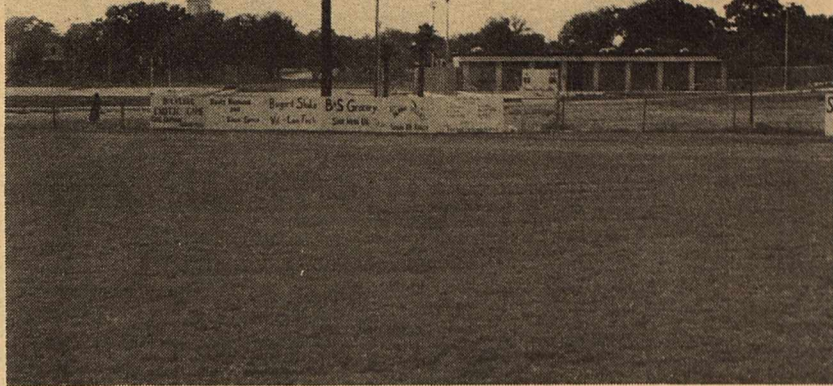

ANNOUNCING SOME GOOD NEWS ABOUT YOUR ELECTRIC BILL

1

A large one-time reduction.

The biggest thing that has happened to your electric bill in a long time is the fuel refund that lowered your bill last month. That was a one-time credit, which reduced the amount you paid by almost two-thirds.

Now your bill will be getting back to normal. Or almost.

TEXAS WATER COMMISSION

AUSTIN.....April 22,1986.. New rules for operation of the Rio Grande Watermaster will be considered for adoption by the Texas Water Commission on June 4. The meeting will be at 2p.m. in Room 118 of the Stephen F. Austin Office Bldg. in Austin.

These rules were developed in association with the proposed expansion of the Watermaster operation to include all segments of the Rio Grande Basin downstream of Ft. Quitman, except for the Pecos and Devils Rivers Watersheds.

These proposed rules are a revision of rules considered in public meetings held in June and November 1985. All water rights holders in this area should familiarize themselves with the proposed rules because they will be required to comply with the rules adopted by the Commission.

The proposed rules were published in the Texas Register on April 18. Copies of the proposed rules are available for inspection at the Watermaster's offices in Weslaco and in Eagle Pass and in the County Clerk's office in Presidio, Val Verde, Webb and Zapata Counties.

Anyone offering comments regarding these proposed rules should do so on or before May 19. Written comments regarding the proposed rules should be directed to Wade Russell Legal Division; Texas Water Commission, P. O. Box 13087 Austin, Texas 78711-3087

Common Sense Tips

Hints For Homeowners

DRYERS

When first introduced about 40 years ago, dryers just dried clothes. Although they did a good job of drying and made laundry days a lot easier, they were certainly a far cry from the convenience that modern dryers offer.



Dryers are efficient work savers that can handle all types of fabrics from heavy denim blue jeans to permanent press items—washable knits and delicate garments to room air temperature drying for items such as plastics that cannot stand heat.

Here's some advice from Whirlpool home economists to help you get the best drying results from your dryer:

- Remove clothes immediately when the cycle ends. This is especially critical when drying permanent press or synthetic fiber items because when warm clothes fall to the bottom of the dryer drum, the heat may cause wrinkles to set.

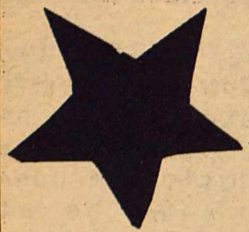
- Avoid overdrying. Overdrying can cause shrinkage. The natural composition of fibers includes moisture that should not be removed. When clothes are dry to the feel or have a slight trace of dampness, remove them.

- Avoid drying heavy items like terry towels with lightweight items like lingerie. By the time the towels are dry, the slips will be overdried.

