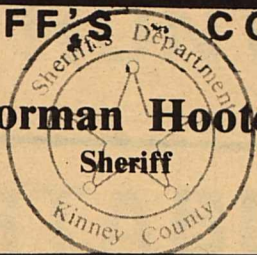

SHERIFF'S CORNER**Norman Hooten**

There is an old adage that "time changes all things" or something close to that. Changes in law enforcement procedures these days are coming faster than we can keep up with them. The large majority of these changes are brought about by court decisions, mostly from higher courts, such as State Supreme Courts or the United States Supreme Court. Some peace officer somewhere gets a report of a crime, investigates it and with lots of hard work and a little luck, makes an arrest. The officer knows from past experience that he must make sure that all the rules regarding the handling of suspects are followed, so he takes special pains to do his job right. He has a good solid case on the suspect, perhaps even a signed confession. He feels pretty good about himself as he has worked hard to do his job of protecting and serving the public. The case goes to court and the suspect is convicted. So far, so good. Then the convicted, often with a court appointed attorney, (paid for by the taxpayers), appeals the case to a higher court which is far removed from the scene of the crime. The higher court is really not concerned with the emotions or the overall loss of the victim, the court is concerned with the rights of the defendant and wants to make sure that he or she really got a fair trial or not. Far too often the original conviction is reversed or overturned, not because the judge or anybody else thinks the defendant is innocent, but because some legal technicality has been overlooked.

We hear more and more about the rights of the accused criminal offenders, prisoners, and how this or that right was violated, but we seldom hear about the rights of the victims of crimes. We have the right to go to our homes and expect our privacy and property and especially our lives to be respected by others and left

alone. No one has the right to take our property or enter our homes and assault us or take our lives. If they do, they should receive swift, harsh punishment as provided by law.

Consider the following case that received widespread publicity a few years ago in an Eastern state. A man attacked, killed and robbed by two muggers. The police worked on the case and finally arrested two men believed to be responsible for the terrible crime.

One of the men was wearing the wristwatch belonging to the victim at the time of his arrest and the other had the victim's billfold in his possession at the time he was arrested. During the course of the investigation, both men confessed to the crime and their statements were taped and written statements signed confessing the crime. They were tried and convicted of Aggravated Robbery and Murder. They appealed to the State Supreme Court on the grounds that the police coerced (forced) their confessions from them.

The court reviewed all the testimony and evidence that had been presented in the original trial and the end result was that the two were released from society back into society. Why? Because during the taped interrogation during which the defendants confessed the police officers involved told the suspects what the penalty for their crimes was. The court felt that this somehow was a threat against the suspects therefore, the confessions were held as inadmissible evidence in court. Without the confessions the police had only circumstantial evidence which was not enough evidence to obtain a conviction.

The judge who overturned the original conviction was interviewed later and admitted that he believed that the two suspects had committed the crime and brutally murdered the victim, yet he turned them loose on his interpretation of a technicality. Did justice prevail, not in my opinion. Certainly I believe that suspects have certain rights that should be protected. Most peace officers I know feel the same way. But the rights of citizens to life and property should come first. Was the

court and the judge concerned about the rights of the victim? Sure didn't look that way to me. These things happen more and more frequently. It's getting worse, not better. Think about it.

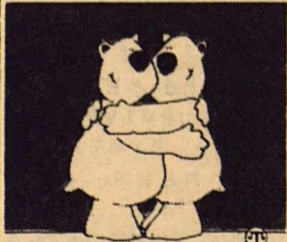

Fact Sheet on Heart Attack, Stroke, and Risk Factors

What a Heart Attack Is

The human heart is basically a muscle that pumps blood. It has its own blood vessels, the coronary arteries, that nourish it to keep it alive. In most cases, heart attack is caused by the gradual buildup of fatty deposits, composed mainly of cholesterol, in the inner arterial wall. Progressively, these deposits narrow the artery, decreasing or stopping blood flow to the heart. Decreased blood flow may damage the heart muscle. Complete blockage of blood flow deprives an area of the heart muscle of needed oxygen and nutrients, causing death of that area of muscle. This is a heart attack. The dying area may trigger electrical activity resulting in ventricular fibrillation, an uncoordinated twitching movement with no effective cardiac contraction.

In many cases, if trained medical personnel are immediately available, they can get the heart beating again through the use of electrical shock and/or drugs.

If the heart can be kept beating, and enough heart muscle remains undamaged, small blood vessels may gradually detour blood around the blocked arteries. This is called collateral circulation, the heart's own compensatory method where other blood vessels take over the functions of the blocked artery.

The key to survival lies in being able to recognize the warning signals of heart attack and getting immediate medical attention.

How To Recognize a Heart Attack

If you feel an uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of the chest (that may spread to the shoulders, neck or arms) lasting for two minutes or more, you could be having a heart attack. Sweating, dizziness, fainting, nausea, or shortness of breath may also occur. Sharp, stabbing twinges of pain are usually not signals of a heart attack.

