## RODEO ....

Rodeo tickets are now on sale at Slade's Saddle Shop, Ed Sim's Western Store and Harris Western Center. Tickets will be \$2.50 advance and \$3.00 gate admission. SWTJC rodeo club members are presently selling tickets. According to Roy Angermiller, rodeo club sponsor, "The club member who sells the most tickets will win a registered palomino mare. Members must sell at least 200 tickets to be eligible for the horse."

Collegiate cowboys will be competing in bareback bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, team roping, saddle bronc riding, and bull riding. The cowgirls will compete in barrel race, goat tying, and breakaway calf roping.

Bradford Ivy of Fairfield, Texas, will produce the rodeo livestock for the three day event. Ivy is well known throughout the professional ranks of rodeos. Ivy's animals were voted the best bucking stock in Oklahoma City last December.

Some 30 colleges, universities, and junior colleges will be competing in the collegiate rodeo team competition. This particular rodeo is a southern region NIRA rodeo. The southern region boast the 1984 National Champion Men's Team Southwest Texas State University and the 1984 National Champion Women's Team Sam Houston State University. Southwest Texas State University lost four of their six man national champion team, however, Sam Houston State University Women's team will be back again with the same three women.

Each collegiate contestant that places in the top four slots in the SWTJC rodeo will receive points that they will accumulate over the southern region rodeo season to qualify them for the College National Rodeo finals held in June at Bozeman, Montana.

Valdina Beer distributors of Hondo, TX, will furnish event winners at the SWTJC rodeo with official college rodeo products such as: rigging bags, clothes bags, rope bags, and NIRA award jackets.

If you've ever had buttons or beads on a treasured garment dissolve or cause other problems in cleaning, there's only one thing you can do. Fight back.

Drycleaners around the country have complained of the growing number of problems with trim on garments labeled drycleanable. They have alerted the International Fabricare Institute (IFI), the worldwide association for drycleaners and laundrers, to this dilemma. IFI has found that the trims made of polystyrene and similar materials just don't stand up to normal drycleaning. Those beads and buttons may dissolve and disappear or cause fabric damage by fusing into the fibers.

The Federal Trade Commission's care labeling rule requires all trim and other component parts of the garment to be cleanable by the method suggested for the garment on its attached care label. If the trim is not resistant to the procedures called for on the label, the manufacturer is responsible. Since the

damage often occurs in a normal drycleaning procedure, however, drycleaners are often blamed by their customers. This is why drycleaners are so concerned about this problem. The drycleaning industry is rightfully proud of its years of consumer service, and doesn't want these garment problems to cause a rift between drycleaners and the public.

If you have a problem with trim on a garment, take it back to the retailer and demand compensation. Write the manufacturer as well, so you can be sure it knows of your displeasure. Retailers and manufacturers will be forced to take notice when you exercise your rights.



**BRACKETT TELEPHONE DIRECTORY**

The 1984-85 Brackettville telephone directory is being distributed through the week of October 12, according to Karen O'Neill, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone.

O'Neill said a total of 10,996 directories will be mailed to area residents. Each residential customer is to receive one directory. For additional copies, customers can call their Southwestern Bell Telephone business office during business hours Monday through Friday, O'Neill said.

O'Neill requested that customers not call right away. "If your friend across town gets his directory before you receive yours, you'll probably get yours within a few days," O'Neill said.

This year 56 white pages and 115 yellow pages make up the Brackettville telephone directory. There are 8,458 white page listings.

Emergency telephone numbers have been placed on the inside front cover of the new directory. In the "Customer Guide" at the front of the directory customers will find tips on how to save money on their phone service and a new map illustrating long distance service areas within Texas.

The directory contains listings for Brackettville, Sabinal and Uvalde.

## THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

Homecoming week was pretty expensive for J.R. & Tina Smith of Brackettville. Burglars struck and took a purse containing personal papers and an estimated \$300.00 in cash and approx. \$500.00 worth of cassette tapes from their vehicle while it was parked in front of a friend's house. The purse and billfold containing important personal papers were recovered 2 days later several blocks away after several persons were contacted to be on the lookout for any of the stolen property. The vehicle was not locked at the time of the theft. At this time the leads are few and it will be difficult to obtain more information as the town was teeming with young people celebrating Homecoming Week and several were seen in the vicinity of the vehicle prior to the theft.

A group of illegal aliens struck the Pinales residence on the Los Medranos Ranch in Northwest Kinney County Sunday night. The Pinales family had gone into town at approx. 6:00 p.m. and upon their return at approx. 9:00 p.m. they discovered that burglars had entered their home and took personal property and cash valued at approx. \$350.00. This property included 4 jackets, a large hunting knife, 2 pairs of work boots, misc. jewelery and approx. \$100.00 in cash. I asked for and received assistance from the U.S. Border Patrol the following morning and we tracked at least three aliens approx. 2 miles north of the residence before losing the trail in heavy brush. Two Border Patrol planes from Del Rio assisted in the search, but results were negative. Although the Pinales residence

had been left unlocked, it is believed from past cases of ranch burglaries committed by illegal aliens that they would have forced their way into the residence anyway.

Crimes of burglary, theft, and even cases of personal injury to U.S. citizens committed by illegal aliens has increased tremendously over the past few years and will continue to do so until stronger measures are taken to control the flow of these illegal aliens, mostly from Mexico, into our country. The U.S. Border Patrol is slowly building increased numbers of agents to try and curb this continual and growing flow of thousands upon thousands of illegal aliens pouring into our country each year. Hopefully with increased pressure by capture and prosecution the numbers will decrease or at least be stabilized.

