next week we will know, based on our survey and meetings with the powers that be in Austin, what project we can spend the money on and upon finalization all facts will be made available.

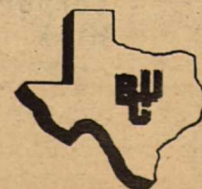

# THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

There was some confusion last week concerning the public meeting which had been scheduled for Friday, August 24th, at 6:30 p.m. This meeting was to be on a proposal for a Detention Center to be owned, operated, and maintained by Kinney County. I will try and explain what happened so that those of you who are interested will understand the circumstances that led to the confusion.

The Commissioner's Court and myself had listened to a proposal from SHWC, inc., a Dallas based firm whose primary business is the planning and construction of jails, detention centers, hospitals, etc. Their proposal caught us by surprise as it was designed to be constructed and then owned, operated, and maintained by Kinney County under the direct supervision of the Sheriff and the Sheriff's Department. Now at first glance the proposal appeared to have many benefits worthy of consideration from the commissioner's and the people of Kinney County. So, a public meeting was scheduled for Friday the 24th in the Civic Center. This meeting was to have been held so that all of you who wished to attend could come and listen to the proposal firsthand and be aware of the facts before making your final decision.

Well, after I took the time to put the pencil to the operational costs of this proposal I realized that the operation of the facility, should it come to be, would be marginal and would not be in the best interest of the Sheriff's Department, the County, nor the taxpaying public of Kinney County. I requested a meeting with the Commissioner's Court and presented these findings to them. After a careful study of these facts they agreed and the Dallas firm was contacted and the meeting was cancelled. An attempt was made to advise as many people as possible that the 6:30 meeting had been

called off. Of course some people did not get the message and came to the Civic Center expecting the meeting to be held. For this inconvenience we apologize.

In the meantime another firm, Operational Support Services of Houston contacted us and requested a special meeting with the Commissioner's Court to present their proposal to the court for consideration. This was an open meeting and was scheduled for Friday afternoon, August 24th. Approx. 50 concerned and interested citizens attended the meeting and listened to the proposal. Afterward a lengthy question and answer period was held and many good points were raised and many good questions asked.

We are now at the point where this will be the final proposal on the matter after nearly a year of negotiations and considerations and hearing preliminary proposals from various firms interested in the Detention Center. A FINAL proposal will be presented to the public in the near future and hopefully this meeting will be attended by as many of you as possible. We are, at this time, attempting to formulate some manner in which to obtain input from the people of Kinney County in the form of a vote on the matter. At this point, as there are NO provisions in the law for an election on the Detention Center, we feel that a voter preference referendum would be best and would allow the voters and taxpayers of Kinney County to make the decision by majority vote.

As soon as these plans are finalized you will be notified by advertisement, letter and verbal contact as to where, when, how, etc. this will be done. Regardless of the final outcome, I think you will have to agree that this matter has not been one hastily decided by only a few, but has been an open issue for nearly a year. The pros and cons, negative and positive points, and plain old personal opinions have been voiced openly by many people since early in the year and even before. The issue was even used as campaign ammunition by some candidates in the recent primary election. This matter has definitely NOT been kept

from the public, regardless of which side you are on or your own personal feelings in the matter. Hopefully a decision, a FINAL decision, will soon be made and will be in the best interest of the MAJORITY of the people of our community and county, and not a SELECT few who are either FOR or AGAINST the matter.

