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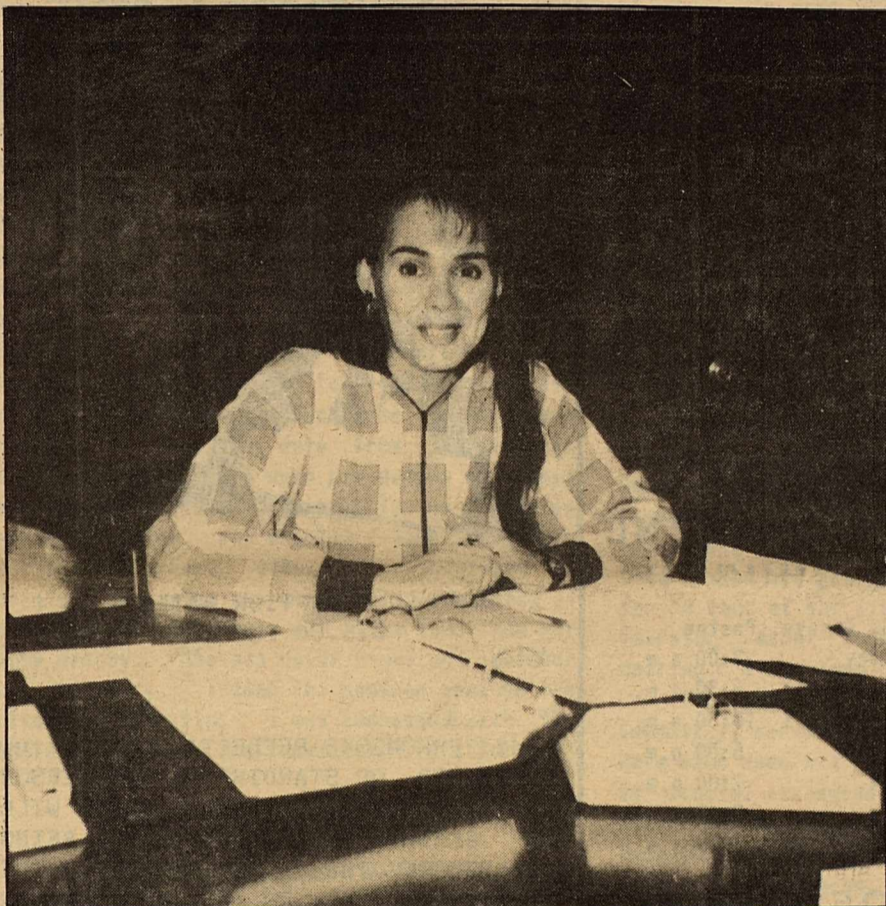

MARY LA GIOIA CERTIFIED BY TEC



Mary La Gioia, pictured above, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. G.C. Talamantez, was certified Tuesday in Uvalde, Texas as a Certifying Agent for the Texas Employment Commission for the DUA (Disaster Unemployment Assistance) Program.

Mrs. La Gioia started work Monday, January 29th. Her office is located in the County Judge's Conference Room in the Court House. This is a temporary assistance program to help the farm workers that have lost work or their jobs on farms due to the recent freeze. The JTPA is financing this program and will be placing these people in new jobs that are available. The length of this program is not known, it may be two or three weeks or maybe longer.

Just recently Mrs. La Gioia was a casting Director and starred in the movie, Gun Smoke II, The Last Apache. Part of the movie was filmed at Alamo Village. Mrs. La Gioia said the movie will be on TV sometimes in February.

Mary La Gioia is a Brackettville resident and wife of our City Mayor, Vito La Gioia.

