## Borden County Landfill TO REMAIN OPEN

The Borden County Commissioners' Court received work on Friday, October 6, 1995, from the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) had passed a rule delaying the implementation of SUB TITLE II for 2 years. This action will allow small rural landfills that hold an Arid Exemption to operate under the previous rules. The Borden County landfill meets these requirements and will remain open for the next two years or until October, 9, 1997.

Although it had been published in numerous newspapers that the rule had been passed earlier; actually, the rule was not official until Friday, October 6, 1995, when it was published in the Federal Register in Washington D.C.

For these small landfills to remain open after October 9, 1997, the Federal law must change. The change must allow small landfills that do not present a danger to the environment to operate in a manner that meets the needs of the local residents and meet local environ-

mental conditions.

The Borden County landfill will operate for the next two years on the present schedule. The landfill is open two days a week (every Wednesday afternoon and Saturday morning). The landfill will be inspected once a month by the Texas natural Resource Conservation Commission to monitor compliance of rules. The Borden County landfill has not received a negative inspection in the past year. The Borden County Commissioners' Court will strive to maintain an environmental acceptable facility for the welfare and convenience of Borden County residents as long as possible.

Hundreds of calls, letters, and telegrams from across rural America helped to persuade the EPA to delay implementation of Sub Title II. We can all thank those Borden County residents who took the time and effort to contact the officials in Washington, D.C.

All contributions will be used for the operation and maintenance of the "STAR" on Gail Mountain.

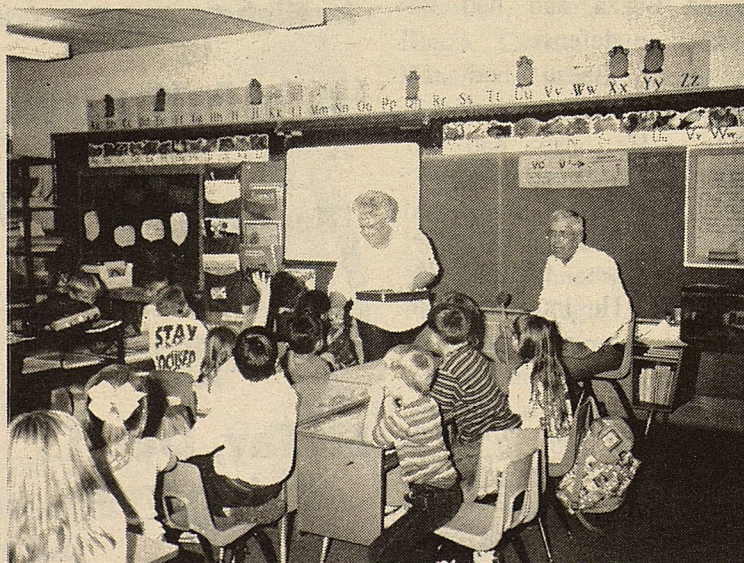

The Museum will be open from noon until after the ceremony. The program will consist of local music, a brief visit from Santa Claus and refreshments.

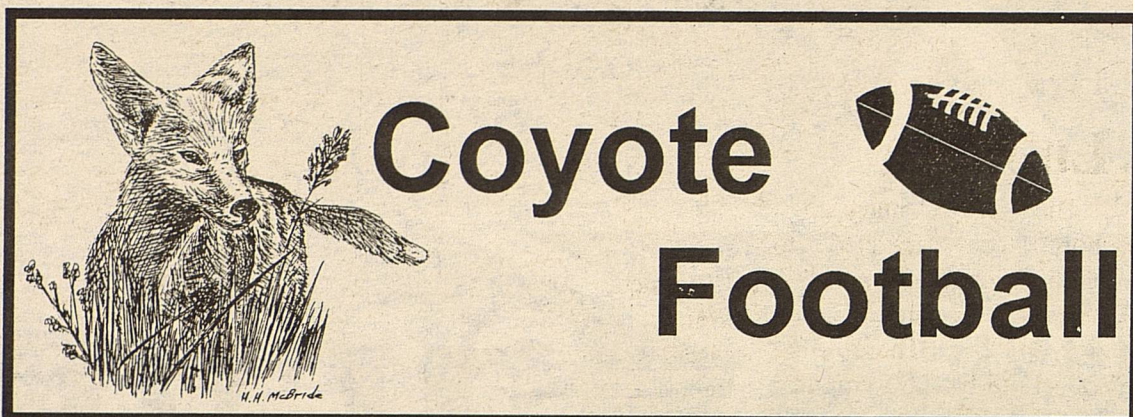
## Kindergarten & First Graders Learn About Bee Business!

