



## Wildcats Pounce on Coyotes 60-14

The Westbrook Wildcats came to Gail, Friday, October 27, and pounced on the Coyotes to spoil the Festivities Homecoming with a score of 60-14. The Wildcats (3-0 in district play) made the most of the Coyote's mistakes early in the game and never looked back by scoring four times in the 1st quarter and three times in the 2nd.

Westbrook was due to have the ball first in the second half and they elected to take the ball. In just three plays, the Wildcat offense put 6 more points on the board to end the game by the 45 point rule.

The Coyotes fumbled the opening kickoff of the game which set up the opponents first TD and they took an early lead of 8-0. Minutes later Grant Key recovered a Westbrook fumble. The Coyotes took the ball on that possession into the end zone. On the first down, Colt McCook hit Fernando Baeza on a 28 yard TD pass for the score. John Brummett made the PAT kick good which tied the score 8-8.

Borden County did not score again until late in the 2nd quarter. Coyote quarterback Colt McCook hit Grant Key on a 24 yard TD reception. The PAT kick failed so the

score was 38-14 at that point.

The Coyote offense was held to just 83 yards while the Wildcats had a total offense of 310 yards.

McCook led the Coyote offense by completing 6 of 9 passes for 80 yards and two touchdowns.

Key led the Coyote receivers with 5 catches for 52 yards and one touchdown.

Fernando Baeza had 9 carries for 33 yards. He caught a McCook pass for 28 yards and a touchdown.

Oscar Baeza had 3 carries before dislocating his elbow. He will miss about 6 weeks of Coyote action due to this painful injury.

## J.V. Team Loose Tough One to Wildcats 45-14

The Borden County J.V. traveled to Westbrook, Thursday, October 26 to play a very tough and undefeated Wildcat ball club. The Coyotes entered the contest with an impressive 4-1 record, but mistakes proved to be too much for the Coyotes. In addition the, Wildcats were easily the best ball team faced they have this season. The Wildcats upended the Coyotes with a score of 45-14.

The Coyotes started on a positive note as they took the opening kickoff and traveled 55 yards for the initial score of the game. Clint Scott rumbled 39 yards to pay dirt. they never relinquished

and caught a pass for 17 yards.


Ronny Gutierrez played well and contributed with 22 yards on 4 carries. Ronny had 48 yards on 3 receptions.

Although the game seesawed back and forth until the fourth quarter, I am proud of the Pups. They played the undefeated Wildcats very tough.



1	Authorizes the Texas Education Board to issue \$300 million in bonds to finance student loans. The amendment would increase the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board's bonding authority from \$660 million to \$960 million. This amendment attempts to extend the life of a program that currently makes loans available to approximately 20,000 students a year. These bom add to the state debt, and voters are not informed of the state's total bond indebtedness when they approve them.
