### TIFFANY BRYAN WINS COMPETITION

Brackettville, Tx. - Tiffany Bryan, a 7th grade student at Brackettville Independent School District, has taken the first step to becoming an internationally recognized artist by winning a local competition sponsored by the Brackettville Lions Club.

Bryan's poster is among thousands of entries submitted worldwide in the Lions Club International Peace Poster Contest. Bryan's poster best portrayed the contest's theme, "Peace Will Help Us Grow".

Brackettville Lions Club President Louis Sofaly, said he was pleased with all the work the students put into the project. From looking at all the entries, it was obvious all the kids really gave the matter a lot of thought.

Tiffany Bryan's poster now advances to round-two district competition in the San

Antonio area where her entry will compete against entries from at least 30 other schools in the area. "Bryan's poster will face stiff competition through the district round and in three more rounds of international competition if she is to be declared the international grand prize winner," Sofaly said.

Lions Clubs International is sponsoring the contest to underscore the importance of world peace to young people everywhere. Ultimately, one grand prize winner will be selected from 24 international finalists. The grand prize includes a cash award of \$500.00, plus an all-expense-paid trip for the winner and two family members to New York City for the awards ceremony at the United Nations in March 1989. As Merit Award winners the remaining 23 finalists each will receive certificates and a cash award of \$100.0. Tiffany Bryan will receive a \$50.00 Savings Bond as the local winner.

"We know Tiffany has a long way to go, but we're all cheering for her," Sofaly said.

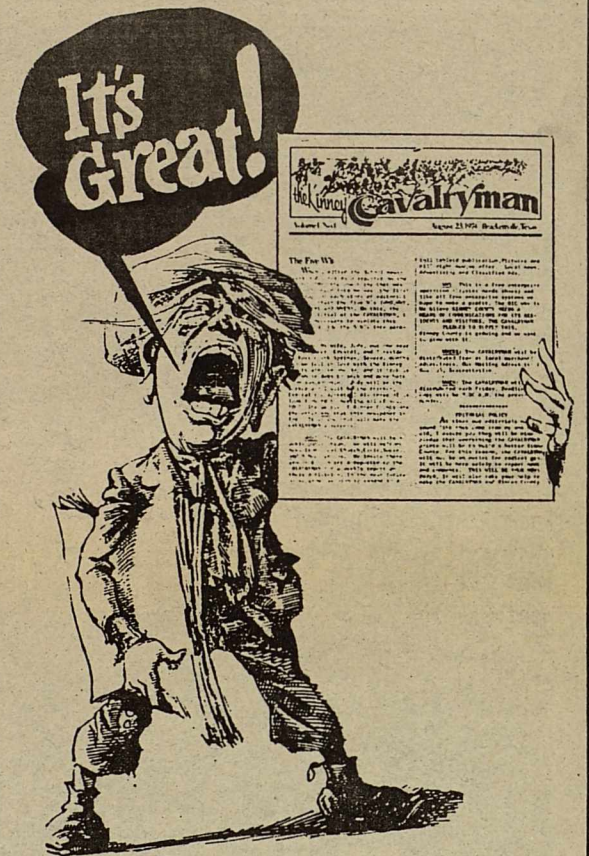

## TRACKS ALONG THE TRAIL

Apologies to Ms. Payne for inadvertently leaving off the last paragraph of last weeks Tracks Along the Trail.

### CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK

The mustang is not the kind you see in the movies, posing on the edge of a cliff. After all, a wild horse is a wild horse and can't be expected to look like a prize race horse, but we can still admire him.

The mustang is in danger again in the Southwest. Let's hope they will soon be declared a member of the endangered species. Maybe they don't have much commercial value, but after all, a mustang deserves a better deal than they are getting in the Southwest.

In 1880, the railroad came to parts of west Texas. It was the custom of the Texas and Pacific Railroad to build a section house every ten miles to be used as a base for repairs. One section house was built where Pyote, Texas now stands.

The old timers named the little settlement "Pyote Tank" after the button cactus of the same name and Pyote like the cactus became a town of long endurance.

It soon became a freight center and trading point and speculation was done in farming, a rancher named Rogers sold townsite lots from his ranch to the north.

As customary a three day barbeque was held while the sale was held. Roger's father, not letting the grass grow under his feet, circulated a petition for a school at the same time. He got the job done too, because it wasn't long until Pyote had a school, true it had only one room, but it was a school.

