## COUNTY HEALTH FAIR A SUCCESS

### COUNTIES ELIGIBLE FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Mr. Julio Perez, District Director of the San Antonio District Office of the Small Business Administration, announced today the following counties eligible for financial assistance due to damages and losses because of a severe freeze occurring on December 18, 1983 through December 31, 1983, and the drought occurring on January 1, 1984 and continuing:

BEE, KINNEY, BLANCO, LLANO, EDWARDS, MEDINA, FRIO, REAL, GILLESPIE, WILLIAMSON.

The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is 4% for small business concerns without credit elsewhere and 10.5% for small agricultural cooperatives without credit elsewhere.

Agricultural enterprises requesting \$100,000 or less must first apply to the Farmers Home Administration (FMHA). SBA will accept applications from agricultural enterprises requesting \$100,000 or less only on a referral basis from FMHA.

Agricultural enterprises requesting over \$100,000 may apply directly to SBA; however, if during the processing efforts, it is determined eligibility to be \$100,000 or less, the application will be withdrawn and the applicant will be advised to apply to FMHA.

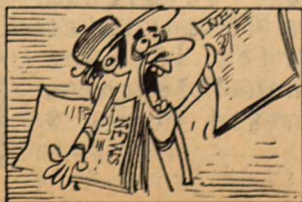

FT CLARK VOICES TO PRESENT POLITICAL SELECTIONS.

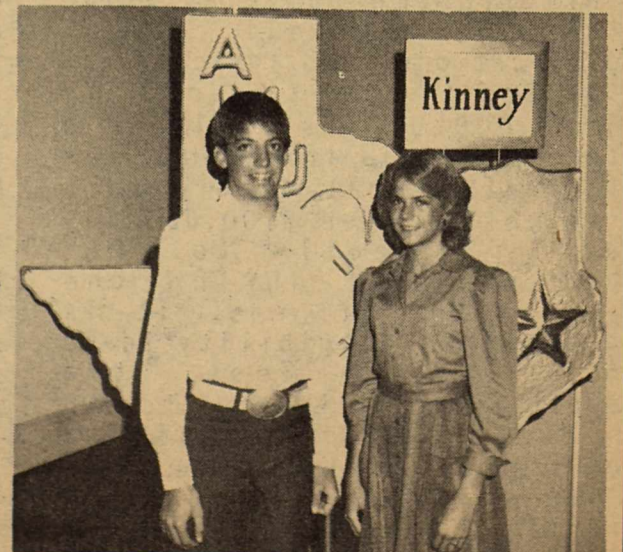

**ELDERLY PROPERTY TAXES**

AUSTIN - Taxpayers aged 65 or over can delay payment of property taxes on their homesteads.

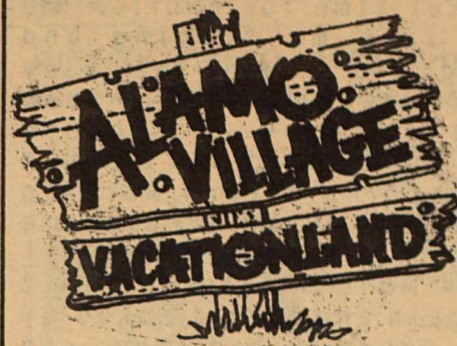
Elderly home owners can qualify for the "over 65 tax deferral" by filing a sworn affidavit at the office of the appraisal district in which they live.

If an elderly taxpayer has already been sued to collect delinquent taxes on his homestead, he can still take advantage of the tax deferral by filing an affidavit asserting age and ownership with the court in which the suit is pending.

According to Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, the Texas Property Tax Code provides that, once an "over 65 tax deferral" affidavit has been properly filed, taxing units may not pursue or initiate delinquent tax suits on the homestead as long as the applicant owns and lives at that property.

Patterson said that forms for the deferral affidavit are available at local appraisal district offices in the state. The form should be filled out and signed by the applicant and his signature witnessed by a notary public or other official authorized to take oaths.

Patterson stressed that elderly homeowners should rea-

lize that the deferral only allows payments to be postponed, not dismissed. "During the period of deferral, the amounts of delinquent taxes, penalties and interest continue to add up," explained Patterson. "Once the applicant no longer qualifies for deferral--that is, if he no longer owns or resides at that homestead--all those accrued amounts become due and payable. Taxing units at that time may sue and foreclose on the accrued delinquent taxes, penalties and interest."

## THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

Many years ago when I was a small child in my hometown of San Saba, Texas, I grew to know a man who had a big influence on my life.

My first memories of him were of a huge, giant, muscular man with black hair and flashing dark brown eyes and a quick smile. His arms were ridged with muscle and his hands were big and strong with thick, square tipped fingers.

I remember he used to come to our home on rare occasions wearing a green Army uniform with three stripes on the arms. I could tell that my Mother adored him and at first I was a little jealous because she did not show me all the attention that I had had before he would come. I soon got over this as he would pick me up in his strong arms, sit me on his knee and tell me manly stories of the war in which he was fighting and the faraway places he had seen. He treated me like a man and an equal and did not patronize me or treat me like the small child I was. He fast became my hero and I would miss him terribly when he would have to leave to go back to that mysterious war in which he was fighting.

On his return, he would always bring me gifts and souvenirs from exotic places I had never heard of - Guam, The Phillipine Islands, and many others. Then one day he came back to town and put away his warrior's clothing and began to dress as other men. For some reason I noticed that my Mother did not seem to be so worried and quit sitting in her chair by the window, gazing out at nothing as she had before he came back. She was happy and we all had a

wonderful time for awhile. He would take me fishing and hunting and taught me many things that he said a man needed to know. I guess that's why I loved him so much and had so much hero worship for him, he never treated me like a child.

A few months later he left town again and when I asked my Mother where he had gone, she answered that he had gone to find work as there was not much to do in our town. She assured me that he would send for us, which he did.

In later years as I grew older and bigger I noticed that he was not as big a hero as I thought he was. He worked hard in the West Texas oilfields like many other men and would come home greasy and tired. Sometimes I would overhear he and my Mother talking late at night when they thought I was asleep and could detect the worry and concern in his voice about everyday problems and the need to make more money. During one of these conversations was the first time I ever saw and heard my hero cry. He shed tears because his children needed shoes and he had no money with which to buy them. I crept back to my bed, frightened and confused but fiercely loyal to my hero. The next day I got a paper route to help out, somehow, with the needs of the family.

By the time I was sixteen or so, I thought I was pretty smart, in fact I had gotten to the point where I thought I didn't need his advice and often resented his attempts to interfere with my decisions and actions. He was no longer the huge, muscular giant of a man that knew all the answers he was just like all the others I knew. We no longer went fishing or hunting not that he didn't ask, but because I just didn't have time. I was too busy forming

my own decisions about things and besides, what did he know?

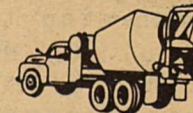
A few years later I noticed a change in him, he was getting to be smart again. Many of the things he had tried to tell me began to make sense and I caught myself, many times, wishing I had listened to some of that advice he had tried to give that I thought was so foolish. He was not so tall, strong and dashing anymore, but I realized that he was a strong man, in many ways far stronger than I. His hair was thinner and was not black anymore, but his eyes, though older and not as bright, still held pride and the look of a warrior.

The last few years or so I have not been able to see him or visit with him the way I would really like to. I realize now that his wisdom, strength of character, and that deep inner strength has been tempered with time, failure and success, age and experience. Though he is more stooped and grayer each time I see him, he is, once again, my hero. His ability to struggle through the years of life, hardship, good times and bad and his ability to grow older and weaker and still retain the strength of character that impressed me so much when I was a child amazes me. He is, after all, just a man, but to me he is a giant. That man is, of course, my father.

Thanks, Dad, for all those years, all those tears, and most of all for being the strong solid base I have been able to turn to during the difficult times in my life.

# Science In Our Lives

DISCOVERING TOMORROW'S SCIENTISTS TODAY

Who are today's greatest American scientists? Chances are, many of them are former winners of a nationwide contest that rewards our finest young science students with scholarship assistance and more.

This Science Talent Search is considered the highest academic honor American high school students can attain and is the nation's oldest and largest high school science scholarship competition. Since 1942, 101,470 students have completed the competition and \$1.9 million in scholarships have been awarded.

