DANNY SAMANIEGO HEADED FOR STATE

NUECES RIVER AUTHORITY

The Nueces River Authority, meeting in special session in Corpus Christi, has retained legal counsel to advise and represent it in connection with a recent lawsuit filed in District Court in San Marcos by the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority. The GBRA suit seeks to have the Edwards Aquifer from Brackettville to near Austin recognized as an underground river and placed under state control. There is presently no control over use of the aquifer water which serves over 1 million people in six counties.

NRA selected Tim Brown, from the Austin firm of Booth and Newson which specializes in water law, to represent its interests as they may be affected by the suit. Those interests include basin wide surface water development responsibilities, in general, and water rights held by the authority at Choke Canyon Reservoir, specifically.

Con Mims, NRA Executive Director, explained that the Board's action was based on several concerns. "First, the GBRA suit could effectively result in a dedication of those Nueces Basin surface waters which recharge the Edwards Aquifer to the use and benefit of Guadalupe Basin interests. This could prevent new water rights from being granted by the Texas Water Commission over the Edwards Aquifer and throughout its upstream drainage area, amounting to about 25 percent of the Nueces Basin. NRA has an obligation to preserve the rights of the people in that area to the use of that water."

"Second, this action could also interfere with our ability to develop reservoirs in that region in the future should any be determined feasible. NRA has to protect its ability to develop surface water projects to meet the needs of its citizens. Further, this suit could force Edwards Aquifer users in the Nueces Basin to

resort to surface supplies, creating conflicts with downstream senior permit holders. NRA has a responsibility to protect its water rights and the integrity of Choke Canyon Reservoir."

"In general," Mims concludes, "this suit could lead to widespread disruptions in the use of groundwater and force competition for limited Nueces Basin surface water supplies, none of which would be in the best interest of our constituents. As the only governmental agency having regional jurisdiction exclusively within the Nueces and adjoining coastal basins, NRA has a unique responsibility to assure orderly development and use of all water resources."

Mims summarized the GBRA petition and its potential effects.

1. What is GBRA asking of the Court?

FIRST, it is asking for a determination that the aquifer is actually an underground river and, as such, is owned by the state and

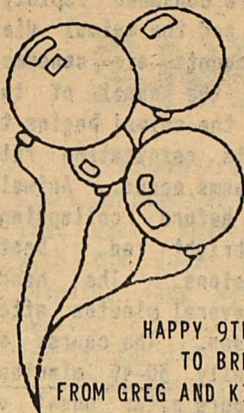

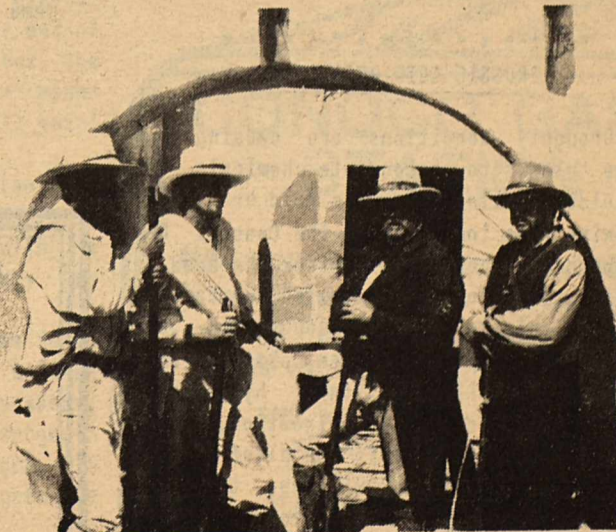

A reproductive symposium entitled "Improving Lamb Crop Raised" will be held in Kerrville, July 20-21 in connection with the annual meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

The symposium will be held at the Inn of the Hills. Dr. Maurice Shelton, San Angelo based Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Researcher says the program will be tailored to fit conditions of producers of Texas and the Southwest area.

Shelton also states that since low lamb crops have always been a concern of the sheep industry, the material presented in this program should help partially alleviate this problem.

The symposium will concentrate on selection and management of the ewe flock, fertility evaluation of the male, lamb mortality, diagnosis of pregnancy and multiple births, artificial insemination and the use of prolific breeds. Other topics include:

- Approaches to Improving Lamb Crops....Dr. Maurice Shelton
- Management Factors Affecting Reproductive Efficiency.... C.V. Hulet, USDA
- Reducing Lamb Mortality....Dr. George Ahlswede
- Breeding Soundness & Fertility Examination of Rams....Dr. Charles Livingston
- Artificial Insemination....Tim Willingham, San Angelo
- Pregnancy Diagnosis & Multiple Birth determinationElmer Herndon & Bob Stobart, Univ. of Wyoming

The second day discussions will include Genetic Improvement and the use of Prolific Breeds and discussion on Accelerated Lambing followed by an open discussion and summary.

