TELEPHONE SERVICES FOR DISABLED CUSTOMERS

Realizing the need to help disabled customers understand who provides which services in the wake of the AT&T break-up, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company offers a brochure, "Services for Disabled Customers."

The brochure is available in both English and Spanish from Southwestern Bell Telephone Customer Assistance Bureaus. (The Spanish version is titled "Servicios para Clientes Inhabiltados.")

Broadest distinction made in the brochure is that equipment such telecommunication devices for speech and hearing-impaired people is offered by AT&T, not Southwestern Bell. (The telecommunications devices are referred to as TDDs.)

As the local operating company, Southwestern Bell offers a variety of services related to connecting such equipment.



operators. Again, verification of the customer's need must be provided to Southwestern Bell Telephone by a qualified physician, specialist or


TDD users can call TDD/TTY Operator Services at 1-800-855-1155 any time they need assistance making local, long distance, collect, credit card or third number calls.





At the request of the Ft. Clark Springs Board of Directors, Ft. Clark Security borrowed an old radar set from the Sheriff's Dept. and conducted a traffic survey on Ft. Clark recently. This survey was conducted due to complaints and reports of cars traveling at unsafe speeds on the roads of Ft. Clark and to give the board a more accurate view of the actual average speeds being driven.

There is reason for concern on the part of not only the board of directors, but the residents and members of Ft. Clark over the past few months

Traffic accidents kill, injure, and cripple hundreds of people throughout the state every year and two of the leading causes of these accidents are alcohol and excessive speed. Most people associate serious motor vehicle accidents, injuries, and deaths with heavily traveled public roads and highways. Well, consider this, at least three of the most serious accidents, and the only fatality, that have occured in Kinney County so far this year have occured on Ft. Clark Springs. All of the major accidents have had at least one of the main elements that cause accidents, either alcohol, or speed that was excessive for the existing conditions.

Ft. Clark is a beautiful place to live and has the potential for growth and development. without losing the small town, neighborly flavor that appeals to all fo us. But Ft. Clark has, in my opinion, a serious traffic problem in that most of the residents are aware that state traffic laws cannot be enforced within the boundaries of Ft. Clark. Therefore, parents allow their unlicensed, inexperienced youngsters to drive 4,000 pound automobiles, high-speed motorcycles, and other motorized vehicles on the roadways of Ft. Clark, unsupervised by a parent or other experienced adult.

Every major accident that has occured on Ft. Clark this year was alcohol related in that the drivers of the vehicles involved had consumed alcohol, some to excess, immediately prior to the accident, and only one was an unlicensed juvenile driver, the others were licensed adults.

The laws of our society and the enforcement of those laws is based on what is best for the MAJORITY of the people. Sometimes, and quite often, it seems that everyone wants the laws of the land enforced, as long at it's on the other guy. When the law must reach out and touch some folks, they wiggle like a bug on a hot rock and grumble and growl like a bear with a sore tail. Let's face it, we have a serious problem on Ft. Clark involving traffic. That problem can be decreased and even eliminated through common sense and cooperation of all the people working together. The stop signs, speed limit signs, and other traffic control devices being used throughout Ft. Clark are there for only one purpose, and that is to provide for the SAFE CONTROLLED movement of traffic. If everyone using the roadways of Ft. Clark will get the chip off their shoulders and use common sense in their driving habits and voluntarily

cooperate by observing the various traffic control devices, Ft. Clark will be a safer and happier place to live. Let's all work together for our mutual safety and common good!

PAGE 6 HARRISON ATTENDS NCSL MEETING

AUSTIN---- Rep. Dudley Harrison (D-Sanderson) joined with several thousand state legislators from throughout the country last week at the Eleventh Annual Meeting of the National Conference of State Legislators (NCSL) in Seattle. NCSL is the official representative of the nation's state legislators and their staffs, and the Annual Meeting offers opportunities for legislators and staff to meet and share concerns on a wide range of issues.

Economic development, health and education were among the top issues examined in Seattle. The opening plenary session, "U.S. Economis Competitiveness," examined the success of the United States in an increasingly competitive world market. Featured speakers included Kevin Phillips, CBS commentator and syndicated columnist; Hunter Lewis, Managing Director, Lewis, Bailey Associates; and Dr. George F. Brown Jr., Executive Vice President, Data Resources, Inc.