Old man Rogers told the townspeople to come out on his ranch and pick a spot for a cemetery. The local dads walked around in his field, kicked the dirt here and there, selected a spot about two miles east of town. They said the reason that spot was selected was because of the great depth of the soil. Not long after the cemetery had been located, the town barber was accidently killed, when his grave was dug the diggers hit rock two feet below the surface and had to blast with dynamite.

Lots sold for forty dollars and the future looked good for irrigation farming and was good for awhile until the stock market crashed and the river dam broke. Pyote looked like it was a goner.

In 1926 oil was discovered in nearby Winkler county and the boom was on. Pyote felt it was sitting on top of the world, because they had the asset needed, they had a railroad.

Things began to look up, there is nothing quite like an oil boom, unless maybe a three ring circus. The people poured in, and the claim was that 12,000 to 15,000 people were living in Pyote in 1928, some even in packing boxes. Although the U. S. census claimed there weren't that many, there probably was because the census was taken every ten years and in that amount of time or less a boom town can come and go.

Along with the oil boom there were more problems, one being a small school house and a big batch of kids, they held school in all the empty spaces, including the theater and local barns. Barney Hubbs brought a press and started a paper. Some citizens were still driving horses but main street was filled with Maxwells, Stars, Oaklands and Rio automobiles, to name a few.

In 1928, the Texas Pacific handled more freight tonnage in Pyote than in Ft. Worth or Dallas. For two years Pyote handled more freight than the New Orleans office of the same railroad. Then the railroad chose Manahans to build a new spur, workers began to move out, business men closed shop, in fact everyone wanted off the bandwagon.

A few faithful stayed on, just mark it up to experience they said, and they weren't as touched by the great depression as in the cities. They barely had time to take a deep breath when the World War was on.

U.S.A. needed to have a training base for the Air Force in record time and Pyote had the two most essentials needed, namely clear flying weather almost the year round and solid caliche just below the surface of the ground, one of the best materials for roads, surface for runways, etc.





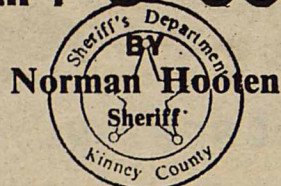

## SHERIFF'S CORNER



The information (?) which appeared on Page 9 of last week's Cavalryman was not only confusing, it was also false and misleading. The statements contained in Mr. Veltmann's ad only serves to demonstrate his lack of knowledge, concern, and understanding of the TRUE facts, figures, policies, and procedures concerning the operation of a law enforcement agency, and in particular a county jail which is mandated by state and federal law and a county budget approved by Commissioners' Court.

The following information concerning the operation of the county jail and related law enforcement activities contains the TRUE facts and figures and is well documented. This information can be verified through various sources by those wishing to do so, they are; (1) The Texas Commission on Jail Standards, (2) The Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education, (3) The official public records of the Kinney County Auditors office, (4) Mr. Bill Schuler, CPA, of the firm of Coleman, Dalrymple, Schiller, and Elley of Del Rio, Tx.

First of all, during FY 87-88 we fed 23,776 meals at the county jail at a cost of \$38,379.30 which averages out to \$1.61 per meal. This amounts to \$144.90 per month per prisoner. I have no idea where Veltmann came up with the \$598.60 per family of four figure and it certainly does NOT apply to a county jail operation anyway. And, federal prisoners bring in a total of \$840.00 each per month, county, state, and local prisoners - zero. The figures used which were labeled PARTIAL expenses for Kinney County Jail for past year were false as were the figures used for JAIL INCOME for past year. TRUE expenditures for our TOTAL law enforcement and county jail operation which covered ALL phases of county law enforcement including salaries and fringe benefits (excluding the Sheriff's) was, according to the official county auditor's report, \$204,668.41. TRUE income from the federal prisoner program only was \$152,096.00 which left a balance of \$52,572.41 cost to the county taxpayers for our TOTAL county wide law enforcement operation. Without the federal prisoner program to help offset operational costs, it would have cost the county taxpayers at least double that amount (\$105,144.82).

