LANDOWNERS DISPUTE



THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

We lost another good friend last week. Death claimed Antanacio Pena, 81, Tuesday morning, November 20, at 1:00 am. Tana, as he was known to most of his friends, was born in Brackettville on May 2, 1903 and lived here all his life. Our deepest sympathy goes out to his wife Ruby and other family members at this time.

Tana and his wife Ruby have been close personal friends of my family for many years and we will miss him.

A call for medical assistance from a ranch south of Brackettville on Las Moras Road was answered by members of the Kinney County Volunteer Ambulance Service Sunday night, Nov. 25 at approx. 7:15 pm. Upon their arrival at the ranch they found that they were too late to save Jack Paul Walker, 52, of Uvalde. He was pronounced dead at the scene from an apparent heart attack by Justice of the Peace Louis Starzel. The Walkers and friends were at a hunting camp on their small ranch when he complained of chest pains and shortness of breath and collapsed soon after. His body was transported to Uvalde by Mr. H.L. Maxwell of Hillcrest Funeral Home in Brackettville.

A Brackettville resident recently received merchandise

through the mail that came C.O.D. and it was discovered to be merchandise that was not ordered by nor wanted by the family that received it. The company that mailed out the merchandise has been uncooperative in trying to resolve the problem and it is suspected that the firm, based in California, may be using unethical practices by mailing out unsolicited merchandise to unsuspecting citizens. Care should be taken by all postal patrons of our community to closely examine a notice of a C.O.D. package to be sure that the merchandise has been ordered by the person receiving same. An investigation into this matter is currently underway.

Hunting season is here again and with it comes the usual rash of disturbances and disagreements in some of those areas where large ranches have been bought by developers and cut up into small plots of 5 to 20 acres and sold by contract to people from all over the state.

The main problem with these areas is that very few of them are fenced and boundary lines are often marked with painted rocks or ribbon tied to trees, bushes, etc. The owners come out to hunt or spend time on their little ranchitos and many of them have disagreements, often violent, over locations of deer blinds, trespassing incidents and so on. I was called to about 20 of these incidents last year and have already received 5 calls this year. Most of

these cases could be solved between the parties involved if they would use common sense and fair play. But, as human behavior prevails in most instances this is not done and I have to play referee between sides who both think they are right. Sometimes they both end up mad at me, which is a common result when disturbances such as these are worked.

I, Personally, regret seeing our local ranches sold to these developers for several reasons, one being the problems that arise as described above. Another being that these ranches are most often taken out of production of livestock which we depend on for our food. Another equally serious reason being that most of these plots are sold to out of town owners, some of them being of the criminal element who use these remote areas to conduct criminal activities such as metamphetamine labs and marijuana fields. There have been several meth labs busted over the past few years in the Kinney, Uvalde, and Rual County areas where these developments are being sold to anyone having the down payment. We are working closely with officers from these other counties, Texas Rangers, and members of the DPS Narcotics Agency to keep this type of criminal activity to a minimum.

I want to thank Ft. Clark Security Officers and our local peace officers for taking some of my calls for the past couple of weeks while I was recovering from minor surgery. I'm back in the saddle again though and feeling fine, although I do think I will send my doctor a whetrock for Christmas so he can sharpen the tools he used for the surgery!

Our neighbor gave us the good word about heat pumps.

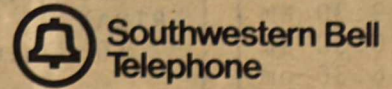