This symposium is sponsored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, the Sheep Industry Development Program and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at San Angelo.

PRUSSIC ACID POISONING

Droughty conditions are causing some forage plants to concentrate chemicals that may poison cattle. Prussic acid or cyanide poisoning has increased in the Coastal Bend because of the hot, dry weather the area has been experiencing. The most common cause is eating plants such as Johnsongrass, Sudan grass and sorghum. These plants (among others) cause the formation of hydro-cyanic or prussic acid during digestion. These compounds are increased in the plant by heavy nitrate fertilization, wilting, trampling, and plant disease. Very young, rapidly growing plants contain greater quantities of the glycosides compounds. Spraying of plants that contain these compounds may also increase the chances of cyanide poisoning.

If large amounts are consumed rapidly, muscle tremors develop and the animal dies rapidly. If smaller amounts are consumed over a longer period, the onset of the poisoning is sudden and the animal begins to salivate and increase its respiration rate (briefly) and muscle spasms occur. Animals stagger and struggle before collapsing. Mucous membranes are bright red. Death usually during convulsions. The heart continues to beat for several minutes after breathing struggling ceases. The course of the poisoning is usually 30-45 minutes. Animals still live 2 hours after onset of signs will recover.

Blood is generally dark red until exposed to air, but clots slowly. The rumen may be distended with gas and the odor of "bitter almonds" may be detected when the carcass is opened.

The risk of cyanide poisoning may be decreased by feeding ground cereal grains on other feed prior to releasing the animals to graze or feeding them suspected hays.

Although this release is for the Coastal Bend area, there are some parts in our area experiencing similar conditions. Producers are urged to be cautious if grazing livestock on sorghum-type grasses. If you need more information, please feel free to contact my office.

Here are a few facts Texans might find interesting. According to the United States Department of Agriculture, Texas has more farms and ranches, more cattle and more sheep than any other state in the nation.

Texas leads the nation in 1989 in the number of cattle and calves with 13.7 million head and sheep and lambs with 1.9 million head. The national total is 99.4 million head of cattle and 10.8 million head of

sheep. Just think how many we would have with a series of good wet years!

Texas cash receipts from marketing livestock products was 6.05 billion dollars with the U.S. total being 76.2 billion dollars.

All of this just shows how strong agriculture is in this state and this county. Kinney County normally shows approximately 5 million dollars in sheep marketed with the same in goats.

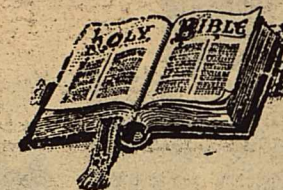

TRM SCHOOL

UVALDE--Ranchers in the 19-county area around Uvalde have some help in dealing with the current economic crisis in agriculture. The Texas Agricultural Extension service has piloted a project called Total Ranch Mangement (TRM).

The seventh 8-day school for ranchers will be in August 15-18th and 21-24 at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center here.

The TRM school is directed toward helping ranchers evaluate decisions, define criterion for improving management decisions, and evaluating technology. TRM is planned to help ranchers organize their ranches, develop plans, and analyze operations to achieve goals.

The teaching staff for the school is Dr. Dale Rollings, Extension wildlife specialist; Dr. Larry White, Extension range specialist; Dr. Tommy Welch, weed and brush control specialist; and Dr. Tom Troxel, Extension livestock specialist.