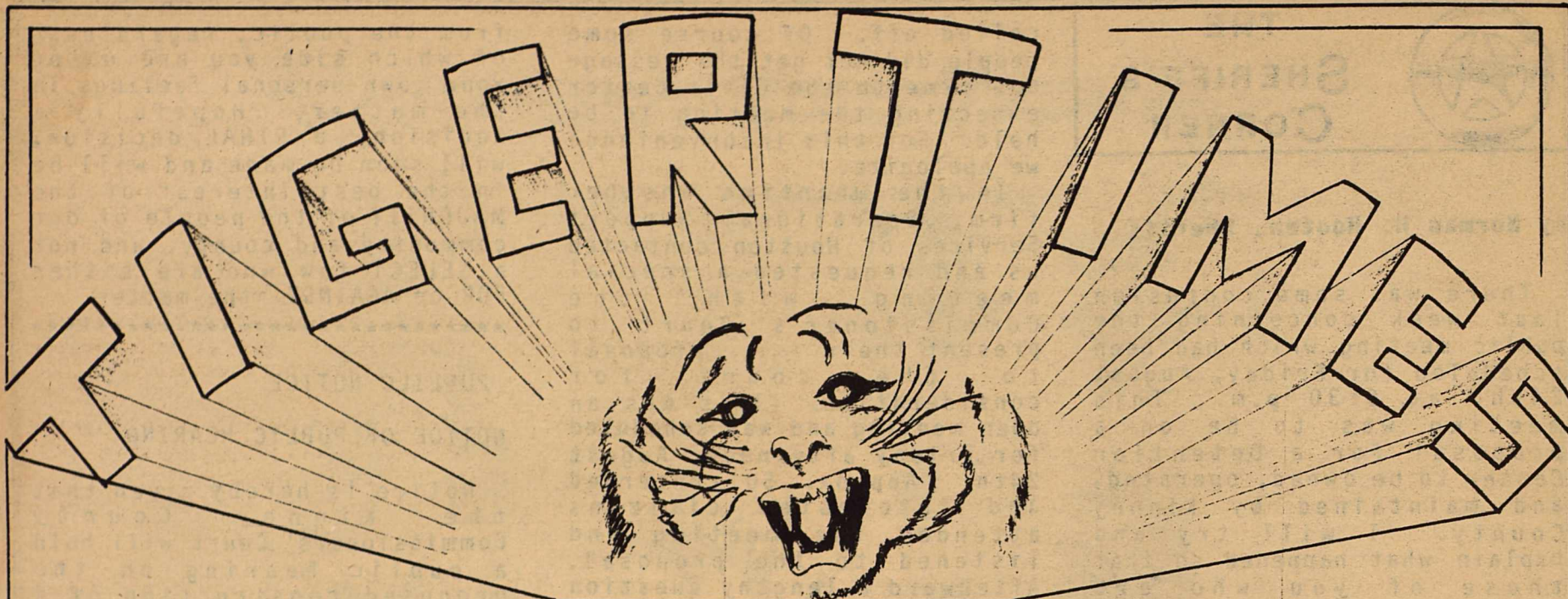

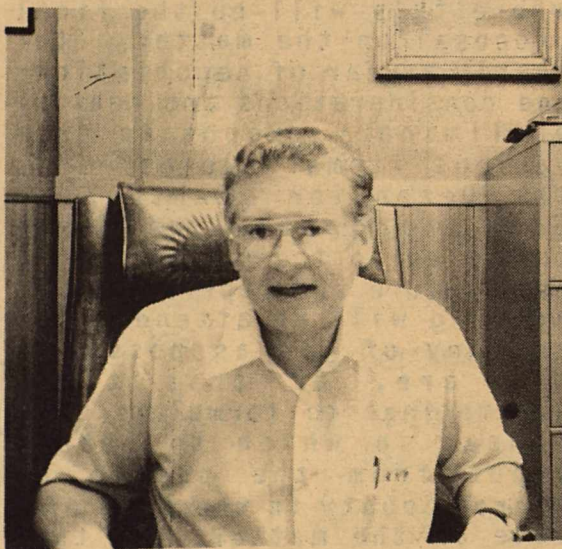
Mr. Willis, Superintendent of Brackettville High School, had some observations about the new school year recently.

Effective this year House Bill 246 and laws passed in a Special Legislative Session are going to limit the number of days a student can be absent and earn credit for a course. A student must make a score of 70 in order to pass every subject.

All teachers will have a folder for every student, which will contain information about what she/he must accomplish in that class. If students have five or more days of unexcused absences she/he will not get credit for a course. The extra-curricular activities will be limited. The principal will no longer be able to interrupt classes for announcements or other activities more than one time per day.

