 WINS HONORS



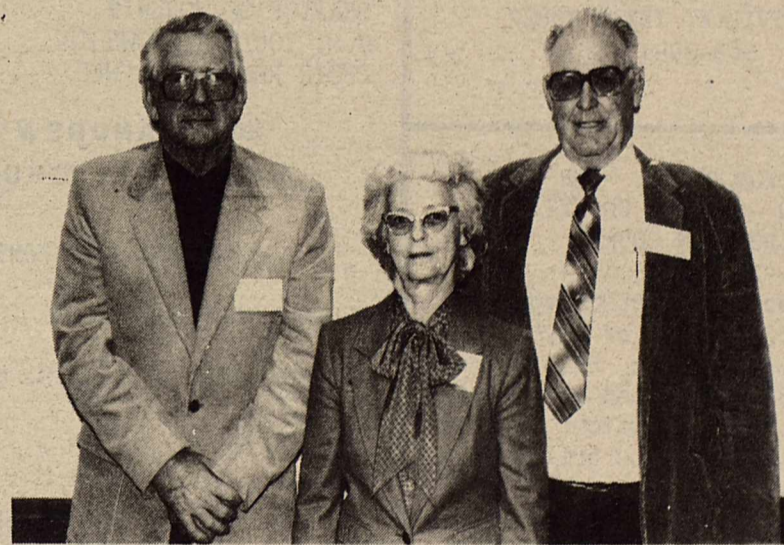

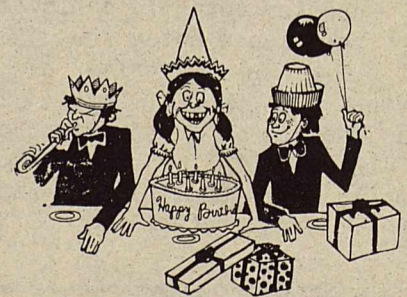

GROW YOUR OWN NUT PALM

Do you want to grow your own nut palm? Purchase a coconut well-covered with thick fibers. Turn the coconut on it's side, place in a container holding one inch of water. Place on top of your refrigerator or water heater, being sure to keep the water at the same level at all times. After several months, roots will appear and it is time to plant the coconut by submerging it halfway in a well drained soil mixture.

Another gardening tip: To help keep your potted plants moist, chop a large kitchen sponge in several pieces. Cover the top of the soil with sponge pieces and water well. Keep the sponge pieces moist and this will aid moisture retention in your houseplants.

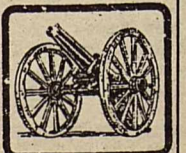

MARJORIE MOORE AWARDED 1ST. PLACE FOR POEM

Marjorie Moore of Fort Clark Springs in Brackettville, Texas was awarded first place in the College Level Poetry Division of the Seventh Annual Southwest Texas Junior College Creative Arts Fair held in Uvalde on February 23rd. There were more than 1,000 entries in the 1988 contest in divisions ranging from Pre-school through College and Community.

Awards were won for paintings, drawings, photography, essays, short stories, and poems submitted by artists and writers from virtually every community in the region, including Del Rio, Uvalde, Eagle Pass, Quemado, Knippa, Carrizo Springs, Nueces Canyon, Sabinal, Utopia, Rocksprings, La Pryor, Lytle, Leakey, Crystal City, Ozona, Concan, Barksdale, Castroville, Campwood, and Batesville. Literary entries were judged by Dr. D'Ann Madewell and Dr. Nancy Jones of the Dallas Community College District. Visual Art judge was Jody Cariolano of the San Antonio Art Institute.

For the past seven months Mrs. Moore has been attending a Creative Writing course taught by Ann Alejandro of Southwest Texas Junior College of Uvalde. The class meets each week at the Kinney County Public Library in Brackettville. "I owe a great deal to Mrs. Alejandro's constructive criticism and teaching procedures, and I am proud to have been able to represent Kinney County and Brackettville in this competition," said Mrs. Moore.

FORT CLARK TO DEL RIO IN APRIL-- A TAPESTRY

This rain-forgotten land blooms with a strangely muted beauty.

