CP&L CUSTOMERS TO PAY LESS

Central Power and Light Company customers will begin paying less for electricity early next year if the Public Utility Commission approves the company's plan to lower the fuel expense portion of customer's electric bills.

The company today asked the PUC for permission to lower the fuel charge to residential customer from 4.147 cents per kilowatt hour to 3.580 cents per kilowatt hour. Other customer classes will realize similar decreases.

According to Bill Cranford, CPL local manager, the impact on residential customers using 750 to 1000 kilowatt hours per month could result in a savings of \$4.25 to \$5.67 on their electric bills. "That represents approximately an eight percent reduction in the price customers currently pay

for electricity. The actual savings will depend on the individual customers total energy use," Cranford added.

The proposed reduction is a result of the companys efforts toward obtaining lower cost fuels for future requirements and the lower price CPL has paid for fuel during the past 12 months.

"We have aggressively sought lower cost fuel contracts and taken advantage of lower priced natarual gas to reduce the fuel cost which represents approximately 60 percent of our customers electric bille," Cranford said. Our success with this program is largely responsible for making this reduction possible," he added. Cranford also noted that CPL does not derive any profit from the recovery of power plant boiler fuel costs.

Because the PUC changed fuel cost recovery rules last year, electric utilities must get approval from the commission before changing fuel charges. CPLs present rate, as a result of PUC order, has been applied to customers bills since October 1983. Using the method prescribed by the commission has caused fuel recoveries to exceed expenses through Septemer 1984.

CPL is seeking PUC approval for a method to return \$16.6 million, which includes interest, to customers in a fair and equitable manner. The company proposes that the refund be allowed in the reduced rate over a 12 month period.

In addition, the companys revised fuel cost factor is expected to lower costs to customers by approximately \$60 million over the next year.

According to Cranford, if the old fuel adjustment clause was still in effect customers would have experienced lower monthly bills over the last year. The fuel adjustment clause, which was used by utilities until last fall, allowed a monthly adjustment of fuel charges up or down to match the price of fuel it took to generate electricity.

CORNER**

There is a form of crime growing in America today at an alarming rate. This particular form of crime is so cruel and heartbreaking that the results of the crime on the families involved is almost beyond description. The crime I am referring to is the abduction, and in most cases, murder (often linked to sexual deviates) of children.

I am sure most of you have seen the short T.V. advertisement that says: "It is 10:30pm, do you know where your children are?" Parents in these days and times would do well to take that question to heart. I do not mean to say that parents should keep their children under constant surveillance, because we all know that as they get older they must have a certain amount of time on their own to be able to mature and grow into responsible, productive adults. But believe me, I had much rather be accused of being over protective of my children than to be doing what so many parents are having to do today; running ads in newspapers, on T.V., and other media sources searching for a clue that might lead to the whereabouts, dead or alive, of a missing child.

People often talk about the wild and woolly days of the Old West. The gunfighters, gamblers, girls of the night and so on. Believe me, the wildest times of the Old West were like a church social compared to the types of crimes being committed in this day and time.

The deadliest killers, gunfighters, bank robbers, etc. of the Old West still had a code of conduct, deeply ingrained, of respect for children, women, and elderly people. Most crimes of violence committed in the Wild West were committed by adult males and involved shoot-outs in saloons, bank or stage robberies, etc. Rape, kidnapping of children, or assaults on elderly people were, for the most part, non-existent. In fact the unwritten code among the lawless was so strong that

any man who committed such a crime was as in as much, if not more, danger from his own kind as he was from the lawmen.

This is not true today. Many crimes of extreme violence against the human race are committed by teenagers and young people, both male and female. Perversion and twisted minds are most often linked to the hideous crime of child abduction. The heartbreaking problem most often associated with this type of crime is that the abducted child simply disappears, never to be seen or heard from again. Can you imagine the heartbreak, frustration, and pain caused the parents and families touched by these tragedies?

I will relate below five actual case histories taken from a directory of Abducted and Missing Children I recently received. You will note that these crimes can occur in rural, smalltown areas as well as metropolitan, big cities, at any time of the day or night. These cases involve children of all ages, from babies to young adults.

