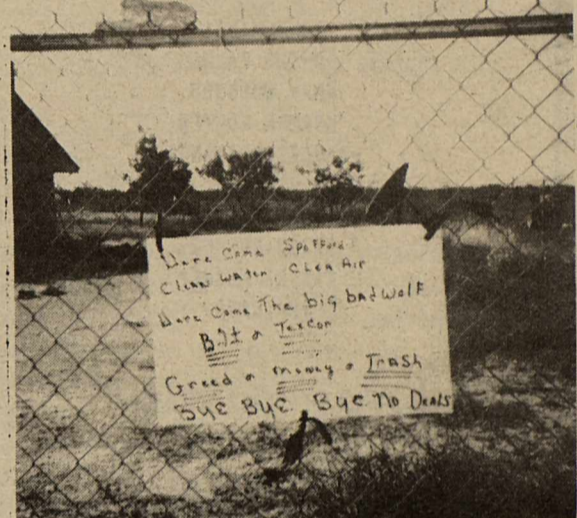

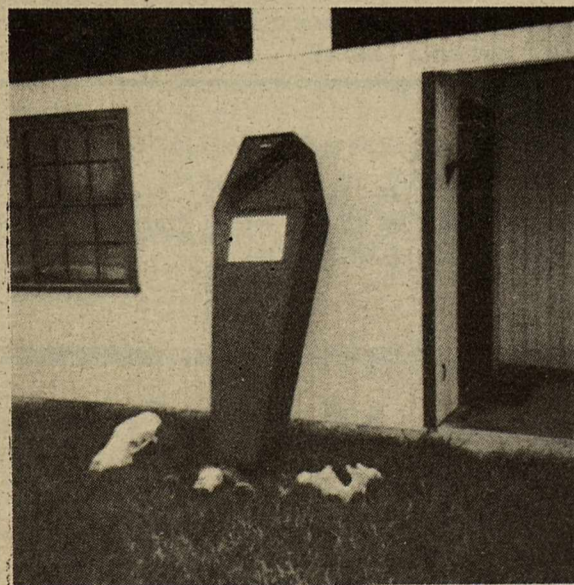

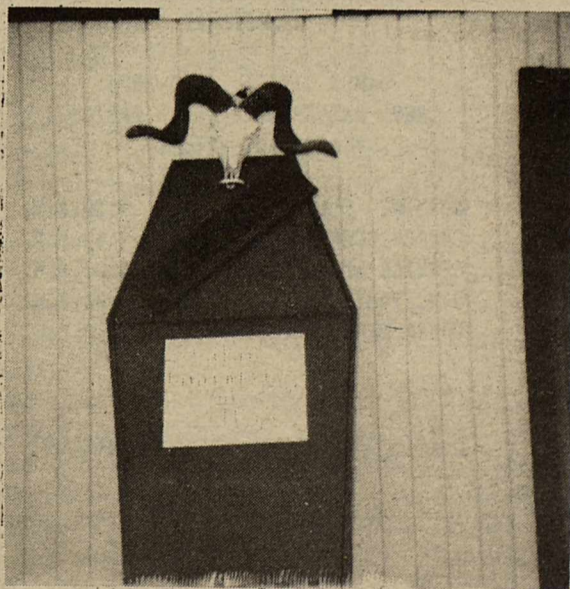

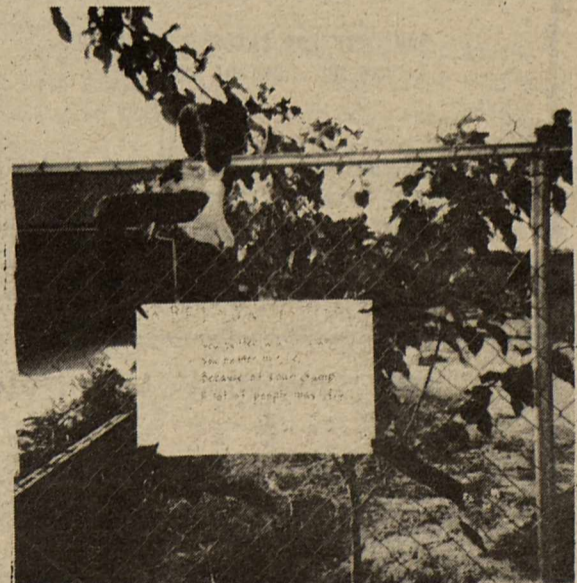

DEAR PEOPLE OF KINNEY COUNTY,

RE: proposed waste site at Spofford.

