
COMMODITIES DISTRIBUTION DATES


All numbers will be served through the side of the building in the Brackettville Center.

Cowboys have gone...the old cowboys that is. Cowboys who used to get up way before daylight and come back to the bunkhouse way after dark are no more.

In the old days a boy was practically born in the saddle and could ride before he could walk. Almost every boy in cattle country took a job on a ranch. Sometimes he couldn't hold it if he was much of a greenhorn, one mistake and he was looking for another job on another ranch.

Nowadays a cowboy expects to be treated with kid gloves or he will quit and go to some ranch that does.

Just like the wheat fields in harvest, a cowboy made all the smaller ranches round-ups if he didn't have a job on a bigger one. And all this work was done on a steady diet of beans, beef, biscuits, potatoes and coffee. When pay day rolled around, he got thirty dollars and found back then most every cowboy learned to cook, not because he liked it, but because he had to or not eat sometimes. Probably why some of them died young, from eating their own cooking.

If the ranch was big enough the cowboys ate at a chuck wagon where the food was cooked by a regular cook hired for that purpose. If the cook knew how to make sourdough biscuits he was a jewel.

To make the starter he mixed flour, water, sugar and yeast together and let it set four or five days until it fermented. Everytime after he made biscuits he kept part of the sour dough and mixed more flour, lard and water to replenish it or he would have to take four or five days to go through the whole process again. These biscuits were "larrupin" and would assure a good cook a steady job.

A cowboys life was no bed of roses, you had to love horses, cows and hardships to be a cowboy, you had to know how to break a horse, throw a thousand pound steer on the open range, or roll out of your soogans (bed roll) at first sign of light and in the winter time break the ice around your bed roll.

Take these rodeo cowboys, he would be at sea if he was turned loose on a regular working ranch.

I guess the biggest improvement in the cattle business was the better control of livestock

Up until the screwworm program was started several years ago, a cowboy might have to get off his horse thirty or forty times a day to doctor a wild animal who didn't like the cowboy, the horse or the idea of being doctored. Sometimes everything got all tangled up, and in the fracas a cowboy could get hurt or killed, or a horse get crippled. Oh well, that was all in

a days work of a cowboy.

And then there was the stampede. A cow was pretty skittish, especially in a rain storm, or even a bark of a dog, a flash of lightning, it didn't take much to set off cattle, especially the cranky ole mossyhorns.

Then it was the cowboys job to jump up and fork his horse and calm down the cattle. Sometimes they scattered so bad they couldn't be found for days. But usually if the cowboys could get the cattle in a mill, they got tired and were glad to slow down and lie down and be serenaded softly by the night guards as they rode around the herd.

I guess the old days are just

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PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 3, 1987

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 104 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide a guarantee for the Texas grain warehouse self-insurance fund. The guarantee of the fund may not exceed \$5 million, and when the fund reaches \$5 million, the guarantee will cease.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the surety of a grain warehouse fund to be established by the grain industry for the protection of farmers and depositors of grain in public warehouse facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 60 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit rural fire prevention districts in counties with populations over 400,000 to levy a tax at a rate not to exceed six cents (\$.06) per \$100 property valuation for the district, if the voters of the district approve the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to raise the maximum property tax rate that may be adopted by certain rural fire prevention districts, but only if approved by the districts' residents."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 48 proposes a constitutional amendment to extend the school ad valorem tax exemption for elderly persons to the surviving spouse of a person receiving the exemption. If a surviving spouse is at least 55 years old at the time of death of the person receiving the exemption, ad valorem public school taxes could not be increased as long as the homestead remained the residence homestead of the surviving spouse.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to limit school tax increases on the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person if the surviving spouse is at least 55 years of age."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to create programs and make loans and grants of money for development and diversification of the economy, elimination of unemployment and underemployment, stimulation of agricultural innovation, promotion of agricultural enterprises, and development of transportation and commerce. Bonds or other obligations payable from ad valorem taxes must be approved by the voters in the political subdivi-

