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## SWTJC

### S.W.T.J.C. NEWS

Eleven new members of Southwest Texas Junior College's chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, a national academic fraternity, were initiated recently in a ceremony traditionally held biannually by the organization.

New members welcomed September 23rd in the conference rooms of the SWTJC Matthews Student Center included Aletha Granberry of Asherton; Juana A. Hernandez of Brackettville; Suelema Saldana of Carrizo Springs; Sandra E. Espinoza, Luis Galvan and Carmel Zavala of Crystal City; Beatriz Ziegler of Eagle Pass; and Maria E. Hernandez, Yolanda Hernandez, Tricia Jacob and Suzanne R. Reyes of Uvalde.

Phi Theta Kappa and the local chapter, Eta Beta, was organized to promote scholarship, develop leadership and cultivate fellowship in superior students.

To be eligible for membership, students must have a total grade point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale, have completed 12 semester hours of work which applies toward an academic degree at a senior college, and be a full-time student the semester they are initiated.

SWTJC sponsors of PTK are History Instructor Barbara Blair and Data Processing Instructor Manuel Alejandro. Student officers, who conducted the initiation Monday, are Lynn Magee, president; Kim Breedlove, vice-president; Dale Richey, secretary; Jesus Moncada, treasurer; and James Meyer, reporter.

Fall semester plans of the organization are to sponsor the SWTJC Halloween dance and present several seminars on 1985-86 honors theme, "Ethics in Today's Media: An Endangered Alliance." SWTJC Director of Public Information David England will conduct the first seminar on Thursday, October 3, in the student center. Music Instructor Dr. Lura Davidson provided the music during the initiation.

### MORE SWTJC NEWS

Publicity on college tuition increases recently mandated by the Texas

legislature probably contributed to the enrollment decrease at Southwest Texas Junior College and many other community colleges in the state even though, ironically, the legislation essentially made a two-year college education a bigger bargain than ever before, according to SWTJC officials.

As a result of the legislation, tuition at Texas four-year public universities tripled, rising from four dollars per semester hour to \$12. At SWTJC, tuition increased from four dollars per hour to six.

"Many students came directly to financial aid first during registration to borrow money to cover what they believed was a huge tuition increase," said SWTJC Financial Aid Director Ismael Talvera. "Most decided they didn't need the extra money when they discovered how insignificant our increase was."

According to Mack Adams of the Texas College and University Coordinating Board, four-year university tuition will increase to \$16 per hour in the fall 1986, to \$18 in 1989, \$20 in 1991, \$22 in 1993, and \$24 in 1995.

"To meet rising costs and stay in line with the current trend that users of public services pay a higher percentage of the cost of those services, SWTJC tuition will go to eight dollars per hour in the fall of 1986," said SWTJC President Dr. Jimmy Goodson.

"But we have no plans at this time to increase tuition after that," he continued. "Compared to other institutions, a community college education is even more a bargain than ever before."

Enrollment at SWTJC decreased approximately 10% this fall, down to 2,216 from the 2,483 students that registered in the fall of 1984. Most of the decrease was in the evening program. Statewide, the decrease averaged 8 to 10%.

From the 1984 totals, the Uvalde evening program was down 80 students; Del Rio decreased 42; Eagle Pass, 28; Crystal City, 53; and Devine, 39. Conversely, the Uvalde day program decrease was less than three per cent and the number of hours for which day students registered was virtually the same last year.

"Most of our evening students are adults who have to balance a tight budget every month," said SWTJC Del Rio Center Director Dr. Joe Kirkland. "There were probably as many who stayed home during registration fearing a massive tuition increase as there were those who showed up thinking they needed a loan."

"Very few realized that the cost of six credit hours, which is the normal evening course load, only rose from \$30 to \$36 at SWTJC," he continued.

The value of a community college vocational/technical program becomes even more significant when the \$2,500 to \$3,000 fee charged by most trade schools is considered, according to Kirkland.

