FOURTH ANNUAL TROOPERS REUNION HELD

Fort Clark Springs came alive when those who had once served at Fort Clark met for the Fourth Annual Troopers Reunion April 27, 28 and 29. Sixty troopers attended the reunion. Some of the wives and dependents of the troopers also attended.

The commissary at Fort Clark served as the headquarters for the three day event. Friday afternoon, most of the troopers registered and then continued through the evening with those famous "bull sessions."

The guest speaker for the noon luncheon Saturday, April 28 was Alamo Village owner, Happy Shahan. Shahan told stories of his experiences with the cavalry and what happened to Fort Clark and the area after the troopers departed.

When the cavalry was here, Kinney County had 4,800 people. By 1950, there were about 1,400 people. That's when community leaders joined to find a solution to regain the economic loss. Shahan said, "I told them that we could film western movies here. They thought I was crazy. So, I went to Hollywood and knocked on many doors. And the rest is history."

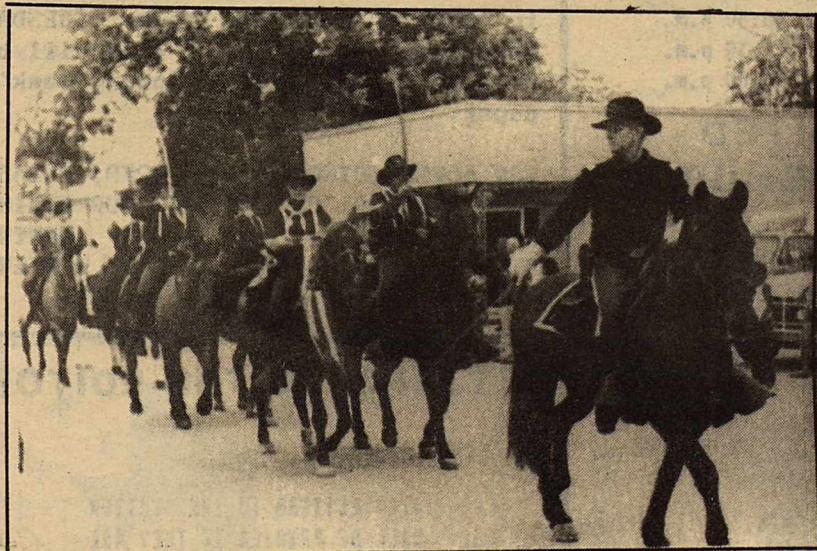
Shahan continued by explaining the background of the movie industry in Kinney County, how it developed and where it is today.

Following Shahan's speech, everyone headed to the dedication of the Texas Historical Building Marker and Medallion at the Old Guardhouse Museum.

Ron Buckles, president of the Historical Society explained the history of the museum and Don Swanson, curator of the museum unveiled the marker.

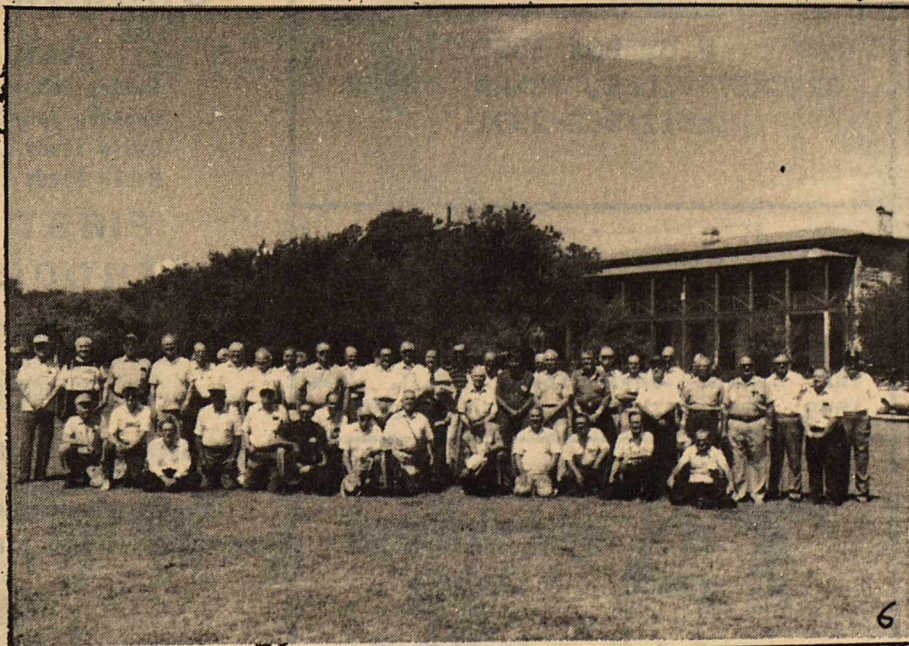

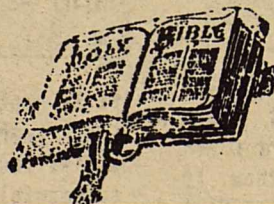

We would appreciate it if you would print this letter to the community, so we might express our thanks to the following individuals.

