


WINNER OF ALAMO VILLAGE RACES LABOR DAY


CAR SHOW

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

In your last weeks newspaper there was a letter to the editor from Glen Seaver, Jr.

In most letters there is usually a message or messages, whichever the case may be. In Seaver's letter there are several messages and in case some of you might have missed them; here they are again:

First - The \$30,000.00 that he spoke of for the barn was a cap; in the event that we needed to spend that much to rebuild a building that is about to fall down to the ground. The 'electrical is bad, lumber is deteriorated, the tin has holes in it and leaks on all the county equipment that is stored there. If Seavers would have taken the time to go look at the building instead of listening to someone else; He might be forced to agree that it does need repair. Yes, we are going to spend \$20,000.00 now and try to save a building that would take three or four times that much to replace. Now is that really bad business????

He also said it was for only ten weeks out of the year. I'm just the opposite, I want Brackettville and Kinney County to have a pool, my record certainly shows it. If the County cannot come up with the needed \$24,000.00; Commissioner Slubar, County Attorney Shahan and I have volunteered to head up a fund raiser to raise the money; so the kids that don't belong to Fort Clark Springs can have a place to swim also.

Third - I feel that Mr. Seaver is throwing his hat into the political arena from his letter and letters in the past. You would think that he is being pushed and tutored on what to say and do. We did not lower taxes this year and probably won't next year. So until you are in the Commissioner's chair, you really do not know what you are talking about. It takes so much to run a County and there isn't much you can do about it.

Another thing that wasn't mentioned, is that in the three years that I have been a Commissioner, we have not raised taxes and I feel as a whole, some of us, including myself, have done one very good job keeping it that way!



Be sure your landscapes are getting enough water. I am seeing drought-stressed plants all over town. One sure way to know exactly how much water is getting down to the roots is to poke a metal rod or similar item into the area you are watering and observe how far up the rod the dampness occurs. Also, remember to water around the dripline of the trees and large shrubs. Watering continously at the trunk of a tree is not healthy and could lead to problems later. Insects have been extremely active and some species are worse in a dry year. The key to controlling insect pest is to know what insect is causing the problem and what recommended treatment will do the best job.

HOMEOWNER CHECK LIST FOR SEPTEMBER

Water every 5-7 days at a one inch application rate.

Now is fast approaching time for a last fertilization for bermuda grass lawns - 5 lbs/1000 square feet of 16-8-8 and 51bs/1000 square feet of copperas.

This month is the best time to control Rescue grass, a winter grassy weed, that is a problem in late winter and early spring. Use a pre-emerge herbicide at recommended label rates. (also called winter rye)

As you plan your new landscape or renovate an existing one, remember to consider planting recommended varieties for this area and also try mixing some natives into the schedule.

Continue to mow lawn regularly. Do not scalp lawns at this time. Bermuda grass seed should not be planted after the 20th of this month. It will seldom have enough root system established to withstand and early freeze.

* * * * * * * * * * * * *

Leaf scorch is a non-infectious condition of shade trees and shrubs, expecially those not adapted to a particular area. Common trees that we see problems with are maples, sycamores, magnolias, ashes, and, sometimes oaks. Under the right conditions, similar to what we are experiencing, many other trees including fruit and nut varieties can be affected.

Symptoms include:

- First noticed as yellowing or bronzing of the tissue between the vein or along margins of leaves.
- This symptom usually follows drying winds and bright sunshine of extremely hot days.
- 3. Later, these leaves appear dry and scorched and will often drop off. The tree does not die, however, there are a number of other problems such as disease, nematodes, insects, etc. that could eventually lead to the death of the tree.
- Usually appears on a single limb, or on one side of the tree. (I see it most oftenly on the south and or west side)

In most cases, all leaves on the same branch are affected more or less uniformly. Frequently, only one side of the tree is affected. (the side exposed to sun or wind most of the time) Other times, individual trees are severely damaged, while those of the same species in the immediate are are unaffected. This can be due to seedling variation and/or probably variations in the soil and moisture conditions.

Leaf scorch cannot be corrected once it appears but injury can be kept to minimum by improving the tree's general condition.

1. If the tree has a permanently injured root system, prune out some of the branches to maintain an even balance between top and roots.

2. Mulching the surface to improve soil's water holding capacity and watering liberally during hot weather can help a great deal. Two applications of one inch of water per week may be better than a two inch soaking once a week during hot, windy conditions due to low water-holding capacity of some of our soils.

 Be sure to watch for, and control, all insects that could inhabit a weakened tree.

4. Water 4-6 inches every 6-8 weeks to flush any accumulations of soluble salts past the root zone.

SOUTHWEST TEXAS JUNIOR COLLEGE


Enrollment figures as of noon Friday, September 1, show 2,407 students had registered for fall classes at Southwest Texas Junior College.

"Day enrollment on campus is doing very well," stated Dr. Robert Aguero, dean of instructional services. "We are about even as far as overall numbers are concerned and there seems to be a shift from evening enrollment to day enrollment," he continued.

The highest fall enrollment to date occured in the fall of 1984 with 2,483, while the highest spring enrollment occured in the spring of 1989 with 2,889.

Enrollment totals for the various areas served by SWTJC are: Uvalde day, 1,190; Uvalde evening, 202; Del Rio day, 96; Del Rio evening, 368; Eagle Pass, 426, Carrizo Springs and Crystal City, 57; Pearsall, 26; Devine, 24; and Hondo, 18.

In the fall of 1988, the official SWTJC enrollment was 2,450.

PRICKLYPEARS

SAN ANGELO, TEXAS -- If it seems there's more pricklypear cactus in a pasture now than just a few years ago, you're probably right.