Additional money will come to Brackettville as a result of the special session. Also, the number of school days will be

lengthened. Mr. Willis stated, "I will have lots of paper work".

I think by now almost everyone is aware that things have changed as a result of the special session of the legislature this year. All of us are affected in some way as a result of the legislation. The general public if nothing else is going to pay higher taxes. The teachers and administrators have a multiplicity of new rules, regulation and edicts that must be interpreted and put into operation. Parents will need to understand the ramifications and the options that affect their children. The students will see many changes from last year. A longer school day, the 70 passing grade, the absence requirement for extracurricular activities, the option as to the type of diploma they receive at graduation are examples.

The Board of Trustees is faced with the financing and policy making decision that must be instituted to comply with the law. There is much we as members of the Board do not

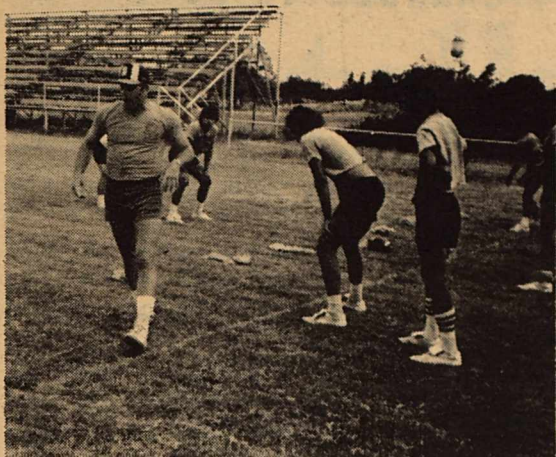
know about the law. At this time we do not have accurate interpretation in many areas as to its application and there will no doubt be some confusion, until everything is in place; however, there is some comfort in knowing that this is going on all over the State and that we are not the only ones faced with the problem.

I think I can speak for the Board in saying that for the most part we think it is a good law, and if a thing is 90% good and 10% bad we need to recognize the percentages. On the other hand if there are things that are not workable and need to be changed we need to work through the proper channels to see that they are changed and not just accept them in resignation.

I have been associated with the Brackettville ISD for several years now and I am extremely proud of our Board, our Administration, our faculty, our physical plant and most of all our students. The latter have always done more to represent us than any other element of our community and they have always done so appropriately. They have brought us recognition in academics, sports, band, stock shows and many other activities. They have competed with students from so called bigger and better schools in the career fields and have prevailed. I feel that if there is confusion or frustration because of the changes this year that our student body will be quick to adjust and in a very short time what was new will be normal.

As a new school year begins, Brackettville juniors and seniors should give some thought to participation in the ACT Assessment Program.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended for required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

The guidance office recommends that students participate in the ACT Assessment Program during the junior year or early in the senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.

Students can obtain registration packets that contain all the information necessary to register and prepare for the Assessment from Mr. Schermerhorn's office. The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$9.50. New for 1984-85, late registration will be accepted for an additional \$10.00 late handling fee.

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies, and natural sciences. A sample copy of a full-length test is available in every high school. Students who would like to have copies of additional tests may obtain them at cost from ACT.

The ACT Assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. The questionnaire focuses on the student's interests, academic and nonacademic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.

Colleges use information from the ACT Assessment Program for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. ACT Assessment reports are sent to students, their high school counselors and only those institutions and agencies specifically designated by the student.

The ACT Assessment Program is a major service of The American College Testing Program, which has

national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa.

