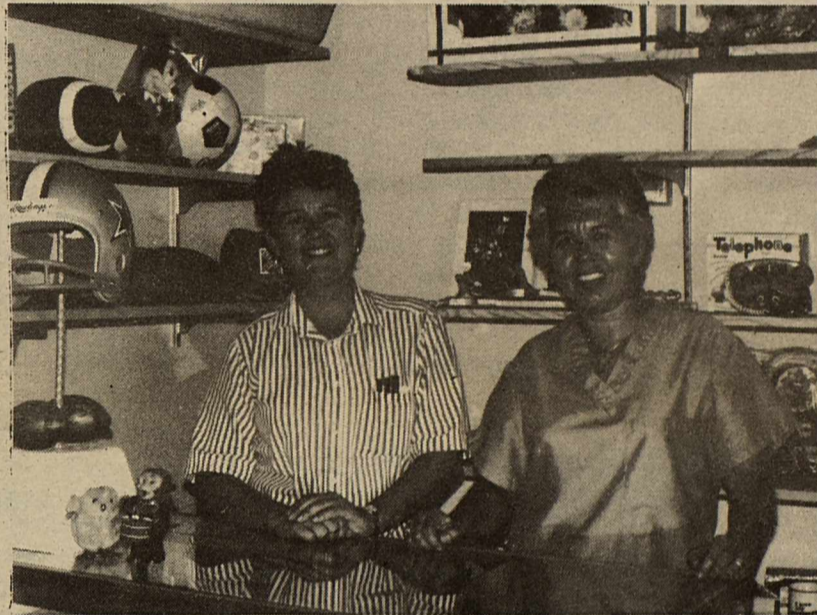

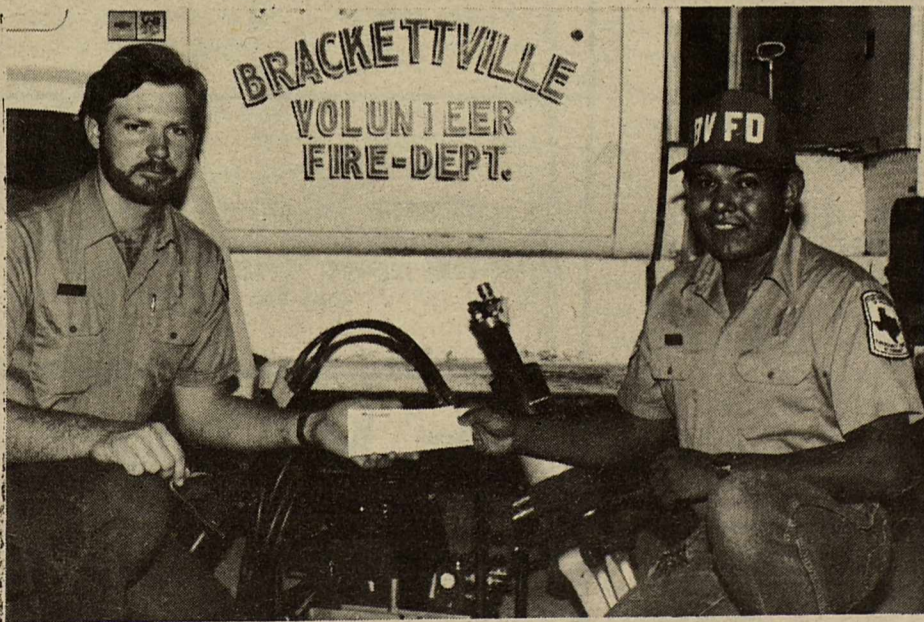

DEMOCRATIC TRUTH CARAVANS TRAVEL SOUTH TEXAS

On campaign swings similar to the historical "whistle-stop" tours taken by Harry Truman, Democratic elected officials and supporters began caravan tours on Wednesday, September 21, traveling through south Texas. The caravans will stop at Courthouses and Democratic Headquarters along the way and will complete the tours at a Pachanga in McAllen on Thursday, September 22.

Statewide Chair for the Dukakis/Bentsen campaign, Railroad Commissioner John Sharp will be accompanying the caravan beginning in his hometown of Victoria. The Brackett Tigers won their third straight game last Friday night in a lopsided victory over the Nueces Canyon Panthers 40 - 0.

Jesus Aguirre scored the first two touchdowns for the Tigers on runs of 3 and 6 yards. Frankie Gutierrez ran an interception 18 yards for another Tiger TD. Aguirre added the two pt. conversion and the Tigers went to the locker room at the half with a 20 - 0 lead.