State law dictates that the Commissioners Court of every county in Texas must provide the county Sheriff with a jail that meets the minimum standards mandated by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. The sheriff of a county must also be provided budgeted funds with which to operate his total law enforcement operation, including a safe and secure jail. This means that your tax dollars MUST be used to finance county wide

law enforcement unless other means of income can be generated. The only other means of generating income is through a federal prisoner program.

In his ad, Mr. Veltmann also made reference to gloom and doom for the federal prisoner program because of the new Border Patrol station planned for Kinney County. He again demonstrated his lack of knowledge of the facts because, the new Border Patrol station IS NOT to be a federal detention center and the federal prisoners we now hold at th county jail are tried, convicted, and sentenced prisoners being detained by the U.S. Bureau of Prisons who contract with us for bed space. If anything the expansion of Border Patrol activity in our county will INCREASE, not DECREASE the numbers of federal prisoners needing bed space. Veltmann's remarks about the county jail being turned into a federal prison which raises the costs for local prisoners is so far out in left field and out of touch with reality that it is beyond my comprehension. But, due to his demonstrated lack of knowledge and understanding about law enforcement in general and jail administration in particular I am not particularly surprised at his comments.

I have re-capped and summarized expense vs. income figures for our total law enforcement and county jail operations for the past five (5) fiscal years as shown below. These figures PLAINLY show that the federal prisoner program at the county jail has greatly benefited the Kinney County taxpayer by eliminating the need to raise taxes to support our law enforcement, county jail, and other county governmental operations. Don't take my word for it, it's all documented, public record, in black and white. I don't operate with vague, misleading statements and insinuations, never have, never will!

FACT: Total cost to taxpayers of Kinney County for past five(5) years of 24 hour a day, 7 day a week, 365 days per year law enforcement service and protection and county jail operation, including bringing the jail into compliance with minimum standards in 1984 has been \$159,359.77 which averages out to \$31,871.95 per year.

FACT: Without the federal prisoner program the total cost to taxpayers for the same service would have been AT LEAST \$100,000.00 per year with NO income. There would have

been no money available for repairs necessary to get the jail certified in 1984 and no operational money without either raising taxes or borrowing.

FACT: Due to the poor design of the county jail and the faulty equipment installed in the cell door and lock system at the county jail in 1978 the bond issue to raise the funds for a new cell door and lock system would have occurred anyway. Where would we get the money to pay for all these costs if we did not have the federal prisoner program? Raise taxes! THINK ABOUT IT!  
THAT'S ALL !!