sion seeking such funding sources.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide assistance to encourage economic development in the state."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to contract with the Texas Turnpike Authority and to contribute money to the costs of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges of the Authority. The amendment would authorize the governing body of a county with a population over 400,000, a county adjoining such county, and any city or district located in or partially in such county to make agreements with the Texas Turnpike Authority and levy ad valorem taxes to pay part or all of the principal and interest on Turnpike Authority bonds and to pay maintenance and operating expenses of the Turnpike Authority, if the voters approve the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing agreements between the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Texas Turnpike Authority and the governing bodies of counties with a population of more than 400,000, adjoining counties, and cities and districts located in those counties to aid turnpikes, toll roads, and toll bridges by guaranteeing bonds issued by the Texas Turnpike Authority."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to establish three separate development funds. A Texas product development fund could be established to aid in the development and production of new or improved products in the state. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$15 million of general obligation bonds to provide initial funding for the program. A Texas small business incubator fund could be established to foster and stimulate the development of small businesses in the state. Small businesses operating under the program would be exempt from ad valorem taxation. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$10 million in general obligation bonds initial funding for the to provide program. A Texas agricultural fund could be established to promote the production, processing and marketing of agricultural products produced primarily in Texas by small Texas agricultural businesses. The amendment would authorize the

issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$100 million outstanding at one time to carry out the agricultural fund program. The legislature could require review and approval of the issuance of bonds and the use of bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 55 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of \$400 million in general obligation bonds to be used for loans to local governments for acquisition, construction, repair, renovation, and equipment of public facilties or for grants to local governments for planning public facilities. The amendment would also permit the issuance of revenue bonds for the same purposes to be repaid from excess revenue from repayments of loans made under the amendment and from other revenues pledged to the retirement of revenue bonds. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to finance certain local public facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 56 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize the issuance of up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to be used to acquire, construct, and equip new correctional institutions and mental health and mental retardation institutions or to repair existing institutions. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the projects to be financed by the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment

authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to corrections institutions and mental health and mental retardation facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that a state legislator is eligible to serve in another state office even if the compensation of the office was increased during his legislative term or even if the appointment is made in whole or in part (including Senate confirmation) by the legislature. The legislator could not, however, receive the increased compensation approved during his legislative term.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a member of the legislature is eligible to be elected or appointed and to serve in a different state office but may not

receive an increase in compensation granted to that office during the legislative term to which he was elected."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Subsections (d) and (e) of Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all tangible personal property except structures which are used as residential dwellings and property held or used for the production of income. This exemption would be in addition to the personal property homestead exemption already established by the constitution. If the legislature authorizes the exemption of additional personal property from taxation, under this amendment, local political subdivisions may pass resolutions providing for taxation of such property unless the property is exempt from ad valorem taxation under an-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain personal property not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1, Subsections (f) and (g) of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to exempt from ad valorem taxation goods, wares, merchandise, and ores other than oil, gas and petroleum products. These items would be exempt from taxation only if they originated outside the state and were located in the state for a period of 175 days or less for purposes of assembly, storage, manufacture, processing, or fabrication. Such property could be taxed by a county, school district, or municipality if the governing body of the political subdivision took official action to provide for the taxation of the items while they were located in the political subdivision. If the governing body of a political subdivision took official action to tax the items before January 1, 1988, the tax would be effective for the 1988 tax year. If the action were taken after January 1, 1988, and before April 1, 1988, the tax would become effective January 1, 1989.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the exemption from ad valorem taxation of certain property that is located in the state for only a temporary period of time."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a married couple to agree in writing that all or part of their community property will become the property of the surviving spouse if one spouse dies.

The proposed amendmen will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting spouses to hold community property with right of survivorship."

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the creation of special districts to provide emergency services. The commissioners court in a county participating in a district could, upon approval of the voters, levy an ad valorem tax of up to ten cents (\$.10) per \$100 valuation of the property located in the district.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow for the creation and establishment, by law, of special districts to provide emergency ser-

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the state a limited right to appeal criminal cases. Under current law, only criminal defendants are allowed to appeal. This proposed amendment would allow the legislature to pass laws granting state prosecutors the right to appeal in limited circumstances.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment

giving the state a limited right to appeal in criminal cases."

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Gregg County and transfer the duties of that office to the county auditor or an elected official designated by the commissioners court. The amendment would also abolish the office of county treasurer in Fayette and Nueces counties if a majority of the voters in those counties vote in favor of the amendment. In Fayette County, the functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county auditor or the officer succeeding to the auditor's functions. In Nueces County, the powers, duties, and functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Gregg, Fayette, and Nueces coun-

PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the commissioners court in a county with a population of more than 150,000 to establish more than one Justice of the Peace court in each Justice of the Peace precinct, i.e., to provide for the election of more than one Justice of the Peace in each Justice of the Peace precinct.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing that certain justice precincts may contain more than one justice of the peace court."

