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LIBRARY NEWS



The ENRICH-PLUS classes will be starting at the library the week of October 17. Morning classes will be at 9:00 on Tuesdays; evening classes will be at 6:00 on Thursdays. The first six-week session will be for parents of four-year-old children. Some of the parents who are taking the classes will be participating in the research aspect of the program. These parents have agreed to allow educational data to be collected on their children over the next few years so that gains in vocabulary and reading development can be monitored. Dr. Seawell has begun testing the four-year-olds whose parents are participating in the research study. She is using a standardized test to get an estimate of the children's vocabulary levels before the classes begin. About once a year the children will be tested again to see how much progress they make as the parents continue using the strategies they learn from the ENRICH-PLUS classes.

If you are the parent of a four-year-old (or a friend or relative of a four-year-old you would like to work with) and have not yet signed up for the ENRICH-PLUS classes, please call the Library (563-2884) and do so.

Dr. Seawell plans to teach the parents of five-year-old children during the second session. The second session will begin after Thanksgiving. In a few weeks she will get in touch with the parents of five-year-olds who have already signed up. Classes for the parents of children 0-3 will begin in January.

The ENRICH-PLUS classes have been made available to our community by a grant from the Meadows Foundation and are free of charge. If you are the parent, friend, or relative of a young child, or if you ever plan to be the parent, friend, or relative of a young child, you are invited to participate. L. Jacobs once wrote the following: "...literature does not just happen in a child's life. It is in his days because an adult who cares about children and books gets them together." The ENRICH - PLUS program invites you to be that caring adult in a child's life.

OPEN LETTER TO THE CITIZENS & VOTERS OF KINNEY COUNTY

I am writing this letter in my official capacity as Mayor of Spofford and as a taxpaying citizen and voter of Kinney County. A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING THE FILING OF A TEXAS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM APPLICATION TO THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE; AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ACT THE CITY'S CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER AND AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE IN ALL MATTERS PERTAINING TO THE CITY'S PARTICIPATION IN THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM.

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Brackettville desires to develop a viable urban community, including decent housing and a suitable living environment and expanding economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate income; and Whereas, certain conditions exist which represent a threat to public health and safety; and whereas, it is necessary and in the best interest of the City of Brackettville to avail itself of the 1988 Texas Community Development Planning Program;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS:

1. That the City of Brackettville undertake a program to prepare the following planning efforts: mapping, housing, land use, population, economic development, water supply and distribution, wastewater including collection and treatment, drainage & flood prevention, and capital improvement program.

2. That a Texas Community Development Program Application for Planning/Capacity Building Fund in the amount of \$18,450.00 is hereby authorized to be filed on behalf of the City with the Texas Department of Commerce and any other appropriate agencies as defined in the regulations.

3. That the City Council directs and designates the Mayor as the City's Chief Executive Office and Authorized Representative to act in all matters in connection with this application and the City's participation in the Texas Community Development

4. That the City commits itself if funded by the TEXAS COMMUNITY DEVELOP-MENT PROGRAM to appropriate \$2,050.00 as matching funds and as a demonstration of its local support to the planning project.

9-1-1 RESOLUTION

Whereas, The 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Number is a dedicated nationwide emergency number for police, fire, ambulance which provides major lifesaving advantages to citizens and public safety agencies; and

WHEREAS, Article 1432f, of the Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, as amended, authorizes the establishment of the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications and the implementation of Enhanced 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Systems in Texas, and

Whereas, Article 1432f, authorizes the implementation of 9-1-1 through the development of regional plans and allows for countries having a population of 120,000 or less and cities within those countries to participate in the plan by resolution of their governing bodies; and

Whereas, Article 1432f authorizes the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications to establish in areas participating in the plan, a 9-1-1 service fee of not more than 50 cents a month per local exchange access line and a 9-1-1 surcharge on each customer receiving intrastate long-distance service of not more than one-half percent; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS, provides its wholehearted support to the establishment of an enhanced 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Number and the implementation of the 9-1-1 fee and surcharge in Brackett-ville and chooses to participate in the 9-1-1 regional plan in accordance with Article 1432f.

BRACKETT INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

Report of Property Value for 1988 Released

A report was filed recently with the State Property Tax Board for Brackett Independent School District. It reveals that property value in the District is growing slightly, but appraised value for tax purposes continues to decline.

