



DIANA WINS \$1,000

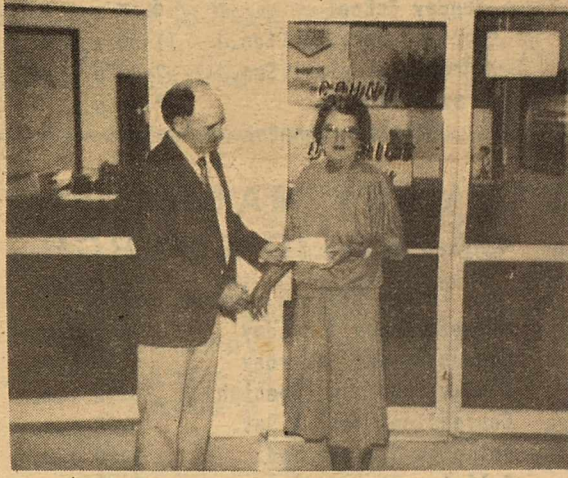

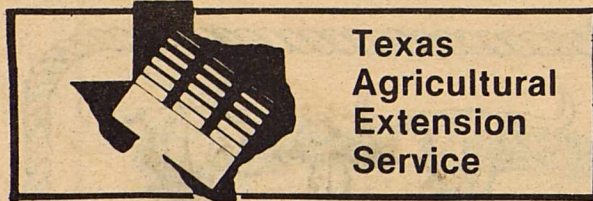
Also a short note to say that I have never seen Brackettville and Fort Clark Springs so unified. This is something that has been needed in all the years that I have lived here. It is nice to see.

It was good to finally receive some rainfall in a few areas of the county. We needed the rain but I am uncertain of how much it really helped some of our ranchers at this stage of the game.

I attended a very interesting tour in conjunction with the Governor's Conference in Del Rio the other day. We toured several ranching operations in Mexico and the program presented several ranching operations in Mexico and the program presented tour participants a look at agricultural diversification; which has become important in modern ranching. Also attending the tour and conference from Kinney County were Jimmy Bader, Bret Trant, Pat Rose III, Pat Rose Jr. and Joe York, Jr.

Now that fall is officially at hand, frost will be hitting Kinney County before long. This could present a prussic acid poisoning problem if we continue to have showers and there is enough moisture to produce certain grasses and get them actively growing again.

While many plants contain this toxic material that causes the poisoning in livestock, the greatest culprits are Johnson and Sudan grasses and Sorghum or hybrids of these that cause the highest mortality if livestock graze them after a heavy frost.

The most dangerous time for grazing of these plants is following frost when the plant begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed to have access to the wilted material until it has dried completely following three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes non toxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

Prussic acid poison acts very quickly and can kill animals within minutes. In most cases, animals become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic

material and can die in two to three minutes.

Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficulty in breathing, and frequent convulsions may also result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged through the tissues.

The key to preventing prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then keep cattle, sheep and goats from grazing such plants until a safe period of time has passed.

REFLECTIONS BY PRESTON TAYLOR FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

When Benjamin Franklin emerged from the Constitutional Convention, someone asked him what kind of government we would have. Franklin answered: "A republic, if you can keep it."

We need to take another long, hard look at ourselves. We need to see where we are and in which direction we are going. We need an awakening Our nation needs to "turn around". Will a genuine assessment come too late?

We will also answer any questions about the Fire Department, such as the equipment, training and members. We feel this is a Volunteer Department the people of Brackettville and Kinney County can take pride in. We appreciate all the support that we get and take pride in serving our community.

C/C SPOTLIGHT REVIEW:

KINNEY COUNTY WOOL & MOHAIR, INC.

Here is a business that surprises the uninformed mostly because of its name. It is much more than a wool and mohair business as we quickly learned from our research for this report. So sit tight and we'll take you on a whirlwind tour of the place.

