DE LA ROSA ATTENDS STATE CONFERENCE

COLLEGE STATION--Carlotta S. DeLa Rosa, Kinney County Treasurer, joined some 200 other elected officials for the 16th annual County Treasurers' Seminar at Texas A&M University, April 18-21. The Program is designed to educate County Treasurers on a wide range of responsibilities to include investments, cash management, record keeping, reporting and disbursements of County funds. Participation in this seminar enables County Treasurers to achieve and maintain certification as required by state law.

The seminar commenced with a legislative hearing on April 18. Members of the House Committee on County Affairs heard testimony from numerous County Officials on issues affecting the office of County Treasurer. The interim charges of this House Committee include possible reorganization of the structure of County government and the possible abolition of the County Treasurer's office.

Carlotta explained, "The Treasurer is the Chief financial officer for the county whose function should remain separate from those of the auditor." In most counties where the office of County Treasurer has been abolished, the responsibilities were given to the County Auditor. "This eliminates the checks and balance concept which is vital for a sound financial operation within the county," explained Carlotta.

County Treasurers who successfully complete the four-day training receive twenty (20) hours of continuing education credits from Texas A&M University. The annual seminar is one of the educational programs sponsored by the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

LIBRARY NEWS

Dear Readers:

On April 19-22 I attended the Texas Library Association Conference (TLA) in Corpus Christi. My reasons for attending were several, but the most important one was to represent and receive a check for the library from the J. Frank Dobie Library Trust Award in the amount of \$4,750.00. The awards were announced at the Public Libraries Division Meeting, Wednesday, April 20th.

How and what did I have to do in order to receive this award?

In the October issue of the San Antonio Area Library System Newsletter appeared the following: "The J. Frank Dobie Library Trust Award Committee invites small public libraries in Texas to submit application for awards to be made in spring 1988. Applications must be received by February 15, 1988. Public libraries serving a population of 25,000 or less are eligible to apply."

After consulting with the library board it was agreed upon to apply for an award. I immediately wrote the


committee chairperson asking for application guidelines. Upon receipt of the guidelines I began to gather the following: a) history of the library and description of its service area b) library's budget for the current year and the two preceding years. c) the amounts of library income for the current year and the two preceding years. d) number of volunteer hours. e) the growth of the book collection over the past five years. f) information on promotional and fundraising activities of the library staff, board and friends group. g) engagement in library cooperation, such as cooperation of the public and school libraries. h) the kinds of books the library proposed to buy and the reasons for such purchases.

After gathering all the information I submitted a draft copy to the San Antonio Area Library System Coordinator to look over. A few modifications were made and by the time I knew it, it was time to submit the application in triplicate to the award committee. The wait seemed forever but finally in March we were notified that our library would be the recipient of the 1988 Dobie Award.

I want to tell about the kinds of books we proposed to buy and the reasons for such purchases:

The library proposed to buy books for the reference, juvenile and large print collections. The need to improve these areas arises from lack of a budget adequate to meet the requirements of the county population. Book budgets have been less than \$1.00 per capita in the past three years. The reference collection is desperately in need of improvement if it is to meet the public demand for information. The juvenile collection gets heavy use both by school children seeking supplemental reading for school and by the summer reading program. The collection needs expansion and updating. At least 50% of the library's patrons are 62 years of age and over. Therefore the demands to maintain and update the large print collection increases too. San Antonio Area Library System, Collection Development Consultant completed a collection evaluation of our collection in November 1987 and she strongly recommended

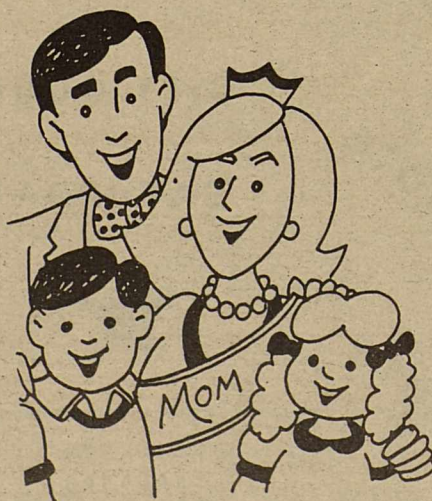

REFLECTIONS

Brackettville has about 600 students enrolled in school each year. Every morning as teachers, principals, secretaries, pupils, the school superintendent, and all other personnel start walking, running, or dragging to their places in school we can see a "bee-hive" of activity.

School is free! It doesn't cost a cent! Nothing to it! All a student has to do is drag his or her "bag of bones" down to the classroom, fall down in a chair, and work or waste about eight hours of time. What a student does is not important. After all, school is free! Or is it?

The truth is known. School is not free; it is costly. Very expensive! Parents and children alike ought to read and think about what the price of educating or sending just one child to school for twelve years is.

