FIRE ON THE MOUNTAIN CLOGGERS

The Old Quarry Society for the Performing Arts will present the FIRE-ON-THE-MOUNTAIN- CLOGGERS on Saturday, August 9, 1986, 8:30 p.m. at the Old Quarry Amphitheatre, Fort Clark Springs, Brackettville.

Traditional as well as precision clogging is presented during a typical FIRE-ON-THE-MOUNTAIN performance. Under the direction of Rusty and Linda Carolan, the team performs annually at the Texas Folk Life Festival, Night in Old San Antonio and other Fiesta events, Wurstfest, San Antonio Livestock Show and Rodeo, plus 125-130 other events each year. Exhibitions range from business conventions to church functions, from television appearances to bluegrass concerts, from private parties to county fairs and festivals and even the World's Fair. Sixteen of the FIRE-ON-THE-MOUNTAIN CLOGGERS recently returned from an eight-day performance tour of Venezuela with performances in Caracas and Valencia. While in Venezuela, the team was filmed for a national television program called SABADP SENSACIONAL (which is sometimes referred to as the "Ed Sullivan Show of South America").

Bluegrass music is the focal point during each FIRE-ON-THE-MOUNTAIN exhibition since history reflects that both the music and the dance have similar roots. Audience participation affords spectators the opportunity to join in. The FIRE-ON-THE-MOUNTAIN CLOGGERS also offer beginner lessons several times a year.

A historical presentation on the background of clog dancing

includes everything from Cherokee War whoops to Irish Step dancing to the English Lancaster clog. Fiddle music recorded by Linda Carolan's late grand-father adds authenticity to her demonstration of jiggin' or flat-footin' as taught to her by her great grandmother. Buck dancing, which is closely related to clogging in its origin, provides the audience with a taste of fancy footwork.

The team will be demonstrating a special style of West Texas dancing called the Abilene Lifting Two Step during one of their sections of "history" and this will be directly compared with Appalachian style clogging.

Also, as a special addition to this particular show for the Old Quarry Society for the Performing Arts, various team members have agreed to present a brief display of their singing and musical talents. This will take place somewhere around the "half time" and then the group will get back to cloggin'.

Rusty and Linda Carolan, directors of the team, have instructed at clogging workshops around the country including Alabama, Kentucky, North Carolina and Indiana as well as Texas. They are in charge of all of the clogging activities during the 1987 National Square Dance, Round Dance and Clogging Convention to be held in Houston, Texas. An estimated 40,000 dancers overall are expected to be in attendance.

SHERIFF'S CORNER**NORMAN HOOTEN****SHERIFF**

WEEK OF JULY 28, 1986.

A 28 year old Camp Wood woman was the victim of a brutal assault and rape Monday night, July 21st, after her car stalled on the side of the road Highway 334 approx. 25 miles north of Brackettville in Uvalde County.

The victim, who is married and the mother of three small children, was in the Brackettville area Monday afternoon looking at real estate property and was returning to her home in Campwood at approx. 10:30 pm when the incident occurred. She was beaten, robbed, and raped several times by her attackers who are described as Hispanic males, both approx. 25 to 30 years of age. One of the men is described as being 5'9 to 6' tall, thin build, light-skinned with brown hair. He has a thin face with hollow cheeks, spoke fluent Spanish and when speaking English he had an accent. He combed his hair back straight from his forehead and his hair was fairly long but not shaggy. The second man was described as short, 5'4 to 5'6", stocky build, with a wide face, flat nose, pock marks, and a large mole on the left side of his face under his eye. His hair was black and curly, almost like he had a perm. He was wearing a white shirt with lace along the sides. Similar to a Mexican Guallavera shirt. The car driven by the # 1 man was described as an older model, medium sized 2-dr sedan. White over pale yellow with a vinyl roof that had a tear in the vinyl over the drivers door. The car also had several rust spots and a dent in the door on the driver's side. The perpetrators fled the scene towards Brackettville after releasing the woman. They took her keys which have not been found.

I was called in to assist in the investigation by Texas Ranger Joaquin Jackson and Sherriff Kenneth Kelly of Uvalde County. We have worked on the case day and night since Monday and have interviewed several suspects and located at least three cars that fit the basic

description of the suspect vehicle. Much of the information about the suspects and the car was obtained from the victim while she was under hypnosis. We had two suspects and a suspect vehicle in Brackettville, but feel that, after a final interview held at the Sherriff's office Sunday night, we have pretty well ruled them out. We must continue the search now in other directions.

A recent accident that occurred at the roadside park on Highway 90 approx. 5 miles east of Brackettville left two injured and totalt destroyed a picnic table at the park. The two injured were from Laughlin AFB as well as the driver of the car involved. First reports were that a hit and run had occurred with the suspect vehicle fleeing the scene while the injured were left unattended until their companion, a white female, also from Laughlin AFB (the mother of one of the injured, a 13 year old girl), returned from inside the restroom at the park.

We received the report of the incident from authorities at the AFB after the injured had been transported to the base hospital. Evidence at the scene and certain other discrepencies in their story led us to believe futher investigation was needed. After our investigation was completed it was determined that the three persons involved had given a false report and we considered filing charges of False Report to a Peace Officer on two adults. After consultation with County Attorney Tully Shahan it was decided that no charges would be filed and the case was closed. It will be up to the State Highway Department to reach agreement with the insurance company covering the driver as to payment for damages to the table.

'DANDY', our local man-trailing Bloodhound, who has been on rotation duty assignment in Uvalde County for several weeks, was called into action on Monday, July 28th, to assist in the search for a murder suspect in Uvalde County.

The man being sought for a murder that occurred in Uvalde on that date has been determined to be an illegal alien. The incident occurred as

a result of a "love triangle". After being attacked by an angry ex-lover, the suspect shot him several times and fled south on the Pearsall road. His car was found abandoned on Highway 140 south of Uvalde about noon and 'DANDY' was called into service. The hot, dry, conditions made tracking difficult, but 'DANDY' alerted the officers to the direction in which the suspect fled his car and with his assistance and that of Border Patrol trackers the man was finally apprehended near a stock tank late Monday afternoon. He was disarmed and arrested by Texas Ranger Joaquin Jackson without incident.

"DANDY" has been on rotation duty assignment in Uvalde so as to allow other officers to become familiar with techniques used in handling man-trailers and this will ultimately be of more benefit to the public as there will be more members of the Southwest Texas Law Enforcement Officer's Association trained in the use of man-trailing Bloodhounds in the event of such an emergency.

I am sorry to report that "STAR", the female Bloodhound that was stationed in Uvalde had to be put to sleep because of a terminal illness. All possible efforts were made to save her, but it was finally decided that the only humane thing to do was to put her to sleep because of her suffering.

Recognized separately for over ten years of service was Dr. Olga Shalanta.

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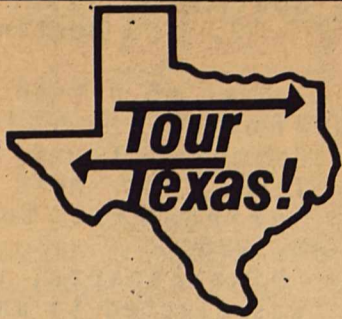

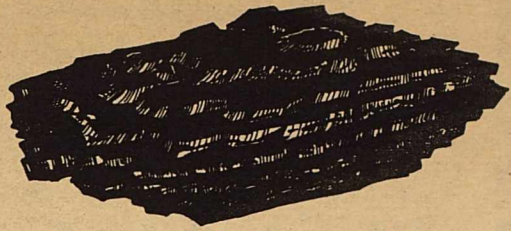