Citizens of Kinney County,

We would like to take this opportunity to thank our County Commissioner Rose Mary Slubar and Tim Ward for their help this past weekend following the flooding in our area. We live and ranch on the Tularosa Road in northern Kinney County, and received approximately 8 inches of rain last Wednesday night. Needless to say, many of the roads were impassable even after the water level had dropped on Friday afternoon. Because the river crossings were washed out, we were unable to even reach our ranch headquarters to take supplies to the people stranded there, or start work on the many fences which were washed away. Fortunately, there were no medical emergencies during this time. As I write this letter Monday morning, our foreman's son is still not able to get out to the school bus. Several of the families stranded in this area do not even have a telephone.

Due to various reasons, the county road crew was not available Friday afternoon or during the weekend. Saturday afternoon, our Commissioner Rose Mary Slubar and Tim Ward were very concerned and did what they could to help the situation. Tim donated his time and that of two of his employees. They found others who were willing to do some part time work. After locating and servicing the county road equipment, they brought it out to this area to begin work. Sunday afternoon the two of them, Rose Mary and Tim, again came out to work.

It can be very discouraging when some of your livestock has drowned, many of your fences are gone, and people are stranded. It is heartening to see people who are conscientious, and will pitch in and help others. It is a very good feeling to see your Commissioner drive up in a dump truck, and your future County Judge show up with some heavy equipment, along with others to help! I am sure we speak for all of our neighbors in thanking these two individuals and the others who were willing to help them this weekend.

Guest speaker, Col. James R. Spurrier of El Paso began by saying, "Thank you for inviting me to this historical occasion. The Historical Society should be highly commended for these efforts."

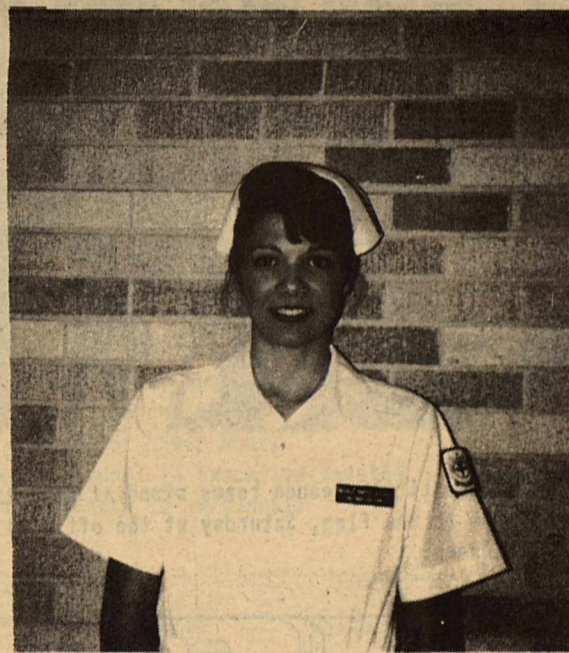
Spurrier first encountered Four Clark in 1937 as a military cadet going to summer camp. "I always remember the dusty rides and the hot afternoons on the firing range," said Spurrier. Spurrier is also concerned with the future of the cavalry. "We are the last of the mohicans. Who else is going to respond to saddles and boots?"

As president of the U.S. Horse Cavalry Association, Spurrier is interested in preserving the history, traditions and heritage of the Cavalry and to bring this information to the general public. This association sponsors the U.S. Cavalry Museum in Fort Riley, Kansas and the Cavalry Research Library. "We try to assemble as many of the Cavalry history documents that can be found, so that it can be available to the serious researchers of this history," said Spurrier.

Spurrier ended by thanking the Fort Clark Historical Society for its efforts to preserve history. "May your canteens ever be filled, may you have double ration for life....."

A barbeque was held near the Swim Park Area that afternoon and the Fiddlers Green Memorial Ceremony was Sunday morning.

