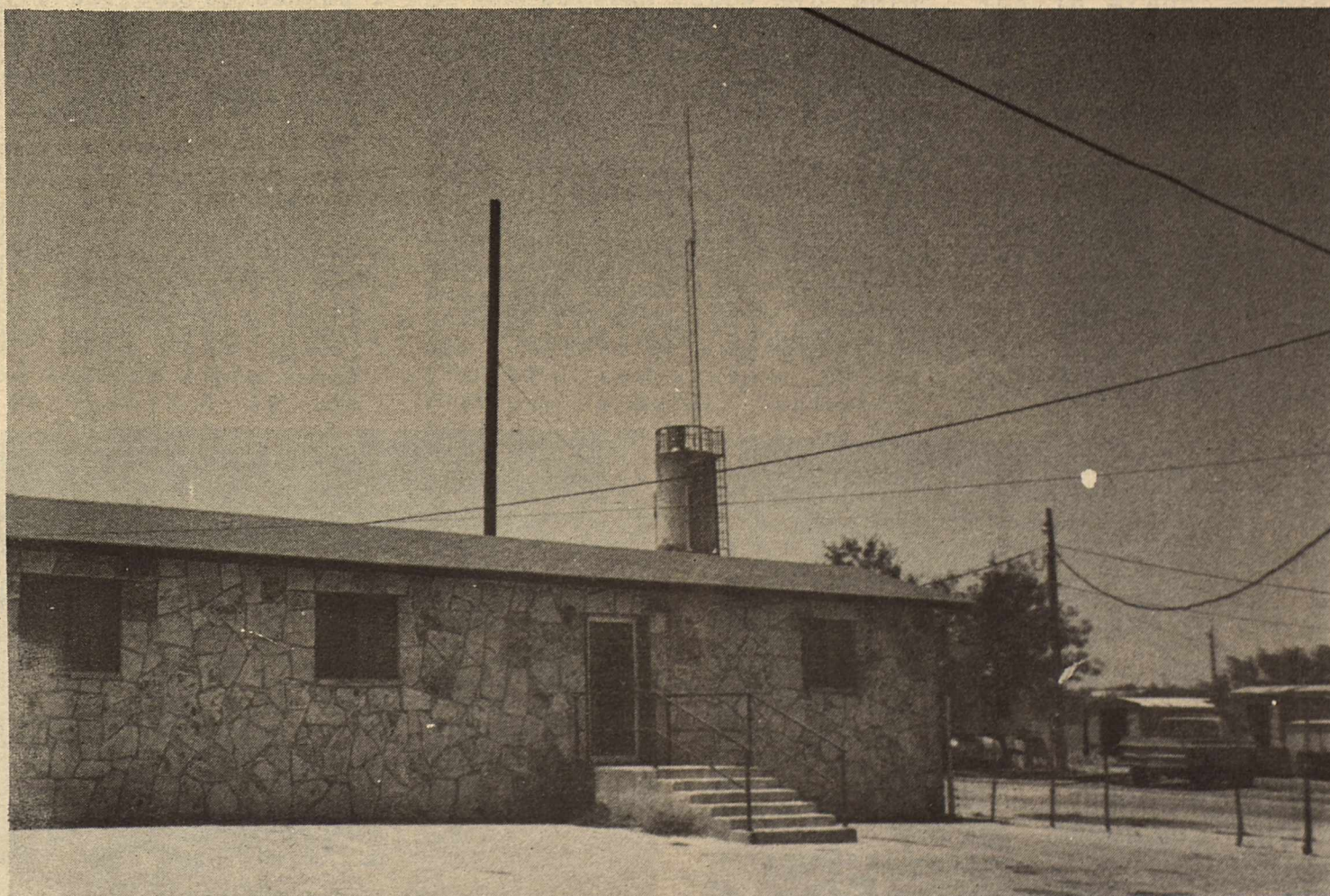

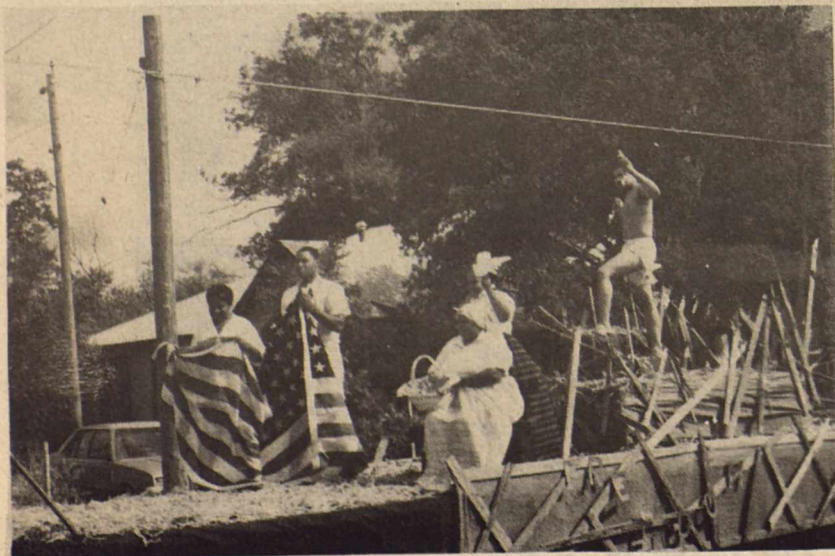
washed dishes at a local resturant, to keep the paper going. THE FIRST EDITION WAS 4 LETTER SIZE PAGES.

GROUND BREAKING CEREMONY FOR NEW CLINIC

WEEK OF JULY 11, 1986

In last week's column we briefly discussed the increasing numbers of illegal aliens invading our state and country and the increasing criminal problems directly linked to illegal aliens.

I feel that the problem does not lie only with the numbers of Mexican Nationals coming into Texas and the U.S., but with the overall Anti-American attitude of Mexico as a whole. Sure, technically, on a world-wide political basis, Mexico is consider to be a friendly ally and neighbor of the U.S.. But consider the numbers of brutal crimes committed against American tourists while visiting in Mexico. Consider the attitude, the attitude of Mexican authorities towards Americans when they, often unknowingly, commit an act considered to be unlawful in Mexico, or have a traffic accident. In most cases the amount of cold, hard cash one is able or willing to pay to those authorities.

I remember when Mexico "Nationalized" property owned by Americans and other non-citizens. The authorities advised many large land owners to leave the country, post-haste, with whatever they could carry on their backs. it is now a federal law that in order to own land or other property in Mexico, one must be either a citizen of Mexico, or have a partner who owns 51% of the property in question.