Total value of all property before exemptions, and production value reductions was \$329,923,656. This represents a shrinkage of almost \$100,000,000 from four years ago. Reductions in value from state mandated residence homestead exemptions (\$5,000 general and \$10,000 over 65) totaled \$6,807,315. Reductions for production value was \$243,872,768. An additional \$125,174 was lost due to disabled or deceased veteran exemptions. This left a total of \$79,118,399 of taxable property values. This figure was further reduced to \$74,776,974 because of taxes frozen for property owners who are over 65 years of age.

The District Property Valuation remains more than 10% below the State Property Tax Board estimate of property value within the District. This variance directly affects the amount of money the school district receives from the state.

The Tax Appraisal District and the School District have worked to get the State Property Tax Board to lower its estimate of District values from \$110,000,000 in 1985 to about \$96,000,000 last year. A further reduction in State Property Tax estimates will generate additional state education dollars for the School District.

MORE MONEY FOR EDUCATION

Education Gets Harder To Pay For By The Day

Programs mandated, but not funded by the State Legislature and the Texas Education Agency are dramatically increasing the cost of education for school districts. This financial burden is passed on to the local property tax payer as districts scramble to meet teacher salaries, and added programs.

Bob McCall, Superintendent of Brackett Independent School District, paints a gloomy picture for the future of small school districts and their tax paying residents. McCall compared Brackett ISD programs in 1983 (Pre-education Reform) with those of 1988 in a recent review of the District's financial condition. "In 1983, Brackett ISD had no pre-Kindergarten program, no computer literacy requirement, no 1:22 teacher-student ratio, no elementary library, no organized physical education for elementary students. At the secondary level, there was no computer literacy requirement for junior high, and basically no electives for junior high beyond band and/or P.E. In grades 9-12 there were very few electives available. taught five periods a day and had an hour off for lunch."

"Today, at the elementary level we have met the 1:22 teacher-student ratio, we offer a half day pre-kindergarten program, we have installed an elementary library, and are serving special education children at the age of three years and up. At the Junior high level we are offering computer literacy, algebra 1, career explorations, music history, and exploratory home economics in addition to the basic program. In grades 9-12, students are offered remedial courses in correlated language arts, math, and science, as well as, language opportunities in Latin, German, and French. Advanced electives such as physics, calculus, advanced social science problems, and Chemistry II are also available, as well as, speech, journalism, computer science I & II, and music history. Secondary teachers are now teaching six periods a day, and have only thirty-five minutes for lunch."

"In addition, tutorials are offered at all

levels for students that are having problems and the District will have a gifted and talented program for K-12 by 1990."

Mr. McCall notes that all of these programs are good and enhance educational opportunities for students. However, if districts have to offer them, the state

Statistically, the impact is even more dramatic. In 1982-83, Brackett ISD taxpayers were responsible for 20% of the educational cost of the district. By 1986, the district was being charged 31% of the total educational cost. During this same span, the district's budget grew from 1.8 million to 2.3 million dollars. Most of the increase can be attributed to higher teacher salaries due to the fact that salaries make up about 82% of the district budget.

According to Superintendent McCall, school boards across the state are facing the same choices. Districts that are not growing or are losing enrollment must fund the basic program by passing costs along to the local property owners through higher school taxes. "It is not a fun time for local board members or school administrators, " McCall stated.




F CUSING ON THE PAST

SAN ANTONIO - SAN DIEGO STAGE LINE. Established July 1, 1857, by James E. Burch who contracted with the Postal Department to deliver the mails bi-monthly between San Antonio and San Diego for the sum of \$149,800. Major J. C. Wood was general superintendant in charge of setting up and operating the line. Burch who went to California to set up the western end of the line was drowned when the ship by which he was returning to Texas via "The Horn" was sunk. The line began operations with 65 men, 50 Concord Stages and 400 mules. Stage stands were spaced about 20 miles apart and it required 30 days to make the trip. The passenger fare was \$200 to San Diego and \$100 to El Paso. Big Foot Wallace, famous frontiersman, Ranger, Indian fighter and scout, drove the first stage from San Antonic to El Paso.










During the course of his investigation he has tape recorded several interviews with witnesses who have first hand information concerning the case, in fact, many of the witnesses have practically lined up to talk to him once they realized that the dominoes were falling. Once he uncovered evidence of criminal activity on the part of the supect he acted as required by law in reporting that evidence to the law enforcement agency having jurisdiction in the matter. solved over 100 cases of killing horses for profit. He is well qualified for his work as he is an ex-police officer who was also a college professor specializing in criminal justice courses. He is considered to be an expert in his field and is highly respected by law enforcement agencies throughout the United States.