## Coyote J.V. Avenges Early Season Loss 20-14

After a week off, the Borden County Junior Varsity traveled to Southland Thursday, October 5 with hopes of avenging a 39-18 loss two weeks earlier. This game was a good measuring stick for the young junior varsity Coyotes. The Coyotes were able to see if they had improved during this two week span. The Coyotes entered the game with a 1-1 record while the Eagles had an unblemished 3-0 record.

The 1st quarter proved to be a defensive struggle as neither team could mount much offense. The Coyotes managed a couple of 1st downs while the Eagles only managed a few yards. In fact, the quarter ended with the Coyotes in a punt situation.

The 2nd quarter started with one of two kicking mistakes that the Coyotes made as the Eagle punt returner returned the punt 57 yards before being tackled by Trini Vasquez at the Coyote 5 yard line. The runner fumbled the ball on the return and a teammate picked the ball up and carried it the remaining 5 yards for a touchdown. The extra points gave the Eagles an 8-0 lead without the luxury of having to make at least one 1st down.

The Coyotes came an eyelash from returning the kick-off, but were forced to start at their own 30 yard line. After a 1st down, the Coyotes were forced to give the ball over on downs. Again, the Coyotes played stingy defense and came away with their first 1st turnover of the game as Jeff Dennis intercepted an Eagle pass at the Coyotes' own 10 yard line. The Coyotes got on the board behind the strong running of Clint

Scott with a 66 yard scamper. The good blocking on the Coyote line led by James Nance, Clint Cowart and Jason Scott was a major force in this run. Clell Knight and Jeff Dennis also provided good blocking for this 66 yard touchdown run. The Coyotes missed the extra point and the trailed 8-6 with 2:00 minutes left in the 1st half. The Coyotes recovered an Eagle fumble, but were unable to convert as they turned the ball over on downs when they could not convert a 4 and 1 at the Eagle 10 yard line. The half time score was 8-6 in favor of the Eagles.

Borden County opened the 2nd half by stopping Southland on downs. This time the Coyotes used the fresh legs of Trini Vasquez and some good blocking to take the ball and drive it 55 yards for the touchdown. A couple of highlights of the drive were a 4th down pass play from Jeff Dennis to Clint Scott for 10 yards and a Trini Vasquez 2 yard TD run with 2:26 left in the 3rd quarter. Dennis kick gave the Coyotes a 14-8 lead.

Again, the Coyote defense of Dennis, Knight, Cesar Mujica, Preston Sharp, Jason Scott, Clint Scott and Vasquez held the Eagles to the final period of the game to cling to a 14-8 lead.

After a 1st down, Borden County was forced to punt. The Eagles blocked the punt and scooped it up and run it back to the Coyote 5 yard line. Three plays later, the Eagles tied the score at 14-14. Vasquez blocked the extra point kick and the game was tied with 5:52 remaining in the quarter. The Coyotes

## Coyotes Come From Behind to Defeat Union 28-21

The Borden County Coyote varsity squad traveled to Union Friday, October 6, to play the Wildcats in 6-man football action. The Coyotes took an early lead in the game scoring on touchdowns from Oscar Baeza from 1 yard out and another touchdown from Grant Key from 26 yards out. Key caught a 26 yard pass from quarter back Colt McCook. McCook kicked the PAT good and the score was 14-0.