KC Wool & Mohair has been around for about 29 years in its present location. It began as a wool and mohair warehouse offering only feed and salt supplies for ranchers. Starting as a branch facility of Uvalde Producers Wool & Mohair, it gradually expanded inventory over the years to become diversified in most of the consumer products used by ranchers, builders, and home craftsmen. Mr. Al Dishman, of Uvalde is the present owner.

Peak activity for wool and mohair warehousing occurs in the fall from August 15 to November 15, and in the spring, from February 1 to May 15. This is evident now when the warehouse is packed wall-to-wall with five foot tall burlap sacks, standing shoulder to shoulder like an army, filled with the crop of wool and mohair ranchers have so laboriously collected and delivered. Mohair from the angora goat and sheep wool are much in demand for the clothing industry of countries in the cooler northern latitudes. Almost 100% of the mohair and perhaps 50% of the wool is purchased by buyers, usually from Texas, who represent foreign manufacturers in England, Japan, Italy, and others. The warehouse holds the supply in safe-keeping until sold, mostly to buyers active in the international trade arena. Commissions earned are well deserved for the essential service that is provided to our ranchers and the export market.

During winter and drouth seasons, stock feed and hay is available for ranch livestock, as well as salt and mineral blocks. Deer corn, game blocks, wild bird seed, sunflower seed, and milo are sold year around for those who care about our wildlife creatures.

The central warehouse contains a huge inventory of hardware items. A main room is loaded with general hardware, and annex rooms containing electrical supplies, plumbing fittings, a good selection of spray paints, and standard house paints are stocked. Prices in general are quite competitive.

A separate warehouse contains a complete line of dimensional lumber, landscape timbers, concrete blocks, plywood sheeting, insulation rolls, reinforcement rods and remesh wire for concrete work, and sacked cement or concrete mix for small jobs around a home.

Veterinary medicine supplies include drenches, antibiotics, nutrients, wormers, and other items that may be special ordered. Pesticide supplies are available for home pest control, tree care, yard and garden maintenance, animal and pet care. Herbicide is sold for weed control, and a variety of soil nutrients can be purchased.

Miscellaneous items include: hunting equipment and supplies (weapons may be special ordered) ammunition of all types, and deer feeders. Riding tack, lariats, chaps, and bridles of many colors are also available. It pays to ask for what you want. If the item is not in stock, special orders can be filled for any hardware item, household appliances, and home or yard equipment.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

On the tenth of October, 1989, at 4:30 p.m., Mayor Vito La Gioia called the meeting to order. Councilmembers Fuentes, Broderick, Saenz, and Dimery, were present for the meeting.

The minutes of the regular meeting and the emergency meeting were accepted and approved. The emergency meeting concerned the new

chlorinators being installed.

The 911 Emergency numbers resolution was briefly discussed. For the city to accept this, the county must do likewise, due to the expense of this project however, as of this time, the county has not acted on it, so, it was tabled. It was reported that the valve for the gas sub-station, will be installed as soon as it arrives. This should be very soon. The resolution suggested by Mrs. Veltman regarding the city proclaiming Else Sauer week, was tabled, due to lack of information, regarding her specific accomplishments. This will be brought up again as soon as enough information can be gathered.

Insurance was discussed & several proposals were presented. By a unanimous decision the council voted on Blue Cross/Blue Shield in order to save money. The effective date of coverage will be October 15, 1989.

It was discussed and approved unanimously to revoke the police and fire fee of \$2.00.

The agreement between the city and county, regarding law enforcement protection of the whole county, in which, by request from the Sheriff to the City Chief of Police, or vice versa, either agency may work or assist the other in jurisdiction. The county has yet to act on this contract.

The Chief of Police, Johnny Fritter presented facts from the previous month. He performed police duties for a total of 262 1/2 hours, and nine arrests were made. In addition, numerous traffic citations were issued.

It was discussed and approved unanimously to write off delinquent accounts, totaling \$6,348.90. It was decided that it would be too expensive to collect these very old debts, some as old as

10 years.

