SOLAR INTEREST RISING

As ranchers look for alternatives, however, they are faced with the recent drop in the beef cattle market, according to Ed Uvacek, Extention economist-livestock marketing. Uvacek, who is headquartered at College Station, said that large marketings from heavyweight cattle and low yields from feed lots have combined to weaken the cattle market.

"Each of these two symptoms must be solved before any real recovery can materialize," Uvacek said. "The good news, however, is that these symptoms are related and can be solved almost simultaneously if feedlots act rationally. The feedlots have already made some adjustments."

The cattle industry has finally been blessed with some good news--- the July cattle on feed report and the midyear cattle inventory, the economist said. Both reports indicate that the outlook for beef will be improving later this year, he said.

"Cattle feeding is down and cattle/calf numbers on farms has decreased even further," he explained. This downward adjustment appears to indicate that the current drop in cattle prices is temporary in nature and prices should recover as soon as current oversupply is exhausted.





Two Mexican males, believed to be illegal aliens, entered the ranch home of Bill Dunn,64, on the Bunger Ranch in northwest Kinney County on Tuesday morning, August 6. They beat Dunn, threatened his life, and took property valued at over \$13,000.

Dunn related that he had left the house at approx. 7:30 am to take two ranch hands to their work location for the day. He returned to the house at approx. 8:30 am and when he entered the kitchen through the back door, the men were standing in a bedroom with two of his own rifles leveled at him. They ordered him into the bedroom where they beat him, robbed him of \$31.00 cash and took his pocket knife, which one of the men held at his throat while the other prowled through the house searching for valuables.

The two men held Dunn captive and terrorized him with death threats for over two hours. At one time they loaded him into the front seat of the 1985 Chevy ranch pickup and transported him approx. 3 miles from the house into heavy brush where they tied him to a tree and again threatened to kill him. They left him there alone for approx. 45 minutes while they went back to the house and ransacked it, taking cameras, wristwatches, jewelery and other valuables. Upon their return they moved Dunn twice more, tying him to trees both times. Dunn said that they were acting very unstable and he firmly believed that they were going to kill him.

Finally, about 10:00 am the men returned Dunn to the house, tying him and leaving him on a bed in one of the bedrooms. They then threatened to kill him if he called the law. The two men then left the area, taking the 1985 pickup and other property.

Dunn worked himself loose from his bonds after about two hours and went to a neighboring ranch owned by Clyde Earwood. By the time they could get to a phone to report the incident it was

2:45 pm, giving the two bandits a 5 hour headstart.

I called Texas Ranger Tol Dawson to assist me in the investigation and the ranch was searched by air from a U.S. Border Patrol plane to make sure that the men and the vehicle were off the ranch. There are no clues at this time as to the identity of the two criminals but their description is as follows:

Subject#1-35-40 years of age,5'7", muscular build, shoulder length hair, medium complexion, wearing a headband, narrow between the

Subject#2-25-30 years of age,5'10", medium build, extra dark complexion, shoulder length hair.

Both men were wearing blue jeans, no other description available.

Rural crime along the Texas-Mexico border has increased dramatically the last few years and violent crimes associated with illegal aliens is steadily on the increase. Our governments, both state and national, should seriously consider the problem before ti gets totally out of hand. Local law enforcement departments are not equipped with either the equipment nor the manpower to protect the citizens of the various border counties affected under the current methods by which we have to operate.

These crimes and incidents of violence could be dramatically reduced by using some old-fashioned ways of law enforcement and frontier justice, but the hue and cry of police brutality over the

years have tied the hands of those of us in law enforcement almost to the point where we have to ask criminals not to a ttack our citizens, burglarize our homes, and steal our property

steal our property. The government of Mexico is taking advantage of the U. S. as so many have done in the past. We always seem to try and buy the friendship and support of other countries while they take our money and assistance and laugh all the way to the bank, resenting us all the while. Mexico is extremely rich in natural resources including oil, gas, and other minerals. In Mexico the rich get richer and the poor get poorer and are forced to enter our country illegally to try and find work in order to support themselves and their families. The majority of illegal aliens coming into our country from Mexico are probably just whay they seem to be, but increasing numbers of them are hardened, violent criminals, often wanted in their own country, who assault our citizens, and rob and steal from them.

Over the past few years I have caught several illegal aliens who committed crimes in our county. Every one of them has been convicted in court for his crimes, but only one has gone to prison, the others have been released on probation and sent back to their own country.

My advice? Excercise your rights under the Constitution and defend yourselves, your families, and your property by whatever force is necessary





lectricity must be treated with caution—especially when you're using any kind of equipment that requires you to work close to overhead power lines.


Make sure you have enough clearance when you're carrying a tall pole or pipe on a tractor...or driving a truck with a raised bed...or operating machinery such as cranes, drilling rigs, cotton module builders, hay balers, and other big equipment.

Don't forget for a moment that the power lines could be there. And don't just assume that clearance is adequate; be sure. One careless move can endanger your life and that of anyone near you.

Remember, too, that fallen power lines are extremely dangerous. If you see a downed line, call CPL immediately. Then stay away from the wire and everything it touches-and keep others away.