The Science Talent Search is sponsored by the Westinghouse Educational Foundation and the Westinghouse Electric Corporation. Winners are chosen based on project reports, scholarship records, teachers' written evaluations of the students' abilities and interviews conducted with judges selected by Science Service in Washington, DC. Entry materials are sent to schools in September and must be sent to Science Service in December.

The Search has an unequal record of identifying and encouraging talent at an early age, earning the nickname "The Nobel Farm Club." Five winners have received the Nobel Prize, two have earned the coveted Fields Medal for mathematics and 21 have been elected to the National Academy of Sciences.

Winners of this year's 44th Annual Search will probably study under one or more past

winners during their college career—43 percent of former winners are teaching at colleges and universities.

In addition to scholarships ranging up to \$12,000, winners are recommended to colleges and universities for admission and further financial assistance.

According to a survey of former Search winners, all but one percent have chosen some branch of science as their major field of study, with career choices equally divided in the physical and biological sciences and medicine. In recent years there has been an increased interest in the fields of engineering, mathematics, biochemistry and environmental and computer sciences.

With concern growing over the national shortage of scientists and engineers being trained, the several hundred Science Talent Search winners today training future scientists is perhaps the program's greatest legacy to America.

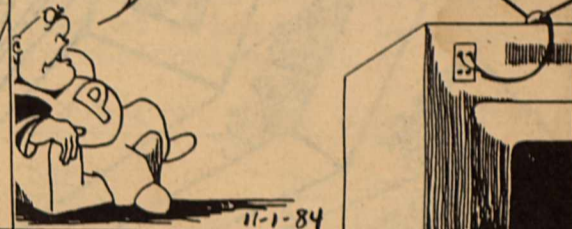

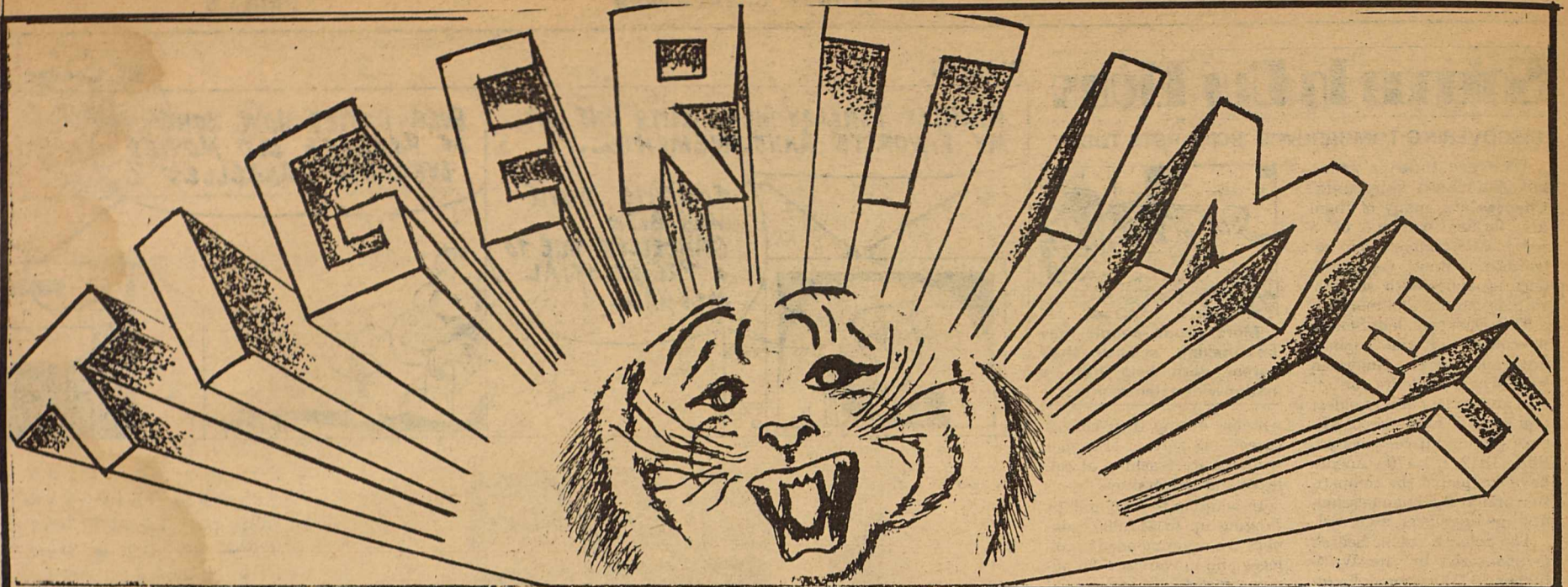

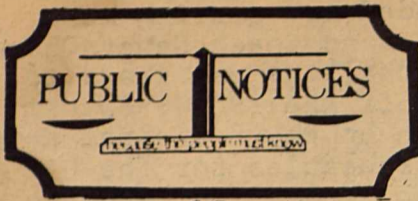

**MATTOX, CONSUMERS SEEK PUC RULES ON SMB**

AUSTIN -- Attorney General Jim Mattox and consumer advocate Carol Barger have filed a complaint with the Public Utility Commission seeking to require Southwestern Bell to make available all information regarding the company's expenditures for financing and capitalization of its unregulated subsidiaries.

"Frankly, we suspect that Southwestern Bell is using revenues from its regulated services to finance its unregulated businesses, such as telephones, mobile phones and the yellow pages publications," Mattox said. "What we're seeking in this complaint is the information that would show us if our suspicion is correct."

"If we are correct, we are asking the PUC to reduce local telephone rates to consumers," he said. "Southwestern Bell should not be able to recover such expenditures from the public."

"Why should consumers have to pay for Southwestern Bell to create and support the

company's competitive ventures?" Mattox asked. "That's simply not the way the competitive marketplace works."