Those who do need financial aid have several options, according to Talvera. SWTJC will assist students in applying for U.S. Department of Education Pell Grants, Work-Study Program, Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants, Texas Public Education Grants, and the guaranteed Student Loan Program.

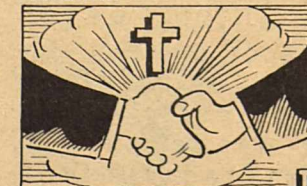
"Students seeking financial aid should bring the income tax returns of the person who is the major source of their financial support to our office approximately six weeks before registration, and we will help them fill out the Financial Aid Form, which is the beginning of the application process," Talvera said. "Despite all the publicity about federal and state budget cuts, there is still plenty of aid available."

**SESQUICENTENNIAL**

**NEWS**

AUSTIN--- October 1 is the official deadline for acceptance of proposals for Sesquicentennial commemorative and promotional products, according to the Sesquicentennial Commission's marketing department. The deadline was approved by the Commission's executive committee on August 27.

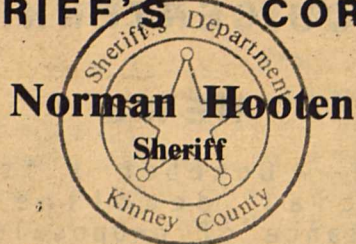
As posted in the Sesquicentennial Commission's program guidelines, each vendor representing an official commemorative or promotional product manufacturer must be registered with the Commission before the vendor may market the products. All new proposals must be in the Commission's office by October 1 in order to be considered in the final round of Commission approvals, said Sesquicentennial Commission executive director Lynn Nabers.

"We've reached a total of 600 products, both commemorative and promotional, and it's now time to close out the program so that we may provide retailers and retail buyers with the final list of approved vendors in time for the Christmas season," said Nabers.

Commemorative products are those which may be sold on a statewide basis, with a certain royalty returned to the state based on the wholesale price of the article. Promotional products, however, were designed chiefly to assist local Sesquicentennial committees in their fundraising and may be sold only by those committees or through retail outlets designated by the committees.

Legislation passed by the House of Representatives last spring has enabled the Commission to begin a crackdown on illegal use of the Sesquicentennial logo on products that have not been officially approved by the Commission. "The Attorney General is now authorized to institute civil action against such logo violators, and these persons may be fined up to \$5,000 per day per illegal use of the logo," said Nabers.

**SHERIFF'S CORNER**



**SHERIFF'S CORNER

The heavy rains that fell last week-end brought much needed moisture to the pasture lands and yards of Kinney County and a welcome relief from the heat. Unofficial reports of rainfall ranged from 2 inches in the northern portions of our county to as much as 11 inches in the south near Spofford and 5 to 6 inches in town.

The run-off from the rain caused flooding of low water crossings on several rural roads, especially those in south Kinney County. Two Eagle Pass residents and to seek shelter with local rancher Sid Martin last Saturday night after their car was washed off the road at a low water crossing on Hwy. 1908. They were cut off from other assistance by high water and were unable to get out until Sunday afternoon and the car was later pulled out by a large wrecker.

Another vehicle was stranded by high water on Hwy. 693 approx. 16 miles south of Brackettville Saturday night and no occupants were located at the scene. The vehicle was a 1973 Ford pickup with Louisiana license plates on it and is believed to be from a hunting camp, though the owner or operator has not been located at the time of this writing. The vehicle was pulled out by a local wrecker.

There was another benefit from the heavy rains that was utilized by the Alvin McClure family of Spofford. I was parked on Hwy. 1908 watching the flood waters at a low water crossing Saturday afternoon when Alvin, his wife, and his daughter arrived. They were armed with dip nets and coffee cans, equipment that is usually associated with the coastal areas of Texas and Louisiana. Within a short period of time they had captured hundreds of craw-dads (cray-fish) that were crawling across the highway going upstream in the floodwaters. Some of the females loaded with hundreds

of baby craw-dads. Alvin told me that every time heavy rains cause flooding in the Spofford area at that particular crossing they catch hundreds of craw-dads. Where do they come from? Nobody knows, but it is almost unbelievable the numbers of them we saw crossing the road and the thousands of frogs that could be heard singing their happy songs because of the rain. Think about it, hundreds of craw-dads and thousands of frogs, creatures that are usually associated with wet lands and a year round source of water close at hand, suddenly appearing in an area that was, only a short time before, dry as a desert and had been for months.

