Public Utility Commission of Texas

Does it really do any good to complain about incorrect utility bills? But we will acknowledge your complaint and we will try to get you some help if you are having a specific problem such as disconnected service or an inaccurate bill.

Does it really have any impact if you call the utility or the PUC and complain about poor service? In most cases, we contact the utility and ask for a written report on its investigation of your complaint. We want utilities to respond effectively to complaints, and the reports help us determine how well the utility has responded to your complaint.

Does anyone at the PUC really read letters from consumers about high rates or sloppy service? Last year the Consumer Affairs Office received and acted on more than 21,000 complaints and inquiries. As a result of our actions, more than \$275,000 was returned to utility customers in credits or refunds. Hundreds of Texans obtained essential utility services that they had not been receiving. Many who had given up on having a service problem resolved finally got the repairs they were entitled to. We can't always resolve a complaint to your full satisfaction, but we do listen, and we will do our best to help make your complaint count.

The answer to all three questions is "yes," but the real question that should be asked here is how can a consumer complain effectively. The following is a short course on how you can complain in a way that will achieve positive results:

(1) Decide what you want to accomplish in complaining. Do you want to vent your frustration about high rates? Do you want your telephone line fixed? Do you want to make sure you're being charged the proper rate? Be specific in stating your complaint.

(2) Decide to whom you want to complain. We have found that the majority of successful complainers try the utility first and obtain satisfaction. Perhaps the utility's computer messed up and charged the wrong rate or a service representative miscalculated a deposit. Any number of things could be the answer to your problem, and most utilities will try to satisfy your complaint as soon as you contact them.

(3) If you cannot obtain satisfaction from the utility, ask the utility to whom you should address your complaint (under PUC rules the utility is required to give you our address).

What do we do with the complaints and inquiries we receive? Much of what we do depends on the type of complaint. But we will try to get you some help if you are having a specific problem such as disconnected service or an inaccurate bill.

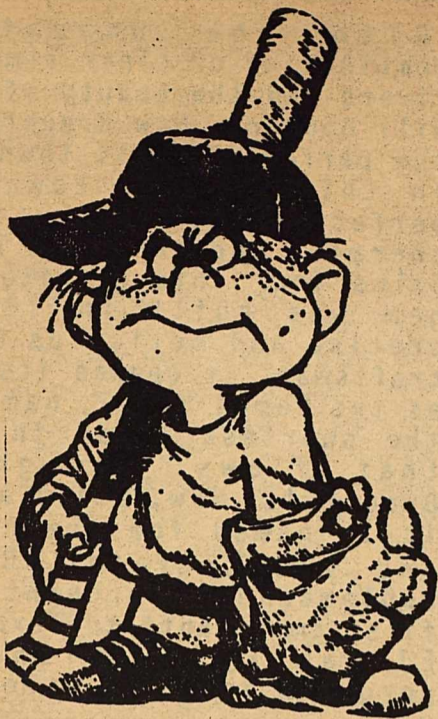

MAKING FAMILY LIFE MORE FUN

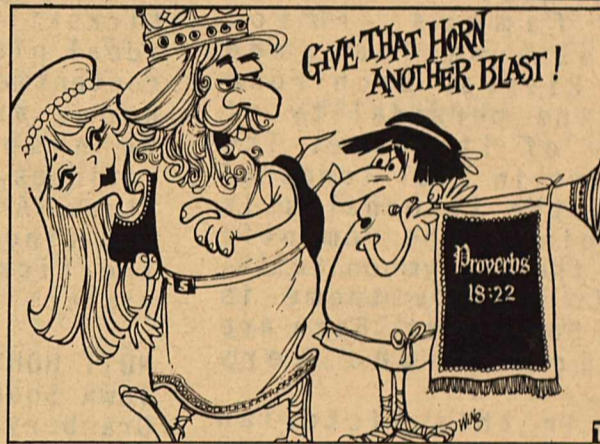
How about going with your spouse on a second honeymoon?

