AeroCare: When minutes matter

Muleshoe Area Medical Center on Thursday celebrated the grand opening of a Helipad, which was recently completed at the back of the hospital. The Heli-pad is a secured, unobstructed area which serves as a place for the AeroCare Helicopter to land when transporting patients to Lubbock.

The AeroCare Helicopter is owned by Methodist Hospital in Lubbock and has been providing rapid aero medical transportation for Muleshoe Medical Center since it opened in 1989.

According to Doak Enabnit, director of pre-hospital services for AeroCare, two BK 117-CI helicopters for AeroCare cover a 150 mile radius of Lubbock.

Enabnit was present in Muleshoe on Thursday during the Heli-pad grand opening.

The AeroCare Helicopter makes about 25-30 stops in Muleshoe annually, averaging about two a month.

The month of June has been busy in Muleshoe for AeroCare though. Hospital administrator Richard Murphy said AeroCare has made four trips to Muleshoe this month, with about three trips alone this past week.

Enabnit said, "One of the biggest factors for Aerocare is that it saves the amount of time a person is away from a hospital. When someone is in critical condition, medical transportation is a real benefit

Redwine died last fall of the illness, Multiple Sclerosis.Redwine's daughter, Susan Cage, is a registered nurse in the Operating room (O.R.) department.

Her co-workers thought it was appropriate to donate the funds necesary to purchase the stretcher.

"The stretcher will be used for transporting surgery patients," Cage said.

The addition of a new stretcher was in need at the hospital.

"Back in surgery, we only had one stretcher," Cage said. "We really need two stretchers due to the increase of surgery cases."

Charles Lorance, a hospital maintenance employee, presented a plaque to Susan and her father, Harrol Redwine, dedicating the stretcher in Redwine's memory. The plaque was permanently affixed to the front of the stretcher.

Fireworks fund still needs some sparks


They have placed money jars around town, at all of the local merchants so people can donate what they can.

Muleshoe men charged with arson

Two Muleshoe men have been arrested, charged with allegedly committing arson of a residence. The alleged arson occurred several weeks ago.

Eleuterio Venegas, Jr., age 19 and Joe Robert Rodriguez, age 19, were both arraigned before Justice of the Peace Judge Jack Bates on June 2. they were each released on a \$2,500 surety bond.

Bailey County Extension Office News

Bagworms are one of the major pests of juniper and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in early May on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks. Insecticide control is most effective in early June when the bagworms are small, says County Extension Agent, Curtis Preston.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge form hatching eggs inside last years bags and begin feeding on foliage. Each bagworm begins to construct its own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until they are about one-and-a-half inches

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long, Preston said. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in the egg stage on trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1,500 eggs.

"Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest," said Preston. "But if bagworms were present on plants last year and control measures weren't applied, chances are an insecticide will be needed this spring."

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion and orthene. The biological insecticide Bacillus thurengiensis can also be used To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important.

The addition of small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees ans shrubs.

because they get there much faster."

The AeroCare Helicopter can make it to Lubbock Methodist Hospital from Muleshoe Area Medical Center in about 32 minutes, making it about three times faster than it would take to drive a patient to Lubbock.

The AeroCare crew is always made up of a pilot, a

registered nurse and a paramedic. The helicopter can fit up to two patients in it at a time.

The helicopter is equipped with everything necessary to maintain a trauma victim or accute cardiac patient.


The helicopter is also

equipped with obstetrics equipment needed to deliver a baby and carries a licensure as a mobile intensive care unit.

"The helicopter helps complement emergency medical services," Enabnit said. "Particularly when there are accidents, we all work together and the patient has a greater survivability chance. They (the EMS) makes our job easier."

In regards to the new Helipad, Enabnit said, "Our first consideration was safety and second, accessibility to the hospital. The Heli-pad adds an element of safety."

The new Heli-pad is located in a fenced area with reflectors and lights.

Although the program is underway and will be ending in a few weeks, Camp said children in grades pre-school to 5th grade can join at any time. It's not too late.



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



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Nice words. Hopeful words. But the words were not nearly as tangible as the sting of the Egyptian whips and the marks they left on the backs of the Israelite slaves.

God had promised his presence. Where was he?

Where was he when the Egyptians decided to make his people slaves? Where was he when Egyptian oppression threatened to crush them? Where was he when Egyptian soldiers were flinging Israel's baby boys into the jaws of the Nile River? Was he gone? Was he powerless? Didn't he care?

The children of Israel asked that question centuries ago. Millions today join them.