Mother Nature, what a strange and beautiful thing she is!

We received Felony arrest warrants for three Ft. Clark residents Monday, and I was assisted by THP Trooper Robert Cano in making the arrests. The three men were wanted on Felony charges of Forgery & Receiving Stolen Property by Patton, Pennsylvania authorities. Their bonds have been set at \$35,000 each. The men have indicated that they will fight extradition.

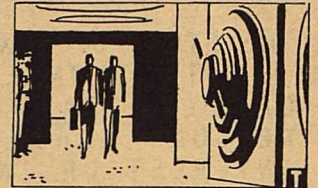
**What's In It For You??**

**New Law Means Government Can Return Unclaimed Bank Property, But Time Is Running Out**

A new law could mean the return of some interesting family property to you if you or a relative had a safe deposit box in a bank that failed before 1933. Time is running out, however, all claims must be made by June 30, 1984.

The Garn-St. Germain Depository Institutions Act of 1982 grants The Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC) authority to return or otherwise dispose of property that has been in its possession for 50 years. The OCC obtained the property from receivers who closed out the affairs of banks that failed before the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation was established.

Most of the property, says Comptroller of the Currency, C.T. Conover, is financial and personal papers, such as letters, bills of sales, copies of mortgages and deeds and some bonds and stock certificates. There are more interesting papers as well that may be valuable to heirs, such as adoption papers and World War I discharge papers. There are also a relatively small number of objects that may have some monetary value, such as coins, flatware, jewelry and guns. Other unique heirlooms that have been found in these safe deposit boxes: a broken baby's

bracelet and a family tree complete with locks of hair from each family member.

Among the national banks that are on the Federal Register list are many once located in small towns in Indiana, California, Michigan, Illinois, New York, New Jersey and many other states.

The law stipulates that only those who file a valid claim before the June 30, 1984 deadline will be able to inspect the property. You must get a claims form from the OCC and be willing to supply certain documents that will establish your relationship to the last known owner of the property. Claim forms and lists of original owners by state can be obtained by writing to the Claims Processing Unit, Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, Washington, D.C. 20219, or call (202) 487-4475.

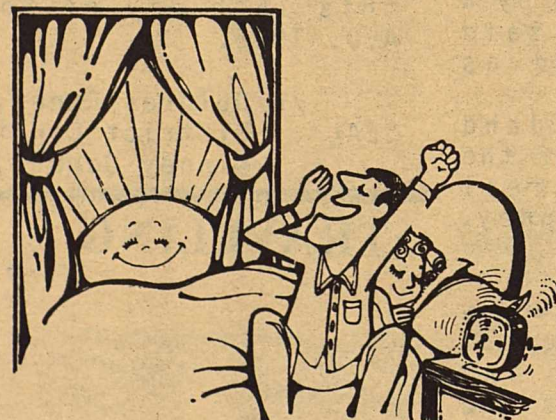
Lead has been used for years to increase the octane rating of gasoline and improve your car's performance. Leaded gasoline, however, may adversely affect people's health.

Now, cars are built to run on unleaded gasoline and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has developed a program to reduce the lead in gasoline by half this year and eliminate it completely by 1988.

No lead doesn't mean lower octane. Arco Chemical Company, a division of Atlantic Richfield Company, has developed a methanol blend for gasoline called OXINOL® Octane Enhancer which can replace the octane qualities of lead. In addition, tests have shown that this precise blend reduces hydrocarbon emissions by an average of 25 percent and carbon monoxide emissions by an average of 45 percent. The EPA-approved mixture consists of 91 percent unleaded gasoline, 4.5 percent methanol, and 4.5 percent cosolvent which acts as a link between the methanol and other components.