The Wildcats scored the only TD of the 3rd period with a 3 yard plunge. The one point PAT was good to make the score 14-14.

Union held the Coyotes again and found the end zone early in the 4th period. The Wildcats scored 21 unanswered points on Borden County. It looked as if the Wildcats were in control of the game. But the Coyotes came alive in the 4th period and stepped their play up a notch to score 14 unanswered points of their own.

With 3:45 left in the game and behind 7 points, the Coyote defense blocked a Wildcat punt inside to 10 yard line. Fernando Baeza was the Coyote who got his hands on the ball, and Roy Clayton picked the ball up and ran it into the end zone. The PAT was barely wide for the "go ahead" points, so the Coyotes were still behind

by a point at 21-20.

The Borden County defense became really aggressive at this point. Roy Clayton and Fernando Baeza made big solo tackles on the Union runners. On 3rd down and 18 yards to go, Grant Key intercepted a Union pass on the Wildcats 35 yard line. On 3rd down and 10 yards to go from the 35 yard line, Oscar Baeza caught a Fernando Baeza pass and was tackled at the 4 yard line. On second down, with only :48 seconds left, Fernando Baeza followed blocks from Oscar Baeza and Colt McCook to go 1 yard to the end zone to go ahead. Colt McCook split the uprights on the PAT and the score was 21-28.

The Coyote offense had 183 total offense yards. The Wildcats had 270 total offense yards. Leading the Coyotes was Fernando Baeza with 12 carries for 75 yards and 1 TD. He threw a 33 yard pass to Oscar Baeza and had 24 tackles on defense.

Oscar Baeza had 14 carries for 49 yards and 1 TD. He also had 10 tackles on defense.

Grant Key caught a McCook pass for a 26 yard TD. He intercepted a Wildcat pass and had 21 tackles on defense.

Colt McCook completed 1 pass of 7 thrown for 26 yards and 1 TD. McCook had 12 tackles on defense and hit 2 PAT kicks for 4 points.

John Brummett and Roy Clayton had an excellent night on defense. Clayton had 11 tackles and Brummett had 5 tackles from the defensive end position.

Chris Harrison, Ryan Grant, Colt Miller and Peter Benevidez all saw action on both sides of the ball.

### COACH'S COMMENTS:

These young men refused to give up. Things weren't going their way after a great start in the game as the momentum was given to the Wildcats and the Coyotes began to play a little flat. With their backs against the wall and time running out, the Coyotes stepped up their play and took control of the game. These guys never died. 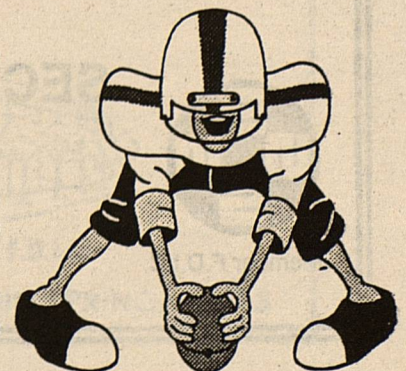

**What is Lupus?**

Lupus erythematosus is a chronic disorder of the immune system that causes inflammation of various parts of body. People with Lupus have immune system abnormalities. For most people, lupus is a mild disease affecting only a few body organs; for

others, it may cause serious and even life-threatening problems. Lupus can affect the skin, joints, kidneys, lungs, heart, nervous system, blood, and other body organs or systems.

**Three different  
types of Lupus:**

**Cutaneous Lupus (also known as Discoid Lupus)** confined to the skin and is characterized either by persistent flushing of the cheeks or disc-like lesions that appear on the face, neck, scalp, and other areas of the skin exposed to ultraviolet light.