PROPOSITION NO. 17 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to define by law those municipal functions that are governmental and those that are proprietary. This authorization would apply to laws passed by the 70th Legislature, 1987, and by future legislatures in regular or special session. A municipality is liable for damages arising out of acts committed under its proprietary functions, but not its governmental functions. Definition of such functions by the legislature would clarify the liability of a municipality in civil lawsuits filed against it.

The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to define for all purposes the governmental and proprietary functions of a municipality."

PROPOSITION NO. 18 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the creation, operation, and fi-nancing of jail districts. Financing of a jail district could be accomplished through the issuance of bonds and other obligations, or by levy of an ad valorem tax on property located in the district if the qualified electors of a district approve an ad valorem tax or bonds secured by a property tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the creation, operation, and financing of jail dis-

PROPOSITION NO. 19 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 88 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which will be used to establish a superconducting super collider fund. The fund would be used to provide economic incentives for the superconducting super collider research facility, and the agency administering the fund would be authorized to grant land or property to the United States government for undertakings related to the facility.

The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to fund undertakings related to a superconducting super collider research facility sponsored or authorized by the United States government,

and to make appropriate grants for such undertakings."

PROPOSITION NO. 20 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for mobile offshore oil and gas well drilling equipment. The tax relief would be limited to equipment that is being stored while not in use in a county that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico or on a body of water that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for certain offshore drilling equipment that is not in use."

PROPOSITION NO. 21 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for legislative involvement in the executive branch of government by permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives in the membership of an agency or committee that includes officers of the executive branch of government and performs executive functions. Under current law, the legislature is not allowed to exercise any powers in executive matters under Article II of the Texas Constitution, which provides for the "separation of powers" into three distinct departments.

The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment
permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives or the speaker's appointee in the membership of an executive agency or committee."

PROPOSITION NO. 22 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 53 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the term of office of a gubernatorial appointee to a vacancy in a state or district office to a partial, temporary term if the appointment is made on or after November 1 of the last year of the governor's term and the governor is not reelected. Under this amendment, the legislature may provide that the tenure of such an appointee would end sooner than the term would normally ex-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the authority of a governor to fill vacancies in state and district offices during the end of the governor's term if the governor is not reelected."

PROPOSITION NO. 23 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$400 million in water development bonds. Of the \$400 million authorized, \$200 million would be designated for conservation and development of water resources, \$150 million would be designated for water quality enhancement, and \$50 million would be designated for flood control. The amendment also

authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$400 million of Texas Water Development Bonds for water supply, water quality, and flood control purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 24 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 83 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a county to use county equipment and personnel to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity if the commissioners court finds that the work will not interfere with the performance of county work and approves performance of the work. The governmental entity must be located wholly or partly in the county, and the governing body of the governmental entity must file a written work request with the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit a county to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity."

PROPOSITION NO. 25 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the Legislature to authorize Randall County to levy a tax for the benefit of the Amarillo Hospital District. Any such tax could be levied only on property located outside the City of Amarillo and outside the South Randall County Hospital District. The tax could not be more than 75¢ per \$100 property valuation and would be effective only upon approval by the voters in the area to be taxed. If the tax is authorized by the Legislature and approved by voters, the Amarillo Hospital District is to serve residents of part of Randall County. If a tax is levied under this provision, Randall County must repay the State for the cost of publication of this amendment.

The proposed amendment also permits the legislature to authorize a hospital district to change its boundaries or jurisdiction if the district was created or authorized by a constitutional provision that in-cludes a description of the boundaries or jurisdiction of the district. Any change in the boundaries or jurisdiction of such a hospital district would become effective only upon approval of the voters in the district.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment

authorizing the legislature to permit the Amarillo Hospital District to serve certain residents of Randall County, to authorize Randall County to provide financial assistance to the district, and to authorize certain hospital districts to change their boundaries or jurisdiction with voter approv-

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 1

Senate Bill 86 submits to the voters the question of whether the 15 members of the State Board of Education should be appointed instead of elected. If the proposition passes, the Governor will appoint a member of the board for each district, with the consent of the Senate. If the proposition fails, the members will be elected from these districts.

The referendum will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The State Board of Education shall be composed of members who are appointed from districts instead of elected, with equal representation throughout the State of Texas."