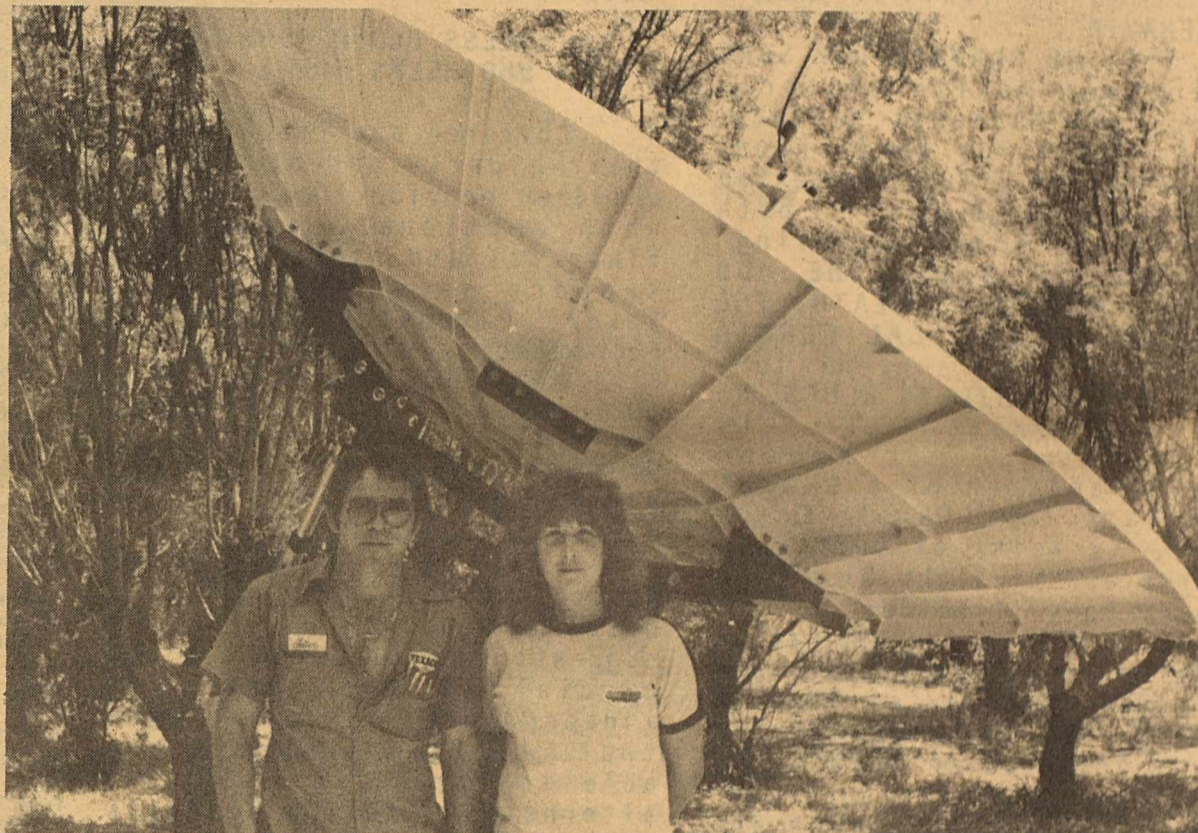
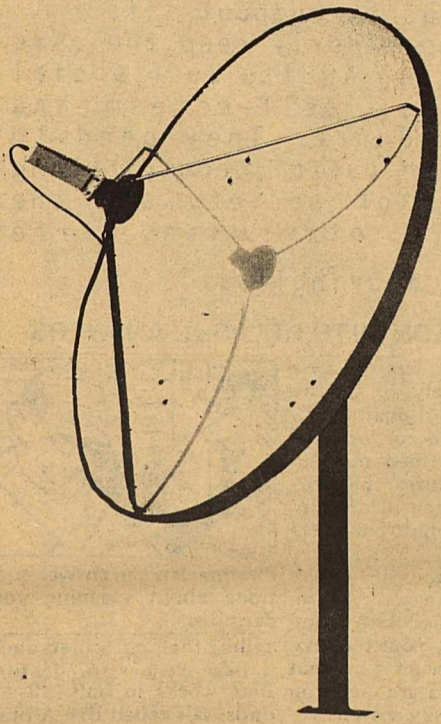

CHILDLESS OLDER ADULTS: WHO HELPS THEM?