Left alone, prickly pear can increase 25 to 33 percent every year, says Dr. Jake Landers, Texas Extension range specialist, San Angelo. At that rate, the infestation doubles every 2 1/2 to 3 years.

Because the cactus spreads so rapidly,

hand spraying a sparse infestation can maintain pasture productivity and save more expensive broadcast herbicide or mechanical treatments later, Landers says. Hand spraying usually is economical when there's less than 200 clumps per acre.

Prickly pear can be a particularly thorny problem for cattle, sheep and goat producers. If livestock graze the cactus, pricklypear can cause ulcerations in the mouth, throat, stomach and intestine. Deer may be affected in the same way. The cactus also crowds out grass and dicourages grazing.

Hand spraying a one percent mixture of Grazon PC herbicide (a restricted use product containing picloram) will control pricklypear almost any time of year. Landers says. Research indicated the cactus is especially vulnerable to the herbicide from September through December. Grazon PC is the only herbicide labled for pricklypear control.

For hand spraying, Landers recommends using either a pump-up backpack sprayer or power cattle sprayer. To achieve control, it's necessary to thoroughly cover at least one side of all pads, spraying until they're wet. Using the one percent mix and minimum wage labor, total cost of the application runs two to three cents per clump three feet in diameter, Landers says.

Pricklypear control demands patience because the herbicide works slowly. After application, the cactus may turn yellow in two weeks or stay green for three months. Either way, pricklypear often won't die until two years after hand spraying. But with hand spraying, Landers says, "Ninety percent control is pretty standard after two years.

"Invariably you'll miss (spraying) a few. The best way to tell if your've got good containment is to look for flowering or tunas (fruits) the next growing season. If you see any flowering, ther're probably the plants you missed."



If a majority of pricklypear clumps are controlled, ranchers may want to wait four or five years to respray. New pricklypear growing from seed will be evident then,

Landers says. "If you treat it when it's

sparse, you can stay ahead of it."



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
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AUSTIN, TEX.-- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday called a new state tax on illegal drugs Texas' latest weapon against drug dealers.

"If you deal untaxed drugs in Texas, Bullock's raiders are coming after your property, your bank account, your car or anything else that can be seized to collect the tax, "Bullock said.

Bullock vowed to aggressively collect the drug tax that starts September 1, which requires drug dealers to pay heavy taxes on marijuana and controlled substances.

Failure to pay the tax can lead to stiff penalties, fines and seizure of property, according to Bullock.

The law requires drug dealers to purchase tax stamps from the Comptroller that must be placed on any packages of marijuana or controlled substance. The tax rate for

marijuana is \$3.50 per gram, which is \$1,624 per pound. The tax rate on controlled substances, virtually any other illegal drug, is \$200 per gram, which is \$90,720 per pound.

Dealers arrested with untaxed drugs owe the tax plus a late penalty and interest.

Bullock said dealers can also face a tax fraud penalty of 50 percent of the amount of tax due for failure to purchase tax stamps. A dealer convicted for not paying the tax will be fined an amount equal to the tax and could be sentenced to two to 10 years in prison.

"Drug dealing has flourished because tremendous profits can be made. I hope the tax will break the financial incentive to deal illegal drugs," Bullock said.

The two-inch square drug stamps are individually numbered and emblazoned with images of a skull and crossbones or the grim reaper and the words "drugs," "death" and "taxes."

Stamps for marijuana are sold in four denominations ranging from one gram for \$3.50 to one kilogram for \$3,500. Stamps for controlled substances are available in five denominations from one gram for \$200 to 500 grams for \$100,000.

Stamps must be purchases by money order or certified check from the Comptroller's office in Austin or by mail. The law requires that all information about drug tax stamp purchasers remain confidential.

Bullock said that when his office is notified by a local prosecutor of a drug tax violation, the dealer will be sent a tax notice for the amount of tax due. The Comptroller can file a lien against the dealer's assets, such as real estate, bank accounts, cars, boats and other property, for collection of the tax.





James (Jay) Gould was born in 1836, at Raybury, New York, and attended Hobart College. He bacame a surveyor, a leather merchant and a banker.

After the panic of 1857, he began buying railroad bonds and soon controlled two railroad lines. In 1859 he became associated with James Fisk and Daniel Drew. They controlled the Erie Railroad which they acquired from Cornelius Vanderbilt.

In 1969 Gould schemed to corner the gold market, causing one of the worst panics in United States history, and in 1872 he was forced completely out. During the 1880's he still had contol of the Union Pacific interests in the New York World and the Western Union Telegraph Company.

Along about this place in time "Jay" Gould came to Jefferson, Texas and offered the city officials to locate his railroad shops in Jefferson in exchange for a free rightaway.

Jefferson had a population of 30,000 or more and was a bustling town with river traffic of more than 200 river steamers unloading annually at its docks.

Citizens of Jefferson laughed when Gould wrote in the register of Jefferson's Old Excelsior House the following; "The end of Jefferson, Texas X."

After Gould was turned down he would wipe Jefferson off the map. He built his shops in the next town of Marshall, and bypassed Jefferson and within ten years he had reduced the former "Queen City of Texas" to a sleepy little village.

In later years one of his parlor cars was found abandoned nearby on an unused railroad spur. The town long after Gould was gone restored the parlor car and made it a tourist attraction. But Gould still had the last laugh because like the money-hungry railroad magnate wrote in the Excelsior House Register it really was "The End of Jefferson, Texas."

I heard that Unit 15 was out of electricity for two hours, on August 28th. With out the air conditioning, it was might hot, and the weather was real hot outside to.