My name is R.C. Hirsch. My wife, Huguette, and I came here over two years ago to make this our retirement home. As former refugees from smog and other air-pollution in Houston, years ago, we have a strong appreciation for the untainted environment with which this area is blessed. The serenity of life along with the character of the old-timers and other new-comers we now know, gives us ample reason to love it here, and to want to share the blessings we enjoy with our children, grandchildren, and friends who can also enjoy their visits over the years.

We have been fascinated by the frontier and indian warfare history of the area, when

rugged men and women struggled to build homes, and to establish a life style free from the restraints of man, pollution of industry, and other detriments. We feel this area offers some precious values that deserve to be treasured and sheltered--open spaces, ranching from horizon to horizon, wild-life and the sport of hunting, clean air, sweet water, and more. Also, there is a budding slow development of a tourist trade economy. Fort Clark Springs with its family oriented recreation and vacation facilities, and a growing retirement community, adds much to the local economy. It provides over 80 jobs to local residents, and pays substantial property tax revenue to support the county administration and the public school system.

Alamo Village, unique for its old-time western setting, museums of past movie classics, and the world's only scaled replica of the original Alamo, generates solid economic benefit from movie making activity and tourist traffic. Kickapoo Caverns State Park is in the making and it too will stimulate further growth, wholesome and enjoyable, without contamination of what we now hold dear to our hearts.

With imagination, investment of capital, patience coupled with hard work, and unity of purpose, we can build on our assets and in time become a special attraction to those who must continue to live in the cluttered cities, but who will want to come here to refresh and revive. This kind of future can provide jobs and other incentives for our younger generations, to remain here, establish homes and families, and to maintain a quality of life, unsurpassed elsewhere in Texas. Retirement folks will gladly add their personal support and economic assistance.

Now, we suddenly see the potential for another kind of future, filled with doubt over the outcome, which could be steady erosion of values, until decline and decay have forever destroyed what is needed for clean development. Many of us, when we first heard of the proposed hazardous waste site, thought it might be good, and economically beneficial even though the idea of any kind of contaminating waste site clashes with our sense of values. With open minds initially, but with our ears open, and fair-minded thinking, we were soon disturbed to hear of closed-type meetings by some who favor the project. As more information about the parent organization that would finance and control the facility became known, our conviction grew that we don't need or want any waste site...

The idea that we would become the dumping ground of someone else's waste -- while they reap the profits from its production -- is a bad thing for us. First of all, when general knowledge spreads that a waste site is here, every other kind of waste site will most likely follow, until the area is recognized primarily for its suitability for waste disposal. We will have lost a battle by then and our losses would be tragic. We would lose all that has real value today, and the

future of this area would be set in concrete, as an undesirable place to live.

Permit me to generalize on what else could happen. Many retirement folks would relocate, probably dumping their property at a loss, many local citizens who could not leave for any reason would see their property values decline. Buyers just would not be much interested. Falling property values would seriously affect the tax base for necessary revenue for government and schools. The budding tourist economy would suffer a death blow. Our sweet water could become contaminated and dangerous to our health. Wild-life would no doubt suffer and our hunting industry would decline. There is more but the bottom line is that this area would go into an everlasting depression. The only ones who would gain, would be those who either sell or lease their property to the waste disposal industry--and they would no doubt move away so they would not be forced to witness the consequences of their actions, with greed as a common denominator.

The bible tells us of how Jesus Christ was betrayed by one of His own, a man named Judas, for 30 pieces of silver. When he realized what he had done later, his remorse was fatal. I sincerely hope that all the concerned people in this area are not betrayed for 30 pieces of silver on this issue. Yes, it could work out ok but the track record of Browning-Ferris Industries is not at all reassuring. Consider, if you will, that they were cited over 2965 for violations, and fined a total of 10.35 million dollars over a three year period, from 1983 to 1987, according to just one survey paper we have in hand.

Should we gamble on this kind of record? Most intelligent and concerned citizens think not. We can't afford to gamble on our future for something like a hazardous waste site. WE MUST FIGHT IT TO THE END.

COMMUNITY MEETING SEPT. 28

A crowded parking lot, filled with people carrying posters, not cars, greeted the town people and visitors who came to get information pro or con about Texcor and BFI.