It is a black day for Kinney County to learn that we could have a person in our community who could cause the death of a beautiful, trusting horse in such a cruel manner, all for the sake of greed and the all mighty dollar. Think about it!! THAT'S ALL !!



Like the hub on a wheel Fort Belknap was a center of network of roads that led to Dallas, Preston, Fort Graham, Fort Worth, Camp Cooper, Camp Colorado, Fort Phantom Hill, Fort Chadbourne, San Antonio, and the Indian Agencies in Young and Throckmorton Counties.

From the time Fort Belknap was established in 1851, it was to become a center of activity. Many famous military and others were to occupy the Fort.

By 1859 Fort Belknap was abandoned for lack of water. During the Civil War State Troops took part in the Battle of Dove Creek. Later citizens lived in some of the vacant quarters, now and then buffalo took refuge against the elements in the cold winters. At one time three hundred people were to make the Village near the Fort their home. The village had a colorful history, here Charles Goodnight courted his bride to be, Mary Dyer. Millie Durgan lived here before being captured by the Indians, which is a different story.

But by far the most interesting character associated with the Fort was Robert Simpson Neighbors, who was the Superintendent of Indian Affairs for Texas when he was assassinated here in 1859.

Neighbors was captured by General Adrian Wall along with other officers of the court sitting in San Antonio and taken to Mexico in 1842. He was released on March 24, 1844 retuned to Texas and early in the following year was appointed Indian Agent of Texas for the Lipan-Apache and Tonkawa Tribes.

Neighbors introduced successfully the field system of Indian Control, dealing with them in their camps rather than continually demanding their presence at the Agency. Later he worked with them in their camps, when dealing with the Comanches and had the greatest influence over the Indians of Texas than any other white man of his generations.

After annexation of Texas, he received a Federal appointment as special Indian Agent in 1847 and took part in many councils with the Indians, especially the one which resulted in the Mouseback-Comanche Treaty. This treaty provided that the Mouseback German settlers go unharmed in Indian Territory and the Indians likewise in the German Settlements.

During the administration of 1849 his position as Agent was terminated, but he remained in public service as Texas Commissioner and sponsered a law that opened the way for establishing of Indian reservations. In 1852 was reappointed Indian Agent for the Texas Indians under the Pierce administration.

Due to the hostility of the settlers and the military towards the Indians under his control, Neighbors finally brought about the removal of the Texas Indians to a reservation in Indian Territory.

Agent Neighbors supervised the removal of his Indians and returned to St. Belknap, where he was assassinated. His assassin was an unimportant troublemaker who was supposed to have resented Neighbors friendship with the Indians.

REFLECTIONS

Our town needs to start a cremation business. A crematory is a furnace where bodies are burned to ashes. We could use this kind of ghastly enterprise to great advantage.

We need to cremate the hatred and bitterness we have toward one another. On a number of issues people may never be together. A family may not agree about the color of an automobile, or the cost of a wedding. We may disagree in politics, or the grades someone gets in school. And yet, we all need to join together and let our dislike for others go up in smoke.

We need to cremate selfishness. Pigs will fight over an ear of corn. Their animal nature expresses itself in the "me first" attitude. They never listen to the words of Jesus about the first being last.

Harold Byrd Jr. gave the Volunteer Fire Dept. of Brackettville, Texas, a gift of \$8,000.00. It's in riving and sharing that one really lives. A crematory trip could convert a person from the ashes of selfishness to a resurrected, "phoenix" life.

We need to cremate unbelief. Atheisn and agnosticism finally will end up in the Big Crematory along with all their disciples. Wouldn't it be better to burn up these shallow philosophies and take on that which lasts?

God remains the central truth of time and eternity. He is the "Always One". The Great "I Am" has a way of surviving. The Lord God expresses Himself in ten thousand ways. Why doubt God when the evidence of the Eternal is all around?

We need to cremate the life that's without purpose and meaning. We may ask a friend, "What 'cha doing?"

The answer may come back to us, "Oh, nothing much."

What? When this day comes to a close it will never return. No one can bring back June 5, 1517. Gone forever is December 7, 1941. The sun can never rise again on the day that slips away from us. We don't need to let indifference and a passionless existence stay alive.

I may not be cremated when I die -unless there's a nuclear holocaust. And yet,
my life would improve if I would carry out a
few "cremation ceremonies" every day. We all
need to make frequent trips to this kind of
crematiory, don't we?