David Tillery and David Martinez were praised by the council as being outstanding workers in the utility department.

Mayor La Gioia suggested that David Tillery be made the utility department supervisor receive a pay increase of \$1.50 per hour. This was approved by the council.

A second licensed operator for waste water is needed and this will be advertised in and outside of Brackettville. To be certified by the Texas Department of Health, there must be two licensed operators employed by the city.

In concluding the meeting the Mayor said that he feels that the city is doing great, and that he has excellent council support. He also added that any person of the city who may be interested can be taken on a tour to see for themselves.

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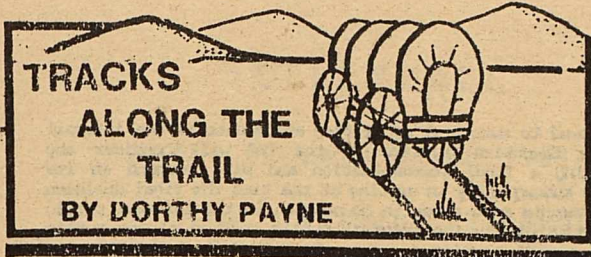
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In southeastern Grant County, dozes in the sun a former New Mexico attraction. Faywood Hot Springs was a desert health resort in the 1890's. After the turn of the century it lost its attraction. In 1951 Faywood visitors were few and far between.

Faywood was going great guns about the middle of the 19th century. People moving west found a welcome at Faywood. Many a broken dream was eased in the hot numbing waters.

The spring became more popular and as early as 1861 a pair of new immigrants, W. Watt and A. Khune staked a claim to the spring and built a crude bathhouse and a small hotel, about that time a bi-weekly stage began operating, connecting the towns of Pinas Altos to Mesilla, on the Rio Grande. When the passengers requested the stage would detour to the springs. Finally it became a regular over night stop for the stage.

Ownership passed into new hands, but there weren't any notable improvements at the springs.

In 1872 a man by the name of Colonel Richard Hudson, of money and vision took hold and further developed the springs. He named it the Hudson Hat Springs Sanitarium Co. A second connecting stage began operation, connecting Santa Fe with Las Angeles and added to the springs tourist attraction. For more than fifteen years the springs flourished, but in 1891 a fire almost destroyed the entire hotel. After the fire Hudson sold out. The new buyers J.C. Fay and William Lockwood reopened. The new owners renamed the springs, calling it Faywood, after themselves. The hotel was rebuilt, and renamed, "Casa de Consuelo. More than \$100,000 in 1891 was sunk into the 48 bedroom hotel. It was furnished in elegant style, and a fancy new bathhouse was built. Modern medicine came into being soon and Faywood declined rapidly, customers soon began to drift away.

A patron, Tom McDermott, however, stayed on and used the waters until he died at the age of 96 years. He sold bottled water for some time. Faywood died about this time also.

The hotel is gone now but, there still remains a camping area, with two rock pools of the hot springs healing water for any of the campers who still believe in the healing waters.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR A CLASS I HAZARDOUS WASTE STORAGE FACILITY PERMIT

U.S. AIR FORCE/LAUGHLIN AIR FORCE BASE, 47 AIG/CC, Laughlin AFB, Texas 78843-5000 has applied to the Texas Water Commission (TWC) for a permit (Proposed Permit No. HW-50258, EPA ID No. TX 2571524103) to operate a Class I hazardous industrial solid waste management facility at Laughlin Air Force Base. The permit would authorize operation of an existing all-weather container storage building having a total capacity of 18,000 gallons. The wastes managed at this facility are industrial hazardous wastes such as waste solvents, which are incidental to the maintenance and support of aircraft used to train U.S. Air Force pilots. The wastes managed are acutely hazardous, ignitable, toxic, corrosive, reactive, and EP toxic liquids, sludges and solids. Authorized wastes may be received from off-site federal facilities.