The complaint against Southwestern Bell, filed Oct. 17 with the PUC, also seeks an accounting from Southwestern Bell of the costs incurred related to divestiture.

"Southwestern Bell keeps coming to the PUC and belly aching about how much money they're losing because of divestiture," Mattox said. "Well, if that's true, they ought to back it up with facts and figures. If it's not true, then their high rate hike request ought to be denied."

"Just yesterday, there were news reports that Southwestern Bell's profits have increased by more than 14 percent," Mattox said. "We believe all of this should be considered by the puc and that this state's consumers deserve protection from the apparent games that Bell is playing with all our pocketbooks."

Mattox, the Consumers Union, Public Citizen/Texas, Texas ACORN and the Gray Panthers of

Austin are listed as plaintiffs on the complaint.

Assistant Attorney General W. Scott McCollough is working on the case for Mattox.

**CHECK OUT THOSE LEAKS**

If you have to jiggle the handle of a toilet to get it to stop making noise, that's a sign of a leaky toilet. Because 45 percent of the water used in homes is used to flush toilets, a leaky toilet can be one of the biggest water wasters in the home, wasting over 200 gallons of water a day.

Although some leaking toilets may make a hissing sound after the bowl has filled with water, not all leaks give obvious clues. There are a few simple tests which you can perform, however, which can help you determine if your toilet is wasting water.

First, make sure there are no wastes in the toilet bowl. Then remove the cover of the toilet tank and put a few drops of food coloring or a dye capsule into the tank to

color the water. After waiting 15 minutes, check the water in the toilet bowl. If the color shows up in the bowl and the toilet has not been flushed in that time, you have a leak to repair.

There are several possible causes for the leak. Normally, the water level in a toilet tank should be between 1/2 inch and one inch below the top of the overflow pipe. However, if the water level is at or above the top of the pipe, water will pour into the toilet bowl and go down the drain. Carefully bending the float arm down slightly should correct this problem.

If that doesn't help, the problem may be that the flush

ball is not fitting correctly in the valve seat. Lining the guide wires up better may stop the leak. If not, a new flush ball or flapper assembly can be purchased for only a few dollars.

Even if the water in the bowl doesn't change color in the previous test, you may have a leak. To find out, flush the toilet and then wait about ten minutes. Then look in the tank to see if water is still flowing from the refill tube into the overflow pipe. This also indicates a leak.

Sometimes it is the float that is causing the leak. Unscrew the float and shake it. If you hear water inside, this indicates that the float

needs to be replaced.
