## UP HILL ALL THE WAY

"Uphill All the Way," a feature - length movie which stars Mel Tillis and Roy Clark, began production this week at "Happy" Shahan's Alamo Village near Brackettville, TX. Also starring are Burl Ives and Glen Campbell. Trish Van Devere is also appearing.
Executive Producers are Tillis, Clark and Renee Valente, President of the Motion Picture Producers Guild of America. David L. Ford and Burr Smidt are producers and Bob Younts is Associate Producer.