Due to the intensity of the training and limited space for workshops, the TRM school in August has been limited to 25 participants. SEPTIC SYSTEM FACTS

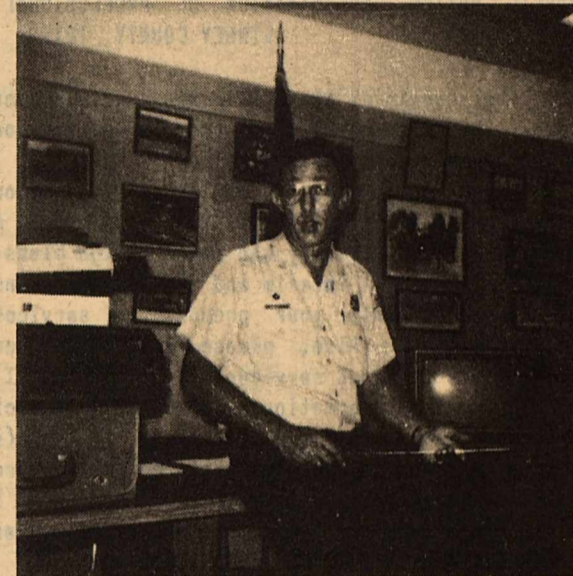
The new septic system construction rules established by the Texas Health Department this year have developed a weakness that is causing a ripple all the way up to Austin.

The very installers that the new rules were partially gleaned from are resisting change in their way of building septic systems in their area. If you put a group of installers together in a room and have them put down on paper the best working and cheapest system that they could build, you will find as many ways of building one as there are installers in the room. This is basically the method that was used to come up with the new standards that were adopted in January 1988. Along with the latest engineering information and the best parts of all the systems that the installers were using were picked out and used to create the new construction guidelines.

The ripple they feel in Austin is the resistance of the installers to change their methods in their area and use the new standards. These same installers are not necessarily plumbers by profession, but come from all sectors of the construction trade. It came as a surprise to me to find out that even licensed master plumbers do not have septic system designing or their construction in the examination by the state. The plumbers that are proficient at installing septic systems have learned septic system construction in the school of hard knocks. This puts plumbers in the same group, with a whole lot of clout in Austin, resisting the new construction rules.

The problem the state is confronted with is finding enough educators, that are as salty as the older installers, to re-educate and certify all installers by September 1989. Seeing their problem, the Health Department has turned the educational programs over to Texas A & M, but they still have the problem of enforcement along with the new responsibility of approving counties to handle enforcement for them. State engineers and sanitarians coming into the installers territory and telling them how a system should be built is raising the hair on the back of their necks. We will hear a lot more on this in the coming months from Austin for the Health Department is having hearings to change the new 1988 rules before we had a chance to learn last years that well. The hardest rule to comply water to meet the

requirement for smaller lots recorded before 1988. Another hardship felt at first is the lack of design alternatives for the duel bed requirement with a diversion valve. Everything would be fine if everybody had an acre and at least four feet of good sandy loam to put their drain field in.

This week the BVFD responded to only one fire. The fire was located on the Railroad tracks next to Standard Lane west of Highway #693.

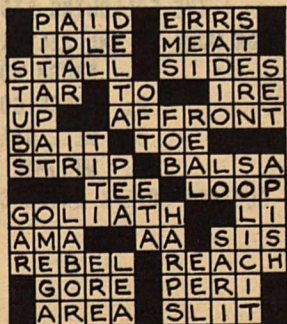
The Department provided food and drinks and service for the Volksmarch this past weekend. We would like to thank the B & S, Super S and Ft. Clark Springs Association for their help.

AN ORDINANCE

REGULATING THE DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE IN THE CITY OF SPOFFORD, TEXAS; PROHIBITING THE DISPOSAL OF HAZARDOUS WASTE IN CERTAIN AREAS; AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SPOFFORD, TEXAS:

Section 1: Definitions.

As used in this ordinance --

(i) "city" means the City of Spofford, Texas.

(ii) "garbage" means solid waste consisting of putrescible animal and vegetable materials resulting from the handling, preparation, cooking, and consumption of food, but does not include hazardous waste.

(iii) "hazardous waste" means any solid waste identified or listed as a hazardous waste by the administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency, pursuant to the federal Solid Waste Disposal Act.

(iv) "refuse" means nonputrescible solid waste, but does not include hazardous waste.

(v) "person" means an individual, corporation, or association.

Section 2. Disposal of Waste.

(a) A person commits an offense if the person disposes of or dumps garbage or refuse at a place within the city limits or within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the city, unless the place has been designated for disposal or dumping of garbage by the city council.

(b) A person commits an offense if the person disposes of or dumps hazardous waste at a place within the city limits or within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the city.

Section 3. Penalties.

A person who commits an offense under this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine. The amount of the fine shall not exceed \$1,000.00.

Section 4. Effective Date.

This ordinance takes effect 10 days after its publication in the official newspaper of the city.

