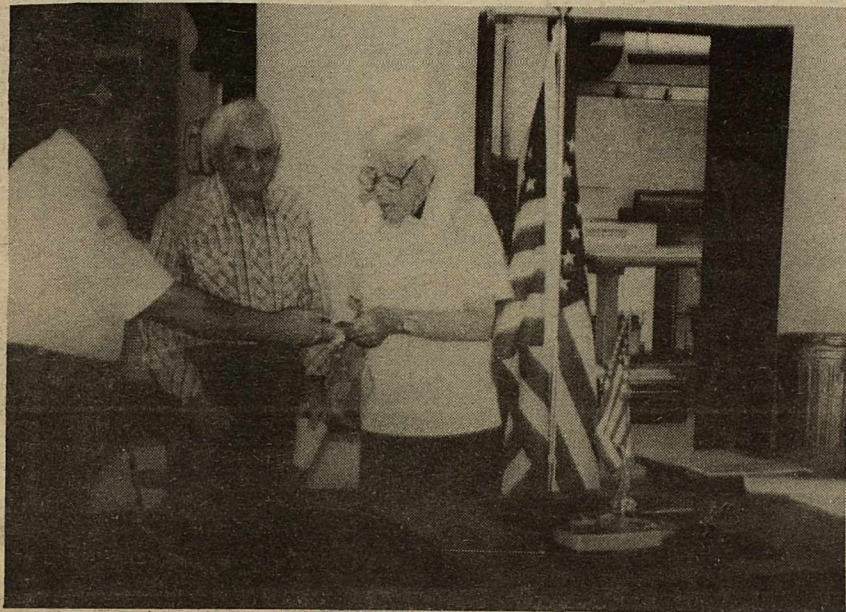
### MISS KINNEY COUNTY PAGEANT TO BE HELD SEPT. 3

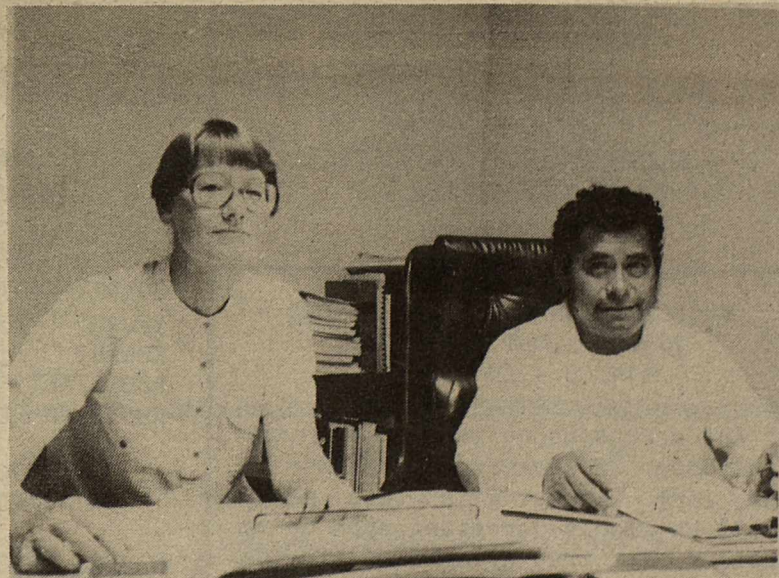
### WW1 VETERANS HONORED

Two World War I veterans, Hugh Hickman (90) and Forrest Parry (92) were presented V.F.W. Life Memberships by VFW Post 8360, Fort Clark Springs. Commander Fithian made the presentation to Mr. Hickman and Mr. Parry at the August 26 VFW meeting. These veterans served with the American Expeditionary Forces in France and England.

Hugh Roff Hickman was born Nov. 18, 1897 at Pecola, Indian Territory which is now part of Oklahoma. Hugh served about a year and a half in the United States Army during World War I. Hugh married the former Etna Elmore in 1919. They had one daughter, Betty Jean Logan. The Hickman's lived in Durant, Oklahoma until 1942 when they moved to California where Hugh operated his own laundromat and dry cleaning business. He moved to Fort Clark Springs in 1984 to be near his daughter.