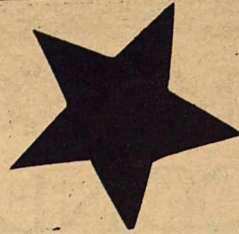

AUDI GT CABRIO CONCEPT CAR

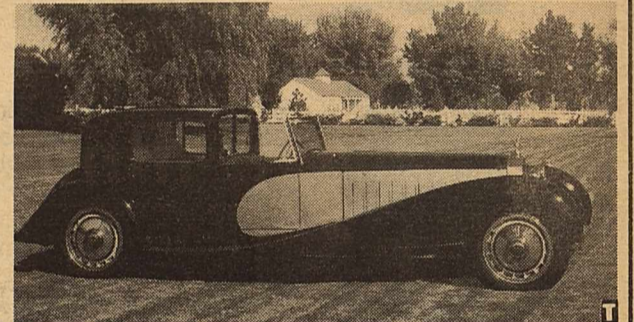

A VINTAGE AUTOMOBILE SELECTION



This Bugatti Royale, considered to be the most valuable car in the world, was hidden in the sewers of Paris to avoid confiscation or destruction during World War II. It is currently on display at Harrah's Marina Hotel Casino, Atlantic City.

Should you ever be lucky enough to take a motor trip in a 1931 Bugatti Type 41 (Royale) the chances of your seeing another car like it on the road are pretty slim. Just seven of these beautiful cars were built. Six still exist.

This Coupe de Ville is originally an open two-seater and the first Royale sold. It has quite a colorful history. In an effort to avoid confiscation or destruction by the German army at the outbreak of the war in 1939, the Bugatti was hidden in the sewers of Paris until the war's end. Of the six Bugattis that still exist, two can be found at Harrah's Automobile Collection in Reno, Nevada, the world's largest collection of classic and antique cars. The model shown here was reportedly built for King Carol of Rumania. One of the largest cars ever built, it has a wheelbase of 170 inches, 3/4 inch bulletproof window glass and armored plate under the upholstery. Of further interest to car lovers is that three vehicles, including this Bugatti, from the 1,000 car collection will travel to Atlantic City for the opening of that area's newest casino Harrah's Marina Hotel Casino. Harrah's will be the first casino in the Marina district of the resort and will feature occasional displays of the vintage vehicles now seen at Harrah's in Reno. In addition to a fully equipped casino and hotel, Harrah's provides ample parking in a 2,400-space enclosed garage adjacent to the main facility.

These are just some of the reasons the Wall Street Journal has acknowledged Harrah's as the "Cadillac of the casino trade."

Good news, too, for drivers within a 400-mile radius is that the casino is just a tankful of gas away. Drive at 55 or under, to be sure you get there safely.

he cannot create. The ultimate ownership of everything belongs to the Lord. No one can really say, "This is mine!" He can only

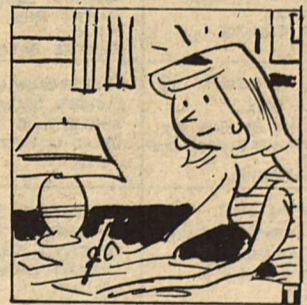
say, "This belongs to the Lord, and He has given me the use of it. I must use it as He would have it to be used."

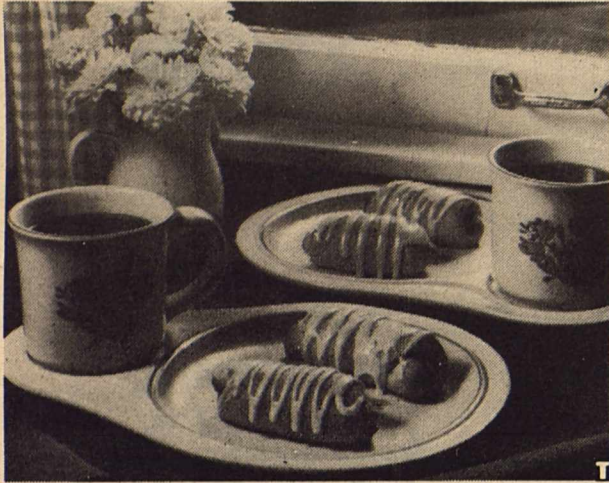

BEAT-THE-CLOCK SWEET ROLLS



Fresh brewed coffee and sweet rolls are a welcome treat for unexpected guests. Sweet Raisin Roll-Ups have a rich filling of raisins, nuts and sour cream with a delicious sugar glaze.

With refrigerated flaky biscuit dough, they're oven-ready in minutes. Served warm, they're a beat-the-clock treat anytime!

