




AUTOGRAPH PARTY

4TH U.S. CAVALRY, COMPANY K

Fort Clark, Texas 1979-1981

Ten years ago, more or less, a group of dedicated cavalry buffs and horsemen and women, were very active in a memorial horse cavalry unit, in this area. This as the 4th U.S. Cavalry, Company K, of Val Verde County, Texas. We decided on the name, due to the original unit having been stationed at Fort Clark for a short period following the Cival War. The term "Troop" replaced "Company", in later years.

Our uniforms were as close as possible to the Army issue of the period immediately following the Civil War, and into the early period of the Indian Wars. The horses were all individually owned, so to recruit members, we could not be too paticular about colors and markings of the horses matching army standards. The U.S. Cavalry did not have women troopers, but again, we wanted enough people to be able to form a unit of at least platoon size. Our strength was near 25 persons at one time. Incidentally, one of the women on in our unit would probably have made old cavalry toopers proud. Most all of these troopers rode McClellan Cavalry saddles with replica saddle cloths, and utilized replica cavalry bridles. The weapons utilized were original and replica U.S. Cavalry sabres and pistols of the period, using wad bullets for ammunition.

During the 4-5 years of this unit's activity, many parades and exibitions of mounted drill and tactics were participated in, to include firing of the pistols while at a full gallop, and running thru the sabre targets, locations at Fort Clark, Brackettville, Del Rio, Eagle Pass, and Laughlin Air Force Base, were the areas of participation. To me, the participations at Fort Clark, were the most enjoyable. For two of the years at Fort Clark, our cavalry unit had battle with a memorial infantry unit, from Laredo, Texas. The infantry

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

Texas Agricultural Extension Service

Well, here we are in the last few days of June and still extremely dry in most, if not all, parts of the county. If we do not receive rain over general areas of the county, ranchers will need to start thinking about reducing numbers of livestock on the ranch.

I had an opportunity to speak to the Rotary Club last week. I enjoyed meeting and visiting with members and their wives. We discussed several problems -- one of which concerned with -- oak wilt!

Oak wilt is a major disease of live, Spanish and Shumard oaks in many areas of Texas. Kerrville and Bandera have been especially hit hard by this devastating disease. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations have developed a seven-step program that will reduce losses from this fungal disease if you follow procedures carefully. The steps are:

> 1) Correctly identify the problem. This is most accurately done by microscopic examination of the fungus isolated from suspected trees.

> 2) Isolate the infected area by trenching between healthy and diseased trees. Trenches are used to cut connecting roots so that the fungus cannot spread trees.

> 3) Timely pruning will help prevent development of new oak wilt center.

> 4) Always remove sick and dead trees. Trees which have died from oak wilt can be source of the fungus.

> 5) Always paint pruning cuts or wounds to prevent spread of the bungus by beetles from nearby diseased trees or logs to healthy trees.

> 6) Handle firewood from diseased trees carefully so that it will not be a source of the fungus.

> 7) Replant with a mixed tree species in areas where oak wilt is active. This will prevent a landscape from being totally wiped out should the area again be attacked by oak wilt or similar type

organism which is specific to one tree

species.
This program provides some guidelines for property owners to follow in reducing losses to this major disease of oak trees. Remember, oak wilt prevention is a continous program. Property owners must be able to identify the problem and take proper action to prevent all of their trees becoming infected with this fungus.

4-H activities for this month include members participating in a county clothing project and several families selecting lambs to show in the coming livestock show. If you are interested in any 4-H activity or project, be sure to drop by the county extension office located on the 2nd floor of the courthouse.

ORGANIZERS PLAN FOR VOLKSMARCH WEEKEND

Volksmarch organizers met Tuesday, June 27 at the Fort Clark Springs Board Room to finalize plans for the crowds of hikers, bikers and swimmers expected on July 8 and 9. The Volksmarch is open to anyone, regardless of age, who would like to earn a medal for completing required distances by walking, biking or swimming. Some 300 participants are expected to take part in the six events scheduled during the weekend.

The Nat Mendelsohn Activity Center on Scales Road will serve as the base of the Volksmarch activity. Fort Clark Springs Recreation Director Sondra Meil said her crew will begin the day 6 a.m. on Saturday, July 8, by offering coffee and donuts to early Volksmarch participants. Start times for the 10-kilometer walks, 200 meter swims and 25 kilometer bike ride will be from 7 am to noon on both Saturday and Sunday. participants must be finished by 3 p.m. A special "Night Walk" will begin anytime participants choose between 4 & 6 p.m., with the finish time by 8 p.m. on Saturday. The "Night Walk" and biking event will be on Saturday only.

Fire Chief Adrian Reyes said the Brackettville Volunteer Fire Department and Auxiliary will offer delicious hamburgers, sausages, cold drinks and other items from 10:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Saturday, and from 10:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday. The Fire Department's food booth will be directly across Scales Road from the Activity Center. Maintenance Supervisor Alvin McClure said his crew is preparing the area, and will place tables and chairs under shade trees for Volksmarchers to relax while eating.

