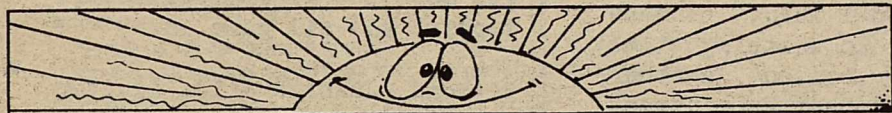

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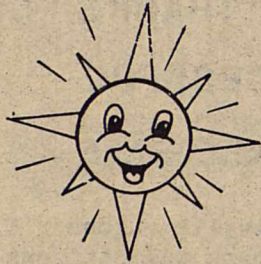

GREEN TIPS BY KATHY BADER

There are a few very essential jobs to do this week or next in the yard and garden to protect them during the coming winter.

One of the most important concerns the lawn. October is the month to give the last feeding before the yard goes completely dormant. You want a fertilizer that does not stimulate rapid growth but that encourages slow steady root growth. A&M extension service recommends a fertilizer that has a 3-1-2 ratio. This ratio provides the best combination of elements to feed the lawn and keep it healthy so that next spring it is ready for new growth. This should be watered in thoroughly.

If your lawn still suffers from die off and brown patches in the St. Augustine, it will help to give the lawn another application of a fungicide. And to remove all unwanted little pests in the yard (fleas, ticks, grubs, cinch bugs, pill bugs, etc.), give your yard another application of Dursban granules or Oftenal. These products should also be watered in very thoroughly and allowed to dry before kids or pets go back into the yard.

If you do these things now: fertilize, water, and treat any problems in the turf, you will have a much healthier, more beautiful lawn come Spring.

The second most important job right now is to spray your peach, plum, and apricot trees with Kocide 101. This spray should be applied as the trees finish losing their leaves. This will protect the trees from Peach leaf curl, a bacterial infection that deforms the leaves as they begin to grow in the Spring. Although it hasn't been proven that this also helps to control bacterial stem canker and bacterial leaf spot, we always thought that a little prevention is worth the trouble.

I also spray my apple and pear trees when they have lost all their leaves and become dormant. Since I have done this, I haven't had the fireblight problems of other years. Another application of Kocide during the winter, about the time I apply the dormant oil, helps even more. I'll remind you later!

Other than that, now is the time to enjoy harvesting those fall

vegetables, and if you haven't, you can still plant many of them to enjoy during the next few months. Broccoli, cauliflower, beets, spinach, swiss chard, carrots, many of the oriental greens, turnips, etc.

So take advantage of our beautiful fall weather and get out in the garden!

Cinnamon Coffee Cake

Great for a continental-style breakfast or for a good old-fashioned midnight snack.

- 1½ cups sifted flour
- 2½ teaspoons baking powder
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 egg white
- ¼ cup oil
- ¾ cup skim milk

Sift together flour, baking powder and sugar. Blend in egg white, oil and milk. Stir until flour is moistened.

... topping ...

- ½ cup brown sugar
- ½ cup chopped pecans
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 tablespoons oil
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon

Make the topping by mixing together brown sugar, pecans, flour, oil and cinnamon.

Spread half of the batter in an oiled 8-inch square pan. Sprinkle with half of the topping. Add the remaining batter, and sprinkle with the rest of the topping.

Bake at 375°F. for 30 minutes, or until done.

DIABETES - DIET

PART 6

Diabetics need to be particularly careful about their personal hygiene and check their bodies everyday carefully for signs of injury or infection. There are several reasons that this care is very important:

- 1) When we get illnesses or infections, our blood sugar goes higher.
- 2) Diabetics, due to metabolic problems, or circulatory damage do not heal as quickly as people without diabetes, and may be more prone to infections as a result.
- 3) If there is nerve and/or circulatory damage because of diabetes, an individual may not be aware of an injury or infection except by inspection.

Prolonged high blood sugar and reduced circulation can lead to skin problems. A daily bath using mild soap and lukewarm water is recommended. Always use a sunscreen to prevent burns. Treat injuries promptly. Wash cuts with soap and water and use hydrogen peroxide, cut 50/50 with clean water, to help prevent infections.

Diabetics are at risk for developing problems with their feet, and many must undergo amputations as a result. Again, decreased circulation and nerve damage or advancing age are usually the cause of many problems.

A diabetic needs to inspect his or her feet daily. Feet need to be washed and dried thoroughly, especially between the toes. Skin lotion applied regularly will keep the skin soft. Reduced circulation can cause the nails to grow abnormally. Clip nails straight across or gently file with an emory board. Keep regular appointments with a podiatrist (foot care Dr.) so that your feet can be monitored or treated adequately if problems develop. If you notice any sores, infections or changes in color or temperature, visit your doctor for an evaluation.