The wide monochrome of winter's yellow-green grass lingers,

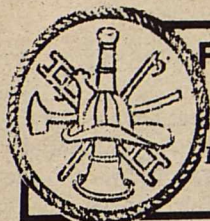

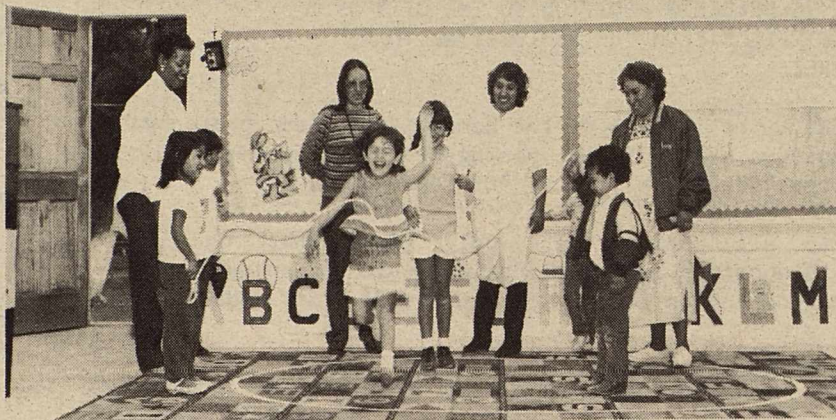
HOUSTON STOCK SHOW

Food, beverage and souvenir booths will be available throughout the show.

