

SHERIFF'S CORNER

Burglars struck again the night of Thursday, April 9th with a local business on Highway 90 being the victim.

We received a call at 7:40 a.m. on Friday, April 10th from Amelia Villarreal, an employee with Las Moras Distributing Company, who reported that a break-in had occured at the business sometime during the night. Investigation at the crime scene by myself and Chief Deputy David Luna determined that a single intruder had forced open a locked restroom door at the rear of the building and used a grubbing hoe to chop a hole through the wall thereby gaining entry to the office. The interior was ransacked and approximately \$81.32 in cash was taken as well as approximately 18 gallons of gas. Several cans of motor oil were knocked from shelves next to the hole in the wall, some of them ruptured and caused quite a mess on the floor.

Tracks and other evidence found outside the building indicated that the unidentified criminal attempted to siphon gas from several vehicles parked at the side and rear of the building. The burglar evidently needed money and fuel as those were the only items taken. There is a suspect in the case though no arrests have been made at the time of this writing.

The Border Patrol check-point held west of town last week netted the arrests of three persons in possession of illegal drugs. The first case involved was the arrest of Kurt Phillips, 30, Scottsdale, Arizona on charges of Possession of a Controlled Substance (cocaine and marijuana). Phillips was arrested at 3:15 a.m., Saturday, April 11th on the felony charges and was magistrated by City Judge Bill Thurber who set bond at \$5,000.00.

The second and third arrests were those of Parker Vincent Evans, 21, and James Neel, 24, both of New Orleans, Louisiana on misdemeanor charges of Possession of Marijuana. Bonds on Evans and Neel have not been set at the time of this writing.

The financial crunch being experienced by the county has been eased somewhat with the reception of 10 federal prisoners on Friday, April 11th.

I had called U.S. Marshall Bill Jonas in San Antonio on Tuesday and explained to him that due to a defecit in our projected income from prisoner care fees the county was running below anticipated income for FY 86-87 by some \$68,000.00 and we needed to make every attempt to generate revenue by increased federal prisoner population at the county jail.

Marshall Jonas was sympathetic with our situation and explained that our problem was being shared by many other counties sheriffs had federal prisoner programs in their jails. He went on to explain that apprehensions of both illegal aliens and smugglers of illegal aliens was down an estimated 72% from this time last year, primarily because of the new Immigration and Naturalization law. He did, however, promise to make every effort to have a "van load" of federal prisoners designated and delivered to our jail by Monday, April 13th. He was good for his word as we received the prisoners on Friday, two days earlier than expected. Income from prisoner care fees for these prisoners will be approx. \$8,400.00 per month. I intend to make every effort to obtain at least 10 more federal prisoners in order to increase revenue for the county.

We have been fortunate in that over the past five years to date we have collected almost 3/4 million dollars from federal prisoner care fees. These funds have gone a long way in helping the county not only pay expenses, but also to get out of debt. Hopefully once the new Immigration law, and the enforcement of it is in full swing, things will get back to normal and we will once again be receiving good income to the county from federal prisoner care fees.

Commissioners Court met in a special meeting Friday, April 10th to discuss and revise the county budget. All department heads agreed to voluntarily cut their existing budgets in order to ease the financial strain now being experienced. These cuts totalled almost \$30,000.00 with the largest cut being made by me from my jail budget in the amount of \$10,270.00. The county is by no means out of money at this point as we still have over \$100,000.00 in the General Fund and \$225,000.00 in Certificates of Deposit, but care should be, and will be taken to reduce spending until we can get straightened out and added income is generated, primarily by prisoner care fees at the county jail.






Hi! This week I'll review two great movies, "Soul Man" and "Legal Eagles".







On July Fourth, 1883, a group of cowboys got together and held a rodeo on the alkalia flat in front of the courthouse at Pecos, Texas. Prizes were given in roping and steer wrestling. The prizes were what we now call entry fees.

What a day that must have been with everyone coming from the surrounding ranches bringing their lunches.

Trav Windham came, contested and won the first money. Henry Slack, a boy of eighteen, rode and was doing pretty good when his rope broke, putting him out of the money.

Uncle Henry Slack rode in the first rodeo and in every rodeo until he died. He was a tall straight old man and lead the parade too.

Trav Windham tied his steer in 22 seconds flat that day. Morgan and Jim Livingston, Billy Coalson, Charles Goedeke, Jeff Chism, Pete Beard and others, were the first contestants.

This was the worlds first official rodeo. In the encyclopedia Britannica it says "Most authorities agree that the first public contest for prizes for bronco riding and steer roping was held in an open field near the courthouse in Pecos, Texas on July 4, 1883, no admission was charged. The first contest for which an admission was charged and prizes were awarded was held at Prescott, Arizona on July 4, 1888."

Pecos has an unusual history and was the home of many interesting characters. Here one of the most famous early western sheriffs, Bud Frazer lived, and was killed in the line of duty. It was one of the stops on the Butterfield Stage Line and end of track when the railroad came.

