
TEXAS LUTHERAN COLLEGE







UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE

POSTAL SERVICE AWARDS COMPUTER CONTRACT...

The Postal Service has awarded a \$4,456,000 contract to Grid Systems Corporation of Mountain View, California for the purchase of 1,800 Grid Case 3 portable microcomputers. The micro-computers will serve as part of the Postal Service's computerized on-site data entry system, which collects information needed to evaluate service, mail volume, revenues and costs. They are batterypowered, making them easy to move from site to site, and have a light-emitting plasma display. The Postal Service will write its owns software. The equipment will be used in more than 200 large postal facilities throughout the country. The micro-computers will feed information into an IBM computer, which, in turn, will transmit the data to the Postal Service's National Information Systems Development Center in Raleigh, North Carolina. Managers will will receive data back more quickly, improving their ability to help process and deliver more than 140 billion pieces of mail annually. The contract award purchases a mix of micros with an internal modem at a cost of \$2,595 each and micros without the modem at a cost of \$2,495 each. The contract includes an option to buy 1,230 more units in 1987 for an additional sum. *****

NEW INTERNATIONAL MAIL SERVICE PLANNED BY POSTAL SERVICE..

Plans to launch a new program to meet customers' needs for a faster and less costly international airmail service were announced by the U.S. Postal Service in Washington, D.C. today. Postmaster General Albert V. Casey said the new service would be implemented on an interim basis 10 days after publication of a Federal Register notice detailing the new product, International Priority Airmail. The notice, required by law, is expected to be published this week. International Priority Airmail is designed for use by bulk mailers of all categories of international mail, except parcel post. The rate for the service will be \$6.80 per pound. Casey said tests of the new service, conducted inNew York, Boston, Washington and Chicago, indicate that delivery will be faster than regular airmail by at least one day. "The development of International Priority Airmail is our response to a clear market need for improved international services, "said Casey. "Preliminary discussions once key customers point to a favorable market response once this program is launched." International Priority Airmail will include pre-arranged collection service at no additional charge in 30 major cities. Mailers in other locations can use the new service if they transport their mail to one of the participating airport mail facilities or other locallydesignated sites. Customers using the service must meet a few requirements. They must mail at least 200 pieces or 10 pounds per shipment. Customers will also be required to sort their mail by destination country. Postage will be paid through an advance depoist account or by postage meter strips affixed to the mailing statement.

COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS TO BOB BULLOCK ISSUED THREE RULES FOR BINGO GAMES.

Austin, State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday issued three rule changes affecting charity bingo games in Texas.

"The charities should be getting the money from these bingo games. We just want to make sure they do," Bullock said.

Bullock now requires an officer of the organization applying for a license to appear in person at the Comptroller's office in Austin to be briefed on the requirements for holding a bingo license. License suspensions in past months resulted because bingo operations failed to fully understand what the law requires for holding a bingo license.

Another rule change prohibits landlords, distributors and manufacturers from being involved in the operation of a bingo game and also prevents them from paying expenses or lending money to bingo organizations.

"We're just spelling out what the spirit of the law intended -- that bingo games are to be run by the organization holding the bingo license", Bullock said.

The third rule change requires licensed charity landlords to place money from bingo rental proceeds in the bingo account, not in their general account to make sure bingo proceeds money isn't comingled with other funds. Bullock said these changes were implemented to insure the charities get the benefits from bingo games.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said five bingo organizations were suspended for failing to distribute 35 percent of their proceeds to charity.

'We're just making sure bingo organizations are complying with the law. If they don't they'll lose their licenses just like these groups did," Bullock said.

All of the groups were given the opportunity to voluntarily surrender their license or be suspended.

Bullock issued the 35 percent rule after the Legislature failed to adopt bingo reform legislation_last year. The rule requires bingo organizations to distribute a

minimum of 35 percent of adjusted gross receipts minus prizes) to charity quarterly.

"The Legislature legalized bingo in Texas to benefit charities," Bullock said. "I'm going to see that this happens."

Bullock also suspended 19 groups and 3 groups surrendered their licenses for not filing their reports on time. Bullock's office reviews individual quarterly reports and will continue to do so to ensure compliance with the rules.

CHERRY DOMINATES POLLS AS LOLLIPOPS TAKE LICKING

DALLAS -- Children who participated in the National Lollipop Day survey generally stuck together, selecting red as their favorite sucker color. Like their peers across the nation, a majority of the 1,000 Texans who took part in the survey stayed with cherry, once the suckers were tasted.

"As expected, the data from Texas conforms to national results," said Corinne Maginnis, executive vice president / production services at M-A-R-C, Inc. a Dallas-based marketing research and marketing information services firm. "With regard to lollipops, the country appears to be truly united.

M-A-R-C coordinated the study in Texas and compiled results. from 20 malls in seven Texas cities that conducted the test on Saturday May 17. National Lollipop Day culminated American Opinion Week, a campaign to educate the public about marketing research and its role in society. "Lollipop Day was designed as a fun way to teach children and their parents how the research process works," Maginnis said. In-Texas, 501 boys and 499 girls ages 12 and under participated in the two-part study. First, children selected their favorite color. Red was the landslide favorite, with 43 percent of Texans and 43 percent of national respondents selecting the color. Purple colored lollipops came in second place as the favorite among 24 percent of Texans and 23 percent of national respondents. Orange and green tied for third place, as yellow trailed.