"A honeymoon has been an adventure ever since the first caveman captured a mate by force and dragged her away into hiding from her irate tribesmen," says Marcia Powell, co-author of The Honeymoon Handbook: A Guide To Life's Most Romantic Adventure (Macillan, 1980). "However, the idea of marriages based on romantic love didn't appear until the 1600's.

"Today's honeymooners expect their wedding trip to be a romantic adventure," she continues, "and they're particularly fortunate because they can choose from among the world's most beautiful places for this very special journey. Even 50 years ago, many of these places would have been either unaffordable or unreachable for most couples; however, the advent of modern transportation and other factors have opened up almost the entire world for travelers."

With so many choices available, how can a couple decide on the honeymoon destination that will fulfill their own special dreams and still fall within their time and budget limitations? The first step, according to the author, is to focus on the expectations each of you have of "the ideal honeymoon." Make separate lists of the kind of climate, accommodations, activities and other factors which you each want for your wedding trip. Then compare lists and begin to gather information about places that you think will appeal to both of you.

A travel agent can be a great help in discovering honeymoon possibilities which haven't occurred to you, as well as for taking care of all the actual arrangements once your deci-



sion is made. These professionals should have the most up-to-date information about places, transportation, accommodations, packages and prices and can save you considerable time, effort and money, Ms. Powell says.

Either through a travel agent or letters you write on your own, you'll begin to accumulate brochures extolling the advantages of various possible honeymoon spots. Read these materials carefully, the author advises, and keep the following questions in mind:

1. Does this place appeal to the kind of people with whom you want to spend your honeymoon? Do the brochures indicate that the main audience is couples, singles or families—and are they young, middle-aged or older people?

2. How interested are you in the major sales features of this place—location, activities available, entertainment, accommodations, food?

3. How are the accommodations described—deluxe, superior, first-class, standard, tourist—and what is meant by these terms? (A travel agent can help translate brochure jargon into understandable terms.)

4. Can you reach this place conveniently and at a

reasonable cost? 5. Are there other places of interest nearby or will you have to rely entirely on the activities and entertainment offered by this place?

6. What is the price range and are package plans available? If so, which items are standard and which are optional—particularly, check which meals are included? 7. Is the place large or small? How will that affect the service you receive and your opportunities for meeting other people during your honeymoon?

8. Is the style casual or more formal?

9. Do they offer any special features for honeymooners?

"The most important thing about a honeymoon destination is that it be right for each individual couple," the author says. "It's a good idea to talk with friends, family and associates about honeymoon or vacation spots they've enjoyed, but the final decision should be based on the things that are important to the two people who will be making this romantic adventure."

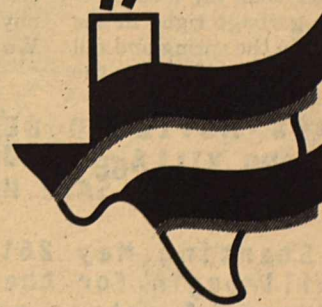

GOOD GARDENING INFORMATION

Compost

"Whenever I leave anything on my plate," I heard a little girl tell Art Linkletter some years ago, "my mother always tells me about the starving children in Indiana." Fortunately, my children are too old to talk to Art Linkletter, but I did overhear one of them caution a friend he brought home from college, *sotto voce*, "For God's sake don't throw anything organic in the garbage while you're here. We save it all for starving earthworms!"

I will plead guilty to having an unusual fondness for earthworms, not because I have unusual taste in pets, but because their presence in my garden indicates that I have made them comfortable with cushions of compost—and organic matter, compost, is perhaps the most valuable thing that anyone can give a garden. It holds moisture in sandy soil; it keeps clay soils from bonding together into yellow brick roads; it provides food for microorganisms which free nutrients for plants; it keeps the texture loose and easy to work. The result of my obsession with "organic garbage" is that my garden soil looks and feels a little like crumbly chocolate cake, and I will admit to receiving a certain tactile pleasure in crumbling the spongy and moist soil between my fingers and slipping carrots and beets from the ground with hardly a tug.