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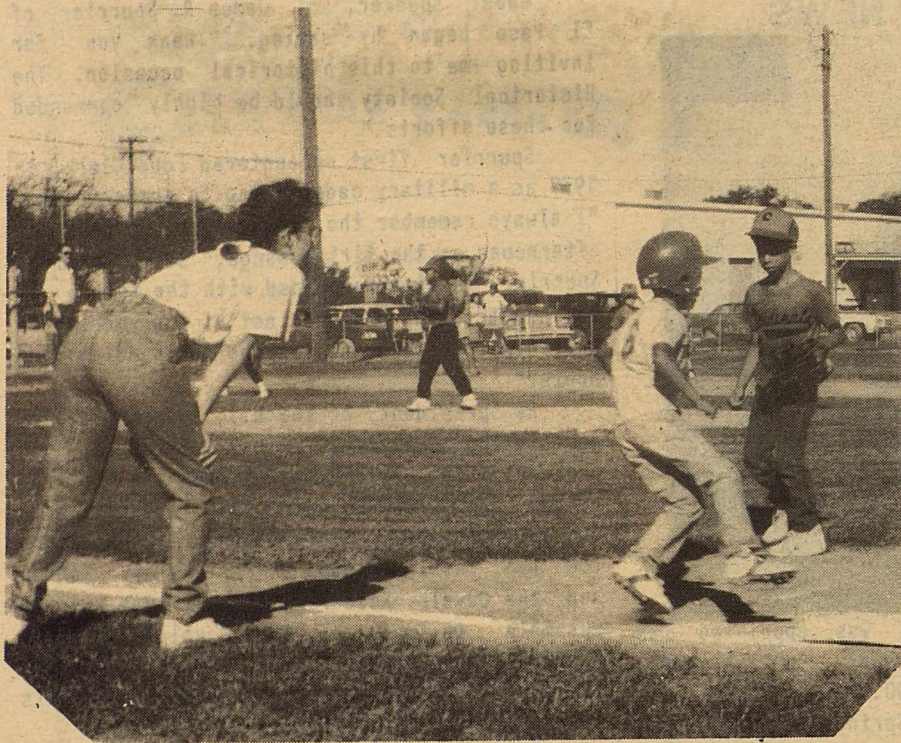

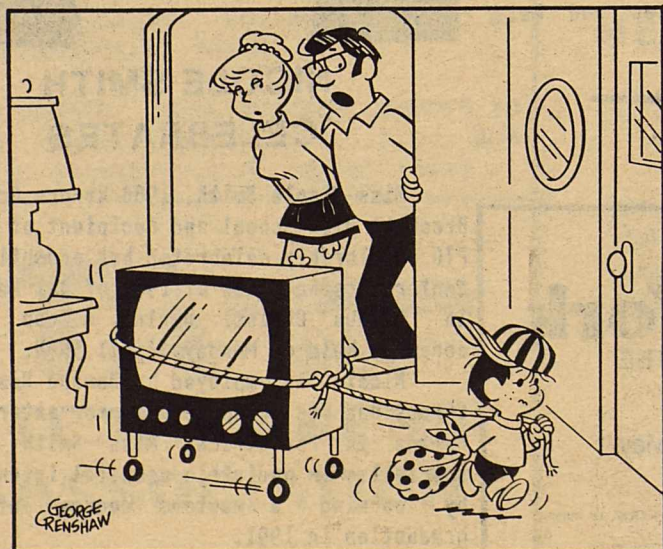
Debbie Coe keeps a close eye on her little T-Ball players and gives them instructions.

Irish Soda Bread

Top o' the mornin' to you! We're all Irish on St. Patrick's Day. Start off right on the 17th with a melt-in-your-mouth Irish Soda Bread. And have a bit o' the Irish luck all day.

| 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour | 1/4 tsp. cream of tartar |
| 3/4 tsp. salt | 1/3 cup margarine |
| 1/4 cup sugar | 1 1/3 cups buttermilk |
| 1 tsp. baking soda | 1/3 cup currants |
| 1/2 tsp. baking powder | |

Sift together the first 6 ingredients. Cut in the margarine with a pastry blender until mixture resembles cornmeal.

Add buttermilk and stir only until moistened. Mix currants in lightly.

Shape into a ball and knead about 15 seconds.

Place on a lightly greased cookie sheet. With the palm of the hand flatten dough into a circle about 7 inches in diameter and 1 1/2 inches thick. With a sharp knife, cut a cross on top, about 1/4 inch deep and 5 inches long, to prevent cracking during baking.

Bake at 350° F. for 45 to 50 minutes. Cool on a wire rack.