U.S. Secretary of Education William Bennett spoke to the delegates and discussed a number of critical state-federal education issues. Major education sessions at the meeting focused on evaluating educational excellence, education for the handicapped and teacher certification. Health care was discussed at another major plenary entitled "America's Health Care System in Transition" that featured Dr. Uwe Reinhardt, Professor of Economics and Public Affairs at Princeton. Many delegates also participated in a health fair that included various health screenings. Health care cost containment and child health were discussed in other sessions at the meeting.

Delegates heard a panel discussion on the impact of the media on political institutions. Panelists included former White House spokemen Jody Powell and Ron Nessen, former Atlanta Mayor Maynard Jackson, and Columbia University Journalism Professor Fred Friendly.

Rep. Harrison is a member of the Agriculture and Food policy Committee of NCSL's State-Federal Assembly. This

committee heard presentations from U.S. Senate and House staff on the status of the 1985 Farm Bill and Washington Congressman Sid Morrison addressed the members. An official from the U.S. Department of Agriculture discussed the Department's credit plans for the 1986 crop year. Food processing and packaging issues also were examined.

Major policy debate centered around captive shippers and the Staggers Rail Act. This act was passed in 1980 to deregulate the competitive traffic of our nations railroads. At the same time the Interstate Commerce Commission was directed to assure that maximum competition between the railroads is maintained and that the rates charged to captive shippers -- those effective without transportation alternatives -are reasonable. Over the past five years many people have felt the ICC has not protected captive shippers from unreasonalbe rates, especially

small agricultural grain shippers. Therefore the NCSL passed a resolution encouraging the ICC to enforce the neasures et forth to deregulate the railroad industry and protect the captive shippers.

Harrison said, "This meeting gave me the unique opportunity to meet with other state lawmakers from all over the country to share ideas on how to deal with issues of concern to all state lawmakers. I am especially proud to have worked in committee to help outline measures to curb the unreasonable rates being charged by the railroad industry to the small agricultural shippers. This will help the ailing farm economy in the state of Texas and across the nation as a whole."

ROTARY CLUB SCHOLARSHIP

The Brackettville Rotary Club and Rotary District 584 will be accepting applications for four different Rotary Foundation Scholarships until October 1, 1985, according to chairman, David Trent of the District Rotary Foundation Committee.

These scholarships, which average approximately \$16,000 each, will help eligible students study abroad for the 1986-87 academic year.

The type of awards to be given this year are: Graduate Scholarships; Undergraduate Scholarship; Vocational Scholarship; Teacher of the Handicapped Scholarship and Journalism Scholarship.

The requirements for each of these awards are as follows: GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP: Bachelor's degree or equivalent prior to commencement of award studies. Students, single or married between the ages of 18 and 28 are eligible.

UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP: Completion of two years undergraduate study before commencement of award studies. Single students between the ages of 18 and 24 are eligible.

VOCATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP: Secondary school graduate or equivalent at time of application. At least two years work experience required. Applicants should be between the ages of 21 and 50 and may be married.

TEACHER OF THE HANDICAPPED SCHOLARSHIPS: Secondary school graduate or equivalent with at least two years experience teaching the handicapped. Applicants may be between the ages of 21 and 50 and may be married.

JOURNALISM SCHOLARSHIP: Secondary school graduate with two years full time experience as a journalist. Applicants should be between the ages of 21 and 50 and may be married.

If water for your garden is scarce, you may wish to set up an irrigation system. The two most popular ways to irrigate home gardens are the trench method—digging a furrow close to the row and flooding it with water that soaks into the root zones—and the drip method—using hoses with small holes in them to slowly water the plants and encourage water to seep deeply into the root zone.



Another way to battle drought conditions is with a practice called mulching. A dark plastic mulch made from shredded polyethylene plastic bags increases your soil's ability to retain moisture by preventing evaporation. Plastic mulches also help to control weeds.

Freezing is the number one method for preserving home-grown vegetables. Often the most convenient containers for freezing vegetables are plastic bags, such as GLAD Food Storage Bags, because the bags permit part of the contents to be easily removed and the remainder resealed and returned to the freezer.