SWEET RAISIN ROLL-UPS

- 3/4 cup raisins
- 1/3 cup chopped nuts
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel or 1/2 teaspoon dried lemon peel
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 2 tablespoons margarine or butter, softened
- 10-oz. can Hungry Jack refrigerated flaky biscuits
- 1 tablespoon margarine or butter, melted

Glaze

- 3/4 cup powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon margarine or butter, softened
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 to 2 tablespoons milk or cream

Heat oven to 375° F. In medium bowl, combine raisins, nuts, lemon peel, cinnamon, sour cream, honey and 2 tablespoons softened margarine. Separate dough into 10 biscuits; press or roll each to a 7-inch oval. Spread each with 1 rounded tablespoonful raisin mixture; roll up starting with narrow end. Place rolls seam-side-down on ungreased cookie sheet; brush with melted margarine.

Bake at 375° F. for 12 to 15 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pan to cool. In small bowl, blend glaze ingredients until smooth; drizzle over warm rolls. 10 rolls.

Master Mix

The polyunsaturated basis for tasty pastry.

- 3/4 Cup Baking Powder
- 3 Tablespoons Salt
- 2 Tablespoons Cream of Tartar
- 2 1/2 Cups Nonfat Dry Milk Powder
- 1/2 Cup Sugar
- 10 Cups All-Purpose Flour
- 10 Cups Whole Wheat Flour
- 2 Pounds Corn Oil Margarine

Stir baking powder, salt, cream of tartar, dry milk and sugar into unsifted flour. Mix. Cut in the shortening till it resembles coarse commmeal. Place in canister with tight lid; store in the refrigerator.

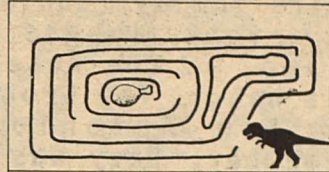

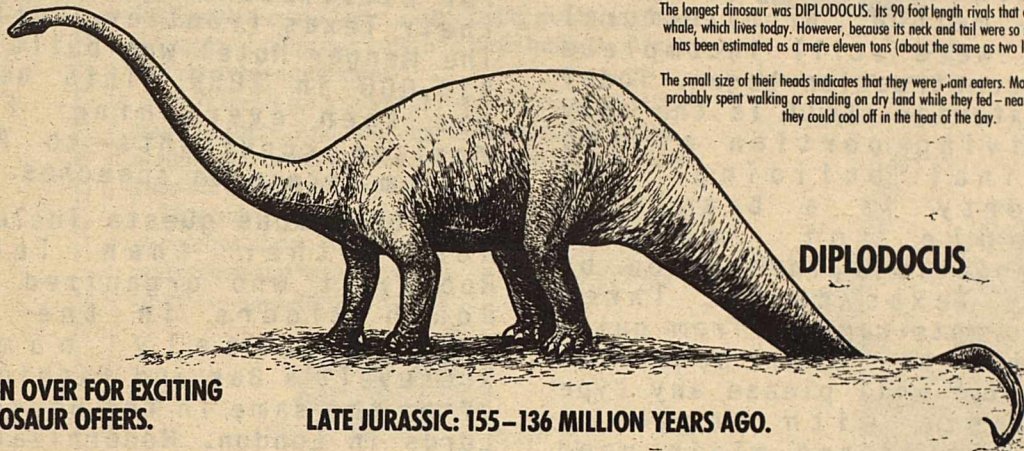


JURASSIC GIANTS

The largest land animals that ever lived belonged to a group of dinosaurs called Sauropods. Because they were so big their limbs were positioned to serve as vertical pillars to support the most weight at the least cost of energy. Elephants have the same limb position for the same reason.

The longest dinosaur was DIPLODOCUS. Its 90 foot length rivals that of the 135 ton blue whale, which lives today. However, because its neck and tail were so slender, its weight has been estimated as a mere eleven tons (about the same as two large elephants).

The small size of their heads indicates that they were plant eaters. Most of each day was probably spent walking or standing on dry land while they fed—near to water so that they could cool off in the heat of the day.

The first official baseball team—the Knickerbocker Club of New York, organized Sept. 23, 1845—lost its first game 23 to 1. That first contest with the New York Baseball Club took place at Elysian Field in Hoboken, N.J., on June 19, 1846. Three seasons later the Knickerbockers became the first team to be outfitted uniformly, in blue and white suits. At the time of its first game, though, there were no standard baseball rules. Each team supplied its own ball, which often varied in size, elasticity and composition.