In the third quarter, Armando Talamantez ran 6 yards for a touchdown. He later threw a 58 yard scoring pass to Abel Esparza. Manny Pena ended the Tiger scoring with an 8 yard score. Pena also added the conversion.

BOARD ASKS FOR SPECIFICATIONS FOR MORE CLASSROOMS

The Board of Trustees asked Superintendent McCall to gather cost and construction specifications of up to four additional classrooms. A comparison will be done between metal building and cinderblock, brick, and tiltwall (pre-cast concrete) construction costs.

Additional classrooms will be needed to accommodate the increased elementary enrollment and to provide special education services for pre-school children.

JONES ELEMENTARY

ENROLLMENT INCREASES

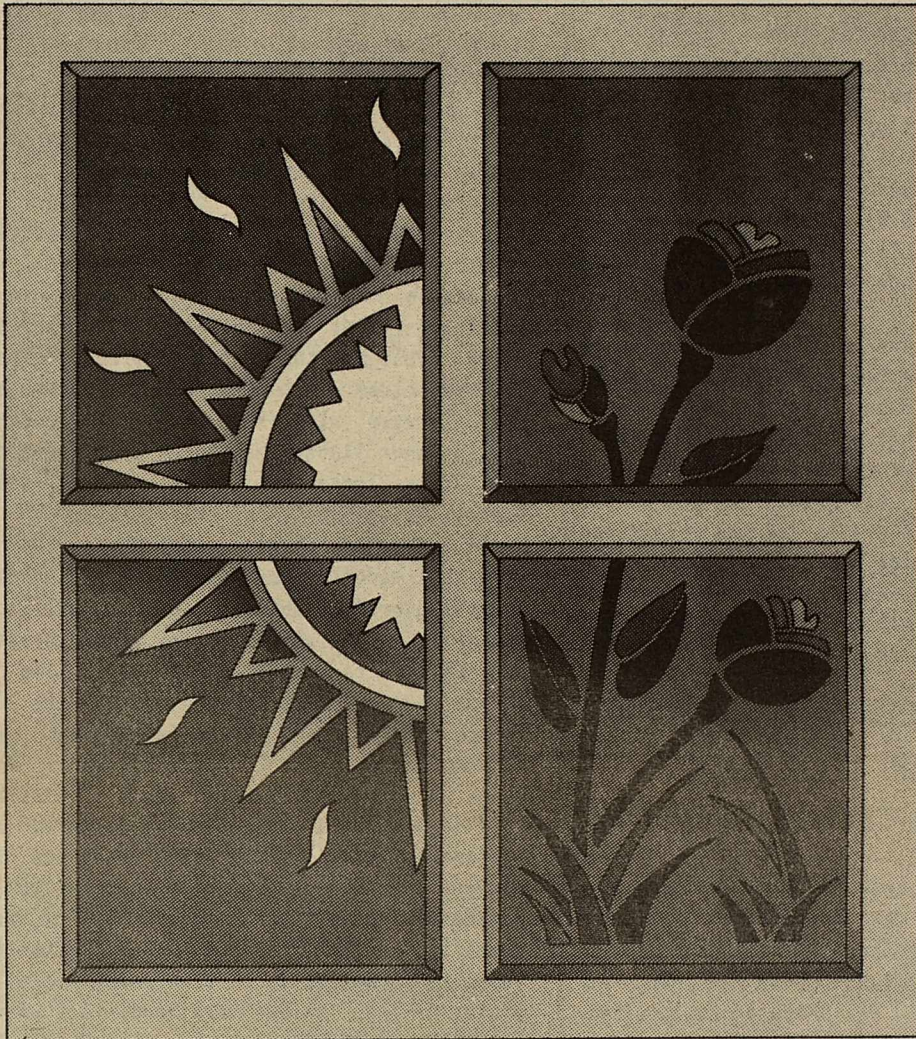
After three straight years of declining or static enrollment, Jones Elementary is showing a dramatic increase. Enrollment is up from 275 at this time last year to 307. Superintendent McCall told the Board Monday night, "We don't know where they all came from, but we are very pleased to see the growth."

The largest class is Kindergarten with 56 students, followed by sixth grades with 51 and third grade with 46. The 1:22 teacher student ratio required by the state for grades K-4 is in danger for both the third and fourth grades.

Brackett Independent School District may have to employ two additional teachers if enrollment continues to climb. Migrant students returning early are one of the reasons for the early enrollment increase. Mr. McCall told the Board that a survey of Migrants was being done to try to determine class count projections through November.

While elementary enrollment is up, secondary enrollment is down slightly. After graduating 46 students, the largest class in recent history, some decline was expected.