Someone has to pay \$4,000.00 per year for every boy or girl who is enrolled in school. If a person goes twelve years to school, the cost for the one person's education skyrockets to \$48,000.00. Read this again! The price tag around the neck of everyone who finishes high school means this one has cost the local taxpayer, the state, and the nation about \$50,000.00.

A family with a family of 10 children has benefited financially almost \$500,000.00. This is nearly one half million dollars! Free education? Yes and no! Education costs. It costs in big figures.

When the state and the nation helps underwrite the local school costs, remember that it's the local taxpayer who pays taxes that makes it possible for the local schools to get money back for its operation.

Look at another fact, too. The School Superintendent

works 12 months a year. The School Board has countless meetings dealing with all matters from teacher hiring, building needs, personnel problems and needs, and many other pains that will not go away.

Think about the school bus services, the family expense of driving children to school, meal costs, etc. Many parents had these benefits, too!

Most teachers spend from two to four hours of time getting ready for each day's work. Is it any wonder that some teachers turn gray before 40?

Since school is costly, students and parents ought to take school intensely. You

all owe it to yourselves, to many others, and to God to take school years and school days seriously. You owe an "unpayable" debt of gratitude to those responsible for a child's education.

If you've wasted time, efforts, and money of others who make school possible, repent and don't do it anymore. If you've given your best in school, keep it up and let others be enriched and improved because of their investment in you.



worked all day at their regular duties, to come out and assist with this dinner.

During the business meeting that followed the dinner it was announced the Alzafars Shrine Temples Annual Hospital Fund Drive would be held Saturday, May 9th. This is one of the Shriners major fund raising projects in which the public is given the opportunity to contribute to the support of our two Texas Hospitals, The Orthopedic Hospital in Houston and the Burn Institute in Galveston.

When you see these Shriners out Saturday wearing their funny red hats and yellow aprons, dig deep into your pockets and help support these hospitals. We provide "FREE HELP" to crippled or burned children under the age of 18 without regard to race, religion or relationship to a Shriner.

Your contribution, no matter how large or how small, will be greatly appreciated. The money we collect is equally divided between the Orthopedic Hospital and the Burn Insititute. If at a later date you should hear some parent say "My child is now able to walk and play like other children, thanks to the

treatment received from the Shriners Hospital", your heart should swell with pride knowing your contribution helped make this possible.

There is never a charge to the child or parent for any service or medical treatment received at the hospitals, and no state, local or federal funding of any kind is sought or accepted by the Shriner Hospitals.

Transportation to and from the hospitals for the child and one parent is provided, at no cost to the parent, by local clubs such as ours and our Alzafar Temple. We also provide meals and lodging when necessary.



Miles Standish IV, while visiting Kit Carson in Taos in the winter of 1842, is supposed to have said "you can keep your dear old Boston home of bass and cods, we've opted for New Mexico, home of the food of the gods." But then Miles Standish the fourth was a chili lover like some of the rest of us.

Chile grew as a wild perennial from South America north into Mexico. There is was cultivated by pre-historic Indians, and was a main nutritional source for the Indians of Peru in 4000 B.C. In Peru it was called "aji" and pronounced ah-hee, which is generally what everyone said when they tasted it. Finally it became Spanish and became chili.

It became a food nutritional for the poor man because it grew wild. And for the rich its flavor enhanced other foods and helped in the digestion of such a rich diet.

From the time of Anate, chile has been a staple food. Chile was a prized food, herbal medicine, and disinfectant for wounds.

Chili comes only second to chinese food as an ethnic food. Chile is high in vitamin A and C and contains more than any vegetable or fruit.

Not only is it a favorite in the southwest but people argue about whose locality has the best. And when people talk about chili they usually bring up their favorite recipe. One

of my favorites is Green Chili Balls, served as a dessert on special occasions.

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 C. flour
- 2/3 C. shortening
- 2 sweet onions, chopped fine
- 2 lbs. pork boiled well done
- 2 lbs. beef well boiled
- 3 cans chopped green chiles
- 1/2 C. sugar
- 1/2 C. raisins

Put cooled meat through a grinder. Saute onions, mix meat, chile, raisins and sugar. Set aside meat mixture to cool. Separate egg yolks and whites. Beat whites until very stiff. Fold in beaten yolks and spoon into a shallow dish.

With a little flour in one hand, shape the meat mixture into small egg-shaped balls. Roll in egg mixture until covered. Lift gently with a spoon and slip into fat heated to sizzling in a kettle. Keep turning until golden and drain on paper towels.

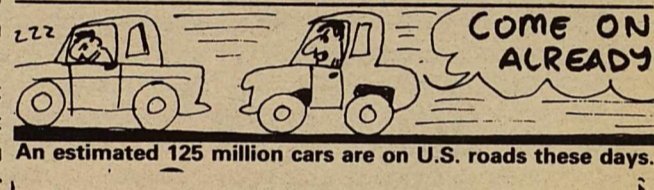