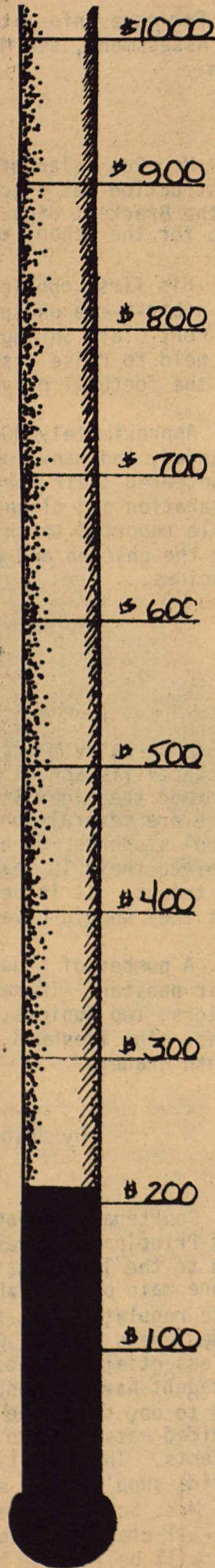

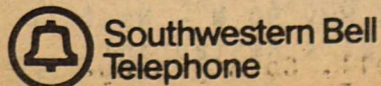

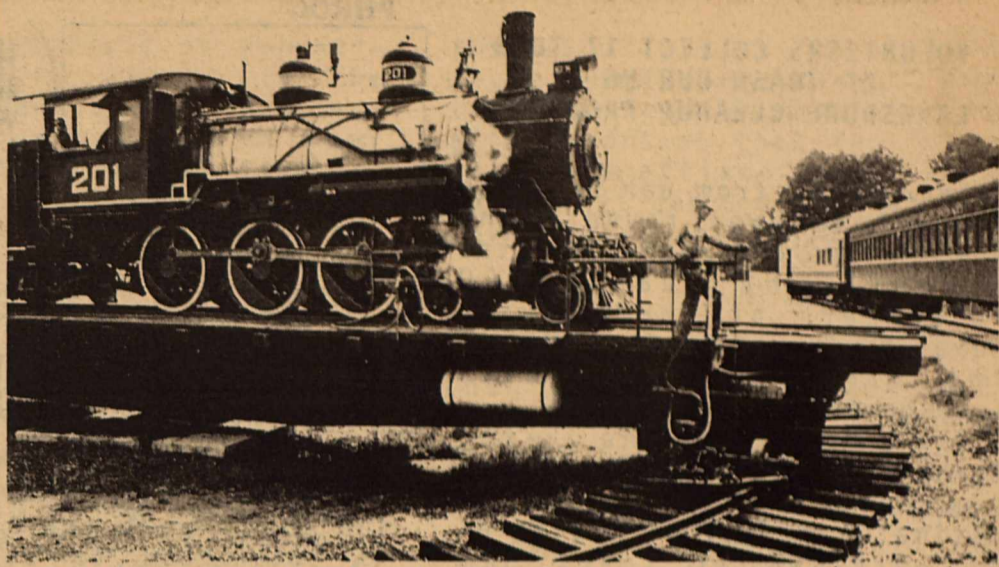

**VOLUNTEERS COLLECT 17 TONS OF TRASH DURING LAKESHORE CLEANUP PROJECT**

Everything from car hoods to copperheads was found among the 17 tons of trash collected recently by nearly 500 volunteers at three major Texas reservoirs as part of the First Annual Texas Lakeshore Cleanup Project.

Officials of the Texas Conservation Foundation, which coordinated the project, estimated more than 500 acres of parkland at lakes Sam Rayburn, Grapevine and Lewisville received a thorough cleaning.

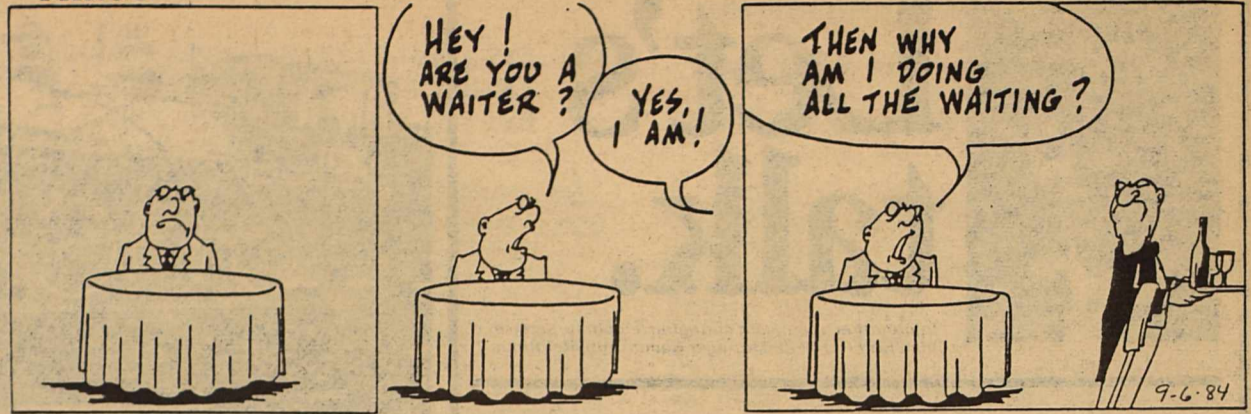
"From members of bass clubs and conservation groups to scouts and trade associations, we had a broad cross section of Texans represented," said John Hamilton, executive director of the Texas Conservation Foundation. "The trash collected amounted to an average of more than 80 pounds per person, and that is remarkable."