**Systemic Lupus Erythematosus(SLE)** causes inflammation in a number of the organs of the body. In some individuals, this may mean skin and joint involvement, while in others the joints, lungs, kidneys and blood may be affected. The disease is characterized by periods in which few if any symptoms are evident (remission) and other periods in which it becomes active again (Flares, episodes).

**Drug Induced Lupus.**

Certain prescribed drugs can create a Lupus-like

syndrome which is similar to SLE but very rarely affects either the kidneys or the nervous system. The most commonly implicated drugs are hydralazine (used to treat hypertension) and procainamide (used to treat irregular heart rhythms). Only some people who take these drugs respond with drug-induced Lupus. When the medicine is used to treat hypertension) and



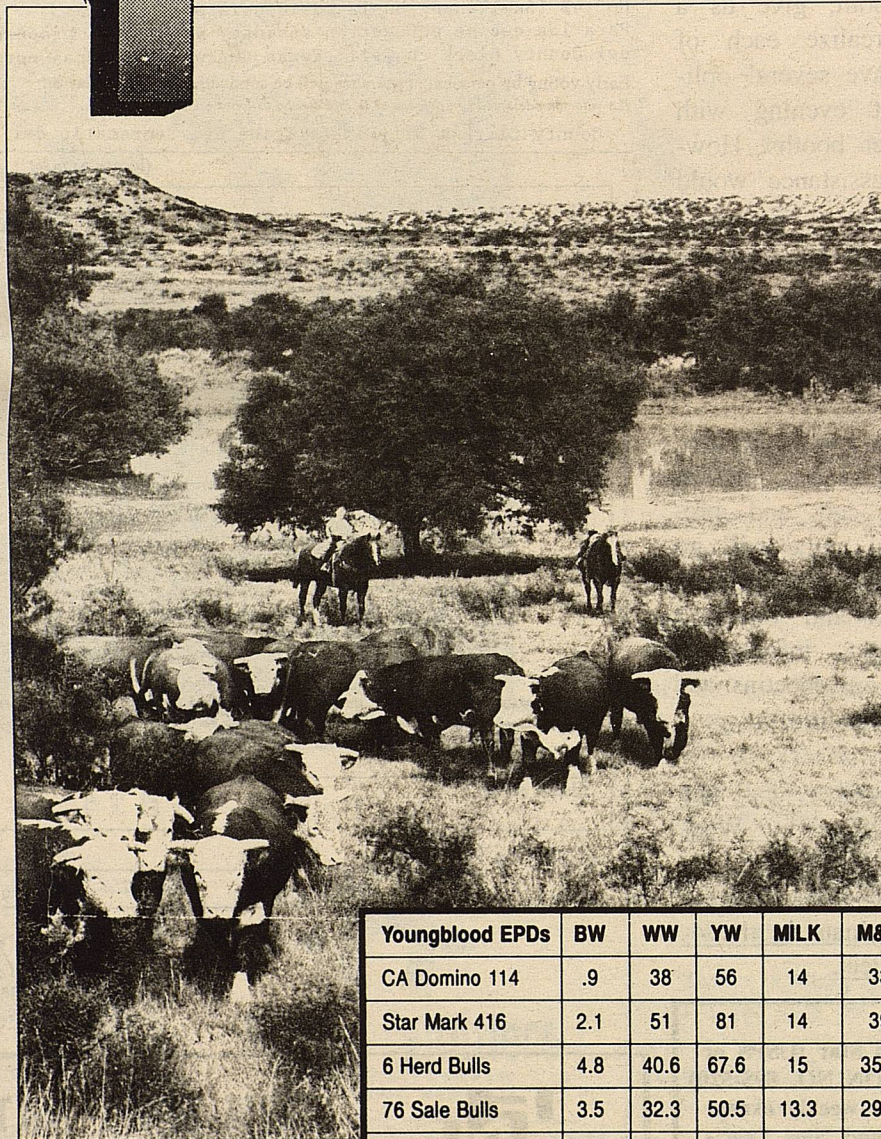