Children are important to their elderly parents. Adult children provide their parents with emotional, material, financial and other types of support says Mrs. Sylvia Baker, Extension Agent-Home Economist.

Yet recent research studies indicate that childless elderly have levels of well being that match and sometimes exceed those oldsters with children.

Since childless older adults are able to construct a parallel quality of life it suggests that children are not crucial in the quest for independence. Or it may mean that childless couples are able to establish effective alternatives to the benefits they would receive from children.

Adult children are not available as a fail-safe resource. Studies indicate that as a result, childlessness seems to produce

capable, self-reliant elderly. Of course, this adaptation is a lifelong process.

It's incorrect to assume that the elderly who have children will have someone who can and will look after their interests. The family is not necessarily the crucial element in determining a high quality of life in old age. What is important is for adults to sustain close friendships and/or kinship relations throughout life.

The elderly need the same things all adults do - social contacts, self-esteem and independence. They need to feel like useful, contributing members of society and the family; otherwise, life becomes meaningless.

One of the family's best friends is likely to be the neighborhood pharmacist. After your doctor or dentist has prescribed medication or procedures, the pharmacist can often offer helpful advice to best complete the treatment.

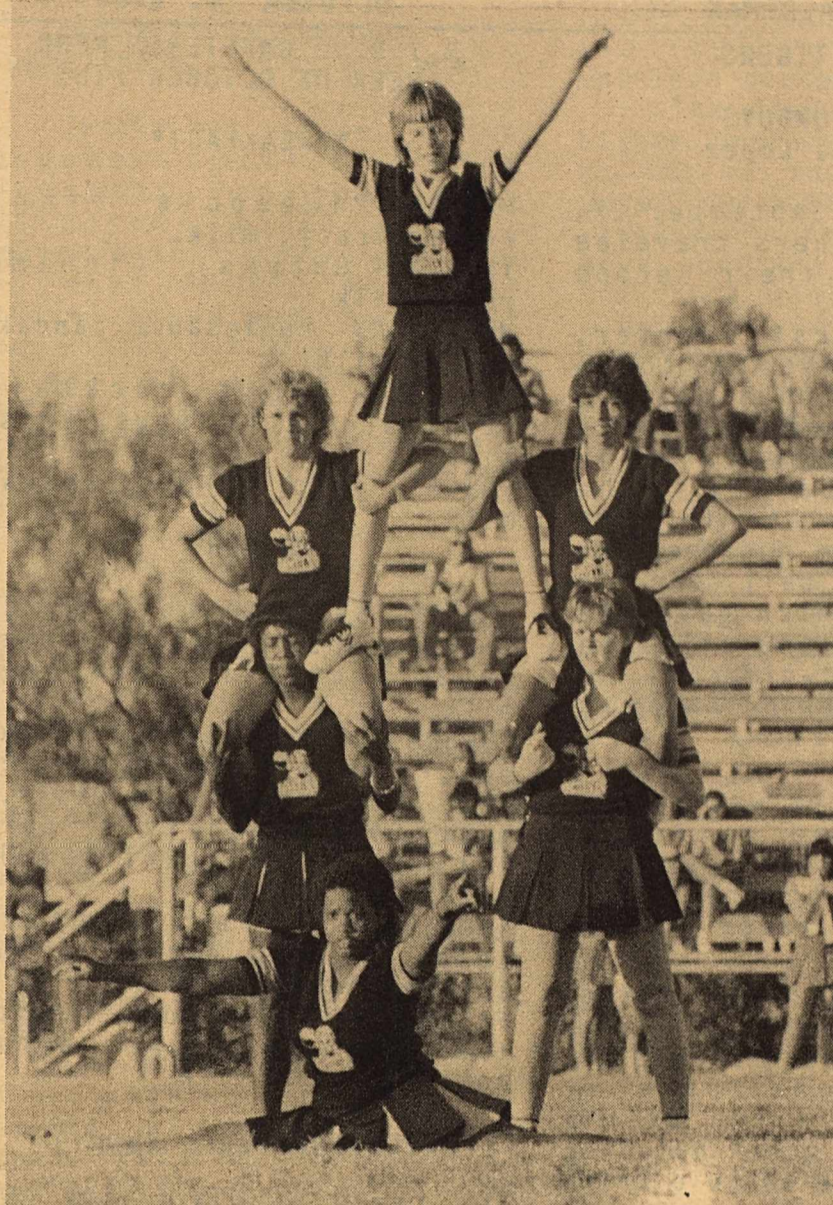

| 1 Egg                          | 2 Tablespoons Parmesan Cheese             |
| 1 Tablespoon Whole Wheat Flour | 2 Tablespoons Sunflower Seeds             |
| 2 Cups Low-Fat Cottage Cheese  |   |

Heat oil in a Dutch oven and sauté onion, mushrooms and garlic until tender.

In a small bowl, mix egg, flour and cottage cheese. Add to sautéed vegetables along with spinach. Stir rice, pepper, thyme and 1 tablespoon of parmesan cheese.

Turn into a greased 12 x 8-inch baking dish and top with remaining parmesan cheese and sunflower seeds.

Bake at 375 degrees F for at least 30 minutes.