Bribery and corruption is rampant in Mexico and it appears that the only difference between a big crook and a little crook is the political title held respectively. It has been proven, over and over, that many of the brutal crimes committed in Mexico are committed by Mexican authorities, federal, state, and city.

Consider the death of Uvalde County Deputy Sheriff Clyde Hobbs a couple of years ago. He was beaten by a group of suspected burglars who used a 12 pound rock to finish him off with. Several of them were Mexican Nationals. Consider the kidnapping and murder of Customs Agent Richard Latham last year. He was kidnapped at the Port of Entry, Del Rio, by three Mexican Nationals, driven to a point approx. 12 miles west of Eagle Pass, led

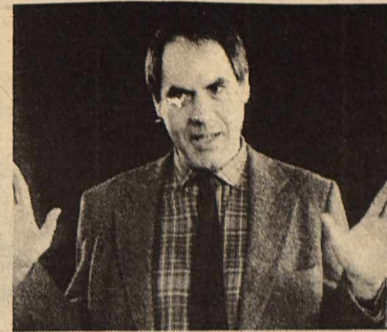

into a brushy ravine on side of the road with his hand cuffed behind him, forced to lie face down and then shot him in the back. Consider the recent kidnapping of a Drug Enforcement Agent in Mexico City, his fate has yet to be determined, but if he is still alive I would be surprised. Consider the recent threats by Mexican Nationals to kidnap yet another Customs Agent. Are these acts a demonstration of friendship, respect, and compassion made by the citizens of a friendly nation? Isolated incidents committed by criminals of any nation are understandable, but the increase over the past few years of not only criminal acts, but an overall attitude of "YANQUI GO HOME" demonstrated by the people of Mexico leads me to believe that we can expect things to get worse before they get better.

