


MISS TEXAS VISITS BRACKETTVILLI BY LASHAWN WARDLAW

Kuehne said posing in front of the Alamo in a bathing suit during the middle of winter could possibly be her most memorable moment as Miss Texas U.S.A.



The talented team of three will complete their Texas Beauty trip Monday, December 11th in Wimberly photographing Miss Rodeo Texas 1989.




# FT. CLARK HAS NEW ASSISTANT MANAGER

## CECILIA AGUIRRE WINS LOCAL COMPETION

Cecilia Aguirre, a 7th grade student at Brackettville Jr. High School, has taken the first step to becoming an internationallyrecognized artist by winning a local competition sponsored by the Brackettville Lions Club.

Cecilia Aguirre's poster is among thousands of entries submitted worldwide in the second annual Lions Clubs International Peace Poster-Contest.

Cecilia Aguirre, the thirteen year old from Brackettville, had a poster that best portrayed the contest's theme, "Picture a Peaceful World."

Brackettville Lions Club President Clifford Lewis said he was pleased with all the work the Brackettville students put into the project. "From looking at all the entries, it was obvious all the students really gave the matter a lot of thought," said Lion Lewis.

Cecilia Aguirre's poster now advances to round-two district competiton in San Antonio where her entry will compete against entries from many other schools in the area.

Aguirre's poster will face stiff competiton through the district round and in three more rounds of international competition if she is to be declared the international grand prize winner.

Lions Clubs International is sponsoring the contest to underscore the importance of world peace to young people everywhere.

Cecilia Aguirre will receive a \$50.00 savings bond from the Brackettville Lions Club. Ultimately, one grand prize winner will be selected from 24 international finalists. The grand prize includes a cash award of \$1,500 plus an all expense paid trip for the winner and two family members to New York City for the awards ceremony at the United Nations in March 1990. As Merit Award winners the remaining 23 finalists each will receive certificates and a cash award of \$250.00.

"We know Cecilia has a long way to go, but we're all cheering for her," Lion Lewis said.

#### MEMORIAL FUND

The Kinney County Memorial Fund Committee met November 30, 1989 at the clinic at 7:00 p.m. The Meeting was called to order by President Sid Sponholtz. Attending were Agapito Saenz, Alfred Pena, Carlota Wright, Charles Wilson, Joan Boutwell, Marge Geeze, Bill Herman, Amy Cupps, Sid Sponholtz, Kay Smith, Else Sauer, J. Lee Ballantyne, Adrian Reyes, Jr., Bob McCall, Rose Mary Slubar and Pat Parks.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Mr. Sponholtz read a State of Texas "Verification of Compliance" dated April 3, 1989. This verification was the result of the clinic's correction of the previously identified building deficiencies. The only item not yet corrected is the installation of a drinking fountain accessible to the physically handicapped. The money for the fountain has been received from the New World Study Club as promised.

There was discussion concering insurance for the clinic. The matter was tabled until later.

Mr. Sponholtz noted that the United Medical Center pays all repairs needed on the clinic and upkeep of the building grounds, plus \$400.00 a month rent. He also noted that it has been three years since the renovation of the clinic and that only recently a few minor repairs were necessary. The condition of the clinic has been brought up to A-1 shape and many favorable comments have been received about its excellence. Marge Geeze stated that she has heard many fine compliments on services provided by clinic personnel.

Rose Mary Slubar displayed the new sign she had made to replace the previous one which had been damaged. The sign says in both Engligh aand Spanish "No person shall be denied service due to their inability to pay." She said, however, that the sign does not mean there is no effort put forth to collect bills due.

Kay Smith presented the financial report and explained the various aspects contained in it. The full report is included in these minutes. We have only one more payment left to make this year on our loan from the bank and Mr. Sponholtz stated that there is no pressure from the bank to collect it immediately. Kay Smith recommended that we put our funds in a savings account. Joan Boutwell made a motion to that effect and it was seconded by Marge Geeze. The vote in favor was unanimous. Bob McCall moved approval of the treasurer's report and Bill Herman seconded the motion. The vote in favor was unanimous.

There was discussion about the use and repair of the ambulance which is owned by Kinney County. Kay Smith told us she is in



charge of its upkeep and that it is serviced after every run.

Rose Mary Slubar made a motion that we keep Any Cupps and Agapito Saenz for a second 2 year term as trustees, and Tim Ward for one more year. The vote in favor was unanimous. Bob McCall nominted Bill Herman to fill the position of trustee for a 1 year period. Agapito Saenz seconded the motion. The vote in favor was unanimous.

Charles Wilson was elected Vice President by a unanimous vote.

