


PUMPER RACES




According to SWTJC Dean of Instruction Dr. Robert Aguero, "Students in classes ranging from developmental

math to advanced checistry are taking advantage of the computers, software and extended faculty hours provided by the MISIP grant."

Aguero, who originally applied for the grant, and Project Director Harold Farris, chairperson of the Science and Math Division, are responsible for the administration of the funds generated by the grant.

The funds have been utilized to stock the SWTJC Math Lab with seven new computers, instructional and classroom management software, and additional faculty lab time.

Faculty members involved in the project are Math Instructors Yvonne Martinez, Jime Swink and Anna Walter; and Chemistry Instructor Ed Heath. The las is manned by a professional instructor from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.. Mondy through Thursday and 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Friday.

"The cost of such extended faculty attention would be prohibitive withour the MISIP grant," Farris said. "Students in math, biology, chemistry and physics all have access to the las."

In addition to open lab time, a section of developmental math and intermediate algebra meet in the lab.

"Doty and Associates of Austin presented a workshop for the instructors involved on software selection and classroom management techniques," Aguero explained. "As result of the workshop and the effort of our faculty, we

are able to effectively and efficiently use the equipment for both classroom situations and open lab time."

"The software and lab instructional programs abve been geared to specific objectives taught in specific courses," he continued.


Farris has established a system based on voluntary student participation that can result in grade enhancement and a special note being added to the participating student's transcript.

"The student's are comint in," he said. "They get extra points on their grade, but their grades just naturarlly improve anyway as a result of spending time in the lab."

The MISIP grant will expire at the end of the 1985-86 year and a Department of Education evaluation of the project will be conducted.

"If the success of this program continues at its present rate, we could be eligible for an even larger grant in the future," Farris concluded.



Another snake bite victim occured in Kinney County last week when a ranch-hand working on a ranch approx. 6 miles west of Spofford was bitten by a rattlesnake. The man received preliminary first aid and treatment at the Kinney County Clinic before being transferred by ambulance to Val Verde Memorial Hospital.

Versie Burns, who lives on the west side of town near Pinto Road, has had her problems with snakes lately. She has reported finding two snakes in her home the past week. The first was in her bedrom and was confirmed as a' rattlesnake after I killed it with a hoe. It was approx. 8 inches long, but don't let the small ones fool you, they are just as deadly as a 6 footer. The second was sighted by Ms. Burns in her living room and she described it as being just like" the first one, but I was unable to locate the snake even though all the furniture in the room was moved and I looked under all of it and in every logical place.

As the weather begins it's gradual trend to cooler temperatures during the fall, the rattlesnake, a pit viper that hunts primarily at night, will become more ative in the daylight hours and will begin movement to dens used for hibernation during the winter months. You would be well advised to keep a sharp eye out, particularly in those areas where you might have wood piles, brush, or other areas around your home that might be attractive to snakes seeking concealment and shelter for the winter.

If bitten by snake, try not to panic, snake bites, though painful and dangerous, seldom result in death and with prompt treatment and care, the damage to the injured area will be kept to a minimum. Try to identify the snake or get a good description as to color, length, and the shape of the head (most poisonous snakes in our area are pit vipers and

will have a distinctly triangular shaped head). Kill the snake if you can for a positive identification by the doctor treating the bite.. Non-poisonous snakes can and will bite you, and their bites also need a doctors care as they can be very painful and the possibility of infection exists. A non-poisonous snake has a row of teeth that are shaped like a horseshoe, they DO NOT have fangs. A poisonous snake also has a horseshoe shaped row of teeth, but has fangs used to inject the venom into it's victim, and the punctures caused by the fangs are usually easily seen and identifiable from teeth marks. Take reasonable precautions and watch where you step.

County Court was held on Thursday, Spet. 19, with Judge Albert Postell presideng and there were several cases heard, the results are shown below:

Six (6) persons tried and found guilty for Driving While Intoxicated and fined a total of \$2,893.00.

One (1) person tried for Possession of Marijuana and fined \$389.00.

One (1) person tried for Delivery of Marijuana and fined \$590.00 and sentenced to twenty (20) days in County Jail.

One (1) person tried for Driving While License Suspended and fined \$440.00.

County Judge Albert Postell continues to hand down stiff fines and jail terms for DWI and drug related offenses brought before his court, and this will eventually have it's evvect, particularly on the local level, in causing people to think twice about drunk driving or drug involvement in Kinney County.





DEER CENSUS -- CAN IT HELP YOU?

UVALDE, Texas -- Managing a ranch is never easy. Considering the deplorable state of traditional agriculture, many landowners are beginning to put more emphasis on non-traditional sources of income, such as deer, accroding to Dr. Dwight Guynn, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

With traditional agricultural, ranchers have to have a pretty good idea of livestock numbers and be able to adjust numbers according to pasture conditions, Guynn

said.

"Sometimes, when pasture conditions are affected by drought, culling some of the stock is necessary. This situation occurs with all types of livestock -- cattle, sheep and goats," he

explained.