The natural reaction is to deny what's happening. But before deciding to wait, remember this: an estimated

350,000 heart attack victims died before reaching the hospital last year, many because they refused to believe they were having a heart attack. If the typical chest discomfort lasts for two minutes or more, call the local emergency medical service (EMS) immediately. Or if the EMS is not available, get to a hospital with emergency cardiac care as soon as possible. Plan in advance the route that's best from home and work. Discuss with your doctor the possible choices. Call your local Heart Association and ask which recognized emergency medical service and hospitals cover your area. Keep emergency information where you can easily get to it, and develop a "buddy" system with someone you know.

Emergency Aid For The Heart Attack Victim

If you discover someone who has collapsed, chances are you can try to save that person, if you can perform CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation). CPR will teach you how to tell whether the victim has fainted, stopped breathing, or the heart has stopped. Then you'll know how to keep a cardiac arrest victim alive with mouth-to-mouth ventilation and closed chest cardiac compression until medical help arrives. Your local American Heart Association can tell you where CPR is taught in your area.

Recovery And Rehabilitation

When people are hospitalized by heart attack, they often become depressed and anxious about whether they'll be able to function as fully physically, socially, professionally and sexually as they did before.

Unless the heart attack was extremely severe, they can be assured that in time and with the right care, they'll usually be able to function again as well as they did before the attack.

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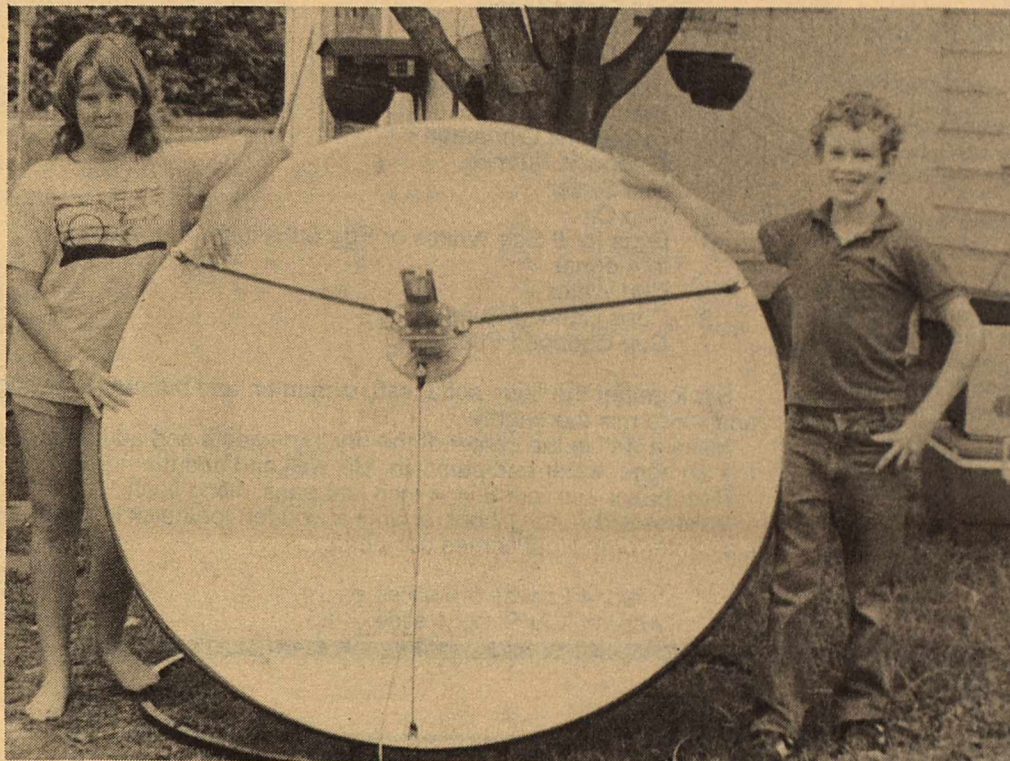

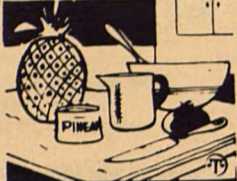

Pumpkin-Pecan Bread

This moist, flavorful bread is a winner any time of the day. It makes an especially good snack.