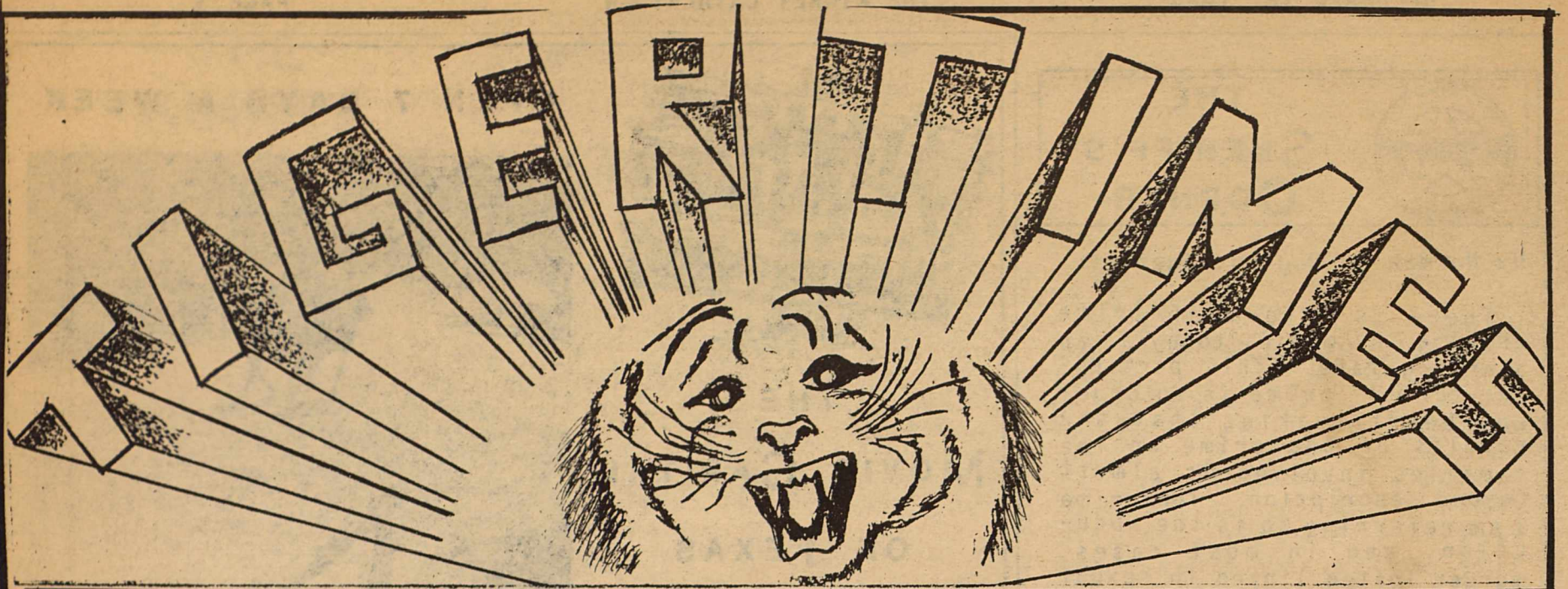

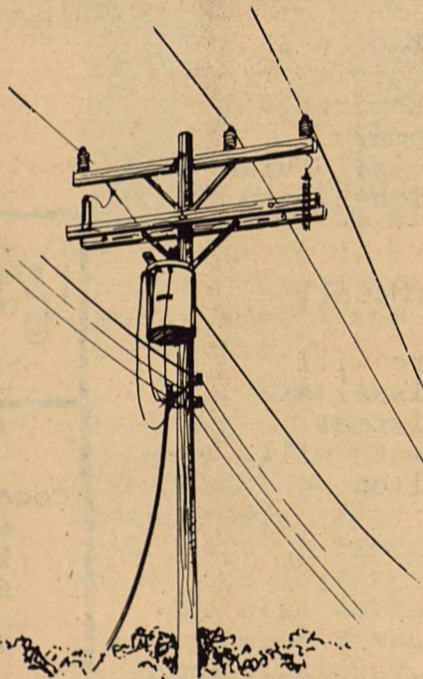
Stay alert and stay clear—

AVOID POWER LINES

Putting up the antenna for your TV set or for the base station of your CB radio can be dangerous unless you take certain precautions.

Plan the project carefully if you install the antenna yourself. First, know where all the power lines are—then stay well away from them. Any contact between a power line and you or your antenna can be serious.

Make sure you locate your antenna (including the supporting mast and guy wires) at least one and a half times its total height from all power lines. For example, an antenna 30 feet high should be 45 feet away from power lines in all directions.