Funding for this year's pilot project was provided by the Boating Trades Association of Texas (BTAT). Also involved in the planning and administration of the project were the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department.

"We are extremely pleased by the success of the initial cleanup efforts at the three lakes this year," Franklin Pillsbury IV, BTAT president, said. "Planning is already

underway to expand this project to more lakes across the state next year and BTAT is committed to supporting these efforts."

**TRADITIONAL COOLING METHODS COMBAT TEXAS HEAT**

**CUTTING WATER HEATING ENERGY USE NOW SAVES WATER ALL YEAR**

The Public Utility Commission has developed the TEXAS TUNE UP campaign, a statewide program to help residents control their utility bills this summer. The campaign includes television and radio spots and written material in the form of brochures and fact sheets. Consumers may call a toll free energy hotline (1-800-643-SAVE) to receive advice and publications on residential energy management.

Along with air conditioning, water heating is one of the biggest energy expenses in a home. Laundry, dishwashing, bathing, cooking, and other hot water uses account for approximately 20 percent of an average family's total energy consumption. Cutting water heating costs will save on energy expenses immediately and continue saving you money all year.

If you don't have one of the new well-insulated models, add an extra layer of insulation around the outside of the water tank to cut heat loss.

Cost of materials is approximately \$20, which, in the typical home, will be regained in savings in two to four months. Foil backed insulation and tape to do this job can be purchased at your local hardware store, or look for a precut kit which will include "how to" instructions and safety tips. While you are at the store, pick up enough pipe insulation to cover both the hot and cold water pipes leading from the tank.

The insulation goes around the tank like gift wrapping on a package -- the shiny foil on the outside. The main point is to cover all exposed surfaces of the tank, except for critical areas that must be free to "breathe." On electric water heaters, it is best not to cover the drain faucet, the thermostat access panel, or the relief valve on the top of the tank. On gas water heaters, do not cover air inlets, pipes, controls, relief valves, or the draft diverter at the top of the heater. If you are unsure about the various crucial openings on gas water heaters,

the manufactured insulation jacket has holes precut for the critical areas. It is also important that the insulation be affixed to the tank so that it can't slip down and cover the openings later.

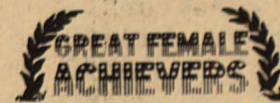

than opening a window and hoping for a breeze. Which windows you open and how wide you open them make a difference. South facing windows or doors should be opened about half way on a summer evening, while north facing windows and doors should be completely open. The windows to your east and west should also be opened about halfway. This strategy will increase the amount and velocity of air moving through your house when the southerly breeze begins to strike the surface of your home. This strategy can make you comfortable without using electricity at all even to operate an oscillating fan.

Raising thermostat setting and MOVING AIR with fans is a strategy growing in popularity for good reason. The popular ceiling fan, the old reliable box fan or oscillating fan complement your AC system. Energy saved from raising the thermostat setting is far in excess of energy used to operate a fan. A standard ceiling fan running at medium speed draws only about 100 watts of electricity, costing less than 20 cents a day to operate approximately one tenth what it takes to run an air conditioner that period of time. The comfort and savings combination is hard to beat.