Else Sauer inquired as to the date speicfied in our constitution for our annual meeting and was informed that it is the second Monday in October. There was a discussion

about the By-Laws requirement for a quorum. It was considered that 50% is too high. Joan Boutwell proposed that we cut it to 40% and Bob McCall seconded the motion. The vote in favor was unanimous. Because the committee has 34 members, 14 will be sufficient to consitute a quorum.

It was noted that all organizations whose representatives do not participate on the Clinic Committee should be so notified and requested to appoint someone who wishes to be active.

The Verification of Compliance and the Building Use Agreement are included in these minutes. The meeting adjourned.

House Speaker Gib Lewis has recognized Harrison's dedication and hard work during his four terms and has appointed Harrison to several key committees and task forces. Recently Harrison was appointed to the Governor's Task Force on Waste Management Folicy.

Harrison also was appointed to the Texas Agricultural Diversification Board. This board assists all areas of the state by awarding grants to non-profit groups to study and evaluate diversified agricultural products. For example, grants were awarded to study feasibility of a tanning plant for leather in South Texas and to do research for the cashmere industry in San Angelo.

In the 71st Legislature, Harrison sponsored legislation that provided for a constitutional amendment, that passed, asking the people to approve \$70-million in general obligations bonds to be available to the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority to finance agricultural processing plants and provide lcans for small businesses in the rural areas of the state.

During his first three terms, Harrison gained valuable experience serving on the House Appropriations Committee, the budget writing team for the House. Other committees Harrison has served on are Environmental Affairs and County Affairs.

"My experience on the appropriations committee allows me to have, first-hand experience on how to retain funding for Sul Ross State University and other crucial state agencies serving West Texas," Harrison said.

"Representing District 68 is an honor and a responsibility that I sincerely appreciate and accept. I am grateful for the support of my constituents and family through the years, and I hope to continue serving and working with the

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people of District 68," Harrison said.

## STATE REPRESENTATIVE DUDLEY HARRISON


FILES FOR FIFTH TERM FOR DISTRICT 68

Incumbent State Rep. Dudley Harrison, D-Sanderson, filed December 4 for a fifth term as state representative for District 68.

This district is the largest legislative district in Texas and included Val Verde, Brewster, Kinney, Maverick, Pecos, Presidio and Terrell counties.

Harrison currently serves as chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture and Livestock, which handles legislation affecting areas of Texas agriculture. This committee oversees 11 state agricultural agencies.

Harrison also serves on the House Committee of State Affairs which has jurisdiction over questions and matters relating to general state policy and government, such as ethics issues. This committee oversees more than 20 state agencies and institutions and considered nearly 500 bills during the 71st Legislature.



#### J. LEE HILL BALLANTYNE

Mrs. Burn (J. Lee) Hill Ballantyne was born in 1901 at Falcon, Colorado east of Colorado Springs, Colorado. Her dad was F. D. Hill a Texas cowboy and her mother was a southern belle.

A brother was born in 1905 and about that time they moved to Mangus, Colorado. Her father became a minister and his first pastorate was there. Her father was one of the first people to see and explore the Mesa Verde area.

In 1906 she saw her first automobile, a Busch. The whole town was excited -- because someone in a Busch car had made it to the top of Pikes Peak. The Hill family had a horse and buggy for transportation. It had two seats and was called a "hack."

They moved to Washington State. One summer they took a wonderful vacation by train. From Washington to California, to Austin and on to Alabama. They visited relatives in Austin and Alabama. From Alabama they traveled on to Chicago, St. Paul and into Canada. She and her brother were so excited as they ate on the train all the time and got to eat all the shredded wheat for breakfast that they wanted. She never forgot that wonderful trip.

Shortly after that the family moved to Austin. J. Lee stopped at Sul Ross in Alpine and attended one year. She has the distinction of being a student there the first year Sul Ross was opened. She then attended San Marcus Baptist Academy in Austin and graduated in 1919.

When the family moved to Brackettville she was introduced to Burn Ballantyne by Mary E. Kreiger's aunt. They were married one year later. She remembers a favorite spot for the young people was a place on the right side of the road on Pinto Creek. They used to gather for swimming and picnicing. The boys would swing out over the water and drop into the water.

There was a silent movie theatre in Brackett and Mr. Riley, a soldier, played the piano for sound. Mr. Riley married a local lady named Nance and they had a son, Bill.

They had many dances at the school house which were family affairs and lots of fun. Mr. Riley or some of the band from Fort Clark played at these dances or whoever came with an instrument. Mr. Henry Veltmann was a wonderful dancer and never missed a dance.

Mr. and Mrs. Ballantyne had one daughter, Susie, who is married to Hollis Brice of Midland, Texas. Mr. Brice is a geologist and they have three children.