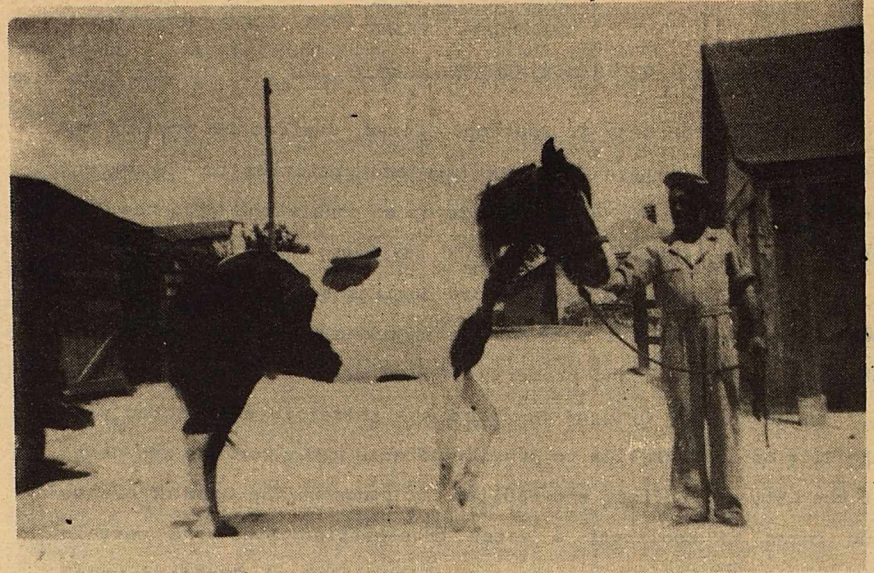

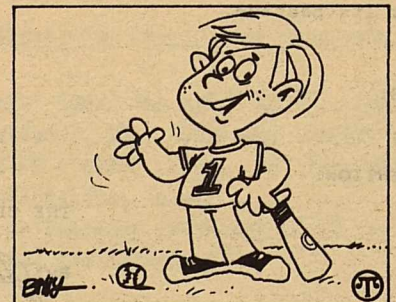

**COMMISSIONERS' COURT
UNOFFICIAL MINUTES**

The July 10th Commissioners Court meeting was called to order with all members present.

June minutes were read and approved.

A line item amendment was made for the County and District Clerk's office for \$1,435.10. It was decided that the old copier should stay on the Clerk's inventory list for now since she had money in her budget for maintenance.

The disposition of 4-H pick-up was discussed. It seems that the pick-up was sold several years ago but the title was never changed. \$500.00 was found that had not been turned in to the County.

Appointment of Bill Lindeman as deputy Constable was discussed. A motion was made and seconded and two voted for and two against with one abstaining. County Attorney, Tully Shahan brought up a law that states that the Commissioners Court had to establish a need for a Deputy Constable in order to appoint one. Some of the Commissioners felt that more information was needed before making a decision.

Executive Session to authorize retaining attorney to represent Kinney County in a Harrassment case. Attorney Davis from Uvalde was appointed in open session.

It was agreed to offer the Soil Conservation Service their office space and storage space for the coming fiscal year for \$250 per month, the same as last year.

Tom Neilson from the Comptroller's Office was kind enough to come down and visit with Commissioners Court to discuss new Budget laws and to answer any questions that the Commissioners might have.

The ceiling tile in the Civic Center is still falling and this was decided was due to the roof leaking. Mr. Vito LaGioia was asked if he would secured the frames. This might help. A letter was also written to Mr. Earl Baker in reference to the roof repair.

Outside lighting for the civic center was approved.

The County will be purchasing a 1989 carrier pick-up for the County Road Crew.

A discussion was held on repairing the County Barn. It was decided that the renovation was needed. The motion was made and carried to proceed with expenses not to exceed \$30,000.00.

Since the old jail building is to be used for the new Senior Citizens Center

location, it was decided to remove the old jail cells and to haul to Eagle Pass since the Salvage Co. in Eagle Pass had already bid on the scrap.

Mayor Vito LaGioia discussed using the forthcoming Grant money that is to go to the City to replace or repair the swimming pool. Since the City does not have another project at this time it seemed a good idea to join together on this project. The County and the City would work on this and on keeping it maintained. With the Grant money and as much volunteer help that the City and County can get, having a working pool again can be a reality.

The Sheriff's budget was amended for \$10,000.00. This should be enough to see him through this year's end.

The County Tax Collector/Assessor's Office budget was amended for \$400.00 and the County J.P.'s budget was amended for \$500.00.