The Fort Clark Springs "Super Six" Volksmarch weekend is sponsored by the Selma Pathfinders, a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting family sports. Selma Pathfinder club members will man control points during the walks, count laps during the swim and offer refreshing drinks and candy to participants. Anyone interested in participating can register and begin from 7 a.m. until noon for the walks, bike ride or swims, or from 4 to 6 p.m. for the "Night Walk". Initial event medal and bar is \$5.00. Additional events are \$2.50. Participants earn a beautiful medal embossed with the Fort Clark Springs logo for the first event, and bars which attach to the medal for any additional events.

B.I.S.D. BOARD MEETING

The School Board waited for quite a few minutes to see if anyone would show up for the public hearing on the expenditure of Chapter I regular, Chapter 1 Migrant and Chapter 2 Federal money. Bob McCall started to explain where the monies were used when it was evident that no one was coming. The Chapter II money is used for school books. Chapter I regular money is used for students with a 40% reading level or lower. It is possible to use it for computer software for reading also. Chapter I regular monies are used for most of the aides and two teachers salaries. We then went into the special board meeting with old business.

First on the agenda was the Health insurance. Mr. McCall stated he has been promised new proposals from TSBA and BC/BS. This was then posponed until July 10's board meeting.

Auditors Bill Schuler from Coleman, Schuler and Elley of Uvalde and two representatives from Ede and Company of Knippa (the two lowest bidders) were present for a discussion on their bids. The board then tabled it to the executive session.

There was a discussion on Update 34 of which a no smoking policy, no alcoholic beverages policy and a visitors policy were presented. It was stated that there is an

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administrative policy of students visiting our school. Update 34 was approved as is.

The bleacher repair was discussed. Southern Bleacher said it would be a 2-3 day job replacing the bleachers with aluminum ones. But the discussion remained on when it could be placed in the budget to be done. It was finalized by stating to have it put in the 89-90 budget with the repair work done the summer of 1990. They will do minimal work to get us through the season this year.

The Bank Depository Contracts were competitive between First State Bank of Brackettville and Del Rio National. It was approved to go with First State Bank.

The Career Ladders were discussed with 24 people on the career ladder. This was with using the ruling of 1987-88 evaluations for the 1988-89 appointment. There is a new ruling to use the 89-90 evaluations for 89-90 appointment. This was deferred until the executive session.

New business started with the Ti-In contracts for the 89-90 year. We will lose the ESL classes for this year and pick up other classes that would not be available otherwise. The contract was approved.

Region XX contracts were approved also.
There were no bids for the gym floor repairs. Bill Bizzell took a look at the gym floor and stated he would repair the dead spots. No action was taken.

An air-condition and energy audit was discussed with the school wishing to find ways to save energy so that eventually we may have air-conditioning without a lot of expense.

The disposal of school vehicles was discussed. The vehicles are a '71 station wagon, a '73 four-door sedan and a '79 station wagon and they will be put out to

The lease/purchase of a 59 passenger and a 19 passenger bus were discussed. They would be leased for 3 years with the finance charge included and could be purchased typically for \$1. afterwards. Mr. McCall stated the district has 2 diesel buses and would recommend ordering diesel from now on as they are more economical. It was table until more information was available.

Administrators then gave updates and the meeting ended after the public forum.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

As there were no visitors present to start the public hearing, Monday, June 26th, the Mayor started with the Special Council Meeting at 4:30 p.m. and would go into the public hearing after the Special meeting.

Ordinance #263 (closing of portion of Gove Street) was read in it's entirety and approved by all councilmen present.

As there were no reports by the City Councilmen, Mayor La Gioia reported that at the last meeting, it came out that the Fire Dept. could no longer have free water. An ordinance passed since 1967 made it illegal for the City to give any free water, sewer, or gas to any customer for any rates other than what was set.

He also reported that the City was working on the lift station themselves


instead of applying for a grant. "We're working on it, but it won't be overnight," he said.

At 4:37 the Public Hearing on the Enterprise Zone was begun. The City wishes to consider an application to the Texas Department of Commerce for designation of the City of Brackettville as an Enterprise Zone. Mr. Charles Trost of Del Rio was asked to explain an Enterprise Zone.

Mr. Trost, a Planning Development Consultant stated the concept of people helping themselves was introduced by President Reagan for private enterprise or grants. Privileges received were basically taxcuts, sales tax exemptions, being able to buy materials to build something new without paying sales tax on the materials, etc. An Enterprise Zone was at first designated to the poorer area of a city or an area that wanted to start businesses, but as Brackett is small the only thing to do is to give everybody the same opportunity and declare the whole city an Enterprise Zone. Mr. Trost went on to further explain that when the State receives an application from anybody in an enterprise zone, whether it's to get a loan, to start a business or expand a business, that application will get 50 additional points at a competitive rate. "It's advantageous for Brackett to be an Enterprise Zone, so that anyone here who wants to get into business or add on to a business can get a decent loan at a fair interest rate. And if you're competing with someone from Uvalde or Sabinal, you've got a head start, because you've got 50 extra points to go with," stated Mr. Trost.

