The cantalope, a special type of melon called Rocky Ford, was grown from seeds originating in California. Dalton has been growing melons, along with other fruits and

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
Mrs. Agnes Fritter Vondy has been appointed to the Citizens Advisory Council on Aging by the Texas Department on Aging for 3 years.

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POTTER TELLS TALES OF REINDEER MEAT & RUSSIA


Since my return, a good many people have asked me about my trip I appreciate Russia. the opportunity to share some of that experience with you in As a matter of fact, Cavalryman. simply having a local newspaper is something I have learned to appreciate. There are no local newspapers in the Soviet Union. national having two newspapers, each about five pages containing length, advertising and ignoring much of the news of the outside world.

Entering the Soviet Union was a little less difficult than I had expected. Before we reached the border, we completed a "Customs Declaration" on which we gave basic information such as where we came from, why we were visiting the Soviet Union, how long we would stay and where, etc. We also listed the amounts of all currency our possession including travelers checks, and cash from other countries. We listed all of our valuable possessions and the number of pieces of luggage we were carrying. We also had to throw away all newspapers and magazines including those with potentially embarrassing references to the Soviet Union, references to the landing of the small plane in Red and black lister periodicals, the most noteable of which was Reader's Digest. It is not permitted to bring Russian money (Rubles) into the country or to take it out. Each time that we exchanged money in the hotels or at a bank, we had to present our


Customs Declaration. We would be questioned if we tried to exchange hard currency which was not listed. We received a very important form each time we exchanged money, which we were to keep during our entire stay in the Soviet Union. Upon leaving the country, we presented those forms along with our Russian visa, the Customs Declaration and receipts for all transactions made while in the Soviet Union. The currency declaration is important to the Soviet authorities because some people in the streets would offer to exchange money on the black market or to buy your clothes. It is very risky to deal with these people since they could be KGB agents or policemen, or they could be offering you money which is not good for purchases. It is also risky to be caught with more Rubles than you should have. Some people on the street will ask you to smuggle letters out of the Soviet Union for them. It is extremely dangerous to be caught with such letters. I was able to walk around freely on my own many times. Using what little Russian I know, I was able to ask directions and say a few kind words. It is interesting to note that when I added the words - very much - to the words - thank you - the people were very warm and responsive, even including the police.

During our stay in Russia, we were joined by a guide from Intourist, the official Soviet tour company for "foreigners". Our Intourist guide did not provide

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


Danny Potter, band director at Brackett High, enjoyed his visit to the Soviet Union. The picture above was taken during his visit to Leningrad.




EARWOOD'S **CELEBRATE 40 YEARS**

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
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KELLEY AWARDED CERTIFICATE FROM S.W.T.S.U.








In the spring of 1757, six Franciscans Friars cleared ground on the bank of the San Saba river near what is now Menard, Texas. They cut timber and built homes and a church, the first catholic church Northwest of San Antonio, and not only that, but it was built in Comanche and Apache country. The Rev. Alonso Giraldo de Torreras financed the building of the Mission to be called San Saba.

They built their first station about three miles downstream from the new Presidio San Luis de las Amarillas, at that time the largest and most important Texas fort.

No converts showed up and by the first of the new year four of the priests left and only one replacement arrived. Father Alonso, Friar Jose Santiesteban and Friar Miguel Molina were left.

That winter the Indian raids on the Mission began and the Commander asked the Franciscans to move to the fort, but Friar Alonso thought the Mission was safer than the fort.

At this time there were about thirty-five persons living in the Mission. On March 18, 1758 the Indians struck. Friar Jose ran to the church to alert Friar Alonso who was preparing for Mass.

The Comanches had come to the Mission in friendship (so they

said) and were permitted inside by the padres. As soon as they gained entrance they began to plunder.

Father Alonso jumped to his horse to ride to the Presidio for help, but was shot, mortally wounded. Then the Comanches set fire to the Mission, destroying it. Friar Miguel was also wounded, but crawled into a room with others who were forced to seek help when that room began to burn. Friar Miguel crawled three miles down the river to the Presidio which took him twenty-four hours.