A resolution was passed designating depository for Grant funds, authorizing certain persons to execute contracts with TDC relating to TCDP Grant funded in 1989, signing checks and to hold position of Labor Compliance Official for the Grantee, for the Citizens Center Grant.

It was approved to advertise for an Architect and Administrator for the Senior Citizens Grant.

Discussion on the purchase of a new patrol car for the Sheriff's dept. was held.

A motion was made, seconded and passed to buy a car. It was also approved to sell the old patrol car to the City if they wanted it for \$5,000.00. Advertising for Bids was approved for the patrol car.

Increasing the Ambulance fees were discussed. It was decided not to raise the fees at this time.

The following is reprinted from the August 1976 issue of Optimist Magazine in hope it will impress our youth, and oldsters, too, to use extreme caution in the operation of the nation's most deadly device...the automobile. (It has been in Ann Lander's And Dear Abby's columns also.)

Suddenly, I awakened. It was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. Then I saw a doctor. My body was mangled and I was saturated with blood. Pieces of jagged glass were sticking out all over. Strange that I couldn't feel anything.

Hey, don't pull that sheet over my head. I can't be dead. I'm only 17. I've got a date tonight. I am supposed to grow up and have a wonderful life. I haven't even lived yet. I can't be dead!

Later, I was placed in a drawer. My folks had to identify me. Why did they have to see me like this? Why did I have to look at Mom's eyes as she faced the most terrible ordeal of her life? Dad suddenly looked like an old man. He told the man in charge, "Yes, he's my son."

