## HEARING TESTED BY LIONS

Last Friday, March 9 , the Brackettville Lions helped screen children for hearing problems at the Brackettville school auditorium. The clinic was organized to help the school nurse, Glenda Westphal, in testing the children. The students were first tested by lion members and if a problem was discovered in a particular child, that child would then be sent to Ms. Westphal and be re-tested. If Ms. Westphal identified a child with a hearing problem, the child's parents were contacted and advised to seek further assistance from a family doctor.

The Lions are certified by the Texas Health Department to conduct this type of screening. William Kallem, District Earborn Chairman of 2A2, and his wife Mary Kallem were here from Kerrville helping the Brackettville Lions. Spanish moss is not really a moss. It is a distant relative of the pineapple family. True moss produces spires instead of seeds. Spanish moss sends seeds into the winds.

Spanish moss brings beauty to many trees in the southern parts of the United States. It also grows in Latin America. The oak tree is one of its favorite homes. In the south, the moss drapes the entire woods, looking like a kind of fairyland.

Spanish moss does not take food from the trees it drapes on and it is not a parasite. It has its own food factory. It has leaves of a sort and gets moisture from the air. It only grows where it can get enough sunshine and rain.

The moss grows until it hangs down on both sides of the tree branches. It is a silvergray color and is sometimes called "old man's beard." If you pull some off and put it into a pan of water it will turn bright green and looks very much alive.

The seods of Spanish moss are hairlike. They have little weight and the wind easily picks them up and blows them around. They won't grow if they drop on the soil. They only grow into plants if they fall on tree branches.

The moss has market value and is used as a filler in some boxes of goods. Also they are used as stuffing for mattresses and cushions. Mattresses made of Spanish moss aren't as expensive as those made from other materials.

Owners of livestock and household pets, especially those in South Texas around San Antonio, should remain vigilant for possible cases of screwworms, a costly insect pest that feeds on warm-blooded animals.

Confirmation of screwworms larvae in the wound of a U.S. soldier, injured in Panama and trated in San Antonio late of last December, is causing of possible screwworm reinfestation to go up across southern parts of the state.

The problem is that some of the larvaenot sent for official confirmation to a laboratory-were discarded at the hospital where the soldier was treated. This medical trash later was compacted and dumped at an area landfill.

There's a possibility these larvae of the blowfly species may have matured despite cold weather and mingled with native fly populations, said Dr. Diane Sutton with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) Screwworm Identification Program at Mission, Texas.

Sutton said entomologists with the National Musoum of Natural History in Washington, D.C., positively identified as screwworms the larval samples taken from the soldier's wound.
C.G. Scruggs of Austin, a rancher, former magazine publisher and a leader in the successful screwworm eradication program launched more than 25 years ago in the United States and Mexico, said this screwworm case is the first confirmed in the U.S. since August
1987.

Scruggs said the 1987 case involved a dog that accompanied a military officer from Honduras to New Orleans, La. A New Orleans veterinarian examined wounds in the dog's neck and collected samples that were identified as screwworms.

With this latest possibility of screwworm reinfestation, owners of all types of livestock and household pets should check all animal wounds they find for larval infestation.

If owners find larvae in the wounds, representative samples of about 10 worms each should be collected and sent in a container of alcohol or formaldehyde to the Screwworm Identification Lab. Mailing kits are available from the county Extension offices or the Mission Screwworm Laboratory. The mailing address is USDA-APHIS Veterinary Services Screwworm Identification Lab, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572.

## NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO <br> CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet $($ R.) service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.
The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet $\left.{ }^{( }\right)$service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet $(R)$ service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet(R) packages have changed from Standard Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet $(R)$ 1000, CentraNet (R) 2000, and CentraNet(R) 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet $(R)$ packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet(R) 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet ( $B$ 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately $\$ 399,600$, or less than one percent annually.
The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m. April 9, 1990

BRACKETT INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT
Chapter 1 Regular
The 1988-89 Chapter Regular program operated in Brackett ISD served 154. eligible students at grades Kindergarten through sixth grade. Several instructional strategies were employed, including supplementary instruction in a resource classroom, supplementary instruction in the Foundation classroom, and computer-assisted instruction (CAI). The students received the specialized instruction for five periods each weak during the year. The program focused on basic skills instruction in language arts.