To put my feelings as plain as I possibly can, I expect criminal incidents committed by Mexican Nationals to increase, not only here in Texas and the United States, but in Mexico as well. Looking back at hte history of other countries, some of them recent, when the citizens of one country, many of them political officials, start to commit criminal acts aganist the citizens of a neighboring country and there is an increase in border incidents, this is an indication of the overall attitude of the country to the people of the neighboring country, which in this case is us. Mexico appears, at least in my opinion, to be on the verge of anarchy. The rebellion of the people of Mexico aganist law and order and the increase of brutal criminal acts committed by Mexican Nationals, especially against the people of Texas and the United States indicates to me that the people of Mexico are not, at least at this time, our friends, and we should prepare ourselves, particularly along the border, for the possibility of terroristiaacts.

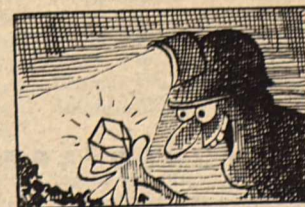

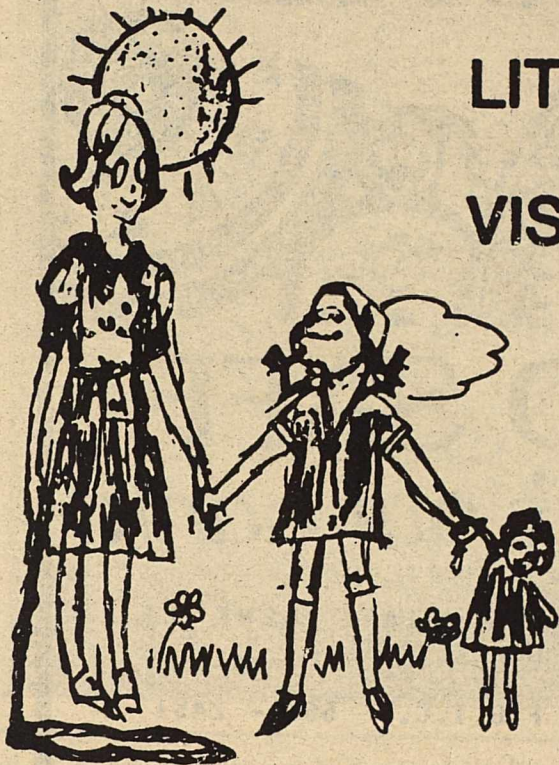

GREAT MOMENTS IN AMERICAN HISTORY

INDIA AND AMERICA SHARE TWISTS OF FATE

The special link between two great democracies—America and India—goes back a long way. After all, here is where Columbus ended up when trying to find a way to get to there.

America and India would share a common heritage of British colonialism, and a common appreciation of philosophy and the arts. Great American writers such as Thoreau, Emerson, Whitman and T.S. Eliot were influenced by the ancient philosophies of India. Later, the great Indian leader Gandhi was in turn influenced by the American writer David Thoreau, whose views on Civil Disobedience had a great deal to do with shaping Gandhi's own thinking on the subject. Later still, American civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. looked up to Gandhi for the strategy to liberate fellow blacks from social and economic injustices.

From the early years of our nation's history to the present day, India and the United States have enjoyed a profitable trade relationship. In the late 18th century, for instance, there were often dozens of American frigates in the port of Calcutta loading cargoes of tea, sugar, ginger, indigo, gunny bags and a great variety of silk and cotton goods.

Since 1947, several Presidents, Vice-Presidents and a First Lady have visited India: Dwight Eisenhower, Lyndon Johnson, Hubert Humphrey, Richard Nixon, Jacqueline Kennedy. Indians today have a special place in their heart for President Eisenhower, who made a fervent plea for world peace while addressing the Indian Parliament in

1959. Eisenhower had earlier presented a Doctor of Laws Degree to India's Prime Minister Pandit Nehru.

In the first decade of the 20th century, a few Indian intellectuals and ardent patriots who had been active in the Indian independence movement came to the east and west coasts of the United States to gather support to the cause of India's freedom. American leaders from Wendell Wilkie to President Franklin D. Roosevelt were sympathizers with the Indian cause. Other great Americans, including Albert Einstein, Henry Luce, Richard Walsh and Louis Fischer served on the advisory board of the monthly publication of the 1940's, published in the US by the India League of America. When independence was finally achieved in India, leaders such as Nehru drew on the American Declaration of Independence for inspira-

tion for India's new democratic form of government.