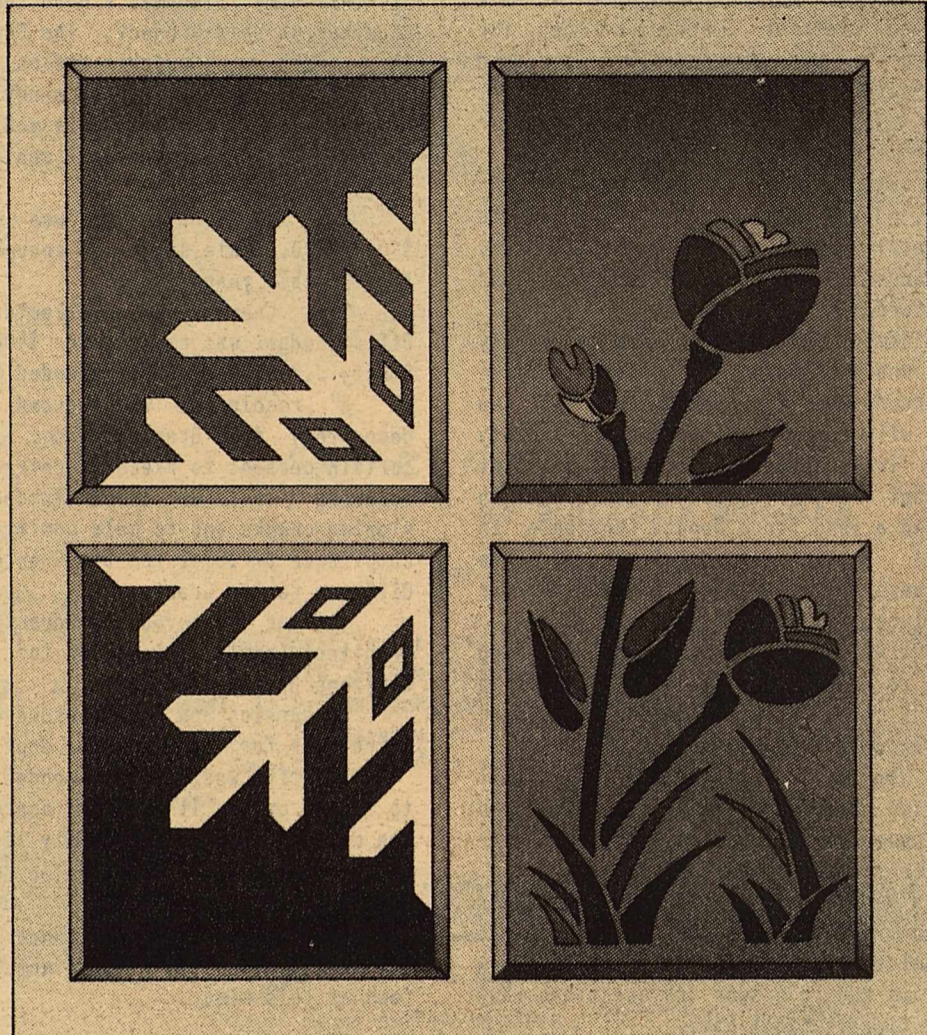

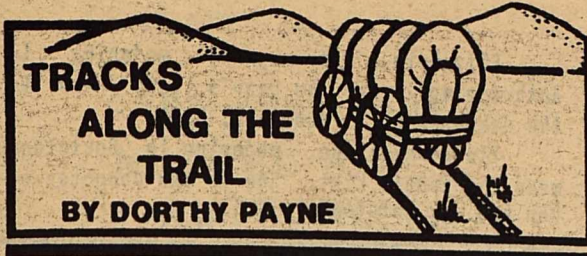

In early Texas, parties were held to do some serious dancing, like balls, cotillions, german hops, and fandangoes. Sometimes the name didn't fit the type of dancing, but they danced anyway.

The word "ball" came from the French word "bal" and means an assembly for the purpose of dancing. If the dance was held in a home it was perhaps square-dancing and the "dosi-does" might go on all night.

The word Cotillion comes from the French word "cotillion" and means petticoat, probably because that was what showed when you swung. Also from a dancing song.

The German dances were the best, at least I enjoy them. There was something exciting to dancing all night and eating a big breakfast at sun-up. Most of the time you were given a dance card to be signed by your pardner at every dance.

Western style clothing were worn by the men and swinging skirts and dresses by the women with a petticoat showing when your pardner swung you around. By 1944 women starting wearing jeans to dances, and some of the glamor was lost.

The square dance club where we were members went in for dresses and the mens shirts were made to match their pardners dresses or skirts.

After you learned to dance you were ready to put on your glad rags and go to the ball. Don't forget your manners, it helps to get a dance pardner.

The Pioneers danced on the ground around the campfire along the trail. In the early ranch country, people would travel for hours in wagons or on horseback, dance all night, breakfast at daybreak, then start the long ride home.

In the old days, we danced every Saturday night to "Bob Wills and his Texas Playboys." Sometimes the dances were in a school house or the American Legion Hut. Then it was, "Throw your coat in the corner, grab your honey and commence."

In a called meeting Thursday, July 6, the Southwest Texas Junior College Board of trustees met for the purpose of considering procedures to be used in selecting a new President for SWTJC.

Current SWTJC President Dr. Jimmy Goodson has resigned effective August 15 to accept the position of President of The Victoria College.

The Board appointed an 11 member Presidential Advisory Search and Screening Committee that will tentatively hold its first meeting on Tuesday, July 11.

Board President Bill Nunley will chair the committee, which will also include Board

Vice-President Rodolfo Flores and Board member Joe Taylor with Board Secretary Bobby Hatley serving as an alternate committee member.

Also appointed to the committee were social science/physical education chairperson Harry Lawrence, federal programs coordinator Gloria Rivera, career center coordinator Sotero Alviar, physics instructor Mary Beth Monroe, Eagle Pass Center director Gilbert Bermea, and agriculture instructor Les Brieden.

The final two members of the committee will be selected from the five SWTJC deans at a later date.

The college deans are Dr. Robert Aguero, John Allen Davis, Rudy Gonzales, Ismael Sosa, and Jerald Underwood.

"We realize that some of these people may not be able to serve for one reason or another, and if such is the case, adjustments will be made in the membership of the committee," Nunley said.

"The Board is attempting to establish a set of guidelines for selecting a new President receiving input from a number of faculty members through the committee, and when the process is completed, the Board hopes to be able to select the best possible candidate for President of this Junior College," Nunley said.

Guidlines and procedures established for the committee were to advertise for the position throughout the state with a deadline for applications set at 30 days from the time the advertisements are in place, and after the application deadline has passed, the committee will tentatively take two weeks to rank the candidates and make recommendations to the Board.

Qualifications for the new President of SWTJC announced were a minimum of a masters degree with a doctorate preferred and experience in education and administration.

The Board also decided not to appoint an Interim President unless the length of the selection process extends significantly past President Goodson's departure and becomes necessary.