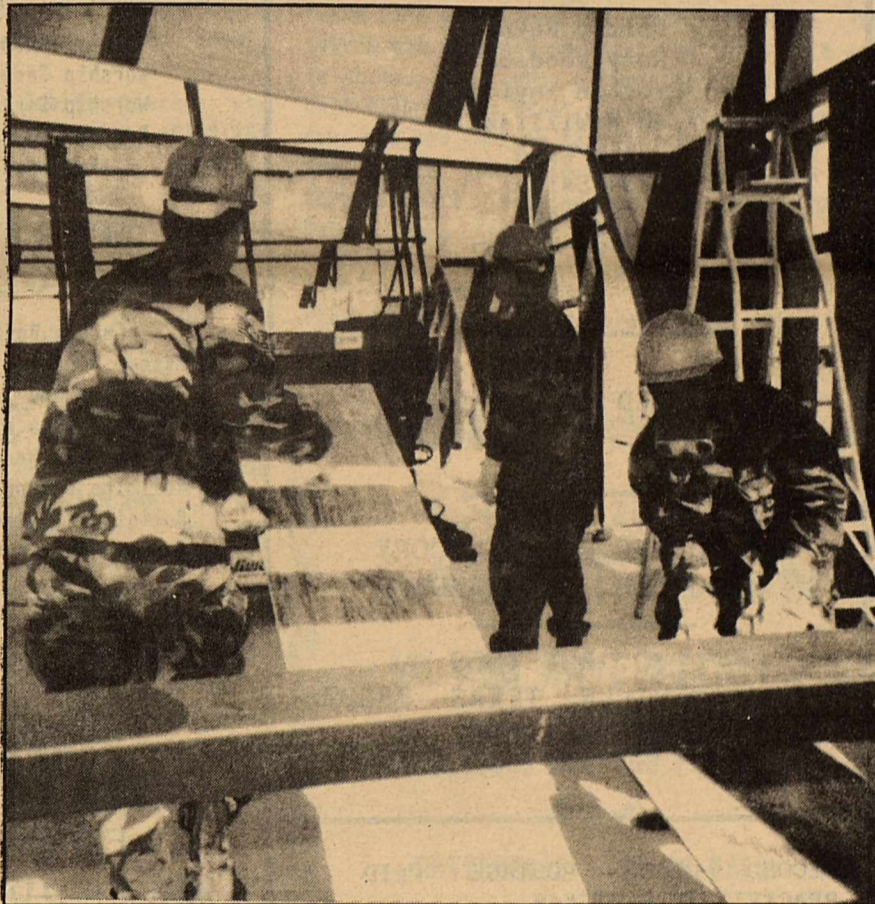
CARE ATTENDS SENATE HEARING IN HOUSTON

The Texas State Senate Committee on Natural Resources conducted a second scheduled hearing on so-called NORM (Naturally Occurring

Radioactive Material) at the University Hilton Hotel in Houston, Texas on Thursday, Jan. 25th, 1990. Committee members in attendance were Senators Santiesteban (Chairman) Ratliffe, Sims, and Zaffirini, Representative Harrison sat with the panel as a guest.

The morning was devoted to witnesses invited by the committee staff as experts. Most of these individuals were either members or associates of industries involved in creation of radioactive wastes. Witnesses from the petroleum, fertilizer, and water treatment industries were generally of opinion that the materials generated can best be handled by the industries themselves, on site where separated, and therefore should not be transported, concentrated, and buried at

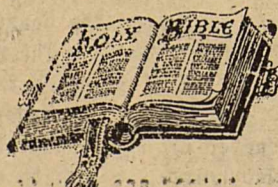

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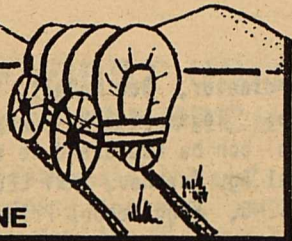