Today, magazines and books promote the use of compost and give complicated advice on shredding debris, layering correctly, turning frequently—to hear them tell it, creating compost almost requires a degree in chemistry. And people still ask me if saving all that garbage—potato peelings, apple cores, left over macaroni and cheese—doesn't result in a smelly garbage heap that attracts flies and rodents. Well, no, it doesn't. A well-tended compost pile doesn't smell either, but it takes longer than my method. I bury my organic garbage right in the garden—anywhere in the spring and fall when nothing's planted and between the

rows in the summer. I just dig down about a foot—and digging is easy in my compost fed garden, spread a thin layer of organic materials and sprinkle the whole thing with a gallon of water that contains a dissolved compost tablet. Then I cover it up. I still have a compost pile, to be sure. That's where my autumn leaves and my pruning leftovers go. I let my grass clippings stay on the lawn, to give their nitrogen back to the soil, but a lot of my neighbors think that's messy, so I collect the bags of grass clippings they put out for the trash man and add those to the pile. I'm not above giving the whole heap a little taste of microbes (I buy mine in a 2-pound box for about \$7.00 from Henry Field's and one box lasts all summer). Nick Reavis of that company tells me the compost is ready in 10 to 30 days. I never timed it, but I do know that those little microbes reduce the size of my pile of debris in a hurry, and I don't have to pay them overtime. I add a little manure, too, when I can get it, but this feast usually goes to the flowers and shrubs—anything that grows loves compost.

Every green plant composted back into my garden conditions it—improves its ability to support new life. Soil tests to learn the special needs of each back yard plot are still recommended, but the addition of compost keeps those cushions of humus between the soil particles where the microorganisms can feast and perform their magic.

My kitchen garden soil feels smooth and crumbly, diggable with bare hands—and although I don't raise enough vegetables to feed the starving children in India (or Indiana, for that matter), I do a pretty good job with the members of the football team who still show up occasionally, and are warned, "Don't throw anything in the trash can around here. We save it all to feed the garden."

Low birth weight is the leading killer of babies in the United States—accounting for about half of all infant deaths.

Newborn babies weighing less than 5.5 pounds are 40 times more likely to die during their first month of life than larger infants.

Underweight babies that do survive are 10 times more likely than others to suffer mental retardation, which could require long-term institutional care. They also are at much higher risk of birth defects, motor skills impairments, cerebral palsy, seizure disorders and respiratory problems.

Regular medical checkups during pregnancy allow doctors time to avoid problems that could result in babies being born prematurely or underweight.

Studies show that among low-income mothers, prenatal care can prevent 26 percent of infant deaths, reduce premature births by 20 percent, and sharply curtail life-long impairments such as mental retardation.

Government programs that provide medical care during a pregnancy cost \$400 to \$500 for each woman. That's a modest sum compared to the \$25,000 it can cost to keep one newborn in an intensive care unit for 20 days, the average stay for an underweight baby. And it's a drop in the bucket compared to institutional care for a mentally retarded child for one year, which can cost \$25,000 to \$100,000 depending on the level of care.

That makes regular medical care during pregnancy a wise investment of time for an expectant mother—and a wise course for our government to encourage.

A study by the National Academy of Sciences shows that each dollar spent on medical checkups for pregnant women saves \$3.38 in medical care for their babies during the first year of life—and this is a low estimate. Other studies have shown savings ranging up to \$12 for each dollar spent on prenatal care.

Medicaid paid for one-fourth of the \$2.6 billion spent in 1980 on hospital care for underweight babies during their first year, according to a study by the Department of Health and Human Services.

So spending Medicaid money on prenatal care becomes a cost-saving measure that also avoids needless suffering.

But until now, Medicaid statutes required that the same package of services be provided to all Medicaid patients. No distinctions were made for special types of patients, such as pregnant women.

Because of this, many states limited the number of physician and hospital visits during a pregnancy and did not make available such important services as nutritional counseling and vitamins.

The 1985 Budget Reconciliation bill, recently signed into law, contains a provision I authored that allows states to provide full prenatal care to pregnant women through the Medicaid program.

Last year, I also succeeded in closing a loophole that had denied any medical care for women—otherwise qualified for Medicaid coverage—who were pregnant for the first time.