1/2 cup	vegetable oil	1 tsp.	baking soda
1/2 cup	honey	1 1/2 cups	carrots, grated
1/4 cup	brown sugar	1/2 cup	raisins
1/2 cup	plain low-fat yogurt	1/2 cup	walnuts, chopped
2 cups	whole wheat flour

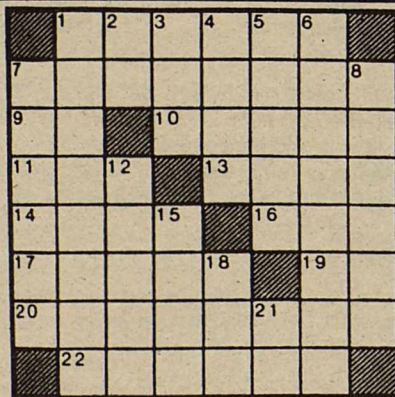

LEGACY OF LOVE CANAL

Many say the NIMBY syndrome started to become a sharp challenge to American business with events that unfolded in a small suburb of Niagara Falls, N. Y., exactly 10 years ago this summer. About this time of the year, a 27-year old housewife named Lois Marie Gibbs began to ask questions about a possible link between a chemical dump in her neighborhood that was owned by an Occidental Petroleum Company subsidiary, and a series of worrying illnesses that were affecting her young children.

On Aug. 2, 1978, after a state health department ruling that pregnant women and

OF PROPOSED**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 8, 1988

**PROPOSITION NO. 1
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to transfer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly re-

lated to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

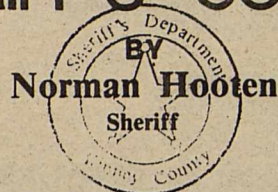

SHERIFF'S CORNER



A fire at the Bayer Ranch 12 miles south of Brackettville off Hwy. 693 Sunday night totally destroyed a two car garage and storage room along with a 1985 Oldsmobile, 3 saddles, and assorted personal property that cannot be replaced.

The fire was reported at approx. 9:45 p.m. and though the Volunteer Fire Department responded within minutes the fire had completely gutted the building and contents before they could arrive at the scene. A preliminary investigation of the scene was conducted by Chief Deputy David Luna and Chief of Police Johnny Fritter assisting him. I returned to the scene the following day with arson investigators from the Del Rio Fire Department for a more thorough investigation. This fire is the latest of a series of fires that have occurred at the ranch the past few days. There was another series of fires on the ranch last year though this one is by far the most expensive and damaging. We have determined that the fires are definitely the work of an arsonist though the case investigation is difficult because of the lack of a determined motive and the fact that there is a high rate of traffic in and out of the ranch. As of the time of this writing we have no solid leads and no suspects.

Hurricane Gilbert passed through our area over the week-end and several funnel clouds were sighted south and west of Spofford, Ft. Clark and Brackettville. One large funnel passed near Ft. Clark and traveled on west. Others were sighted near Spofford and I spotted one crossing Hwy. 693 approx. 6 miles south of Brackettville. Sheriff's Department personnel along with Highway Patrol and Border Patrol officers assisted in the "cloud chasing". Constable Bobby Guidry also assisted in the Spofford area. We were keeping a close eye on the cloud activity so as to be able to warn county residents if imminent danger arose.

Val Verde County was not so lucky as we. Del Rio Fire Chief Howard Bauchman, who assisted me in the arson investigation, was an eyewitness to the large tornado that struck Del Rio. He reported that the funnel was 600 yards wide and traveled along the ground through residential areas and cross country for approx. 6 miles damaging 138 homes and totally destroying 11. Damage has been estimated at 2 million on the low side and 4 million on the highside. Ironically, Howard's daughter's home was directly in the path of the huge funnel with houses on each side of hers being destroyed, her home was undamaged because she lives in an underground house. Howard stated that he saw many freak occurrences associated with tornadoes, 2x4's driven in to solid wood like nails, a huge tree with a dirt ball as big as a car uprooted and carried a half mile and then

gently propped up against the side of a house, another huge tree that was twisted off it's stump much the same as you would twist a match in two. Luckily, there were no deaths and no injuries cause by the relentless funnel.

Just another example of Mother Nature's disdain for the efforts of man. She just brushes aside structures and homes as if to say, "Don't forget, I'm still in charge here!"