TRACKS ALONG THE TRAIL BY DORTHY PAYNE



In Paint Rock, Texas the seat of Concho county, there are more than fifteen hundred Indian paintings on the rocks, up until the early part of the nineteenth century only the landowners and their friends had seen them. One of the land owners sons opened the site to the public. He conducted tours to the Indian paintings which was the largest in Texas. The site is near Paint Rock, and there are also artifacts of at least a thousand years old. To the primitive people this was an ideal campsite with water available in the nearby Concho and the bluff behind afforded protection. The cliffs face south which is a natural solar collector in the winter. In the summer there is the river breeze and shade trees. The tour to the site is only a mile long. There is plenty of fish in the river and an abundance of wild plums for the picking. For the paintings the Indians used red pigment and some orange, white and black. They mixed the paint with hematite which made it stronger and more lasting. Probably there were many more paint sites at one time but they couldn't last forever. Some were lost to the sun, wind and rain and sometimes the rock itself simply wore away. The drawings date from pre-historic times. The symbols were pre-native and some are later, showing english influence, such as horses, rifles, and wheels. Some are merely territory markers, others are signatures of chiefs. One tells the story of a kidnapping of a girl, fourteen year old Alice Todd from her home nearby. She was never found and neither was her body. I took the pontoon boat up the river to the site. I was impressed with the isolated camp and the convenience it afforded.

And the person who drains off all he can for himself from the world (the government, community, or neighbors), does not live an abundant life. Selfishness slaughters a person. Self giving enhances one's days.

Jesus left us an example of a perfect life. That living Lord and Saviour offers an abundant life now. He equips us to say: "This is the day which the Lord hath made, let us rejoice and be glad in it." Can we afford to miss the kind of living?

any dump. In fact, the point was made that current wide dispersal of industry wastes results in less public hazard than the transportation, handling, and storage process. This is especially reasonable in view of the probability of accidents and spillage involved in the movement of huge quantities of materials from hundreds or even thousands of points of origin.

During the afternoon public testimony was heard. Several members of CARE, Kinney County testified. In addition to re-emphasizing previous testimony at San Antonio, CARE witnesses called attention to new and more ominous information in a government sponsored study by the National Research Council, issued in December, 1989. The study dealt with long term human health hazards of low level exposure to radiation, which was reported to be up to four times greater than previously reported in 1980 by the same organization. The new study points to much greater incidence of solid tumor cancer and leukemia, and in addition warns of a much greater danger of mental retardation in infants exposed prior to birth. CARE witnesses, in response to committee questions, reported that community and official opposition to the Texcor dump location in Kinney County is unchanged.

Mr. Khosrow Simnani, from Utah, testified during the afternoon. Mr. Simnani is owner and operator of the only approved and licensed storage facility for NORM wastes in the United States. He described the location of his business, which is 35 miles from the nearest human habitation, and in an area receiving less than 5 inches annual rainfall. He also described the regulatory system in Utah, and listed several of the legal requirements involved in locating any future dump. No license can be granted where the distance to the nearest home is less than 5 miles. Other mandates relating to aquifers, climate, drainage, transport and handling were described. Mr. Simnani, although not among the witnesses called by the committee staff, was the most convincingly expert witness of the day, because he is the only person in the nation who actually operates a storage dump for NORM waste, and because he has been involved in the Utah program since its beginnings.

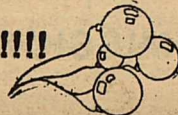



We had a very successful junior livestock show and sale last week. The Kinney County 4-H Club is an active, growing organization and depends on the support of this community for a number of projects and activities. On behalf of the 4-H Club, I would like to say thanks to all the persons that were able to attend our show and support our 4-H Club members, not only with the livestock show, but with all the projects our members are involved with throughout the year. Whether you are a 4-H adult volunteer leader or just a "friend" to the 4-H Club, thank you for your time and your investment in our young people's future.

Cold temperatures have taken their toll on our ornamental plants around town. How do you know if your plants have sustained freeze damage? Well, aside from the obvious features, you will not really know until this summer as to what extent the plants were damaged. However, if dead leaves remain on freeze damaged plants, injury is likely to be more severe than those plants that have dropped their leaves.