Don't use a ladder near power lines—during an antenna installation or while performing any other task. The danger from using a metal ladder is obvious. But a wooden ladder can conduct electricity, too, if it's damp or if it has dirt or paint on it.

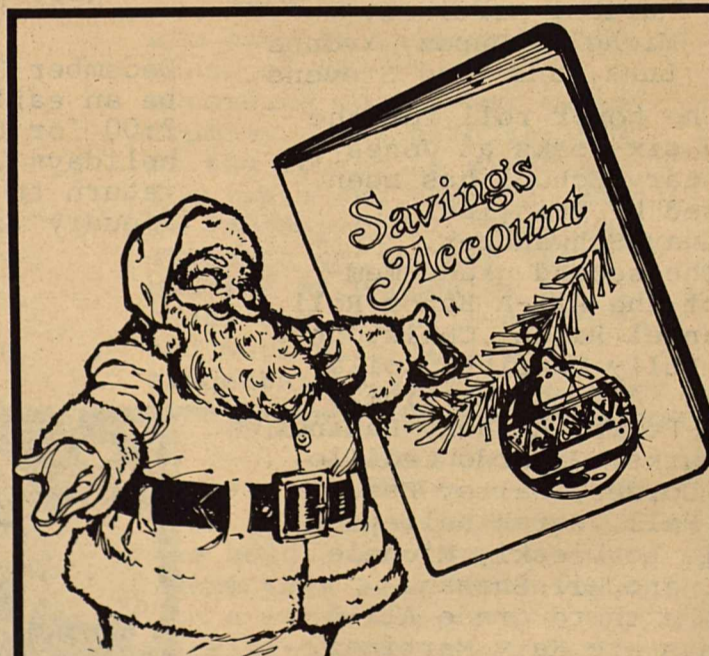
Electricity brings a more comfortable life to all of us, but it must be treated cautiously. Stay alert—and stay clear of power lines!

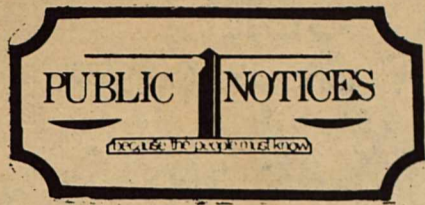

Box 345 Brackettville, TX 78832, applicant, seeks a permit pursuant to S11.121, TAC S303.1 et seq. to authorize the maintenance of an existing 3.2 acre foot capacity reservoir at or adjacent to the main Las Moras Spring, tributary of Las Moras Creek, tributary of the Rio Grande, Rio Grande Basin, approximately 1/3 mile south of Brackettville, Texas, the impoundment of 3.2 acre feet of water in said reservoir, and the use of the impounded waters for nonconsumptive recreational purposes. The reservoir is in the F. Solinas survey, Abstract No. 555, the northernmost corner of the reservoir being N. 02 degrees 46' E, 14,325 feet from the south corner of the Samuel A. Maverick Survey, Abstract no. 491, all in Kinney County, all being more fully set out in the application.

Application No. 4517 was accepted for filing on November 20, 1984, and a hearing thereon will be held by the Commission in the Stephen F. Austin State Office Building at 1700 North Congress Ave. in Austin, Texas, on February 8, 1985, at 10:00 a.m.

Those opposing the granting of this application may appear at the hearing and/or, not less than eight days before the hearing date, may file written protests with the Commission and serve copies on the applicant with proof of service to be provided to the Commission. Written protests shall contain the name and address of the protestant, an

identification of the pending application, the basis of protestant's interest, location of protestant's diversion point (s) or property, if applicable, and any amendments or adjustments to the application which would result in a withdrawal of the protest. The written protest will be noted by the Commission but will not be considered as evidence since the right to cross-examine is absent. No protestant will be admitted as a party to the proceeding unless the protestant complies with Commission Rule 155.04.00.001 (31 TAC S 267.1) which requires a justiciable interest and actual or representative presence at the hearing. If any party participating in the hearing desires a transcript of the proceedings, it will be done at the request and expense of the party requesting the transcript. Due to the technical nature of the hearing, it may be advisable for the protestant to have an expert witness, such as an engineer, available at the hearing. 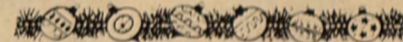

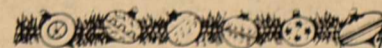


O tannenbaum!