Mr. Joe Bailey and Mrs. Agnus Vondy reported finding a hand grenade in an old cave they are digging in on West Fulton St. near the old city dump. The U.S. Army Bomb Detachment out of San Antonio was contacted and flew out by helicopter Tuesday afternoon and verified that it was a live grenade and extremely dangerous. After consultation it was decided to detonate the grenade with an explosive charge at the scene. This was done safely and with little damage to the surrounding area. The members of the bomb squad advised me to pass on to the citizens of Kinney County to report any finding of such devices immediately and DO NOT handle them if and when discovered. Many of them may be dummies, but many of them, such as the one in question could be live and extremely dangerous to anyone handling them.

A recent incident involving a friend of mine and a suspected illegal alien had a more comical result than the one previously reported above, at least after it was all over.

Seems like this friend of mine was patrolling the rural roads of the county one night recently and had pulled off on the side of the road on top of Harwood Hill approx. 10 miles North of Brackettville on the Rocksprings Road. There is a good view of the valley in which Brackettville lies, especially at night when you can see the lights of the town and the various ranches in the valley. Car lights travelling along the various roads leading into and out of the area can also be observed. Anyway the night was one of those clear, moonlight nights with little or no wind and the view was beautiful and peaceful, so my friend took the opportunity to sit there and enjoy the view and peaceful quiet. He wasn't paying too much attention to his immediate surroundings. Someone walked up to the side of his car unheard and touched him on the arm and spoke to him in Spanish. Well, my friend was so startled that he jumped like he had been stuck with a hotshot. He bumped both knees on the steering column of the car and liked to kicked out the floorboards. The stranger in the dark was evidently severely startled by the reaction of my friend because he took off into the

In the previous days prior to the 16th, demand for type "O" and type "B" blood suddenly went up. The blood bank was unable to meet the

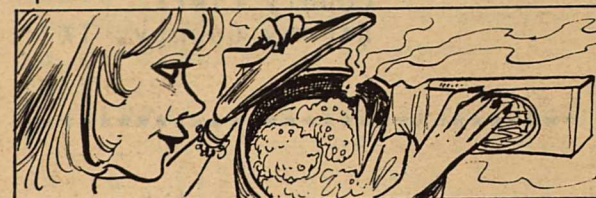
call for blood for all the units of those two types the 54 hospitals served, needed.

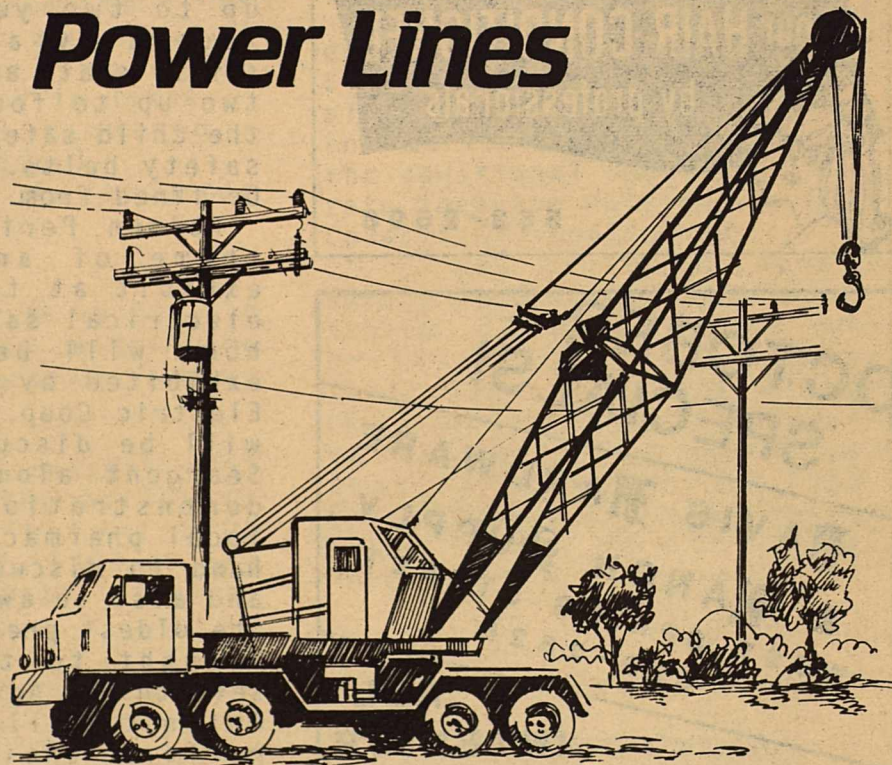

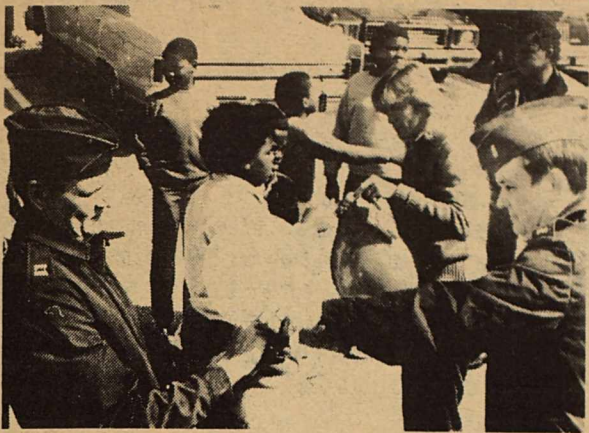