An exciting moment in American baseball history occurred when Don Larsen of the American League's New York Yankees pitched the first perfect no-hit, no-run, no-walk World Series game. It happened Oct. 8, 1956, in the fifth game of the World Series played with the National League's Brooklyn Dodgers at Yankee Stadium. The final score was New York 2, Brooklyn 0.

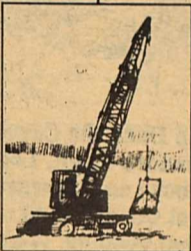
Electricity must be treated with caution—especially when you're using any kind of equipment that requires you to work close to overhead power lines.

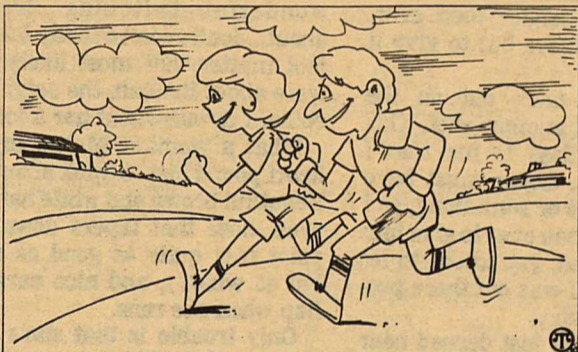
Don't neglect your feet!

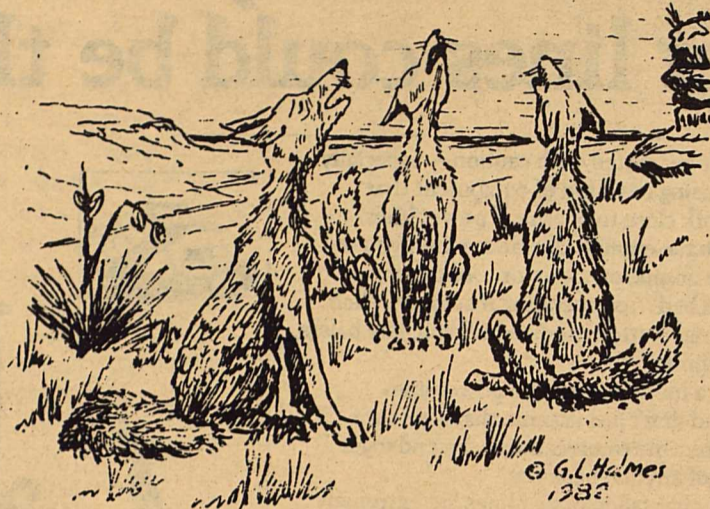

A HOT FREEZE OR A FRESH START?

People would think it unfair if a footrace began with one contestant yards ahead of the other, but the arms race could be run, and ultimately lost, in the same manner if some well-meaning folk have their way.

The various proposals for limiting or reducing the threat of nuclear war are many and confusing, but fortunately, there is one point of agreement: the goal: that the possibility of nuclear war must be endlessly reduced.

The simple proposals for a nuclear freeze have a solid modicum of support, possibly because it is based on the simplest concept. Under freeze proposals, the United States and the Soviet Union would agree to stop producing nuclear weapons. Unfortunately, there is an explosive fly in the diplomatic ointment.

During the SALT I years of the 70's, the U.S. did not deploy one new intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) or one new submarine-launch ballistic missile (SLBM). But during that same period, the Soviets