In the second part of the test, children were tested for their generic vs. branded suckers, 56 percent in Texas and 59 percent nationally.

Cherry continued to dominate, but lost followers in Texas once the suckers were tasted. In Texas taste tests, only 41 percent of the children preferred cherry compared with 43 percent who selected red as their favorite color. Nationally, cherry gained followers in taste tests. Once tasted, 45 percent selected cherry compared with 43 percent who chose red. Grape remained the second-place

favorite durning taste tests. Twenty-five percent of the respondents selected grape in Texas and 22 percent chose

grape nationally.

"People may not realize this, but the procedures demonstrated by the National Lollipop Day survey preferences. The resulting information can impact the we see and, products ultimately, their profitability, Maginnis said.


CENTRAL POWER & LIGHT

Central Power & Light Company's share of support to the taxing entities within the company's 44-county service area amounts to \$18.3 million for 1985, making the company one of South Texas' largest ad valorem taxpayers, according to Floyd Anderson, the company's tax manager.

Of the \$18.3 million total, approximately 50 percent went to school districts with the balance being distributed among other taxing entities such as city and county governments and water, drainage, fire, hospital and

road districts.

According to Bill Cranford, CPL manager in Del Rio, CPL paid \$17,307 in ad valorem taxes in Kinney County. Major recipients include the Brackettville Independent School District receiving \$8,824 and county government receiving \$6,046. The city of Bracketville also realized \$1,653 in taxes from CPL with other taxing, CPL supports local government by payment of gross receipts tax and sales tax, where applicable.

THE GLORY ROAD

Fort Clark was activated in 1852 by Major Joseph M. La Motte on land long favored as campgrounds for Comanche, Mescalero, Apache, Kickapoo, Lepan and other Indians. The original site was a strip one and one-half to two miles in width extending from Las Moras (The Mulberries) Springs downstream about eight miles. It was a beautiful oasis shaded by huge oaks and pecan trees. Two companies of First Infantry and advance and rear guards of Mounted Rifles were part of the outpost protecting this section of the San Antonio-El Paso road----Fort Clark was never a walled or stockade fort.

With the onset of the Civil War and the secession of Texas, Federal troops left Fort Clark. Durning the Civil War, the Fort was occupied by the Second Texas Mounted Rifles, and served as a supply and hospital center for Confederate troops at Camp Wood, Hudson and Lancaster.

Fort Clark is also famous as the home of the Seminole-Negro Indians Scouts, under the command of Lt. John L. Bullis, and as the base of operations for Col. Ranald S. MacKenzie's raids into Mexico to punish renegade Indians, bringing an end to Indian depredations in Texas by the middle of 1881.

Many infantry units and virtually all cavalry units, including the Ninth and Tenth black "Buffalo Soldiers" and the Fifth Cavalry served at Fort Clark, as did Generals Wesley Merritt, Commander of the Philippine Expeditionary Forces in the Spanish-American War; George C. Marshall, U.S. Chief of Staff in World War II, and author of the Marshall Plan; Jonathan M. Wainwright, hero of Bataan and Corregidor; and George S. Patton, famous for his bold, highly mobile armored operations in North Africa, Sicily and across France and Germany. Many combat decorations and honors were earned, including four Congresional Medals of Honor awarded to black Seminole Scouts. The Seminole-Negro Indian Scout Cemetery, where all four of the Medal of Honor recipients are buried, may be visited on FM Road 3348. Durning World War II more than 12,000 troops and a Prisioner of War Camp occupied the 4,000 acres of Fort Clark.

In June of 1944, the closing

of Fort Clark was announced. In 1946, it was purchased by Brown & Root Company for salvage and for use as a guest ranch. In 1971, it was purchased by North American Towns of Texas, and Fort Clark Springs, a private recreation community came into being.





DRIVE & STAY ALIVE

Driving along Texas highways for long periods of time without distractions can cause even the most alert motorists to lose their concentration and begin to daydream. Here are some tips to combat driver fatigue::

BE COMFORTABLE.. Adjust your seat so that your knees are at a 45 degree angle. Legs that are extended straight may strain back and hamstring muscles. Sit straight and fasten your safety belt, which will help maintain proper posture.

MEDICATIONS.. If you take medication, be aware that it may impair your driving ability and judgement. Avoid alcoholic beverages, including beer, which are a major factor in at least half of all motor vehicle crashes involving fatalities.

TIRED EYES.. Use sunglasses to protect against glare from the Texas sun. Move your eyes constantly to help keep you alert. Look in your rear view mirror and side view mirror every 20 to 25 seconds.

REST.. Stop every two hours or less, get out and walk around. Put both hands behind your back, raise arms upward, and pinch your shoulders together. Breathe deeply a few times and stretch.