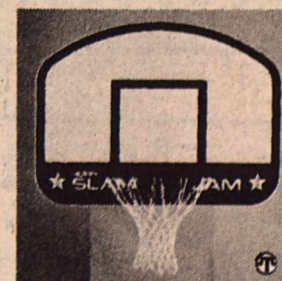
Since India attained freedom in 1947, thousands of Americans have visited the country, even as thousands of Indians have come to the United States for study, business or pleasure. Many years earlier, however, some notable Americans visited India and wrote about their experiences, including Mark Twain, who recorded in his travel diary his fascination with India's people, flora, fauna and religion.

India and the United States, many feel, have every reason to continue their special friendship. It was President John F. Kennedy who said, "No thoughtful American citizen can fail to see our stake in the survival of free government in India." Indian leaders for their part have repeatedly expressed their admiration of American idealism and dynamism.

ECONOMIC IMPACT ALERT

At a time when the economic condition of Texas is poor and is projected to continue deteriorating, the Common Carrier Motor Freight Association, a collective group of Texas common carriers, has requested the Railroad Commission to increase intrastate trucking rates 11%.

This increase, if approved, will further decrease Texas' ability to attract industry and to compete with neighboring states. Texas businesses are already at a competitive disadvantage because Texas is the most highly regulated trucking industry in the country, resulting in the highest intrastate rates, on a per-mile basis, in the country. Since interstate trucking was deregulated by Congress in 1980, it is much cheaper to ship goods across the country interstate than across Texas intrastate.

A 1982 report compiled by Alexander Grant & Co., a corporate consulting firm, ranked the business climate of Texas second in the country. In 1985, Grant downgraded Texas to 18th in the country. Steps must be taken to strengthen the Texas economic structure.

An 11% increase in shipping rates will cause businesses, manufacturers and distributors an even greater disadvantage in the competitive marketplace, as well as raise the cost of consumer goods in Texas.

Transportation cost is one of the primary considerations of corporate decision makers in locating new facilities or in expanding existing facilities. An 11% increase in intrastate shipping rates will reduce Texas' position in the competitive state marketplace to attract new businesses and jobs. Diversification through new businesses and jobs is a key factor in revitalizing the economy.

Even though the significant reduction in fuel cost allows the common carrier lower operating costs, they are requesting a higher percent increase now, during a time when many businesses are

experiencing severe financial difficulty, than the increases over the last four years, during a much stronger economic period.

Due to the downturn in the Texas economy, there is not as much freight moving in the state. Therefore, the common carriers are not generating the same revenue levels as in previous years. However, since the regulatory system allows the common carriers cost-plus pricing, they are encouraged to seek rate increases rather than reduce expenses or improve productivity.

A franchise from a state agency should not be synonymous with guaranteed share of profits. Texas truck transportation is strangling the Texas economy with regulated rates that serve only to promote inefficiency and high costs.

Competitive shipping rates are essential for Texas to have momentum to regain its preeminence as a major distribution and manufacturing center.

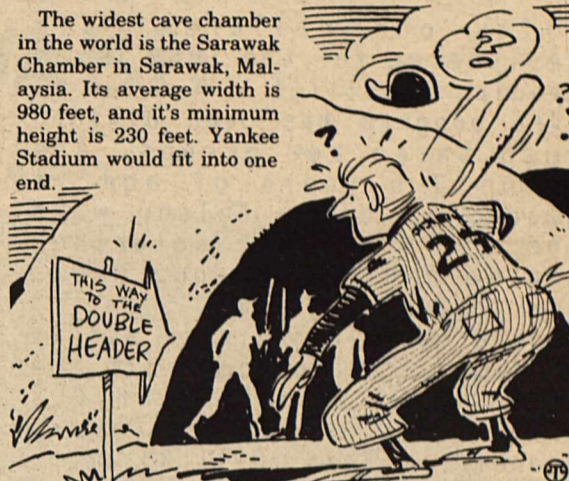

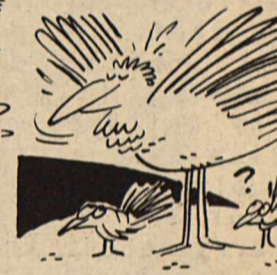

Teens Achieve Popular Hairstyles—With Help From Mom



For centuries, beauty secrets have been as much a family tradition as treasured heirlooms. One valuable technique mothers can share with their teenage daughters is how to successfully execute a home perm to achieve the latest styles. To help moms do just that, Charles T. Abbott, haircare technologist for the Lilt Home Perming System, suggests ways to avoid common mistakes; and Jennine Maher, Beauty Editor of *Young Miss* magazine, offers mothers insight on the looks teens want most this year.