"Irrigation water management is controlling the amount and timing of irrigation water efficiently to produce desired crop response, in a non erosive or wasteful manner,: says Warren Givens Soil Conservation Service (SCS) Technician.

A knowledgeable irrigator will apply water at a rate based on the stages of plant growth and or peak use periods. Producers should know available gallons per minute each well will pump, depth and intake rate of the soil, to derive at the amount of water to be applied.

The Soil Conservation Service has the equipment for measuring gallons per minute and checking efficiencies, also most every situation, surge valves and pivots will increase your efficiency by allowing more timely irrigations in less time to crops.

In weaker water areas, planting a variety of crops across the field will give you the advantage of high residue to low residue rotation and peak usage of plants occurring at different times of the year.

The Soil Conservation Service located at 105 E. Ave. D. in Muleshoe has information to assist local producers on these decisions.

Tips on tractor safety are offered

AUSTIN -Tractors are equipment for any farm or ranch, but unfortunately they account for more than 500 accidental deaths each year and thousands of disabling injuries nationwide, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said.

"Without tractors, we wouldn't be able to produce the high-quality and large quantity of food we raise," Perry said. "However, tractors also present many hazards and require extra caution and care when they are being operated."

Most fatal tractor accidents involve overturns, which can be caused by speeding, hitting rocks or stumps, driving on steep slopes, running into ditches, hitching high for extra traction or operating front-end loaders improperly.

Fatal rollovers can be prevented by driving carefully and by roll-over protective

systems such as protective frames and crush-resistant cabs with seat belts, Perry said.

Falls from tractors also result in many injuries and sometimes death, especially with cabless tractors. Other deaths and injuries are caused by clothing being caught in rotating power take-off shafts. Most newer equipment is equipped with PTO shielding, which should not be removed.

Without protective equipment on tractors like crushresistant cabs and PTO shields, the chances for injuries and accidents increase. Mechanical malfunctions also can contribute to accidents. Tractor operators can minimize accidents by keeping equipment properly maintained, Perry



As a young man I watched huge flocks of geese migrate north and south over the Missouri farm where I grew up. Over the years I learned to love the honking sounds and watching the big V formations fly overhead.

Although I loved the geese, I remember feeling sad in the fall as the flocks traveled southward because I knew winter would soon arrive. Winter meant cold, bitter weather and more work to ensure the safety and health of our livestock.

The northbound flights of spring were early indicators that warm weather was on its way. It meant no more ice to chop or hay to feed. Spring brought new green growth, warm sunny days and pleasant activities around the farm.

I didn't know about the wonderful lessons being taught in the sky as I performed my routine chores. I just enjoyed the sights and sounds.

Geese Lessons

Bill and Marty Geist,

owners of Gingiss Formalwear Center in Amarillo shared an essay with me last month. It is titled "Lessons Learned from Geese."

As I read the essay I remembered those early farms days I described above. I was also reminded that we as small business owners and managers need to be alert for business building lessons regardless of energy of others.

Another interesting fact is that when the lead goose tires, it rotates back into the formation and another bird takes over. This allows a fresh goose to keep up the pace while the leader takes a breather.

The message here is that shared leadership and independence gives others a chance to lead as well as follow. While

the source. I extracted several thoughts from the "Geese" essay. I think you'll agree as you read them that we can even learn from the birds.

According to the essay, as each goose flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for others behind it. There is 71 percent more flying range in a V formation than flying alone.

The lesson we can glean from this information is that people who share a common sense of direction and purpose are more successful. They can work longer and accomplish more because they feed off the

being the lead goose may improve the view, the work is harder. Everyone needs a break from the routine and a fresh perspective may improve your attitude.

I also learned from the essay the reason geese honk as they fly. (It's not because they

are passing another goose.) The geese in formation honk to encourage the leaders to keep up the speed.

The lesson here is to make certain our honks are encouraging. We all need a friendly honk from time-to-time. In

business, it may be a word of praise or a pat on the back for a job well done. Encouragement is a good team builder.

The final point in the essay dealt with being supportive. When an ill or injured goose can't keep up with the flock, other geese will drop out of the formation and stay with it until it revives or dies. Then they catch up with the flock or join a new one.

The point here is that your colleagues may need help from time-to-time. We should stand by them in bad times as well as good.

Team work

You've probably guessed by now that the secret of the geese's success is teamwork. It's not really different from any business or organization. For profit, non-profit or sports related, all groups can benefit from teamwork.
