Eta Beta, Southwest Texas Junior College's chapter of the National Academic Honors Fraternity Phi Theta Kappa, honored a large group of fall initiates representing a wide range of area towns in a special ceremony at the college last Thursday evening. Eta Beta president Anthony Allen and vice-president Yolanda Hernandez conducted the ceremony which included presentations by other officers on different aspects and goals of the organization.

According to Allen, "One advantage to being a member of PTK is that a number of colleges and universities offer transfer scholarships to members of PTK who have been active in their local chapters. Several former members of our chapter have received transfer scholarships."

After the ceremony, Blair noted that Texas Tech University was particularly interested in PTK members, offering 50 scholarships.

Suzanne Reyes, Eta Beta Secretary, spoke during the ceremony on leadership. "We want the new members to know that each of you can be a future leader," she said.

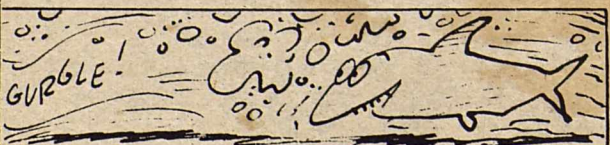

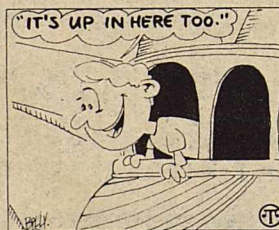
Tricia Jacob serves as historian for the fraternity; other returning members include Aletha Granberry and Terry Parker.

Did You Know?

A white, waxy substance discovered by accident in a lab back in 1938 now touches people in countless ways every day, everywhere in the world.

- It's the primary construction material of many artificial internal body part replacements.
- It's a key material in the lining of the Pontiac Silverdome in Detroit.
- It's a part of the windows of solar heat collectors and car bumpers.
- It's a coating on light-bulbs to keep them from shattering and on the wire lining of blimps.
- It's a substance used to put computer microbes on chips.
- This unique fluorocarbon resin, marketed under the brand name Teflon, was developed by Du Pont Com-



pany. It makes regular flights into outer space, as part of the insulation of voice cables, lining support systems carrying liquid oxygen fuel, and acting as a heat shield during rocket and satellite re-entry into the earth's atmosphere.

- As part of The Statue of Liberty restoration project, Teflon was used to coat the stainless steel gridiron inside the structure, thereby preventing corrosion. It was also used on the Statue's 15,000 junction points.

**HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE
"A SILENT DISEASE"**

High blood pressure doesn't hurt. It often doesn't make you feel bad. But despite its lack of symptoms, this disorder can be dangerous to your health.

Many of the 20 percent of adult Americans who have high blood pressure do not know it, says the Texas Medical Association. If you've never had your blood pressure checked, now is a good time to do so.

Hypertension, the medical term for high blood pressure, is a condition in which the blood in your arteries is putting too much pressure on the vessel's walls. Hypertension usually begins at about age 30 and is more common as age increases, but it can occur in any age and any person.

High blood pressure occurs more often in men than in women. In women, the disorder often is associated with birth control pills or pregnancy. Hypertension occurs more frequently in blacks than in whites, in overweight people, and in relatives of people with high blood pressure.

Hypertension is a major cause of stroke, heart failure, and kidney failure, but this disorder can be controlled by taking prescribed medication, reducing salt intake, not smoking, losing excess weight, exercising, and drinking less alcohol.

If medication is required, it should be taken daily, even if the patient feels well. If he feels sick, he should see a physician. Hypertension patients or those who have ever been told they had high blood pressure should have their blood pressure checked frequently. For others, a yearly check is advisable.

SHERIFF'S CORNER

Burglars struck at a hunting lodge on the Raymond Cunningham Ranch in East Kinney County the night of September 10th and took property valued over \$2,000.00. The thieves entered the ranch by cutting a hinge off a gate with a hacksaw. They then drove straight to the lodge and used pry bars to break into the cabin. Evidence at the scene indicated that at least two persons were involved and they loaded a refrigerator, a kitchen stove, an air conditioning unit, and other items into what is believed to be a pickup truck and then drove straight out of the ranch. They left the gate open and cattle from the ranch got out and that led to the discovery of the crime by a friend when putting the cattle back into the pasture.

The MO (method of operation) of this crime is very similar to that of at least 4 other hunting camp burglaries in the same area over the past two years. This leads us to believe that the same persons have been involved in all the crimes. There are no leads in the case at the time of this writing but the case will remain under investigation.

County Commissioner Tim Ward reported the theft of a 1979 Chevrolet truck/tractor from his ranch on the night of September 15th. The thieves tampered with several vehicles at the scene trying to hot wire the ignition before finding the keys to the truck in the glove box. They then started the truck and drove it through the ranch gate leading to Hwy. 90.

Upon receiving the theft report the truck was entered into the TCIC and NCIC Computers as a stolen vehicle. It was recovered abandoned on IH 35 near Waco on Friday, September 19th. The MO indicates that the truck was stolen by illegal aliens passing through to the interior of Texas.

Juan R. "Johnny" Martinez, 32, of Brackettville has been charged with Burglary of a Building and Unauthorized Use

of a Motor Vehicle stemming from the break in of the B & S Jug Store on Hwy. 90 and the theft of a 1979 Chevrolet 1 ton truck from the Travis Wilson Construction Company also on Hwy. 90 during the early morning hours of September 18th.