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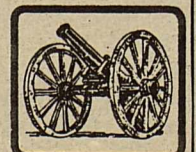

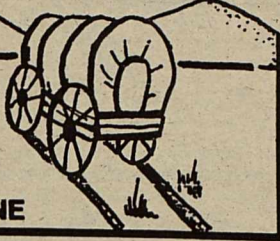

**TRACKS
ALONG THE
TRAIL
BY DORTHY PAYNE**



Two hundred years ago the Passenger pigeon, a migratory pigeon a little larger than the turtledove, was most likely the most numerous bird in the United States and southern Canada, east of the Great Plains.

John James Audubon and Alexander Wilson, early naturalists, reported seeing these pigeons flying in flocks seven or eight miles long, more than a mile wide and so thick they blocked out the sun when they passed.

These flocks were estimated to contain one to two million birds. When they settled on trees for the night, they broke the trees with their weight. Such a flock would eat nine million bushels of feed a day. They made so much noise you couldn't hear the report of a gun.

In 1857, a game committee of the Ohio legislature ruled this bird needed no protection yet less than sixty years later the Passenger Pigeon was extinct.

Authentic records prove that this bird was last seen in 1808, although a few isolated birds were seen in the wild state as late as 1907.

The last known survivor was a captive bird that died in the Cincinnati Zoological Gardens in September, 1914. When this bird's mate died in 1910, \$1000 was offered for another, but none were ever found. Many theories have been offered for the disappearance of this interesting bird.

Some people believed they migrated to another part of the world, or they were blown out to sea in a storm, or were killed by forest fires, epidemics, tornados or similar causes. One writer believed they were destroyed by disease such as caused by mites. He reported he found thousands of dead birds under their nesting trees.

Other reasons were the early settlers shot them by the thousands. After the Civil War these birds were bringing fifty to sixty cents a dozen at the Chicago markets. In 1879 pigeon hunting paid off ten to forty dollars a day.

The last nesting place of passenger pigeons on record was near Petosky, Michigan in 1878. It was from thirty to forty miles long and several miles wide. Indians and boys captured many of these nesting birds at a cent a piece. But naturalists generally believe the slaughter by man was mainly responsible for their extinction. Anyway, man, elements and the birds failure to adapt to civilization finally took their toll and the passenger pigeon is no more.

The mourning dove and the band-tailed dove have shorter tails and are distinguished from the longer tailed passenger pigeon.

Stuffed species of the extinct pigeon have been preserved in various museums, which proves reports of passenger pigeons unfounded.

EMS WEEK BEGINS SEPT. 18

Gov. William P. Clements, Jr. has proclaimed Sept. 18-24 "Emergency Medical Services Week in Texas." The event honors the specially trained persons whose timely actions often make the difference between life and death. The Texas Department of Health (TDH) and local EMS groups will sponsor activities throughout the week to educate Texans about EMS.

"Knowing how to call EMS, and what to do in the first few minutes of an emergency are sometimes crucial to a victim's survival," said Gene Weatherall, chief of the TDH Bureau of Emergency Management.

"When you call EMS," Weatherall said, "stay on the line until the dispatcher tells you to hang up the phone. In many cases, EMS is on the way while you are still talking to the EMS dispatcher.

"If possible, you should also turn on your porch light, and have someone wait by the road to direct the EMS crew," Weatherall added.

More than 40,000 EMS persons are certified in Texas. TDH and its regional offices closely monitor the training, certification, and field work of all EMS personnel.

"Dependable emergency medical care is our goal, and Texas' EMS is a leader in the nation," Weatherall said.

Texas ambulances respond to more than a million calls each year. State law requires that each vehicle be licensed by TDH, and that each be staffed by at least two persons certified in EMS.

**DEADLINE APPROACHING
FOR CROP INSURANCE**

Hondo, Tx. -- Local farmers wanting crop insurance coverage for wheat or oats must apply for the insurance protection by September 30, according to Tom Jean, District Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

In much the same way you select the size of the deductible when purchasing other types of insurance, farmers can select a policy that protects 50, 65, or 75 percent of their historic average yield, says Jean.

Premium rates are subsidized by the federal government in order to make the insurance more affordable and to increase participation among farmers thus providing greater economic stability for rural communities that might otherwise suffer financially by widespread crop losses in the area.

Policies covering all unavoidable causes of crop damage are available through local crop insurance agents and are backed by USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

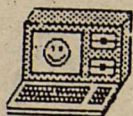

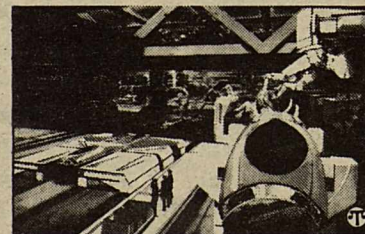