"This applies as well to deer numbers on ranches. Deer herd size must be adjusted to meet range conditions if the herd is to remain healthy and productive," he said. Deer herd size can be managed by legally increasing or decreasing hunting pressure during the fall hunting season, he said.

A deer census is the first step in achieving deer management goals, Guynn said.

"Driving through the pasture late in the evening does not give an accurate idea of the deer population size," he pointed out. "Because deer are naturally elusive and tend to be active mostly at night, many rancher underestimate the number of deer on their ranch. A more accurate estimate of deer numbers is necessary to insure good management," Guynn added.

The method of deer census most commonly used in the Hill Countyr is the spot-light census technique, he said.

"This is much more than just driving around the pasture at night with a spotlight," he explained.

A spotlight census route is laid out so that it will be representative of the ranch, Guynn said. A 10- to 15-mile route is recommended where practical. This route is driven after dark with a pickup truck with two people standing in the bed of the truck. Each has a spotligh and counts deer on "his" side of the truck, he said.

The truck is driven slowly at about seven to ten miles per hour. Initially, when the census route is being established, a "distance of visibility" reading is taken every one-tenth mile, Guynn said. This is done by stopping the truck with one person remaining in the bed of the truck with a spotlight and the other person walking off at right angles to the line of travel until they disappear from sight, he explained.

At the conclusion of an initial spotligh census, the average of all the visibility readings is calculated and the distance is noted from the odometer of the vehicle, he said. "Once the average width of the visibility is known and the distance is noted, it is simple to calculate the acreage that was observed while driving the census route," he said.

"Of course, the deer seen

"Of course, the deer seen were counted and since the acres observed has been calculated, the density in terms of deer per acre is easily determined," Guynn saig.

A copy of the bulletin explaining this technique with example calculations is available from the Texas Agricultural Extension

In addition, as a courtesy to the local game warden, Guynn advises that anyone contemplating this census make the warden aware of their plans. "Therefore, you won't be mistaken for a poacher and the game warden won't have to make a futile trip to your ranch," Guynn said.

BRADY, BENDELE ACCEPT RANCH MANAGER POSITIONS

Dan T. Brady and Jim Bendele are the new ranch managers for the Rio Grande Plain Experimental Ranches. near Uvalde, according to Dr. Bill Holloway, Resident Director for Research at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center.

The two ranches are used by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station for research to develop the understanding necessary for profitable ranching and effective risk management, Holloway said.

Brady and his wife, Glenda, are living on the

George Lyles Ranch, located between Uvalde and La Pryor. The Experiment Station has a research agreement with the owners, the Reagan Houston family.

Brady is a native of Georgetown and received his B.S. degree in agriculture from Texas A&M University. He wa previously employed by Sloan Livestock in San Saba.

Bendele, a natice of D'Hanis, received a B.S. degree in agricultural economics from Texas A&M. He worked for Hi-Pro Feeds in Uvalde and auction markets in College Station before coming to work for the Experiment Station. He is managing the Martin Unit Ranch, which is near Spofford.

TAX WORKSHOPS OFFERED

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is cooperating with the Internal Revenue Service in offering 39 Tax Pracitioner Workshops across the state, reports Carl R. Esser, County Extension Agent.

Twenty-five General Workshops will be held in all major Texas cities. The General workshop nearest our county is in San Antonio on November 25 thru November 26. There will also be fourteen Advanced Workshops offered in major cities. The General Tax Workshops will concentrate mostly on personal taxes -- the Advanced Workshops' emphasis will be on business tax problems.

In addition to the General and Advanced Tax Workshops, there will be three Partnership Workshops, six Oil & Gas Tax Workshops, and -- new this year -- three workships dealing with IRS/Taxpayer disputes. Four Estate Planning and Tax Form Preparation Workshops especially developed for accountants will be offered in Newsman

offered in November. The Tax Practitioner educational program has been highly successful. Last year about 3,200 people participated in this statewide series. These pracitioners reported filing more than 535,000 tax returns. 





After The Party Is Over

Cleaning up after a party can be less depressing if you heed a few hints.



Because most pots and pans are sturdy, people are tempted to use harsh scouring or abrasive cleaners. With regular use, however, those cleansers will damage surfaces. Enamel, stainless steel and porcelain can be permanently scratched by harsh cleansers. Once scratched, they absorb stains easily.

To remove stains and dirt while reducing the potential for scratching, try a cleanser, such as Soft Scrub, a mild, abrasive liquid cleanser. Apply a small amount to a damp sponge, lightly wipe and rinse. To remove food dried onto the bottom of a pot, pour cold water into it and let it stand until the food softens and can be removed. If the food is baked on, cover with water and bring to a boil. A note of caution here. Copper and aluminum are very soft, and abrasives, even mild ones, are not advised. Instead, clean them with special polishes.

Periodically, treat wooden handles on pots and pans with mineral oil. Wipe the oil on and let it soak in. After a while, wipe the handles dry, This helps preserve the wood,