Sleep.. If you continually find yourself dozing off while driving, you may not be getting enough sleep durning the week. Don't drive, if you can avoid it, durning the hours that you would normally be sleeping. Remember, a little preparation can go a long destination.

VEHICLES RECALLED ...

More than 5.6 million motor vehicles were recalled in 1985 for safety-related defects or failure to comply with federal motor vehicle safety standards, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. In addition, the federal safety agency reported the recall of over five million pieces of automotive equipment such as axles, wheels, tail-light flashers and trailer hitches as well as 28,215 tires.

ALCOHOL DRINKING AGE GOES UP ..

Effective September 1,1986, the minimum drinking age in Texas will be 21. The National Highway Traffic Safety, Administration reported that higher legal drinking age. reduces fatal accident involvement of young drivers. In states that have raised the minimum drinking age, there has been a 13% reduction in fatal accidents involving drivers affected by these law changes. We've all seen statistics reporting the number of deaths each year. There is now a new way to look at the results of fatal injuries -- YEARS OF POTENTIAL LIFE LOST -- Injuries and deaths related to crashes affect mainly young people, cutting short their lives. Over 4.1 million years of potential life are lost each year in the U.S. due to.

injuries, according to the National Academy of Science. This is more than cancer and car-diovascular disease combined.

KENT HANCE

Kent Hance, Republican candidate for Governor, renewed his call for a review and hearing of the Ruiz prison case in light of new proposed policies which would require Texas taxpayers to buy satellite dishes " for prisons and install "separate TV jacks" in double occupancy cells. "I guess William Wayne Justice was worried that one prisoner might miss Wheel of Fortune if his cellmate wanted to watch Family Fued," Hance said. "When William Wayne Justice begins to worry about prisoners having enough TV's, it's time for someone to stand up and say 'no' and ask for a hearing on the Ruiz case.

Hance said he wondered if Governor Mark White realized that prisoners' TV access would become an issue when he signed the original Ruiz settlement that promoted such prison policies as four-hour work days for prisoners and unreasonable prison hospital standards. White was Attorney General when he signed the Ruiz settlement which Hance said "gave away the store to William Wayne Justice."

"Between Mark White and William Wayne Justice, criminals will have better TV facilities than most Texans do in their homes," Hance said. According to U.S. District Court documents, the following proposals are being made for television policy for prisoners:

1. Prisoners in certain classes of custody shall be permitted to purchase a television set through the commissary.

2. TDC staff must identify units where at least one signal from a major national. network can be received using only an antenna. Then, lawyers for the plaintiffs and TDC shall confer to determine if any wiring or other equipment is necessary to improve the quality or quantity of reception. If so, TDC must pay for it

3. At the remaining units where antennas cannot provide at least one network signal, TDC shall install satellite dishes, wiring and all other equipment necessary to provide adequate television reception.

4. In each instance in which wiring is installed on any unit to provide for adequate television reception, such wiring shall include the

provision of two separate jacks in each double-occupancy cell.

5. Only prisoners classified as minimum custody, medium custody, close custody, and maximum custody shall be eligible to purchase television sets.

"Not a single dime of taxpayers' money should be spent making sure criminals have good television reception," Hance said.

Hance said he will call on Governor White to immediately bring together prison officials and legal experts to study a new rehearing request in the Ruiz case. "William Wayne Justice is not the only federal judge in the United States," Hance said. "After outrageous action like this television policy, someone must stand up and keep our prisons from becoming country clubs."

For Texan, throwing trash on the side of the road has become a \$24 million drain on the state's already tight budget. " The way we look at it, we have two choices:: Leave the trash where people toss it or change people's habits," says Clark. " Since maintenance and safety of our highway system is one of the department's primary obligations," "leaving the trash on the side of the road is not a realistic alternative. It's too hazardous to Texas motorists." Last fall, the department launched an all out war against litter, in an effort to begin changing texans' habits. The battle cry is " Don't Mess With Texas" a new anti-trash message beginning to appear on litter barrels and highway signs across the state. Television and radio ads, featuring rock star Stevie Ray Vaughan, Dallas Cowboys' Randy White and Ed "Too Tall" Jones, and Johnny Dee and the Rockets 88's are also part of the program. We know it's a bold, aggressive message, said Clark. "But we also know that nicer messages like 'Don't Be A Litter Bug' and 'Pitch In' just aren't working. To prove his point, Clark notes that the cost of picking up the trash Texans leave on the side of the road is increasing 15-17% every year. Clark says he has received three complaints about the slogan, but for the most part the response has been very positive." Two of those who have contacted the department to complain have become supporters when we reminded them of the tax dollars that are spent on litter. We also told them the message is aimed directly at the hard core of the litter problem, usually men, ages 18-34, whom research describes as habitual litterers, "said Clark. On the positive side, the slogan is becoming a household phrase in Texas. For example, an elementary school in Alpine, Texas has adopted the Don't Mess With Texas" song by Johnny Rodriguez for their Sesquicentennial program in May. "Don't Mess With Texas" decals received national TV sports Qverage when fans of the University of Texas Lady Longhorns