The students participating in the program showed an average gain for the 1988-89 school year as evidenced by their performance on the 1985 edition of the Callfornia Achievement Test. Analysis of their Total Reading scores showed moderate to substantial gains at grades $\mathrm{K}, 1,2,3,4$, and 6 , and a loss at grade 5.

## Chapter 1 Migrant

The 1988-89 Chapter 1 Migrant instructional program served 62 eligible students at grades Kindergarten through ninth. The participants were served in the Foundation classroom by supplementary instructional aides under the direct supervision of certified teachers. In addition, students received supplementary computer-assisted instruction (CAI). The students received the specialized instruction for five periods aach week during the year. The program focused on basic skills instruction in language arts.

The students in the migrant remedial
program also showed an overall gain for the 1988-89 school year. The Total Reading scores showed improvement at grades $\mathrm{K}, 1,3,4,6$, and 9 and losses at grades 2,$5 ; 7$, and 8 .

We advise using caution when interpreting test results based on small groups of students because an extreme score form a single student can disproportionately affect the results for an entire grade.

While the overall results are generally positive, achievement test data reflect only one aspect of a project's offectiveness. Other measure should be considered as well when evaluating the success of a project. These measures might include classroom grades, essential element mastery, TEAM scores, or dropout rates.

## SANDOVAL

BRACKETTVILLE NATIVE AIDS IN HURRICANE RECOVERY
Brackettville Leonard Sandoval knows first-hand the destructive power of a hurricane. In fact, he has soveral different perspectives of the same storm.

Sandoval, an employee of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Fort Worth District, is working with the Corps' Hurricane Hugo disaster recovery mission on St. Croix in the U.S. Virgin Islands. Sandoval also worked on the Corps' Hugo mission in Charleston, S.C.

Hurricane Hugo slammed into St. Croix on September 17, 1989, lashing the island with 140 mph winds. On Soptember 21, Hugo crashed into South Carolina. The results were basically the
same in both places - almost total destruction.
"Both places were really destroyed by Hugo," said Sandoval. "Charleston probably has more dollar damages because they had more buildings and homes damaged. St. Croix had more debris and tree damage."
"It'll be a couple of years before either place gets back to normal. I consider St. Croix very lucky. Looking at the damage they had, they are lucky more people didn't get killed."

Sandoval worked in the Charleston area November 5 to December 23, 1989. He has been in St. Croix since January 2, 1990 and will stay until April. Sandoval has worked on debris removal at both locations, including ostimating contract costs, inspecting contractor work and overse日ing contract management.
"Being on these disaster missions has been quite an experience. It's as good as going to school, you learn a lot," said Sandoval.

The experience has its ups and douns. "Helping people get out of a jam gives you a real good feeling," said Sandoval. "The worse thing is boing away from your family for so long."

The biggest difference for Sandoval between Charleston and St. Croix?
"They drive on the left side of the road in St. Croix. It takes a little getting used to."

## RECORD TURNOUT AT FORT

Action proposed by the new leadership includes the following:
a. Installation of suggestion boxes in several strategic locations on the fort for the convenience of members to submit their written
suggestions or complaints for improvements or correction.
b. Organization of Sub-Committees to concentrate on the factors impeding future growth and action that may be effective in overcoming them.

Although the next regular monthly meeting date of April 14 conflicts with other events, the Council Board decided to stick with this date, mainly because no other date could be selected that offered less confliction.

The April meeting will take place in the Toran Hall on Fort Clark Springs. A progress report will be given, followed by ample time for open discussion with members on their concerns. At the conclusion of the meeting, the Council will host all members who received meal tickets at the March meeting to an outdoor bar-b-que north of the Swim Park.