It's high time we encouraged more vigorous intervention by the Medicaid program to reduce the incidence of underweight and premature births, rather than continuing to spend an unnecessarily large part of our limited resources on high-cost intensive and institutional care.

Prenatal care is a sound investment that not only saves the government money, but lessens the toll of suffering that can result when a baby is born too small to thrive—or even survive.

Looking for a leader? God promises you the necessary power to cope with your situation.

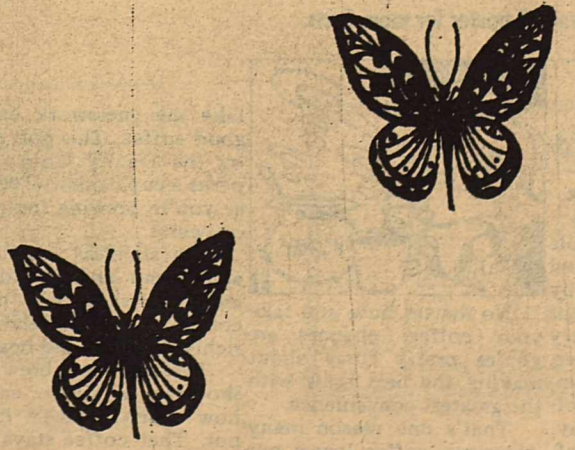
SEEDS FROM THE SOWER

CARROT KUGEL MADE WITH SAFFLOWER OIL

Kugels, which are similar in texture to puddings, are traditional at Passover as a side dish or dessert. This one combines matzoh meal with fresh carrots and spices for its light and mellow taste. But there is something different about this recipe. It contains no cholesterol and is lower in saturated fat because the fat-rich whole eggs and butter or solid shortening, typically used, have been replaced with egg whites and safflower oil. Safflower oil is healthful on another level as well—it has the highest amount of polyunsaturated fats which help reduce our blood cholesterol. Safflower oil is certified Kosher for Passover.

CARROT KUGEL

- 1 pound fresh carrots
- 1/2 cup matzoh meal
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup safflower oil
- 6 egg whites

Preheat oven to 350 F. Oil a 9-inch square pan; coat lightly with matzoh meal and set aside. Coarsely grate carrots (makes about 4 cups). Place in a large bowl along with matzoh meal, sugar, cinnamon, lemon peel and salt; mix well. Stir in safflower oil. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Stir in one-quarter of the egg whites. Gradually fold in remaining egg whites. Pour into prepared pan. Bake until a cake tester inserted into center comes out clean, about 50 minutes. Cut into 1-1/2-inch squares. Serve warm with applesauce, if desired.
Yield: 36 squares

The Salt Talks

SALT: THE HIDDEN MENACE

Salt, or *salarium* in Latin, was so highly regarded by the ancient Romans that it was sometimes used as money to pay their soldiers—thus, the word "salary".

Though humans have always had a taste for salt, the body requires it only in small amounts. In fact, the Senate Committee on Nutrition and Human Needs recommends you limit your daily intake to no more than five grams (equivalent to two grams, or 2,000 milligrams sodium).

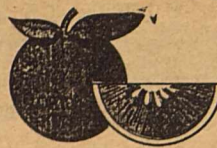


Primitive people often prove: low sodium, lower blood pressure.

Salt in excess of five grams can contribute to hypertension, stroke and heart disease, studies show. Often, however, much of the salt you get is present in popular, low-calorie beverages, so you can consume high quantities without knowing it.

Drinks that contain more than 20 milligrams of sodium include an eight-ounce glass of milk, a diet and/or club soda, a glass of white wine, a cocktail—even a small glass of tomato juice. Some instant soups contain over 1,000 mg. per cup.