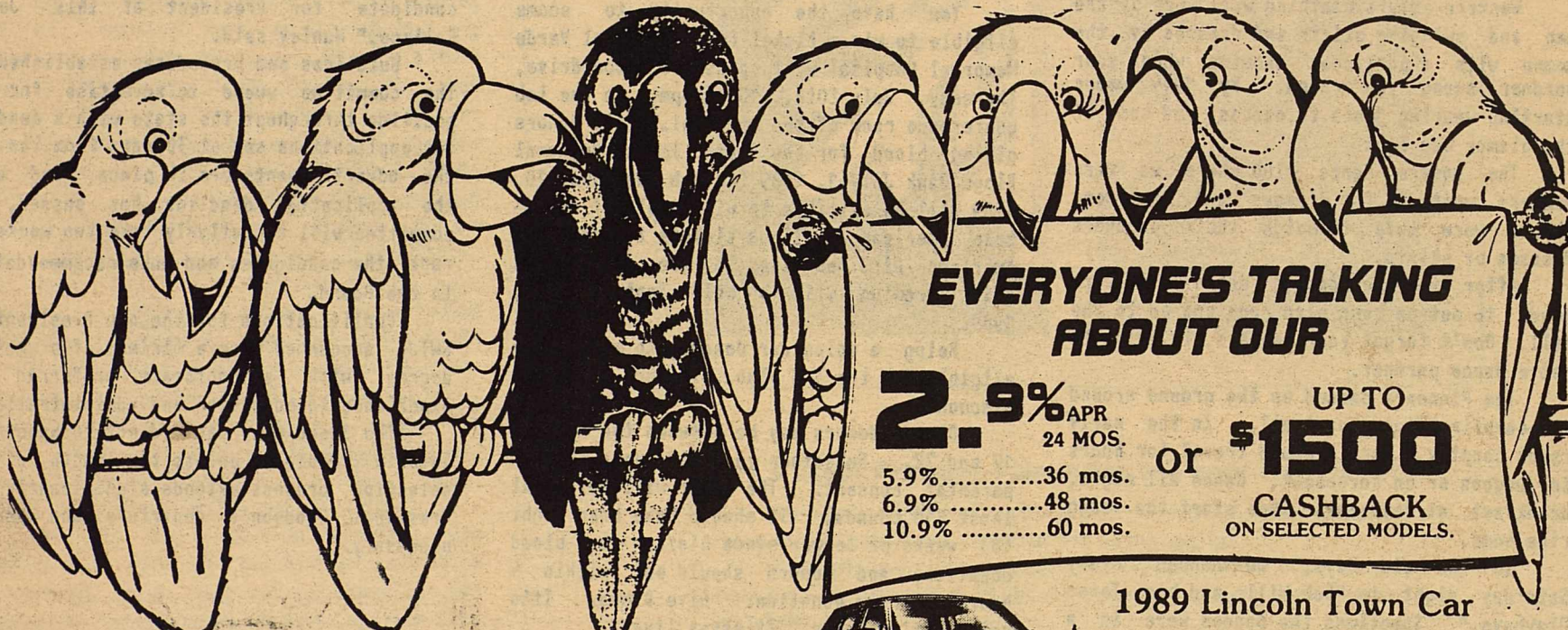

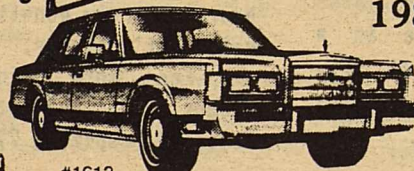

subject to regulation under surface water laws.

If the Court determines that the aquifer water is owned by the State, then:

SECOND, it is asking for the Court to take custody of the aquifer water, determine who has rights under law to take that water, and establish the limitations and conditions of those rights.

THIRD, if the Court finds that current users do not have rights under law to this water, it is asking that those users be required to apply to the Texas Water Commission for permits.

FINALLY, it is asking that all resulting permits contain whatever conditions are deemed necessary to maintain adequate and continuous flows at Comal and San Marcos Springs.

2. What can happen if GBRA is successful?

The Petition could lead to substantial restrictions in the use of surface and ground waters throughout the Edwards Aquifer and its upstream drainage area in order to maintain adequate and continuous springflows at New Braunfels and San Marcos. In the Nueces Basin, this could affect water users in Kinney, Edwards, Real, Uvalde, Bandera, and Medina counties. No existing groundwater use is grandfathered in the suit. Municipal, industrial and agricultural water needs will be of secondary importance to springflow requirements. A water market may develop in which agricultural permits will be purchased or leased for municipal use, substantially eliminating western county irrigation. Water demands to support Nueces Basin growth will be shifted to limited surface supplies, possibly causing conflicts with existing permit holders.