Preventative Measures:

- 1) Wear clean cotton socks daily, and be certain that there are no rough areas or holes to cause



irritation.

- 2) Never go barefoot. Always wear comfortable leather shoes that fit properly. Synthetic materials in socks or shoes will not allow for adequate ventilation, causing moisture build up, creating an ideal environment for bacterial growth.
- 3) Do not use heating pads or hot water bottles on the feet...they may cause burns.
- 4) Exercise the legs & feet to stimulate circulation.
- 5) Never wear tight fitting socks or stockings with elastic tops. These may decrease circulation to the feet.

Other important preventative health care measures:

- 1) Go for regular dental care. Inform the dentist that you have diabetes.
- 2) Do not smoke. Smoking constricts blood vessels, contributing to circulatory problems.
- 3) Do not drink alcohol. It plays havoc with blood sugar levels.

At the first sign of illness or infection, see a doctor for prompt treatment.

Homecoming week had it's usual annual run of mock warfare with the ammunition being dozens of fresh eggs being hurled between various rival groups. The "gangs" patrolled their "turf" searching for members of rival groups and set up ambushes and frontal assaults on interlopers from the opposite.

All in all they had a lot of fun and blew off some steam with only a few incidents getting out of hand. Chief of Police, Johnny Fritter, Deputy Sheriff, David Luna, and yours truly, kept a pretty good eye on the young warriors with a ground rule understanding that we were not to be targets of their bombardments. I would like to commend the participants of these mock battles on their overall restraint and good behavior. There were a couple of incidents of egging cars that caused the drivers/owners to take offense, but overall a lot of good healthy fun was had with no major harm done.

The high spirits generated locally during homecoming week certainly seemed to have it's affect on the football team. The Tigers came alive with a vengeance on Friday night at Tiger Stadium steamrolling their opponents, the Asherton Trojans, beating them 48-0. Good work team!

An incident of the theft of a bottle of whiskey from the Ft. Clark Bar late Saturday afternoon, October 24th was cleared with the arrest of an 18 year old Ft. Clark youth a short time after the theft occurred. He pled guilty to the charges on Monday, October 26th before Justice of the Peace Alvin Hall. A mutual agreement worked out between Ft. Clark General Manager Gene Britton, Judge Hall, and myself was deemed to be in the best interest of justice in this case. The agreement was that prosecution be waived for a period of 6 months, if the youth is not involved in further illegal activities the complaint will be dropped. The stolen bottle of whiskey was recovered intact and will be returned to Ft. Clark.

We go to every extreme to help our young people, especially those who indicate that they realize that their misdeeds are wrong and that

they appreciate another chance to try and make themselves productive citizens of our community.

Most of you who read this column are aware of the fact that a very important issue concerning the future of our county jail operation will appear on the ballot of the General Election on Tuesday, November 3, 1987. This issue will appear as Proposition #1 and needs approval by majority vote to allow the county the ability of obtaining funds through bonds to make necessary, and in fact mandatory, repairs and renovations to the county jail, in particular defective cell doors and locks. We are currently under a Remedial Order issued by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards ordering Kinney County to make the repairs and renovations in order to comply with the minimum standards mandated by the Jail Commission. We have received two extensions of the time limit set by the Commission and should the bond election fail to pass severe restrictions on our operation will be imposed on us by the Commission. They will either close the jail or at the very least downgrade our facility to a 72 hour holding facility. Anything less than a safe and secure jail is unacceptable to the Commission and should be to all concerned Kinney County citizens.

The Federal prisoner program has brought in over 3/4 million dollars to Kinney County over the past 5 and 1/2 years. We are currently holding 21 federal prisoners in the jail at \$28.00 per day per prisoner. This means that we are bringing in \$588.00 a day or

\$17,640.00 a month in prisoner care fees. The prisoners currently being held are sentenced Bureau of Prisons prisoners that have from 120 to 179 days to serve. They will serve those terms in the Kinney County Jail unless we are closed or downgraded. If that happens we stand to lose an estimated \$100,000.00 in the next 6 months and an estimated \$150,000.00 to \$20,000.00 for this fiscal year.

Should we be closed or be downgraded, added expense to the county will occur in that we will no longer be able to house prisoners of any kind in the jail over 72 hours. Our own prisoners would have to be transported to the nearest certified facility in the event that they had to be kept in jail over the 72 hour limit. This at a cost to Kinney County.

The closing or downgrading of the county jail would place a hardship on law enforcement overall in our county and cause the loss of jobs of some jail personnel. We would be in effect going backwards instead of progressing and I do not believe that the majority of the citizens of Kinney County want this to happen. I am preparing a mail-out on the issue to more fully explain our options. At least you will be able to make an educated decision before casting your vote. I feel confident that once the people of Kinney County fully understand the issue and our options that the large majority will vote FOR Proposition #1 on November 3rd.