Perm technology is now so advanced, a mother perming her daughter's hair can produce results even the most critical teen will declare "salon perfect." The key to controlling a perm is to follow the perm kit instructions carefully, avoiding tempting shortcuts. According to Mr. Abbott, mothers can easily show their daughters how to sidestep perming pitfalls.

"The most common mistake," says Mr. Abbott, "is using too few rods. The more hair you put on a rod, the more layers the solution must penetrate. As a result, the top layer is permed, but the rest is limp." A good rule of thumb is to use at least 30 rods for body, at least 40 for wave and at least 50 for curl.

The second most common mistake occurs in the rollup. As Mr. Abbott explains, "Hair should never be bunched on a rod; it should be distributed evenly across the surface with the ends laid out flat on a sponge end wrap. This is the best way to achieve an even perm and avoid the frizzies."

Another mistake is often made in choosing the right perm solution. "Some women are afraid of using a strong solution, so they use a formulation that is too light for their hair type, and the result is a perm with no bounce or life," says Mr. Abbott. Home perm packages specify the hair types for which each formula is designed; all formulas are

carefully developed to give maximum results without fear of damage. Don't be afraid to use the formula designed for your or your daughter's hair type.

Errors are also made in determining when the perm solution has been on long enough. "Hair condition does vary, so don't assume that the timing that was right for the last perm you did is right for this one," advises Mr. Abbott. "Teach your daughter to always check a test curl. Unroll the rod almost all the way, then push the curl up. If it retains the shape and size of the rod, it has been processed enough."

One final tip: Don't skimp with the waving solution. Use it all.

Whether curly, wavy or full of body, today's teen styles offer versatility with minimum maintenance. "We are seeing a common theme running through the most popular styles: volume—in curls, shaggy layers or romantic ringlets," says Ms. Maher. "Virtually all of these can be achieved with home perms." Here, from Ms. Maher, are three examples of popular teen hair fashions for the upcoming season.

A popular short style for active teens is fluffy, curly and longish on top but short and smooth at the sides and back. Heralding a new emphasis on curls, this style is suited to all but the coarsest hair. Lilt recommends using 5 large rods to frame the face, then 30-35 rods behind, running downward from a center part. You can presaturate hair with the solution before rolling to ensure even coverage. Perm as much hair as length will allow, alternating small rods with medium for fine hair and medium with large for hair that is more coarse. "A perm makes this style virtually maintenance-free, requiring nothing more than to be fingered into place and allowed to air dry," says Ms. Maher. "This makes it ideal



for sports-oriented teens."

One of the season's hottest medium (chin to shoulder) length styles is the textured blunt cut. Hair is cut to medium length, blunt in the back, with the sides and top layered. The top is directed up and back for volume; the soft, feathery sides are brushed forward. "The style can best be maintained with a root perm for added body. A root perm is easy to do," says Mr. Abbott. "Coat hair ends well with Lilt Conditioner, then fold household plastic wrap (instead of normal end wraps) around ends before rolling onto medium size rods. The conditioner and plastic will protect the hair ends from the perm solution keeping the ends from curling. Use Lilt's basic rolling pattern—from the middle of the forehead, roll the rods straight back down to the neck and in rows straight down the sides. Thirty to forty rods may be needed." To style, hair should be blown dry with a large brush or use hot rollers. This look is best on medium to fine and medium to thick hair.

Long styles are more romantic and wavy this year. Soft layers of waves tumble to the shoulders or below leaving tendrils to frame the cheeks while two layers of bangs, one swirling forward and one lifting up for height, add new texture. Suitable for most hair types (particularly medium to coarse and moderately thick), this style can be permed using Lilt's basic rollup method. Mr. Abbott recommends using a minimum of 50 rods: approximately 12 large for the top and 40 or more medium for the sides, back and to frame the face. After perming, air dry for soft curls, blow dry for smooth waves or curl on hot rollers for a more polished finish.