- 3½ Cups Flour
- 2 Teaspoons Baking Soda
- 1½ Teaspoons Salt
- 1½ Teaspoons Cinnamon
- 1 Teaspoon Nutmeg
- 1 Cup Sugar
- 1 Cup Oil
- 4 Eggs (or 8 Egg Whites or Egg Substitute Equivalent to 4 eggs)
- ¾ Cup Water
- 2 Cups Canned Pumpkin
- 1 Cup Chopped Pecans

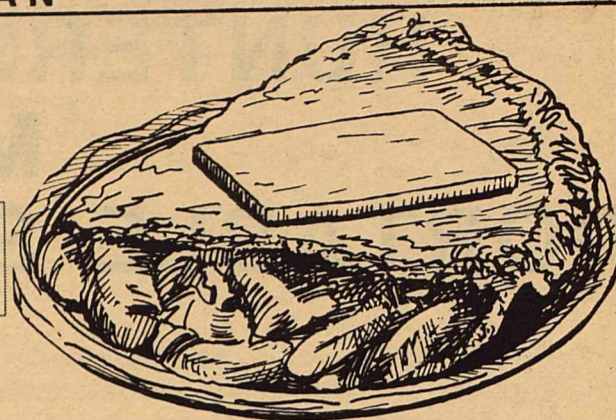
Sift together the flour, soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Add sugar and stir to mix thoroughly.

Make a well in the center of the dry ingredients and add all at once the oil, eggs, water and pumpkin. Mix well and add the nuts.

Pour batter into four 8 x 4-inch loaf pans, filling each ½ full.

Bake at 350°F. for 1 hour, or until a wooden toothpick inserted in the center of the loaf comes out clean.

OVER-65 HOMEOWNERS MAY POSTPONE PAYMENT OF PROPERTY TAXES

By simply filing a sworn affidavit with the Kinney County Appraisal District, homeowners age 65 and over in Kinney County can defer payment of property taxes on their homesteads.

If an elderly taxpayer has already been sured to collect delinquent taxes on his homestead, he can still take advantage of the "over-65 tax deferral" by filing an affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

Marcus Tidwell, chief appraiser of the Kinney County Appraisal District, explained that once an over-65 taxpayer properly files the tax deferral affidavit, state law prevents taxing units from initiating or pursuing delinquent tax suits on the homestead for as long as the applicant owns and lives at that property.

Tidwell said that elderly homeowners can obtain forms for the deferral affidavit at the Kinney County Appraisal District office. The homeowner should fill out the form and have his signature witnessed by a notary public or other official authorized to take oaths, he added.

Tidwell stressed that the tax deferral only postpones tax payments, it does not dismiss them. "Elderly homeowners should understand that the taxes, penalties and interest will continue to add up," he explained. "Once the homeowner no longer qualifies for the deferral -- that is, if he no longer owns or resides at that homestead -- all those deferred amounts must be paid. At that time taxing units may sue to collect the delinquent taxes, penalties and interest, and foreclose on the property."

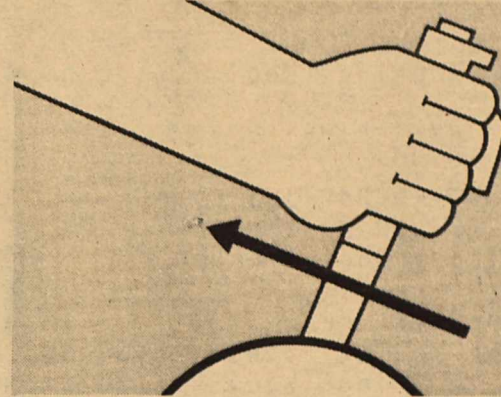

Your Highway Safety

Tips From Experts At United Parcel Service

CONTROLLING SKIDS



Braking is not the best action to take in a skid.

To help put you on the road to safety, you should be aware of the actions you can take to control a skid. There are a number of different types of skids and although there's no absolute way to handle each, here are several important things to remember:

- Do not use the brake until steering control is re-established.
- Do not use power.
- De-clutch if you are driving a gear shift car.
- Countersteer to correct for the skid. This means to turn your steering wheel in the direction of the skid -- probably the most important corrective step you can learn.

Here are four examples of the kind of skids you may encounter and how you can help control them:

All Wheel Braking Skid. Occurs when you jam on the brakes too hard. Your car can slide unpredictably in any direction.

To control this skid, get off the brakes and let the tires re-establish rolling friction. This takes considerable restraint because the natural reaction is to brake violently when a car is in a pronounced skid.

Rear Wheel Braking Skid. Car spins 180 degrees and ends up going backwards. Can be caused by brakes which are out of adjustment, forcing rear wheels to brake sooner and harder than front wheels. Get off the brakes and countersteer.

Power Skid. Car "fish-tails" -- swings back and forth. The correct action to take is to ease up on the accelerator, let the car stabilize itself and countersteer.

If the car is going too fast, and it is obvious that you cannot stay on the road, try to aim for a clear spot where you can stop without hitting anything. Countersteering at the right time can make the difference between hitting a tree and skidding into an open field.

Hydroplaning. Occurs on wet roads. It usually happens at speeds over 35 miles an hour, when your tires start to ride upon a film of water.

To help control this, take your foot off the accelerator and let the car slow down. It is most helpful to have good tires with deep treads. The treads allow water to escape from under the tires and tend to prevent hydroplaning at normal highway speeds.

Remember, highway safety is no accident.