NRA has consistently participated in and encouraged development of an Edwards Aquifer water plan in which groundwater regulations, conservation, reuse, and surface water development are incorporated and all regional interests are treated equitably. "That position was expressly reaffirmed by my Board at its meeting," Mims noted.

He noted that, "Local attempts to negotiate such a plan have failed. The Edwards Underground Water district, being the only governmental agency having specific jurisdiction over the aquifer, has been made ineffective as a viable forum for regional planning negotiations by the withdrawal of its two western counties. The last

Legislative session refused to take constructive action, and there is no indication that the next session will be different. Texas Water Commission has limited, if any, authority to intervene. And, meanwhile, aquifer use continues to expand, threatening Guadalupe basin water supplies, with no relief reasonably expected."

Because of these conditions, Mims believes, GBRA filed its District Court suit as its only remaining option to protect Guadalupe Basin interests in a timely manner. GBRA has also notified the region that, if it fails in state courts, it is prepared to bring further litigation in federal courts. "GBRA offers this suit as another forum in which to negotiate a regional water plan, but its approach is clearly aggressive and its demands in the suit are solely favorable to Guadalupe Basin interests. Water supplies and economies in the Nueces and San Antonio basins are threatened by this suit."

The NRA Board did not vote to immediately intervene in the suit, but to keep all of its options open. "Basically, we have positioned ourselves with specialized legal counsel to respond to the GBRA suit if, when, and to the extent our counsel deems necessary and appropriate," Mims explained.

The Uvalde based Nueces River Authority includes all or parts of 22 South Texas counties extending from Rocksprings to Corpus Christi. Directors attending the meeting were: George A. I had raised my hand at the meeting in hopes to be recognized, yet, I was not. I think it was discourtesy not to let me speak in court. Mr. Belcher was, however, recognized more than once. I think what is good for one should also be good for the other.

Since I wasn't allowed to speak my mind, then I will do so now. This in reference to the debated appointment of deputy Constable Bill Lindeman.

The law states that a need for a deputy constable should be established before one can be appointed. Judge Tommy Seargeant seeked the deputy constable appointment through the Court, yet, clear need for a constable was never established.

If ever there was a point in time that a deputy constable was needed, it was in 1977-78.

At which time, I, Ralph Gonzalez, was constable of Pct. 1. And at that time, Tommy Seargeant was pushing hard not to pay my salary - Justice of the Peace records will reflect that I brought in \$3,500 to \$6,000 per month - during the time I served as Pct. 1 Constable.

Yet, Tommy Seargeant not only would not consider appointing a deputy constable, he voted in favor of not even considering to pay my salary for 13 months. I had to hire an attorney from Uvalde to represent me in District Court. It took 13 months to get my salary and I never received my travel pay.

At this time, the Constable office was a functioning office and was bringing revenue for Kinney County.

It confuses me that at that time Judge Seargeant voted against the constable even getting a salary. Now he votes in favor of a deputy constable for a constable that has only served a couple of warrants in six months. Makes me wonder if he may have some political motivation, rather than the citizens best interests at heart.

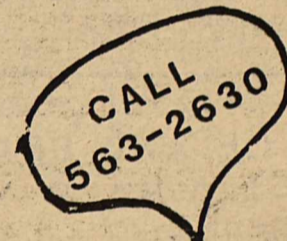

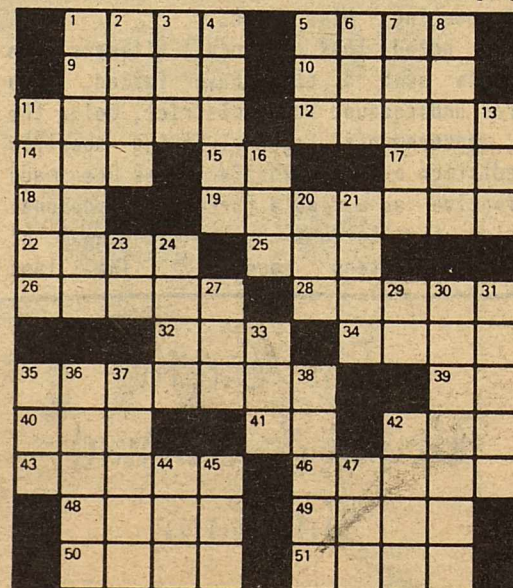