Ralph Brown, lawyer for the City of Brackettville, conducted the meeting and asked that those who ask questions try not to be repitious, be courteous, state name and association if any.

Mr. Ed Bailey with the Texas Department of Health answers a question pertaining to permits with "At this point we do not have an application from Texcor." And continued on with the requirements for an application.

Repeatedly, the question asked of Texcor was why have you not left when you have stated that if there was any opposition, you would go elsewhere. Charles Salsman, Texcor representative, at the first time it was asked stated, "He has not seen a respectable number of people in opposition at a presentation," creating jeers amongst the CARE (Community Against Radioactive Environment) members. They repeatedly asked Texcor to leave Brackettville and Spofford alone during the question and answer period.

Mr. Ed Bailey reports in answer to a question about permits that at present The Texas Department of Health are the only ones to issue a permit, but it is possible in the future that Texas Water Commission and/or Texas Air Control would have to issue permits also, but I do not know this at this time.

What is the liability to BFI and what expertise do you bring to us to protect us? "Texcor and BFI would both be liable. There is an estimate made at the beginning of operation of what it could cost the state to hire a third party to come in and properly close up the site if the Company just vanished. And that amount of money is required to be posted with the agency including the State Treasury plus a minimum of \$250,000 in 1978 dollars for the monitoring of the facility when it closes out," replied Mr. Bailey. He goes on to state that the interest from the minimum of \$250,000. would have to cover the cost of monitoring and peerpetual maintenance."

In the middle of Mr. Salsman's answer about having the same values as BFI, jeers from the back of the Civic Center caused Mr. Salsman to leave the stage. Mr. Brown addressed the audience not to interrupt the speakers.

Mr. Bailey reports that normally the material is put in the ground the same day. Only certain circumstances, such as having to cut the containers the scale is in, would cause a delay in burial.

Questions continually start to repeat themselves in different forms. Mayor LaGioia after a motion from the floor to close the meeting states "what Mr. Brown says is true about the Mayor or City Council taking a stand on this, if you want to believe the rumors on the street then you're no better than Texcor, no better than BFI, no better than any group that's arguing with Texcor, no better than anybody else that started those rumors. From what I can see, we can all work

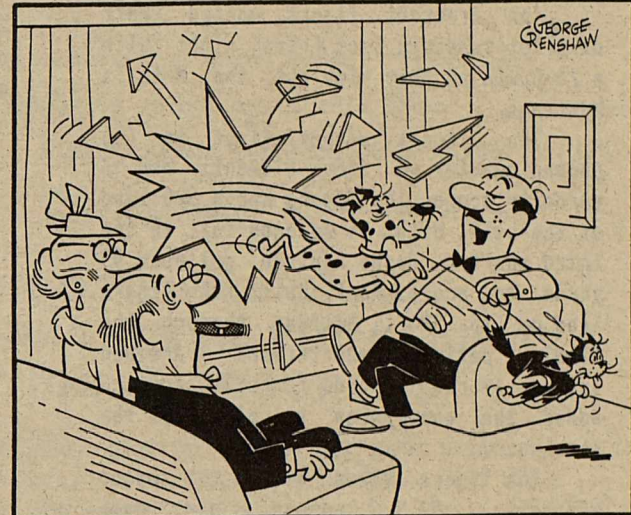
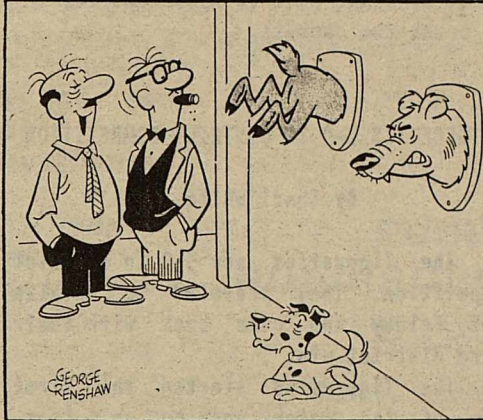