OLD ARMY DAYS BY WALLACE MORGAN

Fort Clark, Texas, 6 Aug 1944. T.O. Stables, viewing from the southwest to the northeast. Note the familiar view of the mountain in the background. This area was on the war time lease of the York Ranch. These are all temporary buildings, covered with tar paper, built for the increase of U.S. Armed Forces, due to World War II. The 2nd U.S. Cavalry Division was due to be stationed at Fort Clark, after the departure of the 112th Texas National Guard Cavalry Unit, to Fort Bliss, and then to the Pacific Zone of Operations. Fort Clark had always been occupied by an army unit of regiment size, so when a cavalry unit of division strength was to be stationed here, that meant that a lot more stables were needed. As can be seen in this photo, due to vegetation growth in the streets and around the stables, the 2nd Cavalry Division has departed to another assignment, when the picture was taken.

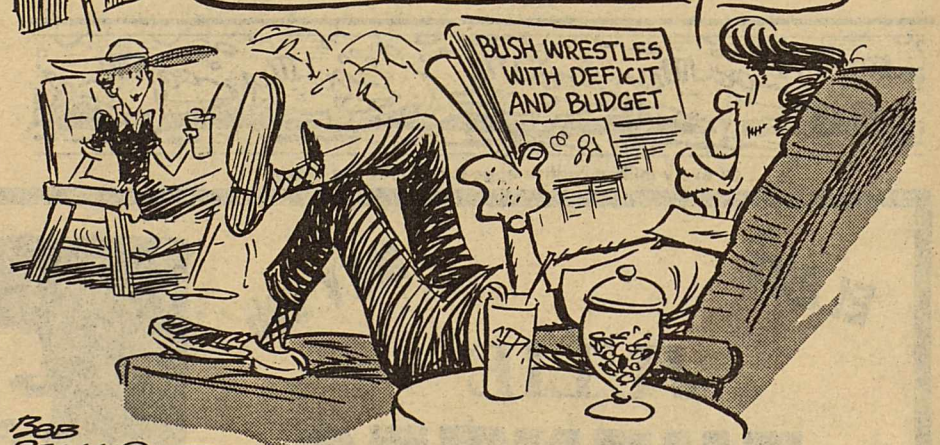

All anyone has to do to get hooked on mesquite wood for a cooking fuel is use it. Cooking with mesquite wood gives meat or fish a smoky essence that can't be topped. When the mesquite burns, its oils are carried with the smoke up to the meat that is being cooked, and mesquite has more oils than other woods.

Mesquite is a hardwood, it burns the hottest and the longest. Unless you live in mesquite wood country you will find mesquite wood expensive.

Most any kind of food can be cooked on a grill using mesquite wood and much quicker. Because the wood reaches a high temperature quickly, the juices are sealed in and the food doesn't stick.

It usually takes about forty minutes to prepare a proper bed of coals so don't be in a hurry, but once the fire is nice and hot, it doesn't take long to cook a delicious supper.

The meat, fish or chicken should be fresh because the grill flavor will accent the condition of the food. Mesquite coals are much hotter than other woods so cooking time will be shortened.

One of the favorite recipes used in the southwest is "Las Brazos Carnitas." Using 2 pounds of choice sirloin (cut into 1 1/2 inch cubes; olive oil; six crushed red chile salsa; green chile (fresh). Marinate sirloin one hour in olive oil with 4 cloves of crushed garlic; grill over a hot mesquite fire, basting with red chile salsa until medium rare.

Serve in a bed of green chile that has been roasted over the fire, peeled and crushed with two cloves of garlic to make a simple salsa, salt to taste. This serves 10 to 16 as a very pleasing appetizer