Forrest Parry was born August 9, 1895 at Silver City, Idaho. Forrest enlisted in the Army Dec. 15, 1917 and served until Dec. 30, 1918. He married the former Margaret Portas in 1947, in Carson City, Nevada. He has six children. Forrest worked for the

AN ORDINANCE TO SET THE 1987 TAX RATE FOR THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE 1987 AD VALOREM TAXES AS REQUIRED BY STATE PROPERTY TAX LAW SECTION 26.04 (e).

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Brackettville in conformance to established State laws met and passed the City of Brackettville 1987/1988 Budget; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 26.04 (e) of the State Property Tax Law the City Council has established and set a \$.60 per \$100 Market Value rate for Ad Valorem Taxes to effectively carry out the 1987/1988 Budget; and

WHEREAS, the tax rate established does not exceed the 3% or 8% effective tax rate as outlined in the Statutes; THEREFORE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE THAT:

The effective tax rate for the City of Brackettville 1987/1988 Annual Budget be set at \$.60 per \$100 valuation of market value.

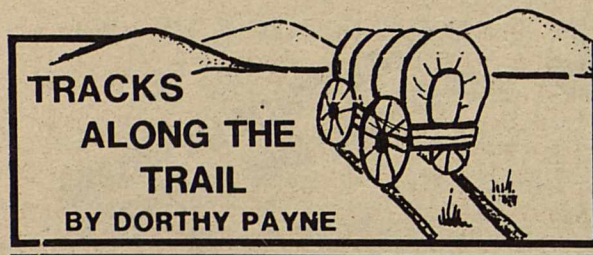

## BRACKETT TEACHERS HONORED BY LIONS

Brackettville teachers were back in the classrooms Monday, August 24, 1987, and thanks to a wonderful meal prepared for them by the Brackettville Lions Club, they were more than ready for the students that began their school year on Tuesday, September 1.

The Lions hosted a get-together for Brackettville teachers and administrators, as they do every year, to honor them and to introduce and welcome new teachers to the area.

B.I.S.D. Superintendent Bob McCall spoke to the large crowd and thanked the Lions for their hospitality. He introduced each of the teachers returning from last school year and then presented the new arrivals to our district.



A few gnarled apple trees remain along the water in Limpia Canyon in the Davis Mountains of Texas. Once in the nineteen and twenties they flourished here and these orchards provided a thriving \$100,000 per year crop in Limpia Valley near Ft. Davis, in the Davis Mountains.

The heart of the apple growing country in Jeff Davis county was along Limpia creek although dry most of the time, was a raging torrent during the rainy season. There were no bridges, only low water crossings, the road crossing Limpia twenty-two times between Ft. Davis and the rest of Texas.

When you journeyed to Ft. Davis you always stopped at the orchards and got apples to eat along the way. Delicious homemade candy was available too.

The flavor of the apples was probably due to the lushness of the Valley, which was watered by sub-irrigation, the Limpia Creek, and a huge underground river which meandered through the Davis Mountains. This irrigation has since dried up and Limpia Creek only runs when it rains in the Mountains.

Years ago the orchards were a thriving business, now most of the trees are gone and only a few are in good enough shape to bear apples.

The biggest of the apple producers was C.H. Bird who came to the Ft. Davis area in 1903. When he came there were a few apple trees and he decided to plant orchards commercially.

Bird started to plant in 1909 and by 1917 had four thousand trees in production. There were other producers on a smaller scale.

At Bird's peak year he had seven-thousand trees in production. After Bird's death in 1933 his son-in-law, Bill Fryar ran the orchards until they were sold in 1945.

Bird's apples were the first on the market by two weeks every year. The orchards grew Delicious, Blacktwigs, Limbertwigs, Winesap and other varieties of both eating and cooking apples. These orchards in the valley were the furthest south of any in the United States.