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Fort Gibson on the Arkansas River was the head of navigation in the early days in Indian Territory. Its location was established here because of the water communication.

The military built the Fort in 1924. This Fort was unique because its duty was to protect the five civilized tribes against the Plains Indians.

This Fort was one of the strongest and most important link from the northern to the southern boundaries of the United States. It became the chief military center in Indian Territory. Many treaties with the Indians were concluded here.

Here the Indians brought in buffalo hides, furs, beeswax, bear oil, prairie chicken and pecans, which they traded for tobacco, knives, jewelry, and especially cotton cloth. The favorite cloth was a bright three colored pin stripe.

Fort Gibson was abandoned in June, 1857. It was re-opened during the Civil War and was active until 1890.

Many American historical figures came to Fort Gibson. Such figures came as General Zackery Taylor, Captain Nathan Boone, son of Daniel Boone, Jefferson Davis, General Henry Leavenworth, Robert E. Lee, and Washington Irving whose book was followed by anyone who wanted to come to the West.

For a time, Henry M. Stanley, the famous explorer, taught school in Ft. Gibson. He was famous for finding Dr. Livingston who was supposedly lost, but really wasn't, just not ready to be found until his work was finished.

In 1829, Sam Houston made a home for himself about three miles northwest of the Fort at his "Wigwam Neosho". Here he lived with his Cherokee wife, Tiana Rogers, until 1932, when he left for his adventures in Texas. The grave of Mrs. Houston is in the United States Cemetery at Fort Gibson. Mrs. Houston was related to the Will Rogers family.

The famous painter of Indians, George Gatlin, had his headquarters in Ft. Gibson in 1834. From here he made trips to paint the Indians. Most of these paintings are in the National Museum at Washington and

in the Gilcrease Foundation at Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Ft. Gibson, because of the terrain and rivers, was prone to mosquitoes which caused malaria, which became a problem to the soldiers. It was a busy place and a haven to travelers in the wilds of the prairie.

Most of Ft. Gibson has been restored, especially the buildings built during the Civil War. An aura of adventure still is felt at Ft. Gibson.

TIPS FOR A SAFE HALLOWEEN

Most adults recall when Halloween was the official "kids' night out" of the year, when children roamed free, garbed in hand-stitched costumes after dark. Adults were fair game for pranks, and the homemade cookies, fruit and other treats they parceled out were almost always safe. The biggest hazard most kids encountered was a bellyache on the morning after.

In recent years though, a growing number of accidents and crimes involving children have signaled parents to be more cautious in how their children enjoy Halloween.

According to the Texas Department of Health (TDH), parents can help this year's trick-or-treaters have a safe and fun Halloween by taking some simple precautions.

Dan Sowards, chief of TDH's Product Safety program said, "For practical purposes, home or school supervised parties are safer for children. Activities can be planned for safety, and should there be an accident, help is available," Sowards said.

He said however, that if children go trick-or-treating, parents should take the following steps to reduce the number of hazards:

- * First, children should not eat any treats before bringing them home for examination by an adult. In many cities, hospitals offer free X-raying of candy and other treats.
- * Costumes should be made of brightly colored, fire-resistant material. If a costume is dark, however, it should have some fluorescent or reflective tape on it. Make-up instead of masks, is recommended for clear vision. Hats should be securely attached, and shoes should fit well to prevent stumbles.
- * An adult or older child should always go with small children

and should carry a flashlight to show the way and to make the children more visible to motorists.

The children should not enter the home of anyone they do not know, and they should stop only at homes with outside lighting. Children should stay out of the street, and never run between parked cars. They should not run through yards, or even on sidewalks. Hard-to-see objects often are lying in the grass, and slick surfaces may not be visible in the dark.

Sowards added that homeowners who expect trick-or-treaters should turn on a porchlight, or other outside light, and be sure the lawn is cleared of any objects a trick-or-treater could trip over. They should keep jack-o-lanterns and candles away from doorsteps to prevent igniting a costume.

HEARS AUDITOR'S REPORT**

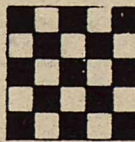

The Board approved the Audit Report. Mr. McCall noted that the Audit Report could be viewed at either the Central Office, or the County Clerk's Office.