Mr. Ballantyne's family came to Brackett at the end of the Civil War. His grandmother was the first school teacher in Brackettville. His father was a partner in Peterson & Co. and later Burn worked for them when they first married. During WW II he bought a variety store, they were called 10 cent stores in those days. It was located next to the Evans building in front of First State Bank. Mrs. Ballantyne made a buying trip twice a month to San Antonio for supplies. She said they sold everything they could purchase.

Late in the war there was a 12,000 member Black Regiment here and the 5th Cavalry was gone.

During that time they started to have a shortage of teachers. J. Lee started to teach during the school year and went to school at Sul Ross in the summers. It took her seven summers to obtain her degree. She taught 25 years in the Brackett School System.

The Black Regiment left and the Fort closed down. The economy went bad and they closed the variety store. Mr. Ballantyne and Happy Shahan went into partnership and opened the Shaker Feed & Lumber Co. Mr. Ballantyne passed away in 1967. The wool and mohair was just getting started and the business was closed.

Mrs. Ballantyne is 88 years old and has had an interesting life. She has traveled to Europe and all over the U. S. She loves the West, especially Big Bend. She and Mr. Ballantyne explored Big Bend extensively before the park was established.

She says she is never lonely. Books are her friends. She reads everything from novels to history. She stays very busy and has lived in the same house for 66 years, a wedding present from her father-in-law.



#### HOLE IN ONE

Monday, December 4, at the weekly Monday Morning Scramble at Fort Clark Springs, Patty Barnett became the first woman to hit a holein-one at the 9-Hole golf course.

This is Barnett's first Texas hole-in-one. She had her first and only other one at Briarbrook in Joplin, Missouri. "I was surprised to get this one," said Barnett. Barnett is no newcomer, she has been playing for 25 years.


Barnett was awarded \$50 and her name will be inscribed on a plaque at the Adult Center at Fort Clark.

Sometimes called "bear grass," or "soap weed," but is correctly called "Yucca Glauca" in the botanical world, but in our part of the world is called "Candles of the Lord."

Along in the spring when wild flowers begin to show, these yucca plants gain foot holds in the country side. "The Candles of the Lord" has many uses, if you know how to go about it.

The Yucca belongs to the onion family, also akin to the lily family. Its creamy blossoms grow from the center of lance - like spikes. The blossoms have long been used for food. The petals are each pulled from the bloom, soaked in brine, rinsed and cooked in batter like eggplant is sometimes cooked.

Cactus candy made with yucca flavoring is delicious. Shoes are made in Mexico from the spiked fiber and so are ropes, mats, baskets, and rugs. Pioneers once used the plant as soap to wash their hair and clothes.

The yucca like other plants with large white blossoms depends upon night-flying insects for polonization. One such insect is the Pronuba Moth. The female knows what is her duty. So she gathers the pollen from the big white blossom, rolls it into a ball, then carries it by wing power to another plant where she lays it onto the stigme of the other plant, then she lays her eggs in the ball. Caterpillars eat some of the eggs but enough eggs remain to grow into seeds, which would produce another blooming plant in the spring.

Let's hope the yucca can be protected for its many uses but most of all for the beauty of its creamy white blossoms that are "Candles of the Lord."


First UMC will sponsor a covered dish dinner December 10 at 5:30 P.M. honoring its "Winter Texans." The public is invited to attend both events.

If our homeowners' association pla shrubs and trees in a park or a right-of-way our subdivision, and we give the land to i city, do we have to pay sales tax on the cc of landscaping?

Dear B.H.:

If your homeowners' association gives t park or easement to a public entity such as city or county, the association does not o sales tax on the landscaping. Instead, give t landscaper an exemption certificate stati that the park or right-of-way has be dedicated to the city or county.

But if your association retains ownersh of the park or right-of-way, it owes sales t on the landscaping, even if the general publ has access to the property.

Our company is considering hauli infectious waste from doctors' offices. Th isn't part of the dumpster removal service. T waste will be hauled in special containers refrigerated trucks. The types of waste expect to haul are needles, cotton, gauze a other materials that touch the patient. Shou sales tax be collected on this service? A.L.

Provided your service falls under Tex Department of Health or federal Environment Protection Agency regulations, and the waste "hazardous" according to their guidelines, th your charges aren't taxable.

Our company buys wood, nails and oth materials to build crates to ship purchases our customers. Should we pay sales tax on t building materials?

Dear C.S.:

Materials such as wood and nails aren' taxable if they are used to build nonreturnabl crates to ship products to your customers Wrapping, packaging and packing supplies use as part of selling goods are exempt from sale and use tax.
