

# REFLECTIONS BY PRESTON TAYLOR FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

Have you ever lost any valuable possessions? Kind expressions of gratitude are frequently lost or over looked by most of us.

I never did tell Mr. Hinton the high school baseball coach in the small school I attended (28 in the senior class) - "thank you, sir" for letting me be the baseball catcher for three years. Nor did he ever hear me say a word of gratitude for the math he taught us back during that time.

Mr. Atkins taught Chemistry and Algebra in our high school. He was tremendous man -- with most of his left ear missing because of an accident. He failed to hear " thank you" from ninety - eight percent of his labors. students for his Neither did our Biology teacher have students standing at his door to express appreciation for his faithful teaching. We just had not been taught to do those things.

Mrs. Dowdy and Miss Carroll were two of the greatest English Grammar, Literature, Speech and teachers any school ever had. Most of us failed to encourage them by words of praise. Mrs. Dowdy died at ninety years of age. She answered my thank you not a few years ago, deeply grateful that someone remembered her in her sunset years of life.

Mr. Bolen, our High School Principal, taught He was a tough Geometry. hombre! I did not write him in his retirement years and that I still remind him "a straight remember that line is the shortest distance between two points: but that I probably couldn't tell him today the difference between a right angle and an isosceles triangle.

Mr. Davidson was disappointed that I didn't go beyond the required second year in his Agriculture and Shop classes. He wanted me to stay on a cotton farm and I wanted to leave it! Some Church members have wondered through the years why I don't go back there!

Gratitude? Yes, I owe this to my small town high school teachers who together



had around 300 years in public education - not to mention the superb elementary teachers. Now most of them can't hear me say "Thank you."

But to the Lord of glory, I owe more -- so much more. Maybe we all should stop today and say "thank you, Lord" for all you do for us!





# FIREFIGHTERS support PROPOSITION 17

THE BRACKETTVILLE VOLUNT-EER FIRE DEPARTMENT ASKS THE VOTERS OF KINNEY COUNTY TO VOTE "YES" ON AMENDMENT 15 &

AMENDMENT NO. 15

House Joint Resolution 32, proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit and regulate raffles conducted by certain nonprofit organizations for charitable purposes. (HOUSE AUTHOR: Terral Smith; SENATE SPONSOR: Bill Ratliff)

The proposed amendment to Article III, Section 47, of the Texas Constitution would allow the legislature by general law to authorize charitable raffles conducted by qualified religious societies, volunteer fire departments and emergency medical services, and other nonprofit organiztions.

#### AMENDMENT NO. 17

House Joint Resolution
33, proposing a constitutional
amendment to authorize the
state to provide scholarships,
grants, loans, and other
financial assistance to local
fire departments and other
public fire-fighting
organizations. (HOUSE AUTHOR:
Rick Perry: SENATE SPONSOR:
Gonzalo Barrientos)

The proposed amendment to Article III of the Texas Constitution would add Section 51-a-1, which would allow the legislature to authorize by general law the use of public money to provide certain assistance assistance to local fire departments and other public fire-fighting organizations and allow the use of public money for the administrative costs of the assistance program. The assistance could take the form of scholarships and grants for education and training and loans or other financial assistance for the purchase of fire-fighting equipment and facilities or equipment required by law. The legislature by law would provide for the conditions of the assistance.



# TRACKS ALONG THE TRAIL BY DORTHY PAYNE

One of the most unusual con men was a Pawnee Indian, traveling with the Pawnee Bill and Buffalo Bill Wild West Show in the early 1900's.

This combination of shows toured big cities. There were cowboys, Indians, cowgirls, vaqueros, covered wagons and stage coaches. They held shows from New York to Denver and stops, all along the way.

While the show was playing in Madison Square Garden, between acts some city slickers decided to have a little sport with one of the Indians. They happened to pick on a Pawnee, wearing eagle feathers, war paint, beaded leggings, breech-cloth, dance bells and a brightly colored shirt.

The bartender at the Garden Bar plied him with free drinks. Pawnee Bill had asked his Indians not to speak English in order to seem more fierce. So he used sign language and grunted a lot. He wasn't born yesterday though, and had gone to school in Carlisle. So he just glared at his tormenters, which made them heckle him all the more.

When the party began to glow, the Indian asked for a saucer of water and the bar tender obliged, From his beaded pipe bag the chief took some horse hairs and dropped one into the saucer of water and folding his arms like he had seen the Indians do in the movies he spoke in broken

English. He told his audience he was a medicine man with heap big magic and said; "Hair turn to smoke!" Before their very eyes the hair began to move and appeared to swim. He put more horse hairs into the water and they swam too. By now he had the audience watching his every move. He took cockleburs from his bag that were painted white. He gave an elaborate speech about them and said they were porcupine eggs and sold them to the people until they were all gone, for one dollar each. He sold them handfuls of sumac for two dollars saying it was Indian Health tobacco.

Then, he wrapped some horse hairs in a cigarette paper and said they were doit-yourself snake kits. They sold like hotcakes. Then, he took an eagle feather from his head dress and borrowed a pocket knife and where ever he moved the knife the feather followed.

He stayed so late he stuffed his money into his pipe bag and ran for the depot but he had missed the show train that was going to their next engagement in Pittsburg. He knew some Carlisle friends in Brooklyn who put him on a fast train to Pittsburg and he made it just in time for the show.

Back in the bar in Pawnee, Oklahoma, the story was laughed over for years. As everyone knows a horse hair soaked in water will twitch when its segments form air pockets. And everyone knows a feather can be blown which ever way you want it to go. I wonder if any of the porcupine eggs ever hatched for the suckers who bought them?