Hadrosaurs get their nickname "duckbills" from their broad, toothless beaks; yet, the back their jaws were crammed with row upon row of up to 2,000 grinding teeth (they were plant eaters). CONSUMER UPDATE

The businessman could not believe his eyes as he read the notice. "Why could the power company want to cut off my lights next week? In 25 years of receiving electric service, I have never been late with a monthly payment. My security depoist was returned with interest years ago because the company said my payment record was excellent". But as the businessman read the fine print of the disconnect notice, the answer became crystal clear. "Guarantor for the account of Jack Smith? My goodness, he was fired last year....I wonder where he is now?" When the businessman contacted the Public Utility Commission (PUC), his tone was apologetic. "I had forgotten all about signing that contract," he said. "It never occurred to me that I could get stuck with paying the bill."

Problems involving letters of guarantee are experienced by electric and telephone customers every day. The average person usually does not understand the obligations he or she accepts when signing a written agreement to guarantee the payment of bills by another residential utility customer.

A guarantee is an undertaking by an individual to answer for the payment of another's person's debt in case the other person defaults on the debt. A guarantee usually takes the form of a written CONTRACT SIGNED BY THE GUARANTOR WHICH IS LEGALLY BINDING, AND CAN ONLY BE CANCELED AFTER A 30 - DAY WRITTEN NOTICE.

The PUC's service rules allow electric and telephone utilities to accept a letter of guarantee from a residential customer who does not have adequate credit and cannot pay a depoist to secure the account. In order to avoid receiving an unexpected

utility bill or disconnect notice, we urge you to take the following simple steps before signing a letter of guarantee on behalf of another residential electric or telephone customer:

* Know the person whose account you will be securing. When you sign a letter of guarantee, you are gambling that the individual for whom you are signing will pay the bills. Do not guarantee a stranger's account, and be wary of a friend who seeks to capitalize on your good credit. The fact is that person who must obtain letters of guarantee to obtain service are not credit - worthy or may not have a credit history. That is why the utility company is taking the extra step to ensure that timely payments will be received. You should exercise equal caution when signing a letter of guarantee.

You'd think we were on a chain gang. She had to know who our friends were and what we were doing. She insisted if we said we'd be gone one hour or less---not 1 hour and 1 more minute. I am nearly ashamed to admit it, but she actually struck us. Not once, but each time we did as we pleased. Can you imagine someone actually hitting a child just because he disobeyed? Now you can begin to see how mean she really was.

The worst is yet to come. We had to be in bed by nine each night and up early the next morning. We could not sleep till noon like our friends. So while they slept, my mother actually had the nerve to break the child labor law. We had to wash dishes, make beds, learn to cook, and all sorts of cruel things. I believe she laid awake at night thinking up mean things to do to us. She always insisted upon our telling the truth, the whole truth, even if it killed us--and it nearly did.

By the time we were teenagers, she was much wiser and our life became more unbearable. None of this tooting the horn of a car for us to come running. She embarrassed us to no end by making our dates and friends come to the door to get us. I forgot to mention, while my friends were dating at the mature age of 12 and 13, my old fashioned mother refused to let me date until the age of 15 and 16. Fifteen, that is if you dated only to go to a school function. And that was maybe twice a year.

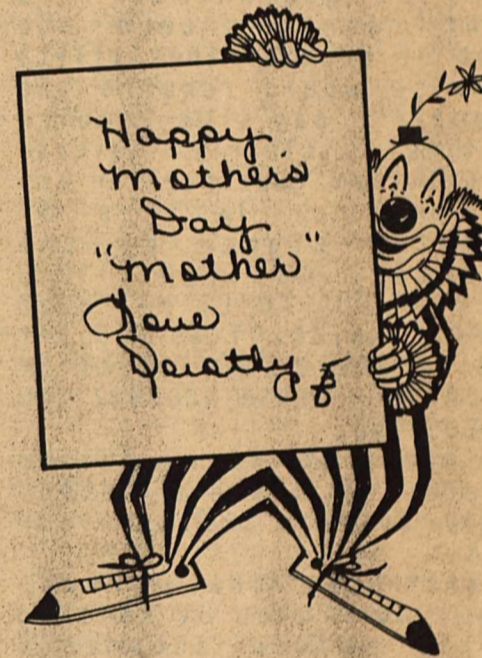
My mother was a complete failure as a mother. None of us has ever been arrested or beaten his mate. Each of my brothers served his time in the service of his country.