When looking at a map of Texas, there are only about 12 Enterprise Zones. Mr. Trost said," That means either the rest of the folks don't know about it or it's awfully hard to do. I haven't figured out which yet. It doesn't cost anything to try."

Mr. Ted Connors, assistant to Mr. Trost, stated we don't just decide to become an Enterprise Zone. A public hearing is the first step, then the City Council has to make a resolution & application package to send to the State. And they'll determine if we're eligible or qualified to be an Enterprise

When asked what disadvantage there would be if Brackett wished to rescind or get out of being an Enterprise Zone, Mr. Connors replied, "There would be no disadvantage if Brackett wantd to rescind once it was an E.Z. Just don't work any of the advantages, just let it lay there."

Mrs. Maxine Smith, visitor and possibly the first person to use the advantages of an E.Z. asked what are the advantages and disadvantages? As far as disadvantages, the people in Austin that the Mayor spoke with couldn't find any. The Mayor stated as for advantages, it would be a foot in the door to getting businesses, industry or anybody down here to an E.Z. They would rather go to an E.Z. than just a small town. He continued with, " They would have to go to a zoning oard and follow proper procedure to get into Brackett, we could get grants, we could get loans."

Mr. Connors emphasized that Businesses could go straight to the State and find out who has an E.Z. It would help build leads to anyone who wants to relocate here. He stated that Mr. Trost gave a comprehensive overview, that the State gave the definition of an E.Z. that was published in the June 15th edition of both newspapers. "It would create jobs, the more people you hire the more money you get back." The procedure for somone going to move here or to expand an existing business would be to ask the City for GAP financing and the City would in turn ask the State for the grant or loan. The City would help prepare the application and have to meet with the State. Your responsibilities and City's responsibilities would be

explained. The City would be responsible for actually administering the program by making sure the money you ask for is spent like you say it will and that you hire the number of people you say you will.

To qualify we have to have 1.5 X the % of the rate of state unemployment. Another number we need to be concerned with is income

A motion was passed to authorize the Mayor to act in behalf of the City Council in dealing with the E.Z. Mr. Trost commented that there was a meeting next week in Austin on the briefing of rules. That the rules for an E.Z. are changed once a year.

A motion was approved to appoint Joseph Hild as Engineer for the Sewer Plant Project.



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



New Mexico has a strong and rich traditon of wood carvers which dates back to the pre-Columbian era when the people carved their religious articles as well as utensils for their households.

When the Spanish came in the 16th century they brought a new part to the already rich culture. The Spanish struggled to survive for a hundred years. At the same time the Spanish and native Americans interingled and produced a new mixed people with both Indian and Spanish language and customs.

The 18th century was the classical period of the santero, (the carver of images of Christian Saints), and the construction of the states mission style churches. This period of the santero activity produced a style of sculpture like no other in any part of the world.

Most of the nation of Mexico was building and creating art work similar to that in European Spain. In New Mexico they were using the same style as the Pueblo Indians.

The Santeros of this period created their work unsigned. In later years some were identified by church records and tradition.

Sometimes a wood carver was hired to make santos for village churchs, then he would take his tools and family and live on location until the work was finished.

In 1821, when the Sante Fe Trail was opened, foreign art and crafts of weavers, carvers, furniture makers, blacksmiths, bagan to die, but they were never completely forgotten.

In 1930 a wood carver named Patracinio Barela began carving and revived the art until his death n 1964. He was self-taught with little formal education. He was not rebelling against traditional art as the Europeans were, "Primitive" expression came naturally to him.

The carvers of northern New Mexico rarely exhibit except in small towns and vilages during local fiesta celebrations, sometimes in churchs or private homes. There are many excellant wood carvers in northern New Mexico. During my residence there an exhibit could always be found in some village and also sometimes there were exhibits in Highland University in Las Vegas, New Mexico.



OPERATION MOTORCIDE

AUSTIN--The Director of the Department of Public Safety has challenged Texas drivers to show that the DPS traffic death estimate for the long July 4th period is far too high.

"The DPS Statistical Services Bureau has

"The DPS Statistical Services Bureau has indicated that as many as 52 persons could be killed on Texas roadways during these hours," Colonel Joe Milner said.

Col. Milner mentioned that the July 4th period will include the weekend before Independence Day.

"The DPS Public Information Office will conduct the traffic fatality count for 102 hours, beginning at 6p.m. Friday, June 30 and continuing until midnight on Tuesday, July 4th," he said. "As before, we'll be keeping this count with the assistance of local law enforcement agencies along with DPS troopers and communications personnel."

The final count for the 1988 July 4th period, which was 78 hours in length, totaled 32 fatalities.

Col. Milner said as part of his agency's "Operation Holiday," additional troopers will be deployed to help minimize the risk of driving on all roadways in rural areas.

Traffic fatality totals for Texas will be tabulated and released three times daily from the DPS, at 10 a.m., 3 p.m., and 8 p.m. The first report will be made at 10 a.m. on Saturday, July 1.