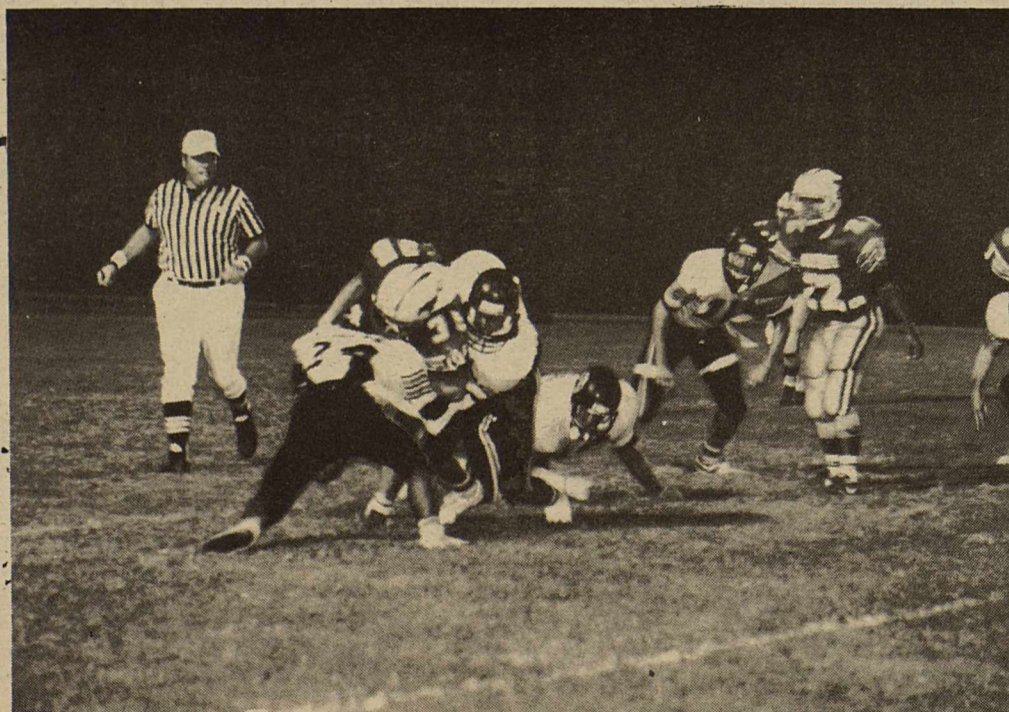
The Tigers stand 4-0 on the season averaging 39.5 points per game offensively with the varsity unscored upon.

COMMISSIONER'S COURT UNOFFICIAL MINUTES

Commissioners' Court started at 9:06 with a quorum present. The minutes of the regular meeting of August 8th were read and approved, followed by the minutes of the continued meeting on August 11th being read and approved.

Adrian Reyes, Secretary/Treasurer of the Brackett Fire Department was present to ask for permission to use the Civic Center on Oct. 15th for a fund raiser for the Jaws of Life. A donation from D. Harold Byrd, Jr. completed the funds necessary to purchase the equipment, but the firemen still need to be trained to use the equipment safely. It's approved.

American Pools from Houston has 3 options for consideration for the Commissioners on the County Pool. Two are for repair: A. Level it to near original grade, having to remove concrete and tiling to replace bad plumbing, B. Essentially the same, leveling it, but removing the diving end of the pool to make it more functional. The third option is to construct a new pool. No action was taken.

Harrell Floyd asked to use the District Courtroom for a play Nov. 11-12 to be put on by the Old Quarry Society for the Performing Arts. Mr. Floyd also requested for two security guards. It is approved.

Ramon Johnston states Statute 1432f must have a regional plan for a 911 system. He needs a resolution to include Kinney County in the planning stage. It is approved.

Mr. Moseley states that it costs 20% more this year as compared to last year to get well. There was a discussion on three insurance plans for employees. It is approved to accept one of the plans. The commissioners' will discuss later which plan to accept in order to add figures to proposed budget. Motion was later made to accept Plan II.

During the public hearing on the proposed budget, Mr. Al DaCosta from the Library Board of Directors stated that when items are needed, money must be donated and labor must be donated. Three quarters of budget goes to pay fixed items; salaries, utilities, etc. He would like a pay raise for the Librarian. Councilman Saenz invites the Library Board to City Council Meeting on Tuesday night. The Commissioners postponed the budget approval or disapproval to later in the day. It was later approved as is.

Frances Hernandez, Librarian, asks for raises for her assistant and herself. Commissioners state it must be discussed during Executive Session. They ask Frances to return in the afternoon.

Attorney Shahan comments that Nick Fohn says to pass the Septic Tank Ordinance as is. The Construction Standards for On-Site Sewage Facilities as set out by Texas Department of Health is approved.