Laughlin Air Force Base occupies a 3,908-acre tract of land which is positioned along the southside of U.S. Highway 90, approximately 5.0 miles east of the Highway 90/San Felipe River Bridge in the City of Dal Rio, Val Verde County, Texas. This location is in the drainage area of Segment 2304 of the Rio Grande Basin (north latitude 29°21'15", west longitude 100°47'30").

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will authorize the continued operation of this facility under the terms described above. The Executive Director has also prepared a summary of the applicant's compliance history at this facility, copies of which are available upon request.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended; Section 4(e) of the Solid Waste Disposal Act (Article 4477-7, Texas Revised Civil Statutes); 31 TWC Chapters 305 and 335 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

This notice satisfies the requirements of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA), as amended, 42 U.S.C. §5901 et seq. and 40 CFR §124.10. The draft permit, if issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), will implement the requirements of the Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments of 1984 (HSWA), amending the Federal Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended. The TWC and the EPA have entered into a joint permitting agreement whereby permits may be issued in Texas in accordance with the Texas Solid Waste Disposal Act, Article 4477-7, V.A.C.S. and HSWA until the State hazardous waste program receives interim or final authorization under RCRA to administer the requirements of the HSWA. In order for the applicant to have a fully effective RCRA permit, both the TWC and the EPA must issue the permit. All permit provisions are fully enforceable under Texas law after issuance by the TWC. Permit requirements implemented under the HSWA will be enforceable by EPA.

The TWC will provide an informal public hearing session if a written notice of opposition and request for hearing is received within 45 days of the date of publication of the notice of application. The written notice of opposition and request for such hearing must be accompanied by a statement that an aesthetic, conservational, recreational or economic interest of the requestor is or may be adversely affected by the granting of the application. It is presumed that residents, property owners or individuals doing business in the local area meet this

test. Any person will be allowed to make oral or written statements at the informal public hearing session. The Executive Director of the TWC will consider any information submitted in making a final recommendation and will respond in its recommendation to the TWC, and subsequently in writing at the time the final decision is made, to any significant comments made at or in connection in the informal public hearing session. EPA may participate in the informal public session of the public hearing.

No evidentiary public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested an evidentiary public hearing. Any such request for an evidentiary public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request, and (2) a brief description of how the requestor, or persons represented by the requestor, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the TWC determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the permit decision, or that an evidentiary public hearing would serve the public interest, the TWC shall conduct an evidentiary public hearing, after issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 45 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the TWC for final decision on the application.

The Texas Air Control Board (TACB) may appear at a public hearing and participate as a party to address air quality aspects of the application, pursuant to the Texas Solid Waste Disposal Act, (Article 4477-7, Texas Revised Civil Statutes). The TACB will regulate air emissions from the facility through special provisions in any permit which is issued.

Requests for a public hearing and/or requests for further information concerning any aspect of the application should be submitted in writing to Claire P. Aronson, Assistant Chief Hearings Examiner, Texas Water Commission, P. O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711, Telephone 512/463-7875. Written comments on the application should be submitted to the same address within 45 days of the date of publication of the notice of application.

Persons wishing to comment or request a hearing on a requirement under the Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments of 1984 (HSWA) should ALSO notify, in writing, the Chief of the Hazardous Waste Permits Branch, EPA Region 6, 1443 Ross Avenue, Dallas, Texas 75202-2733. EPA will accept hearing requests submitted to the Texas Water Commission (TWC).

TEACHING TEXAS STYLE

Mr. and Mrs. Ernst-Gunter Freder of Berlin, West Germany visited Brackettville last week to check on the Berlin-Texas-Teachers' Exchange Program in which computer teacher Eberhard Kunze is involved.

The program allows Germans to teach in Texas for one to three years and Texas Teachers have the opportunity to visit there for three weeks. Brackettville teacher, Billie Foust visited Germany last summer. "It was super! There was a group of 22 Texas teachers. We visited the schools learning about their school system. But, we also toured the city, as well as Austria and Italy. Everyone was very hospitable," said Foust.