Have a recipe, "A Happy Home" -- Take 4 c. of love and 2 c. of loyalty, 3 c. of forgiveness, and 1 c. of friendship. Then 5 spoons of hope, 2 spoons of tenderness, and 4 quarts of faith. In Saudi Arabia, she was privileged to study with Raheem Baig and his wife, Maher, both artists from Pakistan and India...During her stay in Saudi Arabia, she was awarded "Best of Show" and "Honorable Mention" in the A.R.A.M. C.O. competition in 1978. She recently won first place in an Air Force wide competition with a Texas bluebonnet oil painting. Her paintings hang in the offices of Henry B. 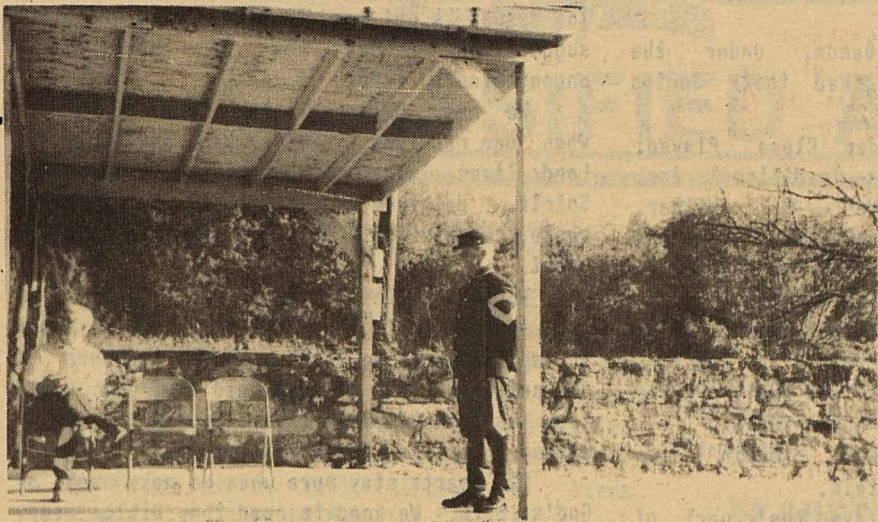

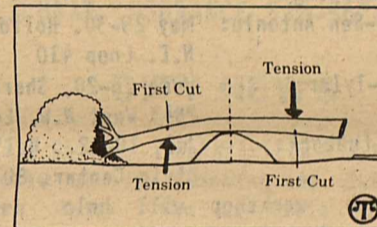
HINTS FOR THE HANDY

For Better Fires Next Winter, Cut Firewood Now

If you spent more time trying to start your fireplace fires this winter than enjoying them, chances are your wood was cut at the wrong time.

That's the opinion of forestry experts at Husqvarna, a large manufacturer of chain saws, lawn and garden equipment. According to Forestry Engineer Mark Michaels, suburbanites, farmers and "weekend woodsmen" who do their own cutting will get best results from following a few simple steps.

- Cut firewood in spring or early summer. This will allow it to dry properly and burn more easily next fall.
- When cutting, stand on firm ground to one side of the cut. Keep an escape route open, should a log start to roll.
- If the trunk has a downward bend, start the cut at the top. Make the final cut from underneath.
- Avoid pinching the saw in any fallen trunk that is under tension. To do this, make the first cut one-third the way into the tree on the side opposite the tension. Then, finish the cut on the side under tension.
- When cutting a pile of wood,

make sure the chain saw tip does not come in contact with any logs behind the one you are cutting. Such contact may cause the saw to "kick back." Put larger logs on a sawhorse first. Never stand on a log pile.

• Always wear protective clothing: work gloves, eye and ear protection and chain saw protective pants or chaps.

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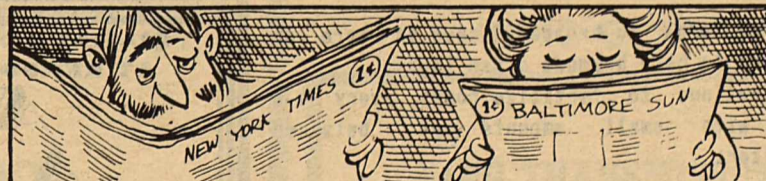
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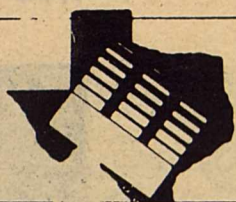

PROBLEMS WITH ARIZONA ASH TREES?

If you are experiencing problems with your arizona ash trees, (leaves curling and turning brown), you probably have a wooly aphid. This aphid occurs in a wet year as we are experiencing and does no great damage to your tree other than the rolled leaves. There are beneficial insects at work to control them. If you spray with an approved insecticide, you will kill all the beneficials and probably worsen the aphids as they are very difficult to control with any insecticide. My advise is to let the aphids run their course and the new growth on the trees will be normal.

LAWN AND GARDEN CHECKLIST FOR MAY

*Homeowner needs to apply foliar zinc to pecan trees for increased foliage and nut production.

*Water once a week (if not supplemented by rain).

*May want to broadcast seed on bare or thin area to help bermuda grass lawns.

*Continue to fertilize roses every 4-6 weeks with small amounts of balanced fertilizer.

*Spray roses for black spot control. Use benomyl or maneb at 7-day intervals.

*Replace or replenish mulch materials in flowerbeds and shrub borders to conserve moisture and reduce weed growth.

*You can remove or cut back frost-damaged crape myrtle or other ornamentals injured by cold weather as soon as you can see the extent of the damage.