A perm will make any of these styles last longer for your daughter. Help her select a look that's right for her and use Lilt's professional tips on rolling, perming and styling to turn her hair into her crowning glory.

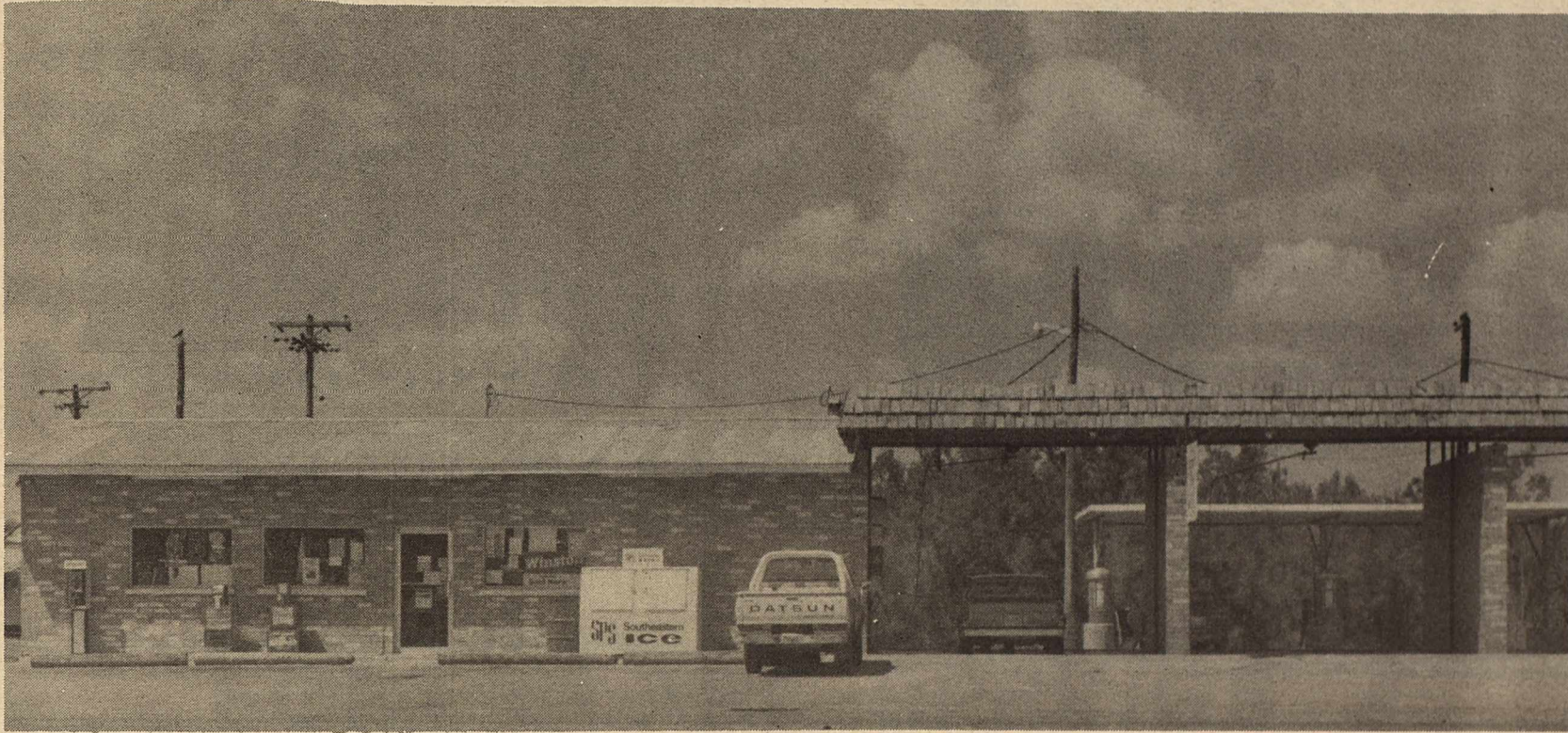