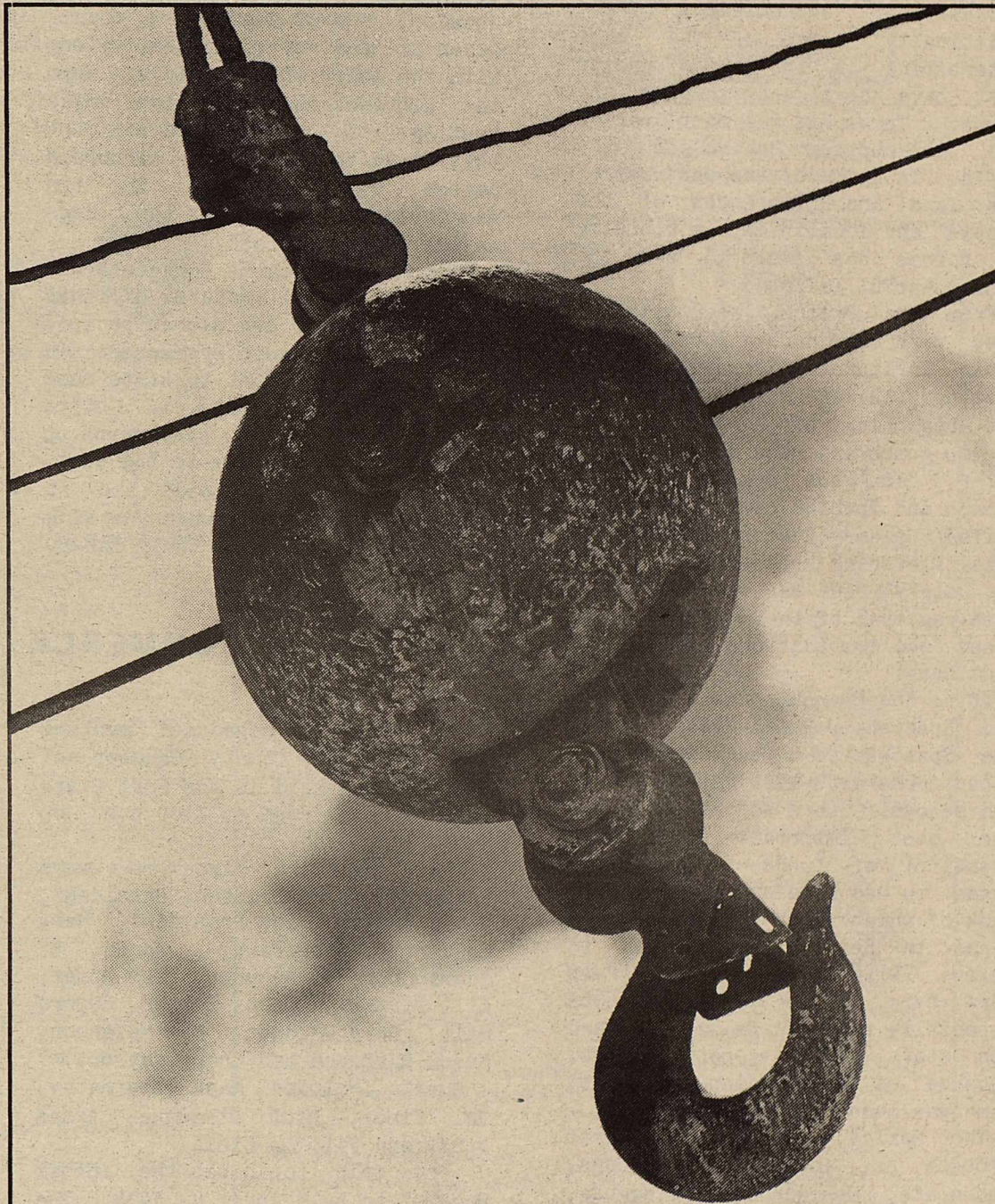

The six flags that have waved over Texas have left marks socially, economically and politically. One of the most interesting is the eating habits that have developed through the years. Texas has the most varied and interesting habits in the world. In spite of the vastness of the land and differences of the people and localities, a blending of forces has developed and the most powerful is food.

From the French, and although they were only here a short time, their influence on Texas food was lasting. Rice, shell fish, began the beginning of oyster stews, shrimp gumbo and rice dishes. Then later came the combination of French and Spanish cookery. French coffee became famous, Jambalaya, file flavoring became a favorite and dirty rice was one of their most regional of their recipes, and other food combinations too many to list here.

After the French, came the Indian and Spanish. The Indians taught the Spanish to make tamales and other foods made with corn, beans, and melons. Corn at this time was the most important and most plentiful of foods. Later they began to use more and more rice. Lack of wheat flour influenced corn bread to be the main bread in Texas. Wild game and wild fruit were here, also fish and nuts especially pecans. Salsa sauce had its start in this period also. Because of the abundance of fruit, wine was made.

The Mexican influence in Texas brought us, among other things, chocolate, mexican coffee, eggnog, fried masa, tamale pie, chalupas, tortillas, frijoles, chili con carne, basic chile sauce, which the Texas pioneers believed would, if it was hot and strong enough, protect you from colds, malaria, aid indigestion and clean the blood. It would also stimulate romance, and make you strong. They brought us sopapillas, squash dishes and sourdough starter and bread.

There were recipes for Slavic bread, German noodles, potatoe dumplings, Swedish meatballs, sauerbraten, Polish meat pies, hot potatoe salad, sweet and sour cabbage, poorman's cake, Danish

cookies, and apple pudding.

The period under the Confederacy gave us recipes to preserve food, slapjacks, cornfield peas, omelettes, corncakes, oyster stuffing, chitlins, fried rabbit, venison, mutton chops, fried chicken, green tomatoe fritters, grits and grandmas pound cake.

Influence from the Union occupation brought broccoli soup, cucumbers, black-eyed peas, chowder, son-of-a-gun stew, quail, pecan pie and hush puppies, along with the story of its origin. When the pioneers camped at night while hunting, the dogs yapped so much they gave the left over cornbread batter that remained in the fishfrying skilled to the dogs saying "Hush Puppies".

Of course, we can't forget Bar-B-Que sauce. All makers of this sauce have their own secret recipe. This sauce is known everywhere in Texas. If you want to taste some good Bar-B-Que that is ultra tender, try our new restaurant up on the hill on the way to the West. It's called "Pat's Place" and it will speak for itself when you sink your teeth into one of their Bar-B-Que dishes on the menu.

SAVINGS BONDS SALES IN TEXAS TOTAL \$44.5 MILLION

Sales of United States Savings Bonds in Texas amounted to \$23,223,419 during November 1987 for a two-month total of \$44,504,322. T. J. Morrow, District Director for the U. S. PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS



HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1988. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:

- You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can put your own opinion of your property's value on

record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

• By filing a special type of rendition called a *report of decreased value*, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1987. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1988 value to your property.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available there.

The deadline for 1988 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

For more information, get a free copy of the pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, at your appraisal district office or from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

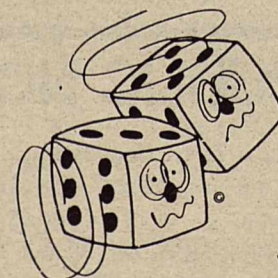