At full force, forty people were employed in the Bird orchards.

In the late 1920's the weather

changed in the area. One of these years a hail storm destroyed the crop and Insurance Companies would not insure the productions again. During the 1900's it was \$75,000 to \$100,000 a year.

Perhaps the first orchard was planted by David Merrill who came to the valley in 1883. And some other ranchers also planted a few trees, which only produced a few years.

In later years the Brooks family kept the orchards, but as the old trees quit producing, just straight nursery stock was planted in their place.

In the 1930's the road through Limpia Valley was a beautiful winding trail. What a surprise to suddenly see apple trees along the road. One could stop and buy apples, truck gardening crops, and homemade candy, and you were always sure of friendly conversation and a cup of coffee. But now that is gone, along with the dried up underground river.

But nearby restored Ft. Davis affords a good restful and interesting stopping place, by the creek where the soldiers used to camp.

**HERE'S TO YOUR HEALTH**

**HEAT STROKE**

The intense heat of the desert Southwest is responsible for many heat related illnesses and deaths every year. The hotter the temperature, the brighter the sun, and the more humid the conditions, the greater the risk for acquiring heat related problems. Add other risk factors such as obesity, heart disease, alcoholism and age and the potential for death increases.

Our bodies have a heat regulating center in the hypothalamus, a small gland located in the brain. When functioning normally, the hypothalamus regulates our internal body temperature at approximately 98.6 F.

When a person works hard or exercises in the hot sun, the hypothalamus sends signals to the cardiovascular system, causing heart-rate to increase and surface capillaries to dilate so that heat radiates to the air through the skin's surface. Pores in the skin open and sweat escapes to the skin's surface to evaporate into the surrounding air. 97% of the body's cooling takes place in this manner. The cooler blood returns to inner parts of the body, keeping the internal temperature at approximately 98.6 F.

Over exposure to heat will cause the system to overload. The concept is similar to a radiator overheating. When this happens, the internal temperature of the body rises to dangerous levels, and heat stroke and death can occur in a very short time.

Tolerance to prolonged heat exposure can be acquired over time. A carefully structured program over several weeks, beginning at lower temperatures and gradually increasing the time spent exercising in a hot climate can make a person more heat tolerant. This process is called

"acclimatization".

If you must work or exercise outside during these hot summer months, follow these guidelines to help protect yourself from heat stroke.

a) drink plenty of cool water and drink it often. 12-24 oz. every hour.

b) dress in cool, light clothing made of cotton. Synthetic fabrics do not allow the skin to "breathe" as well as cotton, often preventing adequate sweat evaporation and cooling of the skin.

c) Rest often in a shady place. Symptoms of heat related illness to watch for are:

- 1) excessive perspiring or inability to perspire.
- 2) muscle cramping
- 3) gooseflesh or prickly heat rash
- 4) rapid breathing
- 5) nausea/vomiting/diarrhea or constipation
- 6) weakness
- 7) Rapid pulse
- 8) Restlessness
- 9) Headache
- 10) Elevated temperature

If these symptoms occur:

- 1) Lie down & rest where it's cool or shady.
- 2) Bathe in cool water
- 3) Drink 1 liter of cool water with 1/4 t. salt added. Over the next 24 hours drink another 6-8 liters.
- 4) If you begin to feel worse, or if the above symptoms do not subside, have someone get you to the emergency room immediately. Heat exposure can be life threatening and needs to be taken seriously.

**STATE TO PROFIT FROM CHARITIES**

AUSTIN, Tex.--State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said changes in the State's charity bingo laws will mean higher cash prizes as well as a new tax on bingo games.

Bullock said the Texas Legislature added a two percent gross receipts tax on all games that will bring in an estimated \$13.3 million in the next two years.

The new tax will be in addition to the local gross receipts tax which produced more than \$5 million in rebates last year to cities and counties where bingo is played.

Bullock said the new tax will take effect September 1, 1987, which is also the start of higher

prize limits.