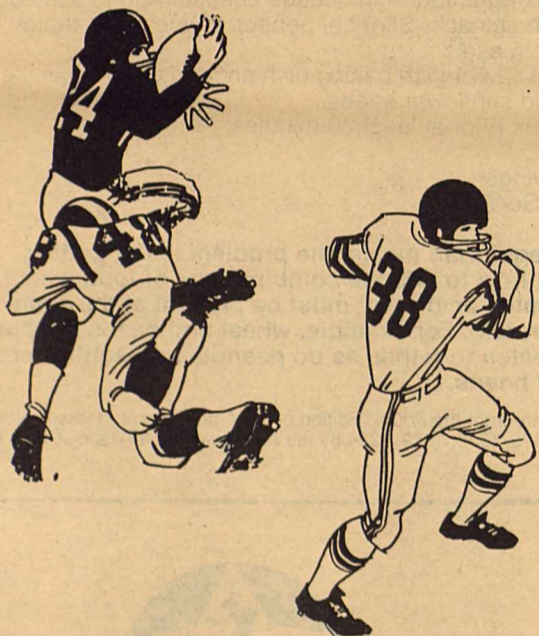

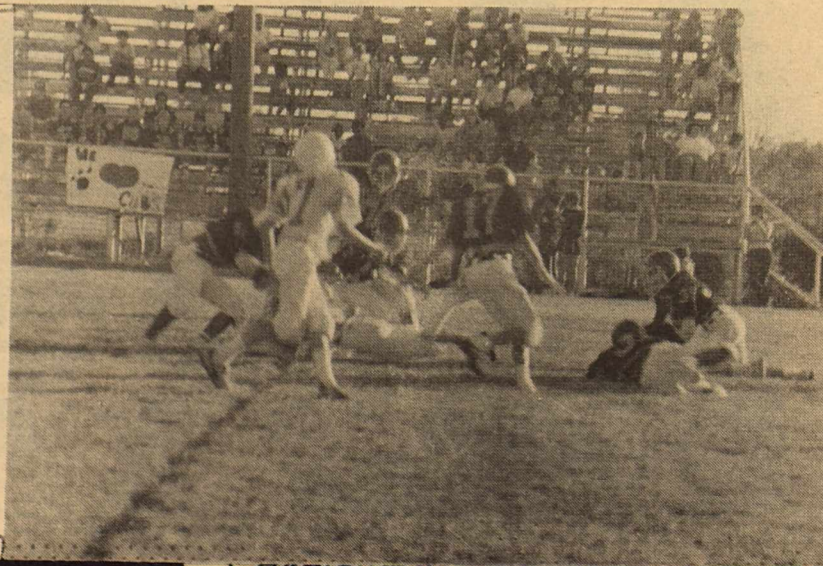
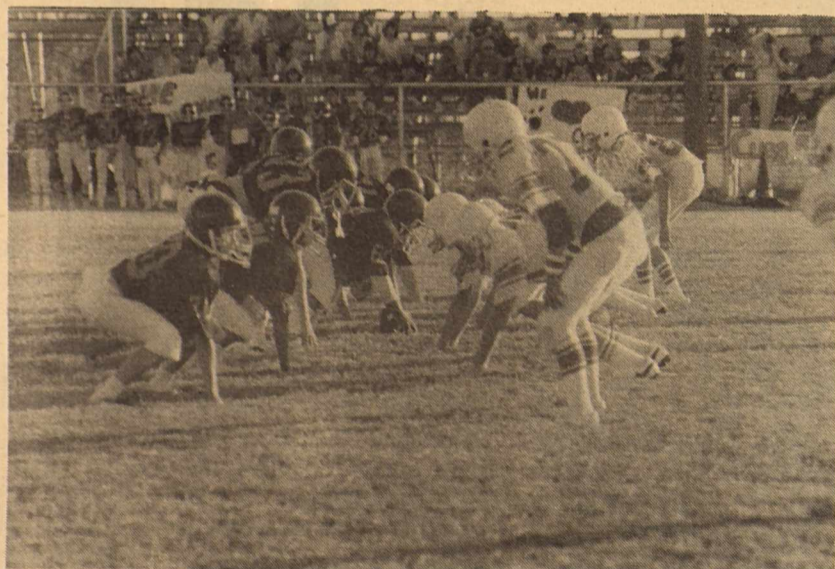

### CONSUMERS EATING MORE VEGETABLES, LESS RED MEAT

Thirty six percent of the consumers polled during September for the Texas Restaurant Association's "Texas Tastes" study said they are more likely to order natural foods and vegetables when dining out than they were a year ago. Twenty five percent of the survey respondents said they are less likely to order red meat and thirty five percent are more likely to order salads.

"Customer demand for healthy foods is being felt in all segments of the restaurant business today - from fine dining to fast food - and I think it will keep growing," said Louis Hochman, President of the Texas Restaurant Association. "Today's consumer is more interested in 'eating healthy' than 'just eating' and restaurateurs are responding to this trend by including foods perceived as nutritious on their menu", he said.

In addition to providing Texans with a wide variety of dining experiences, the state's eating places will pump over \$10 billion into the economy in 1985. In honor of this significant economic contribution and in recognition of the state's 300,000 foodservice workers, Governor Mark White has proclaimed **October as Texas Restaurant Month.**

Curt Pfannstiel, President of the San Antonio Chapter of the Texas Restaurant Association, said that consumers in San Antonio spend \$652 per capita annually to eat out. "Foodservice is an integral part of our local economy," Pfannstiel said, "the 3,597 foodservice units in our area employ 25,069 persons and residents spend 44.8 percent of their food dollar to eat away from home".

Mexican restaurants account for 18.5 percent of all restaurants in the San Antonio area. Nine percent of all locations are snack stands, 8.5 percent are hamburger locations and 6 percent are cafes and diners.

Statewide, Mexican food was voted the favorite ethnic food by consumers participating in the 'Texas Tastes' study, with enchiladas the first choice of thirty eight percent, tacos the favorite of eighteen percent

and fajitas the choice of thirteen percent.

The study also showed a higher preference for fajitas as income increases. Twenty seven percent of the survey respondents earning \$50,000 or more annually choose fajitas, the 'rich man's mexican food', when eating out.

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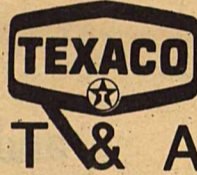