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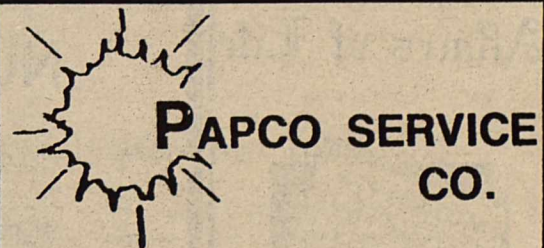


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BROADWAY COMES TO FT. CLARK SPRINGS

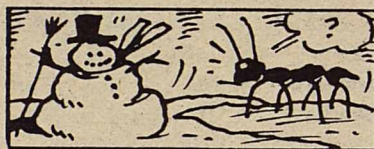

Trustees Adopt Resolution Supporting An Elected State Board of Education

Brackett Independent School District Trustees adopted a resolution on Monday, October 12, 1987, calling for a return to an elected State Board of Education (SBOE). The SBOE became an appointed board under House Bill 72, and was scheduled to return to an elected Board in 1988.

However, the 1987 Session of the Legislature chose to place a referendum on the November 3, 1987 ballot that would allow the governor to continue to appoint SBOE members. The Texas Association of School Boards, and the Texas Association of School Administrators feel that the appointed SBOE has reduced the input of local boards, and decreased local control of the schools.

The resolution adopted Monday night urges the voters to vote against Referendum Proposition No. 1 on the November 3, 1987 ballot.

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THUNDERBIRDS TO BE SPOKESBAND FOR SMOKEOUT

The Fabulous Thunderbirds, an Austin-based blues-rock quartet, will act as the honorary "spokesband" for the Great American Smokeout in Texas, American Cancer Society officials announced Sept. 22nd at a news conference in Austin.

Guitarist Jimmie Vaughan, bassist Preston Hubbard and drummer Fran Christina -- all smokers -- will try to do without cigarettes on November 19, the day of the eleventh annual Great American Smokeout. Vocalist Kim Wilson is a former smoker.

"We think it's entirely appropriate that a Texas band which rose to national fame on the strength of a song called "Tuff E'Nuff" is proving just how tough it is by accepting our challenge to abstain from smoking on November 19," said John Frankhouser of Lubbock, state volunteer chairman of the Great American Smokeout in Texas.

The Great American Smokeout is sponsored by the American Cancer Society each year on the third Thursday in November. It is a

light-hearted event to encourage smokers to try quitting for 24 hours.

According to a Gallup survey, 23.7 million American smokers quit or cut down during last year's Great American Smokeout.

"The band's example will help us reach young Texas smokers who may not have considered quitting for health reasons," Frankhouser said. "We know smokers will relate to other smokers who are trying to quit...the whole purpose of the Smokeout is to give smokers an opportunity to try quitting in an atmosphere of support and good will," he said.

The Fabulous Thunderbirds will be featured in a 30-second television public service announcement for the Smokeout to be distributed statewide. In the spot, the T-Birds encourage others to join them in the Great American Smokeout by saying "...we think you're tough enough to quit, too."

American Cancer Society units around the state are currently planning local celebrations to mark the observance of the Great American Smokeout.

PROPOSITION 14

GIVES THE STATE THE LIMITED RIGHT TO APPEAL IN CRIMINAL CASES

I. WHY IS STATE'S RIGHT TO APPEAL NEEDED?

The Texas Constitution presently prohibits the State from appealing any ruling by a judge that occurs at any stage of a criminal prosecution. Texas is the only state in the country in which the people's representative, the State, is powerless to challenge a trial judge's ruling. This is true no matter how outlandish the ruling and no matter how disastrous the outcome. This simply is not fair and should not be allowed to continue.

II. WHAT DOES PROPOSITION 14 DO?

Proposition 14 amends the Constitution to allow the State to appeal in certain situations carefully limited by law. The law that would govern if Proposition 14 passes would give the State the right to appeal pre-trial legal rulings that dismiss indictments or prevent the State from introducing certain evidence at trial before a judge or jury.

III. WILL THE STATE BE ALLOWED TO APPEAL NOT GUILTY VERDICTS?

NO. The State can never appeal not guilty verdicts and Proposition 14 does not change that.

IV. DOES PROPOSITION 14 VIOLATE DOUBLE JEOPARDY?

NO. Since the State is never allowed to appeal not guilty verdicts, the defendant is never threatened with being twice convicted of the same offense.

V. WILL PROPOSITION 14 ALLOW THE STATE TO DELAY OR DRAG OUT TRIALS?

NO. It does not allow the State to drag out or delay trials by appealing. Once a jury is selected and sworn in, the State's right to appeal automatically ends and the trial proceeds to its uninterrupted conclusion.

VI. CAN THE STATE PUNISH A DEFENDANT BY KEEPING HIM IN JAIL WHILE THE STATE APPEALS?

NO. If a defendant is on bond when the State appeals, he remains on bond. If he is in jail, the judge must set a reasonable bond. If the judge's pre-trial ruling would terminate the prosecution if upheld on appeal, the defendant is entitled to be released from jail on a personal bond while he awaits the higher court ruling.

VII. WHY SHOULD PROPOSITION 14 PASS?

Because it is only fair. It is time to add balance to the scales of justice on behalf of victims and the general public.