Lawmakers approved an increase in the total prize per session from \$1,500 to \$4,000 by exempting instant bingo from the current \$2,500 limit. The change will allow games to have both regular prizes up to \$2,500 and instant bingo prizes up to \$1,500.

Bullock said lawmakers have outlawed door prizes from charity bingo halls.

They also approved changes in the law which will prohibit advertising except by licensed organizations and prohibit advertising the amount of prizes.

"With these changes, Texas regulation of bingo will be among the tightest in the nation, ensuring that charities are the ones that benefit from charity bingo," said Bullock.

Bullock estimates that these changes will mean an additional \$25.3 million for Texas charities during the next two years.

**CAVALRYMAN NAMED CHAIRMAN**

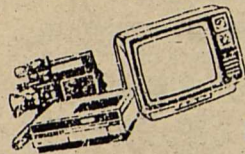
Tom Parker of Ore City has been named chairman of the Populist Party of Texas, according to a spokesman for the national organization.

Parker, a former Cavalryman stationed at Fort Clark in 1940-41 and a retired industrial air conditioning contractor, was named to the post by Tom McIntyre, national Populist Party chairman. Efforts at organizing the party in Texas have already begun, Parker said, with a statewide mailing to more than 1,000 persons in preparation for three mini-conventions scheduled in Tyler, San Antonio and Midland-Odessa.

The Texas party chairman said the goal of the organization is to organize and elect, at local, state and national levels, persons seeking "to wrest control of the nation from the special interest groups and return it to those who put America first."

Among the planks of the Populist Party campaign are repeal of the federal income tax, restoration of a sound national defense, the protection of American jobs and industry, protection of the right to keep and bear arms, abolition of the federal reserve system, a return to non-interventionist foreign policy and repudiation of the national debt.

The state party is headquartered at Box 628 in Ore City Tex., 75683.

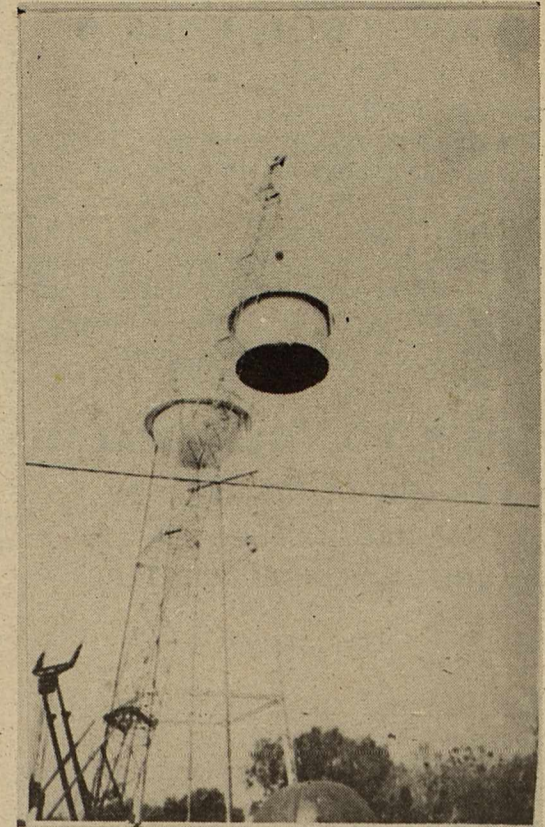
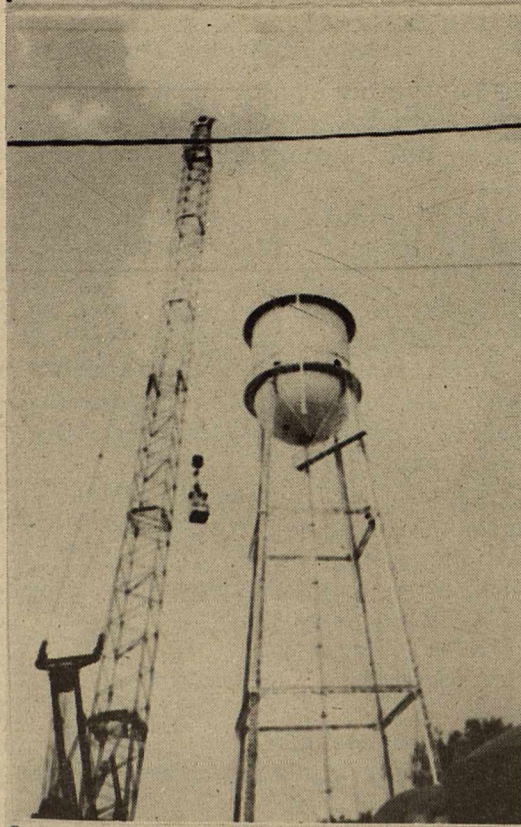