And whom do we have to blame for the terrible way we turned? You are right- our mean mother. Look at all the things we missed. We never got to march in a protest parade, nor take part in a riot, burn draft cards, and a million and one things that our friends did. She forced us to grow up into GOD-fearing, educated honest adults.

Using this as a background I am trying to raise my children. I stand a little taller and I am filled with pride when my children call me mean.

Because you see, I THANK GOD he gave me the MEANEST MOTHER in the WHOLE WORLD.

SATELLITE SCRAMBLING DECLARED ILLEGAL

SATELLITE TV

WASHINGTON.....Responding to a recent inquiry from Rep. Robert Kastenmeier (D-Wis.), chairman of the House Subcommittee on Copyright, Register of Copyrights Ralph Oman said in a letter that once cable superstations are scrambled, satellite carriers may not charge home earth stations to descramble and receive those signals under copyright law.

Oman added that satellite carriers may not legally scramble superstation signals.

According to Oman, the Copyright Law of 1976 states that carriers may distribute television broadcast signals to superstations as long as they don't control who receives the signals. A carrier who sells scrambled feeds to dish owners is, in fact, controlling reception, and that action invalidates the carrier's copyright exemption status.

"In selling or renting descrambling devices to some earth station owners, the carriers would appear to exercise control over the recipients of the programming," Oman said. "This result seems especially clear where the carrier both encrypts the signal then purports to provide access through descrambling devices. But for the encryption, the satellite dish owners would be able to receive the signal with their own equipment."

According to Oman, the 1976 Copyright Law clearly states that carriers lose their control of the signal beyond providing "wires, cables or other communications for use by others...." Licensing descramblers goes beyond passively providing the signal.

David Silverman, an attorney representing United Video which is the carrier for WGN, the Chicago superstation, sent a letter to Kastenmeier partially in response to Oman's letter. In his letter, Silverman challenged Oman's interpretation. Scrambling would not jeopardize the

carrier's copyright exemption because "scrambling does not constitute a copy-significant exercise of control of either the content of the primary transmission or over the particular recipients of the transmission," he said.....

Justice Intensifies Cable Investigation

The Justice Department has stepped up its investigation of the cable industry's scrambling plans. Several companies that provide cable television programming, along with two groups representing cable system operators, received "civil investigation demands" requesting all documents relating to scrambling and plans to sell scrambled programs to earth station owners. The companies

include Time Inc., owner of HBO; Viacom, owner of Showtime - The Movie Channel; TeleCommunications Inc., the nation's largest multiple system operator; the Community Antenna Television Association (CATA), which represents small cable operators; and the National Cable Television Association (NCTA). The Justice Department's decision to intensify its investigation follows the scrambling hearing held in March by the House Subcommittee on Telecommunications and Finance. Don Klawiter, senior trial attorney with the Justice Department's investigation team, said information regarding the probe was confidential and could not be discussed. Klawiter would only say that the department is attempting to determine if "violations have been committed."

The trail of George Joseph Barber, 27, of Brackettville began on Monday, April 28th, in District Court with District Judge George Thurmond presiding.

Barber, as you may remember, was charged in the October 1985 shotgun slaying of John L. Titt, 37, also of Brackettville, after an argument between the two erupted into a fight and gunfire from a .12 gauge shotgun. It ended with the death of Titt at approx. 2:00 am at the Barber residence off Highway 334 15 miles north of Brackettville.

The case was investigated by Texas Ranger Tol Dawson and myself and Barber was arrested by us the afternoon of October 11, 1985 after evidence collected indicated that the death of Titt had been caused by a shotgun blast at the hands of Barber. He was charged with Murder by District Attorney Tom Lee and bond was first set at \$40,000.00 That bond was later reduced to \$20,000.00 at a bond reduction hearing requested by Barber's attorney. Barber was released on that bond after it was posted by a friend.

The jury panel was called in Monday morning and a nine woman, 3 man jury was selected and seated by Monday afternoon. The trial was recessed until 9:00 am Tuesday morning with the presentation of evidence in the case beginning at that time.