Ms. Robbie King is to send a contract to Rushing Estes Knowles Funeral Home pertaining to burial of all qualified indigents.

Mayor LaGioia asks for permission to use the Civic Center for a Public Hearing on Texcor. It is approved.

Carlotta DeLaRosa, County Treasurer requests authorization to purchase supplies out of current funds. It is approved. It is also approved to order election supplies and to pay clerks in Tax Office and Clerks Office on election day plus all judges and clerks.

Tencha Pena asked to have budget proposal approved for Nutrition Center. It is approved.

The budget is amended for the current jail bills. And the August bills are approved.

J. Robert Brown, County & District Retirement System, was not present but the discussion reports that people who retire and withdraw retirement funds must pay back retirement funds if they are rehired. Mr. Brown is needed in the discussion to explain things further. No action.

Robert White couldn't be present.

It is approved to get liability insurance on new motor grader and drop comprehensive.

A discussion on the County water bill and equipment use results in the County will bill the City for equipment use and the City will bill the County for water bill as of Oct. 1.

It is approved to Bond Robbie King, Esther Montoya and Rosie Pena.

The Sheriff's monthly report and fines are approved.

The tax rate is set at .6463. Kinney County Road getting .0669 of it.

Commissioner Bizzell reports there is a problem with the speaker system at the jail and that the tile is coming up. Del Rio tile will fix it or they won't get paid their last check. There is a discussion on putting in a suspended ceiling with 6 inch insulation

above the gridwork and to change the lighting system. It is approved for bids to be put in paper 3 times.

The Commissioners continued with a discussion on whether to add a dormitory type facility for minimum control inmates to alleviate tax break to taxpayers. No action taken.

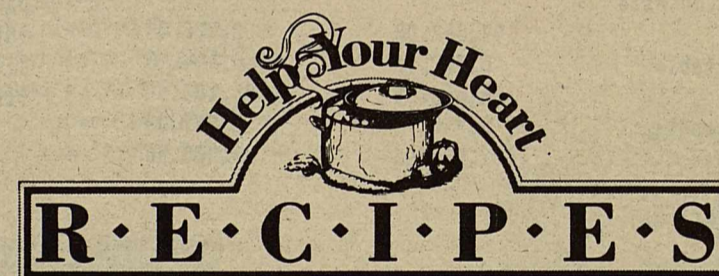
Commissioner Slubar reports that cleanup has been started at the Cemetery, that we need to appoint and reorganize the Cemetery committee and that there are some graves still unmarked. Ms. Slubar is asked to get prices for markers and get back to the Court and Ms. Roberta King is suggested to keep records for the Cemetery committee. R.G.E.C. ANNUAL MEETING HELD

With a crowd of approximately 200 people sitting on opposite sides the Annual Rio Grande Electric Coop Meeting started Saturday on time with Board of Directors President Bit Terry introducing Roger Bursey to say the invocation.

Secretary Tommy Seargeant was asked to read the Notice of Membership Meeting of RGEC that was mailed out earlier in the year. From this he read the official minutes from last years meeting.

Instead of following the program, Pres. Terry introduced Mr. Monty Hartledge, who explained the functions of the two committees that were formed (credential committee and the tellers committee) who counted the votes in secret. There were 37,000 ballots mailed out and 1,263 mailed back. Eighty-seven were uncertifiable which left 1,176 total eligible votes to be counted. The announcement of the winners of the newly elected officers brought cheers and applause from the audience. All five incumbent officers were voted out. The new board members are District III - B. W. Leeper, District V - Margaret R. Johnson, District IV - Gladys Hall, District IV - Paul O'Rourke and District XI - Art Gonzales.

There was no old business to be brought up and at first it appeared there would be no new business, when George Foster made the motion that in the future if a private agency were hired to count the votes, therefore reassuring everyone that it was done fair. Mr. Terry states it is not binding on the board, but if a show of hands is wanted the board will consider it. There was a definite showing of hands.

There was a question pertaining to the balance sheet questioning inconsistencies of the Operation & Maintenance portion and Mr. John Drew, RGEC Accountant offered an explanation in depth.