AT ALAMO VILLAGE**

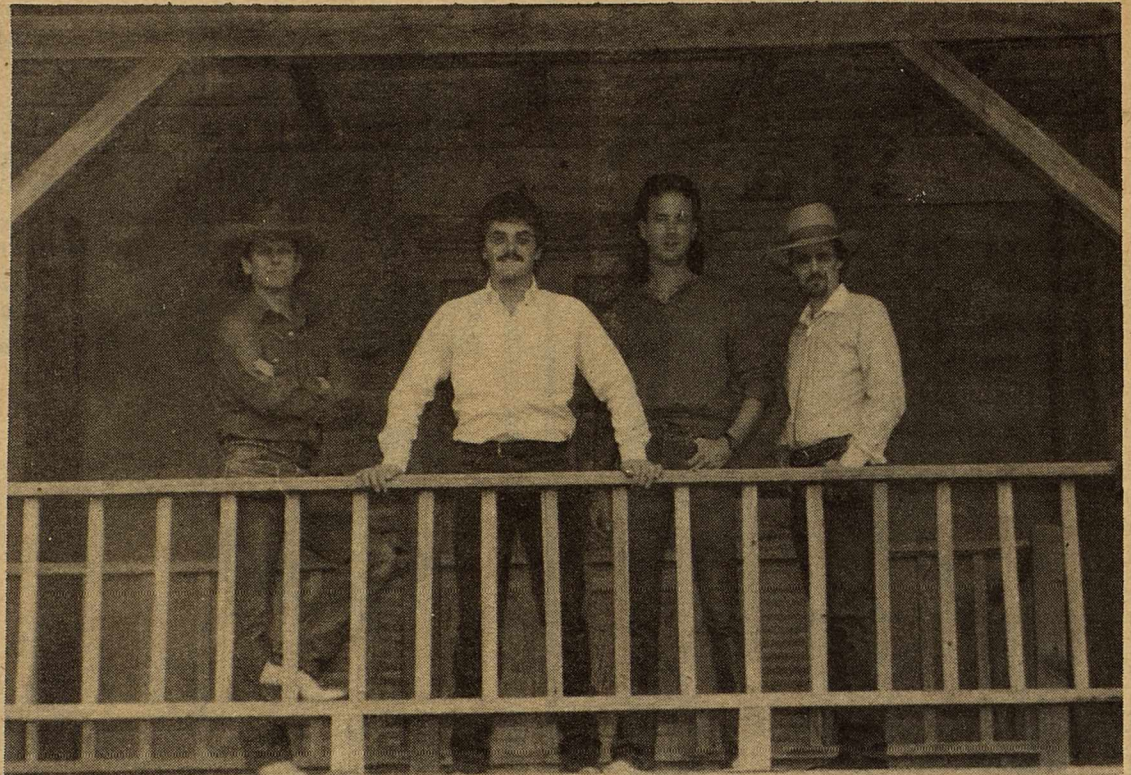

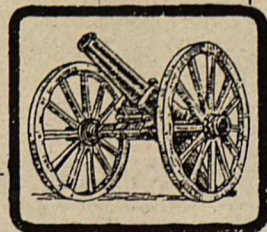