In the meantime, Father Jose was killed in the church at the foot of the altar. The next day when the soldiers came, all they saw was smoking ruins. Dead were two Friars and seventeen laymen. Their graves are unknown today. The 2,000 Indians, (Comanches, Tejas, Bidais, and Tonkawas), rode on to Paint Rock where they reported the raid, claiming the death of three priests, not two. The Mission was moved into the Presidio, which was abandoned in 1770 by the Spanish.

The remainder of the ruins was carted off by people of Menard and used in other buildings. It was restored in the 30's by the WPA but flood waters washed most of it away.

San Soba Mission existed only a year but then everything was short lived on the Texas frontier. At the last, only three Friars were alive and the nine Tiascolteca Indians who were sent to the Mission from Mexico were dead too. They had been sent to teach the Indians agriculture. Only the one-hundred and twenty soldiers survived.

By the way, Emilio's co-star is his long time love Demi Moore who in her own right is a well established actress.


I think everyone will like this movie.



vegetables, for 15 years, but this is the first time he has seen anything grow this large.

"Don't tell anyone that this was an accident," Dalton laughs. "I really don't know how it grew so big or what caused the growth," he continues, although he did add nitrogen to some grapes that were planted about four feet away from the cantalope bed. "That's the only thing I can think of that would have done it," he concluded.

Dalton does have another candidate for Brackett's largest cantalope, but it has not fully matured yet. We, along with Dalton, will have to wait and see.

GARDENING TIPS BY THE MORNING ORY GARDEN CLUB DEL RIO, TEXAS

"A HANGING FLOWER GARDEN"

If you do not have space for a Flower Garden, start a Hanging Flower Garden, for the house, porch, patio, and even in your trees. The first rule for hanging baskets is to choose plants that trail, and those to be planted as fillers. An ideal spot for a hanging basket is your front porch greeting friends with a glamorous sight of flowering or foliage plants, which can be Impatients, Begonias, or Ivy. At a sunny kitchen door plant a combination of parsley, nasturtium and some lemon thyme, all can be used in flavoring of salads. Cascading petunias do well in hanging baskets and add color to many places, and of course portulaca is lovely in a hanging container. With the trailing plants, you may also plant alyssum, variegated vinca.

For the hanging basket itself there are the plastic ones, complete with saucer, and the wire ones which need a liner, using old panty hose, moss, or special basket liners. You may have a collection of woven baskets that could be used for your hanging garden. In planting a hanging basket consider the planting medium or soil. This soil should be light which can be purchased, or you can make your own, of equal parts good garden loam, peat moss and perlite, and to each 12 inch basket mix, add one of slow-release tablespoon fertilizer. When planting the basket, have the soil moist, and start planting your plants, starting in the center. The outer plants should be planted so they will begin to trail over the rim of the pot, and water well. Also be sure to check often to see if the soil is too wet or too dry. As you know, wire containers drip readily and nutrients are washed out, so fertilizers have to be added often. . You have a large variety of containers, flowering and foliage plants to choose for a beautiful Hanging Garden for everyone to enjoy.


BAND MEMBERS BEGIN REHEARSALS AUG. 3



PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE #210

In view of the fact that several residents have not complied with the ordinance #210, resulting in several complaints through the City, the City of Brackettville would like to remind all residents of this ordinance prohibiting the burning of certain items leading to compliance of ordinance and fewer complaints of the violation of ordinance.

ORDINANCE # 210

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS:

Section 1. TRASH BURNING PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful to burn brush, tree limbs, grass, trees, leaves, boards, planks or lumber in the City Limits.

Section 2. PENALTY. Any person convicted of violating this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00.

Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval, and publication as provided by law.

They have never even heard of many things that we take for granted as common knowledge.

There were some wonderful times during the tour. While in Moscow, we attended the famous circus, and it was breathtaking. In Leningrad we attended a gala dinner which included wonderful black caviar. I did have some things to eat and drink on the trip which were, well, shall we say, unusual. The water in Russia is not drinkable and the mineral water was almost as bad. I ate my first Reindeer meat and had an opportunity to eat some nice, fresh tongue, but I decided that one tongue was enough in one lifetime (the one in my mouth, that is). For breakfast one morning we had a very heavy pastry which had something like sour milk in the middle, and was accompanied by a heavy cream which also tasted like sour milk. Thank goodness for coffee!

We were missing a couple of things that we needed at times in Russia. Hot water and toilet paper. A cold shower can be very exciting.