It was the home town of the W Ranch which stretched along the Pecos River for thirty miles and covered three counties. At one time or another all the cowboys in the area rode for the W.

The boys from the Hashknife came to Pecos to whoop it up. In later years one cowboy stands out, Ole' Fritz Steigler.

Fritz was a bronco buster and broke horses for the surrounding ranches. The highlight of the year for Fritz was the rodeo on the 4th of July. He broke horses all year long and could ride anything with hooves and hair. He eared them down with his teeth while he climbed aboard and then the fun would begin.

Fritz was wild and wooley as the saying goes, with small feet and sure hands.

It's hard to tell where the true stories end and the legends begin about Fritz. One particular 4th, Fritz put on his rodeo shirt which was always red, shined up his neat small boots, and decided to really celebrate this time and give the Pecosites a real show. He eared down his favorite brone and went to town,...but how he went to town.

When the first spectators noticed him coming all they could see was a cloud of dust. As the dust cloud came closer they could see it was Fritz on a walleyed horse, hat clamped down low on his head and whipping that ole pony at every jump. It wasn't until he thundered down main street that they could see he was whipping his pony with a live rattlesnake. Fritz made quite a picture, he had that snake right behind the head and was using the tail end where it would do the most good. I'd have given my eyeteeth to have seen it but I didn't know Fritz until 1932.

I first met him at a rodeo dance where he had changed his red shirt for a spanking clean white one. And I must say he was as graceful as a ballet dancer.

Fritz did all the years dancing, drinking, and celebrating at the 4th of July Rodeo every year. I guess he had to store up enough hell-raising to last until next fourth of July.







April is Cancer Control Month

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has joined other agencies and associations nationwide in observing National Cancer Control Month in April.

President Ronald Reagan proclaimed the observance to draw public attention toward a better understanding of cancer, its prevention and treatment.

In Texas, TDH and the American Cancer Society are assisting local public awareness programs, emphasizing the dangers and detection of breast cancer in women, cancer attributed to tobacco use, cancer screening among older adults, and other programs.

One recent statewide public information campaign, conducted primarily through local television stations and newspapers, attracted some 108,000 responses from persons concerned about breast cancer. Part of the campaign was low-cost examinations and mammograms conducted in some metropolitan areas.

In addition, TDH's Adult Health Program has begun a pilot project to teach cancer preventive nutrition for black adults in East Texas (Wood County).

At the heart of TDH's programs to prevent cancer is its Cancer Registry, which compiles records from Texas hospitals of the many factors involved in incidence. Analysis of registry data since 1976 has begun to show characteristics of the more than 100 types of cancer suffered by Texans. Such information includes demographics, age, ethnic origin, previous illnesses, types of treatment and other pertinent facts that may indicate why some people are more at risk than others. example of the registry's finding is that Hispanics appear to have a higher incidence of stomach, liver, and gallbladder cancer than do Such facts help

researchers in their quest for specific causes of the diseases.

Dr. Robert Bernstein, Texas Commissioner of Health, said, "The combined efforts to prevent cancer have come a long way in recent years. We are steadily learning some of the specifics about how cancer occurs and which Texans are likely to have it. In doing so, we are able to help the public better understand ways to avoid the second most common cause of death in the state."

LEGEND OF THE EASTER BUNNY

An Easter bunny!! Why not an Easter elephant or giraffe? Why a bunny?

The bunny, as a symbol of spring seems to go back in time to the Egyptians, before Easter was celebrated. It has won acceptance throughout much of the world as the most important symbol of springtime to children.

In a German book written about

1682, the tales goes that the bunny lays eggs and hides them in the garden.

Easter bunnies first appeared in America in the 1770's with the arrival of German settlers. Children prepared nests for the bunnies hoping to find colored eggs on Easter morning. The nest could be a hat or a fancy paper box. Then it would be hidden in a secluded spot, because Easter bunnies are especially shy.

Pennsylvania Dutch children receive Easter cakes made of bread dough formed in the shape of a rabbit, with a raisin eye and a colored hard-boiled egg beneath the bunny's tail. In Germany, in the 1800's Easter bunnies were first made of pastry and sugar.

Whatever the country, you can see this legend is pleasant to swallow.

Many people believe that the tradition of coloring eggs at Easter time is a Christian custom. Actually, it predates Christianity. Read further to learn about that tradition and others.



Then: 5,000 years ago the Persians celebrated the return of spring by exchanging colored eggs as tokens of goodwill. The Pennsylvania Dutch brought the Easter egg to the New World in 1728. Their pride in the colorful Easter eggs made the Pennsylvania Dutch start the custom of an Easter egg tree. They used a large branch or small tree, removed the leaves and hung the decorated eggs on branches.

Now: The egg tree is still one of the most popular centerpieces on the Easter table in the Pennsylvania Dutch country. Other traditions remain intact as well.