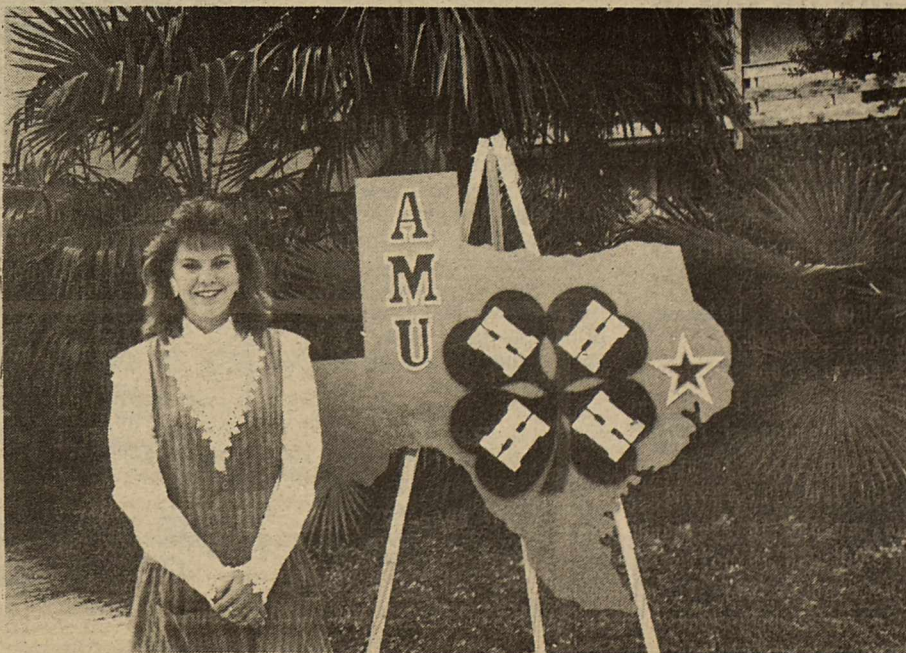
Don Parks suggested that the Board notify the members on their monthly statements of when the Board of Directors Meetings will be held with accordance to the Texas open meeting law, the books ought to be available

to the members on occassional basis and the by-law changes should be submitted to the membership for approval before changes are made. This last request received loud applause.

A Mr. Fitzsimmons, disturbed by the contents of a letter handed out by the newly organized Rio Grande Electric Members Association to members entering the building objects to the highlighted sentence "Do you think lines i and j are satisfactory, or can we jack them up higher? Line 5(a) is the magic figure we want as high as possible. I can easily add another \$30,000. to this figure if you don't find it objectionable, by increasing the amounts on lines g, i, j, and l." He asked Mr. Terry "Were you aware of this letter before today?" No Sir was the reply. Mr. Fitzsimmons continued with, "Is this standard procedure for new projects?" "I'm not familiar with the letter", replied Mr. Terry. At this time Henry Fuentes, acting manager of Rio Grande Electric explained that the letter was an estimate sent to REA for loan funds (cost estimate). "We secure funds on completed projects. Until the project is completed and figures documented there are no funds received. There are guidelines set on how much you can spend on warehouse building, office space, etc.", reports Mr. Fuentes. After much arguing about this letter which was dated March 1, 1984 Mr. Happy Shahan goes to the microphone at the rear of the Civic Center and states, "We can't argue about what happened 10 years ago, but we can argue about what goes on from here." This received applause from the non-members association people present.

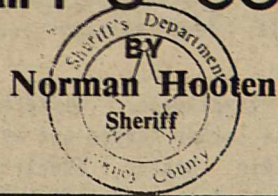

SHERIFF'S CORNER



Our investigation into the arson case that occurred on the Bayer Ranch south of Brackettville the night of Sept. 18th, is continuing and I have been joined in the investigation by arson investigators from the Del Rio Fire Department, Texas Ranger John Allen, also of Del Rio, and insurance investigators from San Antonio. The case is a difficult one in nature for many reasons, primarily because of the high number of people who had access to the burn site prior to, during and after the fire. We are confident however that we will eventually unravel the twisted threads of evidence in the case and narrow the range of suspects to a number we can concentrate on and deal with. I will keep you posted on our progress as it advances.

As election day, Tuesday, November 8, 1988, approaches I would like to remind the voters of Kinney County to consider the issue of the separation of the Sheriff's Office and the Tax Assessor-Collector's Office which will appear on the ballot. As required by state law I requested that the Commissioners' Court have this issue placed on the ballot of the November General Election so as to be decided by majority vote, either for or against.