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 2

The Texas Racing Act submits to the voters the question of whether pari-mutuel wagering should be legal in Texas on a county-by-county local option basis. If parimutuel wagering is adopted by the voters statewide, a county must also pass a separate proposition on parimutuel wagering at an election held in the county before any such wagering may be conducted in that county.

"The legalization of pari-mutuel wagering under the Texas Racing Act on a county-by-county local option basis."

"Hispanic leaders have played a pivotal role in creating greater social justice in our nation and state."





PART 2

What if the Pap Smear is abnormal?

If the results of your pap smear are abnormal, you will be notified and asked to come to the doctor's office or clinic for follow-up. The doctor will need to remove a small amount of the abnormal tissue for microscopic examination. This is known as a "biopsy". The biopsy may be a little painful, and there may be a little bleeding from the vagina for a day or so afterward. Depending on what the biopsy reveals, further diagnostic tests may be necessary. DYSPLASIA

Mild dysplasia is usually treated in the doctor's office. "Cryosurgery" is a freezing technique to destroy the abnormal cells. "Cauterization" is a heat method. One or the other will be employed, but neither treatment causes more than mild discomfort.

If dysplasia is very extensive, brief hospitalization may be employed. "Conization" is the term

CERVICAL CANCER

for surgical removal of the abnormal tissue from the cervix and cervical canal.

VERY EARLY CANCER

Treatment for carcinoma in situ may involve any of the above treatments. If no children are planned, a woman may have a hysterectomy to prevent recurrence of the cancer. Women who have gone through menopause will usually undergo a hysterectomy.

INVASIVE CANCER

will require hospitalization. Before undergoing treatment a second opinion is advisable. Depending on the extent of the problem, treatment may involve surgery, radiation therapy, or a combination of both. If further involvement has occurred, chemotherapy may be initiated.

Regardless of the abnormality or severity of the condition, regular follow-up examinations are vital. The doctor or clinic will advise you about when to schedule follow-up examinations. If you experience any abnormal symptoms, such as unusual bleeding, see a doctor immediately.

At Troas where Paul preached the Christians assembled for worship on the first day of the week (Acts 20:7).


Paul instructed the Christians at Corinth to make contributions to the work of the Lord on the first day of the week. (I Cor. 16:2).

GREEN TIPS BY KATHY BADER

For anyone looking for a shade tree for the yard, consider some of our Texas Natives as alternatives to the standard Ash tree or Mulberry.

One of the most exciting trees to be released through nurseries this year is the "Lost Maple" of Texas. Big Tooth Maple This (Acer Grandidentatum) was stranded in the canyons of the Texas Hill Country and were able to adapt and survive the ice age changes. These trees are now available across Texas and do very well in Alkaline soils. Every October & November, when conditions are right, they turn spectacular hues of scarlet, gold, orange, and burgundy. Most Northerners who move to South Texas have complained of not having the beautiful fall colors of Maples. Now's your chance!!!

Another Texas native that makes a nice tree with an abundance of white blooms that last for a long time during the spring and summer is the native Wild Olive. This is a fast growing, well adapted tree with unusual foliage and attractive trunk.

The Texas Red Oak is another native with brilliant fall color. It is a very nice shaped tree that grows rapidly (4' - 6' per year)

with proper care. It does very well here and should really be considered as an alternative to the slower Live Oak.

The Chinguapin Oak resembles the American Chestnut tree. It has large, dark green leaves, very tall and shapely with a lusher look than other oaks because of its larger leaves.

For a contrast in leaf shape consider the Bald Cypress. They can reach heights up to 130 feet, do well in almost any soil, are extremely long lived, and are beautiful trees.

Another relatively fast growing tree is the Cedar Elm. It is a rough textured tree with nice fall color reaching a height of 90 ft. It is a tough, healthy tree, and shold be used more often.

Smaller trees, but just as beautiful, include the Mountain Laurel, the Evergreen Sumac, Flame Sumac, Smoke Tree, Golden Ball Tree, Chinese Elm, Texas Pistash, Texas Red Bud, and Bradford Pear. These trees are all unique, with a spectacular variety of shape, size, and color. Look into these trees. They are great for yards, and can be used as the focal point in landscapes.

One last tree...the Afgan Pine. This Pine is fast growing, beautifully shaped tree, excellent for our area. It can be used as a live Christmas tree then planted for a beautiful addition to yard and home.