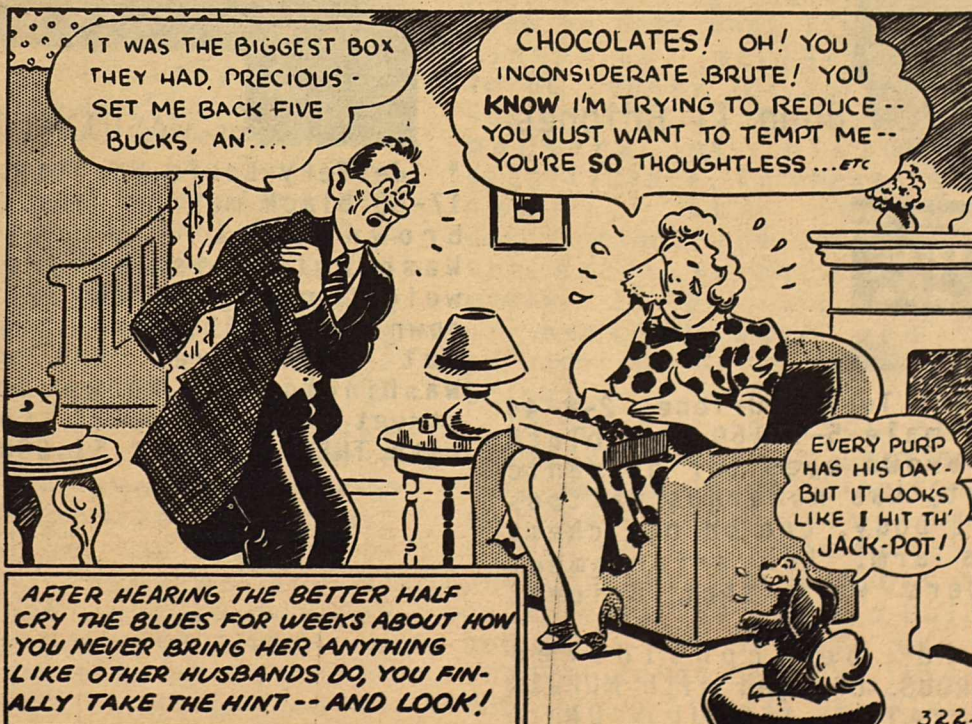
raced ahead in the biggest military buildup in history.

The dangerous flaw in the freeze proposals is that there is no way of verifying whether the Soviets are living up to the agreement. We would have no way of determining how powerful their missiles are, nor how many new missiles they deploy. It's a little like playing poker with cards face-up on the table, while your opponent is hiding his own hand.

Fortunately, an all-out arms race is not the only alternative to the freeze proposals. A search, chase, capture, and subsequent legal battle for the return of an escaped prisoner to the Kinney County Jail that has lasted for nearly two years ended on May 6th with the return of Larry Ronald Stiver to Kinney County.

There is an old saying among the mountain folk of Tennessee (my ancestors on my mother's side of the family tree) that "All things come full circle in the end". Now this might not be true in all things, but over the years I have found it to be a fairly true observation overall. Such is the case of escaped prisoner Larry Stiver.

Some of you may remember that Stiver escaped from the county jail in the early morning hours of August 28, 1984. He had been arrested in June 1984, when a routine check of his driver's license was made during a traffic stop and a "hit" came back from the National Crime Information Center indicating that he was wanted in North Carolina on Felony Embezzlement and Felony Fraud charges.

Stiver refused to waive extradition and the complicated legal proceedings to extradite him to that state were started. All requirements were eventually met and officials from North Carolina were preparing to come to Kinney County and take custody of Stiver when he escaped. A large scale manhunt developed after the escape and was finally called off with negative results. Stiver remained free for almost a week until we developed information as to his location that led to his capture and arrest by F.B.I. agents at a truck stop in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. At this point, Stiver, who had been fighting so hard to stay out of North Carolina, suddenly decided to waive extradition to that state and was returned there for trial. He was subsequently tried and convicted on various felony charges and had been in the North Carolina prison system until I flew to that state on May 5th and took custody of him on May 6th. Stiver will be arraigned in District Court sometime soon.

It is unknown at this time when his trail will start. Oh, by the way, it just so happens that Stiver was placed back into the same cell he escaped from almost two years ago. Some things do have a way of coming "full circle", they most certainly do.

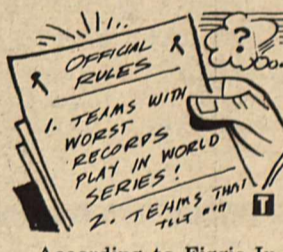
Pete Rose of the Phillies is the only switch-hitter among the 15 major leaguers who have 3,000 or more hits in their career.

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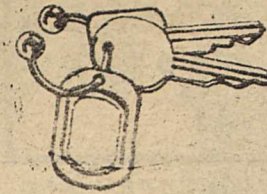
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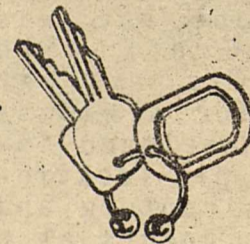
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