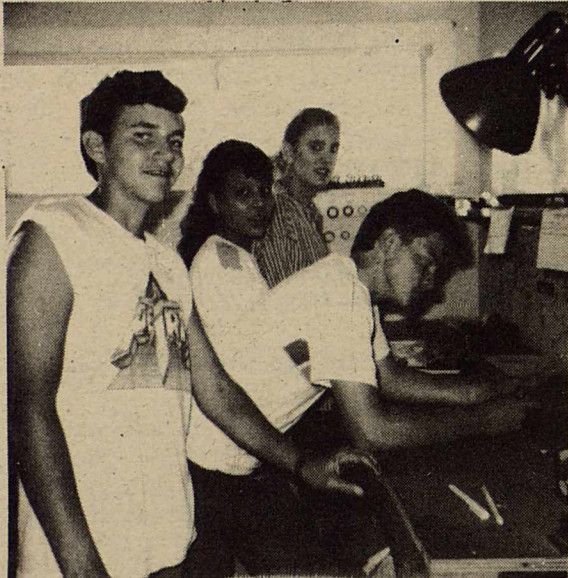

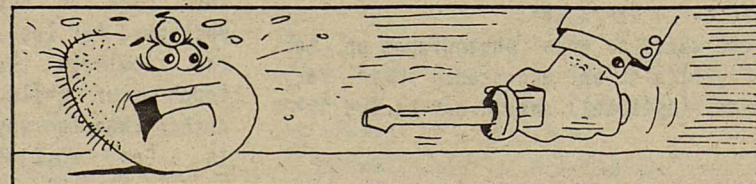

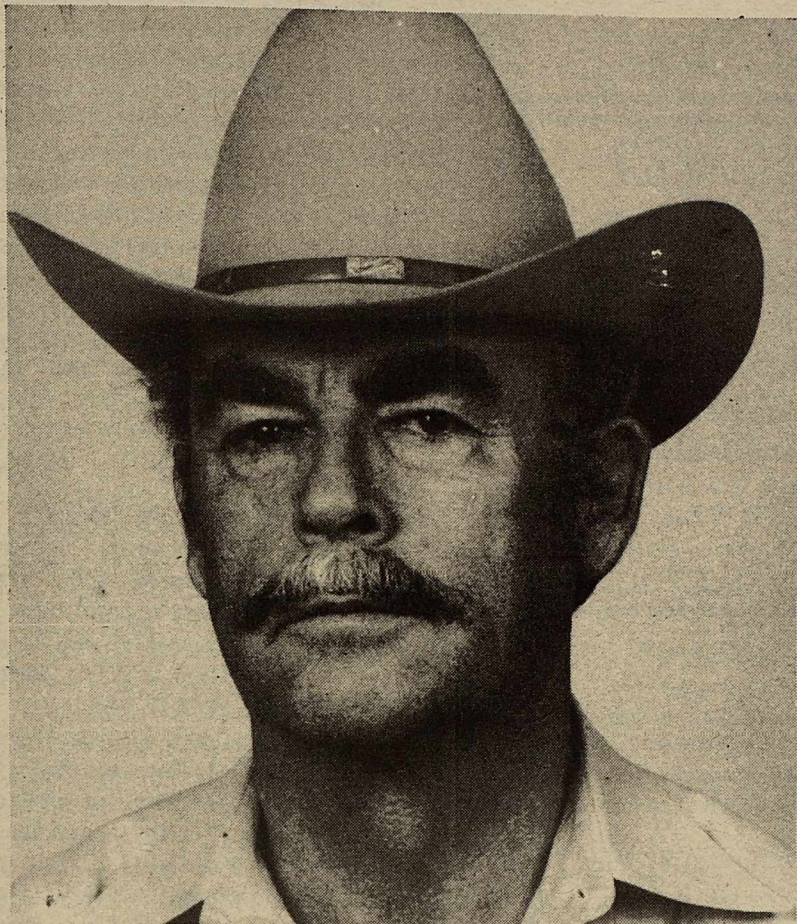

### "CARE" FOR THE FUTURE

Twelve representatives of CARE (citizens of Spofford, Brackettville, Fort Clark Springs, and rural areas of Kinney County) met with Texas State Senator Judith Zaffirini at her Laredo office on Friday, Oct. 21. The conference was scheduled to discuss citizen opposition to the TexCor/BFI plan for locating a so-called "NORM" disposal facility at Spofford in Kinney County. The CARE contingent delivered to Senator Zaffirini letters from Kinney County residents expressing strong objections to the proposed site, based on personal and civic considerations of adverse effects on health, on the environment, and on the resort, retirement, recreational, and hunting

industries which are the area's major sources of economic growth and income.

Senator Zaffirini was also presented with an informational packet, which was discussed during the conference. The Senator told the group that she was visited at an earlier date by TexCor representatives who described their proposal in their own terms. She indicated that she was not informed, prior to the conference with CARE members on Friday, that residents of Spofford, Brackettville, Fort Clark Springs, and the county at large were organized in opposition to the project. She was also interested to learn of disapproval expressed in resolutions, already passed or pending, by various government bodies in Kinney, Uvalde, and Val Verde counties, and

by the Fort Clark Springs Board of Directors.

During the conference the Senator expressed her desire to represent the people of her district to the best of her ability, and to assist the citizenry in maintaining the integrity of the existing environment. She described her own successful efforts, in the last legislative session, which prevented the location of a low-level radioactive materials dump at Asherton, in Dimmit County.

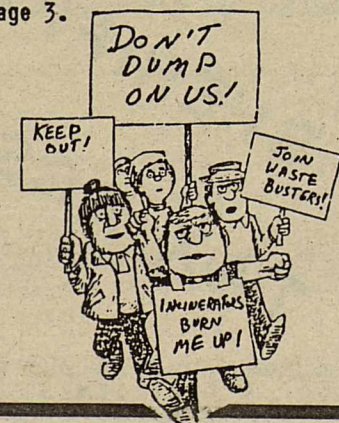
At a joint news conference immediately following the CARE discussion, the Senator expressed her opposition to the location of radioactive waste disposal sites in the Texas region which she represents in the State Senate.