Kinney County is one of only a handful of Texas counties that still have the dual office in effect. There is no longer any benefit derived from this practice and in fact, the county would be far better served if the offices were separated.

By separating the offices the responsibility and duties of each respective office would be in the hands of the duly elected official who heads each department. This would allow the Sheriff to concentrate and devote his time to criminal investigation, jail administration, and the many other duties and responsibilities of his office. The separation would also allow the Tax Assessor/Collector to concentrate and devote his or her time to the duties and responsibilities of the TAC office which, in these days and times, has no viable connection to the Sheriff's Office.

As I have stated before, should the voting public approve the separation of the offices, the duties of the Sheriff's Office now being handled by TAC personnel could be smoothly

absorbed by my staff at the Sheriff's Office and County Jail with a small amount of training and adjustments in work schedules the transition would be complete by January 1, 1989 when the Interim Tax Assessor/Collector would be appointed and take office. Assuming the separation would be approved, The Commissioners' Court would appoint the Interim Tax Assessor/Collector to take office on January 1st and this official would serve until one could be duly elected at the next General Election. From that point on the Tax Assessor/Collector would serve out the remainder of the term and would thereafter be elected and serve the same type terms as the Sheriff and other elected county officials.

Again, I urge all voters interested in more effective county government to vote for the separation of the Sheriff and Tax Assessor/Collector's Office. There are many benefits to be derived from such a separation. **THINK ABOUT IT! THAT'S ALL!!**

I wanted it to blend in with the dark blue hue of the rest of my car. I bought a can of the right acrylic lacquer spray from my auto dealer. Please bear in mind, if your plate has not been installed recently, it would be a good idea to use a pre-cleaning solvent to remove any wax or grease. If your plate is already showing rust spots, gently sand it off with auto sandpaper first and use a metal conditioner which will etch the remaining rust off. I used newspaper and masking tape to mask an area large enough to insure against paint overspray. Don't pick a windy day, and make sure to protect your rear window. Make sure to prime the plate first. The spray paint will not adhere well to bare metal.

I used a little rubber cement to cover both sides of a dime, which I inserted over the face of the key cylinder. I lightly sprayed several thin coats over the plate from all angles to insure 100-percent side coverage as well. Looks good. Don't forget your dime. © 1988 by King Features Synd.

