# Regional Qualifiers Results Track

The region II, class 1 A track meet was held last weekend in Abilene, at the ACU campus. Borden County was well represented at this meet with six girls all qualifying for the meet. They were Shelby Isaacs, Sandy Brummett, Jill Voss, Bobbie Armstrong, Tammy Cooley and Shalina Reyes. These girls have given their best to track this year, and their dedication paid off with a trip to the regional track meet.

Shelby Isaacs had a stroke of bad luck. She was to run the 100 m hurdles, the 300 m hurdles and the mile relay. A injured foot prevented her from running in this meet. Shelby's times would have been right up there with the best of them. Better luck next year, Shelby.

The mile relay ran a 4:44.9 and were fourth in their heat. This was not fast enough to make the finals, but it was a very respectable time. We were all very proud. This team consisted of Sandy Brummett, Jill Voss, Shalina Reyes, and Bobbie Armstrong.

Sandy Brummett had a big weekend at the track meet. Sandy began her day Friday with the triple jump. She made the finals in that event and finished eighth with a 32 foot, 8 inch jump. This even was run against a pretty good wind, so this was a very respectable distance to travel. Sandy ran the 100 m dash in 13.3 but did not make the finals. She also ran the 200 m dash in 27.75 and was 5 th in her heat. Sandy did not make the finals in this event despite running the best time of her life. She also ran a 65 second leg in the

1600 m relay, and began the race for the Lady Coyotes.

Tammy Cooley also had a stroke of bad luck in the shot put. In last week's preparation for the shot, Tammy strained her wrist prior to Friday's event. She threw the shot but was only able to put it 30 feet 9 inches. This was disappointing considering that her best throw of the year would have placed her in fourth. Better luck next year, Tammy.

Bobbie Armstrong and Shalina Reyes ran on the mile relay team. These girls gave $110 \%$ of what hey had to the Lady Coyote track team. This effort mad everyone that knew these girls very proud.

Jill Voss began her weekend with the long jump on Friday. she set a personal record in this event with a leap of 16 feet, 5 inches. She qualified for the finals in this event and finished eighth. There were three contestants that jumped 18 feet or over, making the competition very stiff. Jill ran the 400 meter dash on Friday and was second in her heat with a time of 63 seconds. Jill later ran the 200 meter dash in a time of 26.24 seconds. Jill made the finals in both of these events and ran again on Saturday. She had the third best qualifying time in the 400 m . dash, and the fourth best qualifying time in the 200 m . dash. In the finals of the 400 m . dash, Jill ran in second place for most of the race. On the last 100 meters a girl from Christoval out legged Jill to the finish line. Jill ran her lap in 63 flat and was third. (Hey another medal at regional, that's two in a row.) SUNNY VEGETARIAN SANDWICH
$3 / 4$ cup ( 2 oz .) low fat cottage cheese
$1 / 2$ tsp. lemon juice
1 small garlic clove, minced 3-4 drops Tabasco (hot pepper sauce, or to taste
salt and pepper, if desired 4 slices whole wheat bread $1 / 4$ cup ( 1 oz .) walnut pieces 1 small zucchini, very thinly sliced
1 carrot, very thinly sliced $1 / 2 \operatorname{cup}$ (about $1 / 2$ ounce)
alfalfa sprouts
4 slices tomato
In a small bowl, combine the first three ingredients and
blend until smooth. Season with Tabasco, salt and pepper, if desired. Spread each slice of bread with $1 / 4$ of the mixture. Divide walnuts equally and sprinkle on top of cottage cheese on two of the slices of bread. Divide zucchini and carrot slices equally and use to top walnuts. Then top vegetable slices with $1 / 2$ of the sprouts and 2 slices of tomato each. Top with the other slices of bread. Cut in half diagonally. Serve with a pear or apple. Serves 2.

A second week will be offered again this year to accommodate the increased demand for the growing camp, open to all girls in fifth grade through high school.

The camps, under the direction of South Plains College women's basketball coach Lyndon Hardin, are open to all girls in fifth grade through high school.
"We feel we have one of the better camps around," said South Plains College women's basketball coach Lyndon Hardin, director for the camps which will be held June 18-23 and July 16-21.
"We try to keep a small ration between

instructors and campers. It's a good environment to learn fundamentals."

The purpose of the camps is to provide an opportunity for girls and young women to improve their basketball skills in a fun environment. The fundamentals of basketball are stressed, with sportsmanship, team play and selfconfidence emphasized as well.
"We're not going to make them great players in a week," Hardin said, "but we give them a good foundation. We're going to work hard on basketball skills. It's not a recreational camp, but they have fun too."

The camps will be held in Texas dome on the SPC campus. Other facilities for use by the campers are a indoor swimming pool, indoor racquetball courts and tennis courts. In
addition, campers also may spend time at the SPC Student Center, which features a video arcade, pool and ping pong tables and a giant-screen televi-sion.

Camp participants may commute daily from their homes or spend the week on campus in a college residence hall.

The cost of the camp is \$200 for overnight campers, $\$ 165$ for day campers who eat in Texan Hall and $\$ 100$ for day campers who do not eat in the dining hall.

Included in the camp fee is instruction, insurance, awards and entertainment, as well as certificates, a personalized camp t-shirt and a basketball for each participant.

The camp schedule will include ball handling, dribbling, passing and shooting drills, along with scrimmages, tournament games and individual instruction.

Time also will be devoted to "Let's Talk Basketball," a session which will stress attitude, desire, leadership and enthusiasm.

Assisting Hardin with the camp will be Joy Muller, assistant women's basketball coach at SPC. Other members of the camp staff include current and former members of the SPC women's basketball team, in addition to other outstanding area high school coaches and college players. Previous camps have included appearances by former lady Texan Sheryl Swoopes.
"We just have a great staff," Hardin said. "They do a great job of teaching fundamentals. The girls get a lot of individual attention."

Hardin, in his 12th season at the SPC helm, was named the Junior College Coach of the Year by the Texas Basketball Coaches Association in 1992. During the 1993-94 season, he recorded 200th career victory at South Plains.

The veteran coach previously has been associated with camps at Texas Tech University, West Texas State Univer sity, Wayland Baptist Uni-
versity and Texas Women's University, in addition to camps at Canyon and Tulia high schools.

Camp applications will be accepted as they are received and should be returned as soon as possible. A $\$ 75$ deposit should be sent with the application, and the remaining balance will be due at the time of registration.

Registration will be held on June 18 and July 16 at 2 p.m. in Gillespie Hall, with camp activities. concluding at $3 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. on June 23 and July 21.

The deposit is nonrefundable after May 19 and July 7 , and a $\$ 20$ charge will be made on all refunds.