Homeowners can take steps to help reduce the potential for more injury if we have another freeze or these early morning light freezes.

(1) Keep plants well watered. Moisture amounts for the most part have been insufficient and could contribute to additional loss. Irrigating landscape plants throughout the winter especially broadleaf evergreens, can help reduce the effects of cold injury.

Six counties have been added to the President's January 10 disaster declaration that resulted from severe freezing during December 1989. As a result of this declaration individuals in Kinney, Maverick, Uvalde, Zavala, Dimmit and Frio counties who became unemployed because of the severe weather will be able to file claims for Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) for a period of thirty days from January 25, 1990. The last date for individuals to file in these counties will be February 24, 1990.

Recent changes in the law regarding Disaster Unemployment Assistance have resulted in altered eligibility requirements. Claimants must apply for regular unemployment insurance benefits when they apply for DUA. If it is determined that a claimant is eligible for UI benefits, those benefits must be exhausted prior to receiving DUA. To be eligible for DUA, individuals must have worked or been scheduled to work in the disaster area, but because of the disaster no longer had a job, a place to work in the area, or could not get to their place of work because of disaster damage; or, they must have been prevented from working by an injury or illness that resulted from the disaster; or, must have become the head of a household and need employment because the head of the household died as a result of the disaster. This assistance is also applicable to self-employed individuals who have lost all or part of their livelihood as a result of this disaster. Each claim is considered individually, therefore, anyone who thinks they may be eligible for assistance should visit with the TEC representatives while they are in the area.

The first payable week of DUA is the week ending December 30, 1989 and the last payable week is July 14, 1990. This is a DUA eligibility period of 29 weeks. Claimants applying for assistance should bring their Social Security card, the name and address of their last employer, documents verifying income prior to the disaster (i.e., income tax statements, pay stubs or W-2 Forms), and any documents indicating work eligibility status. Every effort will be made to confirm employment information and expedite the application process.

(2) Even though plants may appear to be in poor condition, don't do any pruning until later next month or early spring. Pruning now may stimulate new growth and would be highly susceptible to late freezes. Also, it is more desirable to prune and shape after the full extent of the damage is known. (3) Do not fertilize plants until they have resumed active growth. The use of fertilizer now may also stimulate new growth (especially when we have a few warm days) and the fertilizer salts may cause further injury to stressed root systems. (4) Watch carefully for insect and disease problems that could potentially infect damaged tissue. Treat as necessary and always read all labels. Remember, the extent of the injury to many plants may not become apparent until later this year (into the summer). Steps you take to reduce plant stress can ease injury later. If you need more information come by the Kinney County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service located in the County Courthouse. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

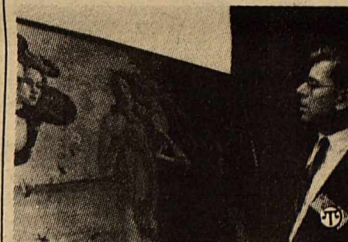

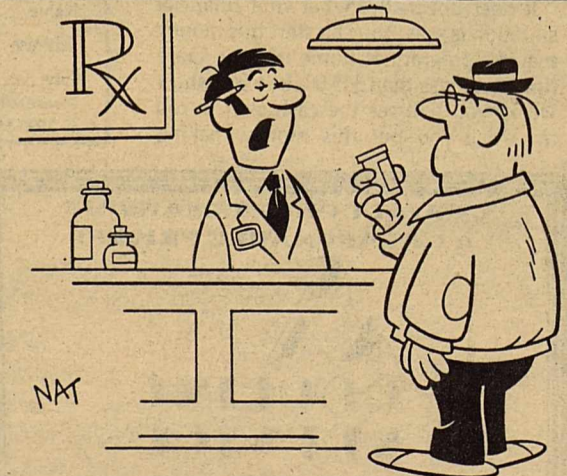