Kinney County would not be the only one affected by a waste site proposal. On Monday October 24, both Val Verde and Uvalde Counties unanimously passed a resolution in opposition to the development of any kind of toxic or radioactive waste facility. Members from CARE were present at both meetings. On October 15, 1988, Fort Clark Springs Board of Directors passed a resolution stating that they are opposed to the location of any toxic or radioactive waste sites in Kinney County. Fort Clark has over 7,000 members which could be affected by this proposal. The City of Brackettville held a special City Council meeting Monday night on October 24 where they unanimously passed a resolution in opposition to any toxic or radioactive waste sites in Kinney County.

We hope that Texcor and BFI hear our message that we, the overwhelming majority of the people do not want you and your waste site here in Kinney County. There are many other communities in our state that are fighting a proposed or an already existing facility. We are not alone in this battle and we can win, other towns have won and succeeded in keeping these harmful substances out of their community. No amount of advance assurances or the proverbial "Its got to go somewhere" statements will make this facility a positive addition to our community.

In response to "Its got to go somewhere" CCHW (Citizens Clearinghouse for Hazardous Waste) states that, "The best place to dispose of waste is the place where it's generated. That's the safest way to do it and, as many businesses are discovering, the cheapest in the long-run. The new trend is toward "Source Reduction" where companies (a) recycle, (b) destroy or neutralize waste on-site or (c) change their production methods so that they're no longer generating as much or any waste at all."

school are the safest way for children to enjoy Halloween," Burnham said. He warned that if children go trick-or-treating, parents should take the following precautions:

\* Teach children not to eat any treats before bringing them home for examination by an adult. Remember, many hospitals offer free x-raying of treats.

\* When buying a costume, look for the label stating it is fire-resistant. Costumes should be brightly colored, and dark colored ones should have fluorescent or reflective tape on them.

\* For clear vision, use make-up, instead of masks.

\* Instruct children not to enter the home of anyone they do not know, and to stop only at homes with outside lighting.

\* An adult should accompany small children, and carry a flashlight, both to show the way and to make the children more visible to motorists.

\* Keep children out of the street, and never let them run between parked cars. The most frequent serious injuries are to children struck by vehicles.

Burnham suggests that homeowners who welcome trick-or-treaters should turn on a porch light, and be certain the lawn is cleared of any object a trick-or-treater might trip over. They also should restrain their pets, to prevent them from harming or following the youngsters. In addition, jack-o-lanterns and candles should be kept away from doorsteps, to prevent igniting a costume.

The boom was on again, in 1942 Pyote woke up a second time but what a difference, B-17's and B-29's swooping over town all day long. The air force called it the jumping off place, but it was more generally known as, "The Rattlesnake Air Force Base".

The "Enola Gay" the B-29 which had dropped the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima made Pyote

Texas it's home base along with 4 or 5 thousand other B-29's who made up the group. During the war the "Swase" was a member of the 19th Bombardment Squadron which was stationed in Pyote. After the War the "Enola Gay" went to the Smithsonian Institution. The other planes were carted away to be reduced to metal and Pyote looked like a ghost town again. When you pass through Pyote it's hard to believe 5,000 planes were roaring over town in the 1940's and in the 1920's there were 11 supply houses, 35 bars where you could bend an elbow, 11 lumber yards, and see that depression over there? That was the Texas Hotel, 90 rooms and 90 baths.

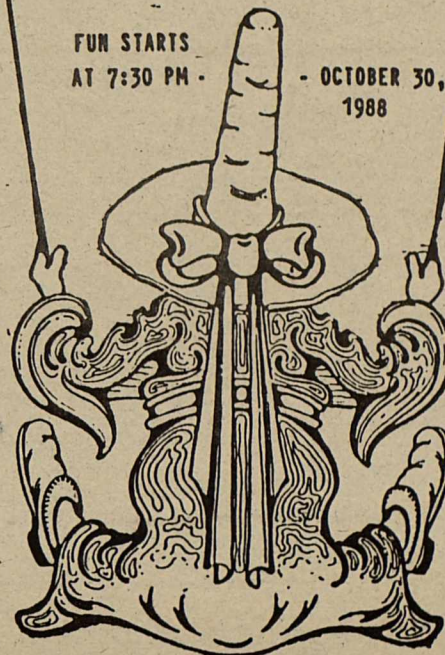