The state called several witnesses to testify including Dr. Vincent Di Maio, Bexar County Medical Examiner who performed the autopsy on the body of John Titt, myself, Texas Ranger Tol Dawson, and Titt's girlfriend Melba Foreman. Cross examination was performed by attorney for the defense Martin Underwood of Comstock, Texas who was defending Barber.

The case went to the jury at approx. 2:00 pm Thursday afternoon and they returned with a verdict at 6:15 pm. The Texas Penal Code under Article 19.05 states that a person commits the offense of Involuntary Manslaughter if he:(1) recklessly causes the death of another. The Texas

Penal Code under Article 12.34 states that (a) an individual adjudged guilty of a felony of the third degree shall be punished by confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for any term of not more than 10 years or less than 2 years. (b) In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a felony of the third degree may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.00. Barber was ordered by Judge Thurmond to appear before him on May 21st for sentencing in the case.

On Friday morning, May 2nd, at 7:15 am, I received a call from Spofford that an unidentified white male had been seen prowling around the residence of Elmer & Jackie Truesdell at approx. 5:00 am. They had been unable to get help earlier because their phone was dead and there was a flat tire on their pickup. When I arrived at the scene it was determined that Mr. Truesdell had been watching television when the electricity suddenly went off. When he went outside to see if a fuse had blown it was learned that someone had turned off the electricity at the fuse box and then turned off another fuse box and cut the telephone line. About that time Mrs. Truesdell called to her husband about a man she saw run in front of their house and crouch down by their pickup. The man was described as being tall, thin, with a beard and wearing a vest and bluejeans with a baseball type cap. He ran from the Truesdell residence in a southerly direction. The man ran from the residence after Mr. Truesdell shouted into the dark that he had a gun and would shoot if he had too. I guess the would be intruder decided that things were getting a little too hot for comfort and that his attack on the privacy of the Truesdell home wasn't the best idea at the moment.

By the time we received the report of the incident the culprit had had adequate time to make his get away. A search of the Spofford area by this officer and Border Patrol Agents assisting in the case failed to turn up any suspects. I am in full support of the Truesdells or any other citizen taking strong, affirmative action to defend their homes and themselves

against illegal entry and possible injury or death at the hands of burglars and prowlers. As the old saying goes " A man's home is his castle " and my message to would be thieves, prowlers, and burglars is, if your intentions are not honest and honorable when you approach someone's home, you had better stay away or suffer the consequences, they may be serious.

TEXAS AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION SERVICE

Carlotta DeLaRosa & Vella Gum attends State Conference College Station.....Kinney County Treasurer Carlotta DeLaRosa & Deputy Vella Gum joined some 185 other officials for the 14th Annual County Treasurers' Seminar, April 21-24. Theme of the seminar was " Commitment to County Treasurers' Excellence."

"County treasurers have the major responsibility for handling and investing county funds," said Carlotta. "It's an ever changing business that requires staying on top of the latest in money management and legal requirements for government fiscal accountability."

County treasurers who attended the seminar received nuts and bolts training on such subjects as payroll, accounting, investment alternatives, computer software applications and public relations. Carlotta said one of several key issues discussed was HR 3838 which, if passed by Congress in its present form, could result in removal of the tax exemption on dividends earned from local government funds.

County treasurers who successfully complete the 20 hours of training are certified as required by state law. The annual seminar is one of the educational programs sponsored by the V.G.Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The institute provides a forum of mutual support for county officials, the Extension staff and various government, academic and business leaders in Texas.

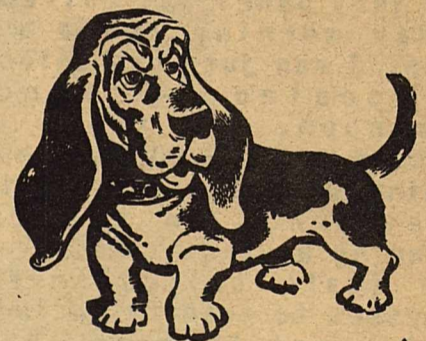