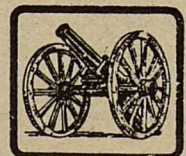

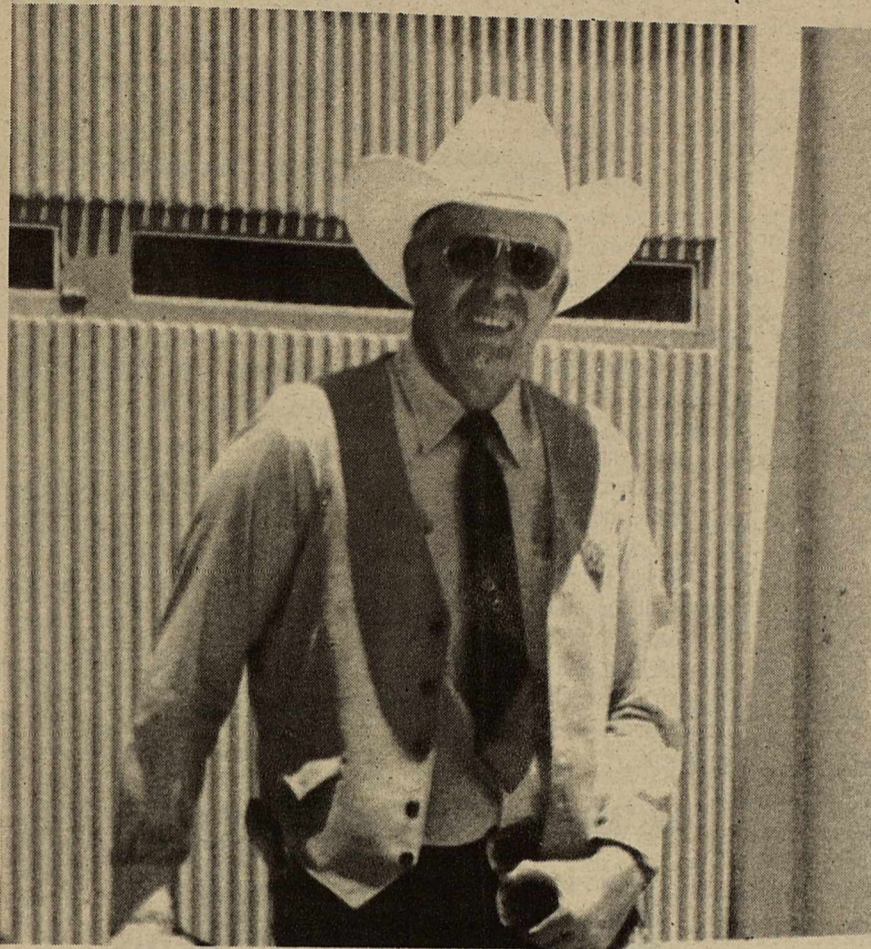

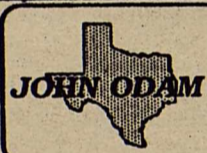

Texas Democrat Explores 1990 State Attorney General Race

That summer, they moved to Littleton, Colorado, where John was employed as a program director for the Denver Metropolitan YMCA, Littleton Branch. Peggy taught in the Littleton public school system.

In February, 1966, Odam entered the United States Army, graduating from Armor Officer Candidate School at Fort Knox, Kentucky.

He thereafter remained at Fort Knox, Kentucky, throughout his tour of duty as an instructor at the Armor School. He separated from active duty at the rank of First Lieutenant in 1968.

The Odams returned to Texas, John entering Baylor University School of Law and Peggy teaching in the Waco area public schools. While

at Baylor, Odam served as Editor-in-Chief of the *Baylor Law Review*. He graduated *cum laude* in 1971.

Following graduation from Baylor, Odam became an associate with the Houston law firm of Baker & Bolts where he remained until he opened his own private law office in Houston in 1972.

In 1973, he and his family, now including a daughter, Paige, born in 1972, moved to Austin where he became Special Assistant to then-Attorney General, John L. Hill.

Serving in the Attorney General's Office for three years, Odam also held the position of Chief of the Insurance, Banking and Securities Division and ultimately, Executive Assistant Attorney General.

In addition to having responsibility to oversee all litigation handled by the office, he participated in investigation of child care facilities licenses by the State, serving as Special Staff Counsel to a House Committee studying license laws.

Special Assignments included arguments before the United States Supreme Court, Texas Supreme Court and the state courts. He also served as part of the impeachment proceedings before the Texas State Senate of a state district judge, the first such proceeding in over 100 years of Texas history.

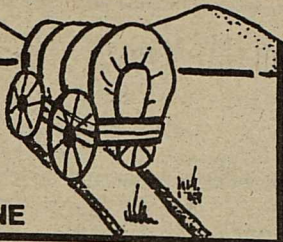

One of the oldest mysteries of the animal kingdom, is "Where do elephants go to die?"

Elephants who die a natural death have never been found and where their remains are is very baffling to Scientists.

An englishman who made his living capturing elephants for the government said he has never found the carcass of a dead elephant.

The elephants in Africa and Asia go to hidden spots to die, these graveyards are known in legend as "Valleys of Ivory". Europeans believe this because occasionally a native will come up with old tusks, they say they have found in the bush.

Few wild elephants die of old age. They are either killed by man, or the elements. Other animals, even dogs sometimes go off and hide to die. Sometimes elephants bones have been found in the water where they have gone to cool off when they become sick.

Due to the climate of Africa and Asia, carcasses decay rapidly. The natives and scavengers make quick work of a dead animal, and rodents make rapid disposal of the bones. Within a year or two the larger bones are overgrown by mosses, brush, and other vegetation. All of this contributes to the reasons elephant remains are seldom found.

Theodore Roosevelt in his book, "African Game Trails" said "Here and there bleached skulls of elephants and rhino, long dead, showed white against the charred surface of the soil".

Charles Darwin wrote of the guanacos crawling off to die, beneath the bushes.

One scientist said he found the same thing on the banks of the Rio Gallegos, where the guanacos of the St. Cruz always walked to the river to die. And at St. Jago in the Cape de Verde Islands, he found the bones of all the dead goats at a common burial ground.

These known cases might explain why some animals hide themselves when they die. Some burial grounds are much better hidden than others.

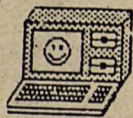