The break-in of the Jug Store was discovered by a Passerby at approximately 4:00 a.m., the theft of the truck was not discovered until approximately 9:40 a.m., both on the morning of the 18th. During the investigation it was learned that Martinez had been jailed in Del Rio on drunk driving charges at 2:52 a.m. on the 18th and was driving the stolen truck at the time of his arrest. As the truck had not been discovered missing at that time the arresting officer had no way of knowing that it was stolen. I completed my investigation of the two cases on Tuesday, September 23rd and have obtained enough evidence to officially charge Martinez in the two crimes. He remains in the Val Verde County Jail on DWI and Driving While License Suspended charges. A hold has been placed on him by this department and he will be returned to Kinney County for trial after Val Verde County is through with him. No bond has been set on the Kinney County charges at the time of this writing.

Special notice should be given to the fact that in both of the auto theft cases the keys to those vehicles had been left inside of them. DO NOT leave the keys to your vehicles inside them at any time for any reason unless someone is there to supervise the vehicle in your absence. Keys left in unattended vehicles allows would be car thieves a golden opportunity to steal your car. Over 90% of the auto theft cases we have worked over the past six years have involved vehicles that have had the keys left in them.

STUDENT COMMENDED

Brackettville High School has been notified by National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) of Evanston, Illinois, that John B. Benacci has been designated a Commended Student in the 1987 National Merit Scholarship Program and will receive a Letter of Commendation in recognition of outstanding academic promise. The principal, Lee Schermerhorn, announced today that on the basis of performance on the qualifying test for the 32nd annual Merit Program this senior placed in the top 50,000 of more than one million participants.

An officer on NMSC, which conducts the program, stated, "The very high test performance of the young men and women who are honored as Commended Students in the Merit Program is indicative of exceptional scholastic ability. We hope that NMSC's recognition of these high school students will increase their motivation to make the best use of their talents and to develop the skills that will be needed by the future leaders of our nation. Being named a Commended Student in this keen competition is a credit to these young citizens as well as to their schools, which play a key role in their development."

Participants entered the current Merit Program by taking the PSAT/NMSQT in October 1985, when most of them were juniors. Although their qualifying test scores are high, the 35,000 young people throughout the nation who are Commended Students scored slightly below the level required for Semifinalist standing in the

Merit Program. Only the 15,000 Semifinalists, whose names were announced on September 11, will continue in the competition for some 6,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the spring of 1987.

Parsley Salad (Tabouli)

Tabouli also makes a tasty filling for pita bread.

- 2 bunches parsley, washed and crisped
- 1/2 cup finely crushed bulgur wheat
- 1 cucumber, diced
- 2 medium tomatoes, cut in large pieces
- 4 green onions, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh green mint, or 1 tablespoon dried mint
- freshly ground black pepper

Wash and drain the crushed wheat and let stand while preparing the vegetables.

Chop parsley and combine with chopped cucumber, tomatoes, onions and mint. Mix in the crushed wheat.

SWBT supports program that addresses school dropout problem

Texas' most precious resource is *not* oil or gas, but rather the young men and women of the state. Unfortunately, a large proportion of these youths will never reach their fullest potential because of their decision to drop out of school. They end up cheating themselves, and society, out of the contributions that only they and their unique talents can make.

Recently published statistics reinforce the severity of this problem: The dropout rate in Texas hovers around 30 percent. Last spring alone, one out of every three potential high school seniors in the state — about 80,000 — failed to graduate.

This problem affects all of us, since young people with little education often turn to crime when they are unable to find a job. In 1985, more than 100,000 people under the age of 17 were arrested in Texas. And, this is not a new phenomenon — 85 percent of the 30,000 inmates in Texas prisons are high school dropouts.

Although these numbers paint a grim picture, a group of concerned citizens have approached this age-old problem with a new and promising solution — it's called Communities in Schools (CIS). We, at Southwestern Bell Telephone, feel that CIS will pay future dividends to the people of Texas because it addresses the individual needs of our state's troubled youths.

A highly focused program, CIS coordinates efforts of many social service organizations into a centralized, efficient, yet humanized, unit. It works closely with public education personnel to encourage students — who run a risk of dropping out — to complete their education.

CIS treats students as individuals

CIS counselors work one-on-one with these students to solve problems that often cause them to drop out. It takes a "whole child" approach, recognizing that many factors — including family, financial and psychological concerns — affect a youngster's decision to leave school.

Southwestern Bell Telephone has been an enthusiastic supporter of CIS since it began as a pilot program in 1979. Through the past seven years, we have provided direction, money, equipment and manpower to give floundering students in Texas another chance at a good education.

SWBT believes in the program because it works: Since its inception, CIS has helped more than 5,000 students. Even more impressive, over the last two years, 87 percent of the youngsters in the CIS summer program are still in public school, or have gone on to college, additional training or unsubsidized jobs.

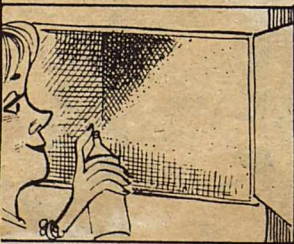

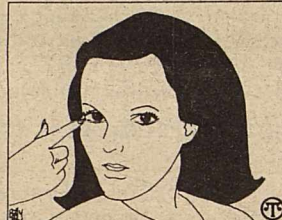

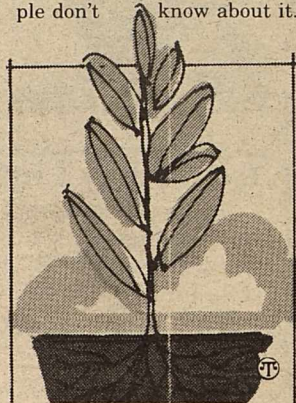
