


MAYOR ELECT, LARRY MOORE



BRACKETTVILLE HAS NEW MAYOR

In the May 5, 1990 City Election, Larry Moore won over Vito La Gioia, 262 to 256.

In Place #2, City Councilman, Richard Terrazas won with a total of 277 votes. Opponents Jessie Garcia had 109, Alex Longoria had 95 and Michael Broderick got 73 votes.

In place #4, Julie Fuentes was the victor with a total of 347 votes. Ralph Gonzales had 217.

In place #5, Bernie Cervantez won with a total of 253 votes. Ray Robinson had 75 votes, Leonard Luna had 153 votes, and Bobby Guidry had 82 votes.

The votes will be canvassed in a meeting Thursday, May 10, 1990 at 5:00 p.m. After the canvassing, the new Councilmen and Mayor will be sworn in.

With a new Mayor and three new Councilmen, the City will almost have a totally new council. Louis Dimery and Dave Broderick were elected last year.

Wednesday night, there was a re-count of the votes cast for Mayor. The count remained the same as counted Saturday, May 5th.

LIBRARY DESPERATE

The Kinney County Library desperately needs the assistance of every citizen. Currently, nearly two hundred books are out of the Library having been checked out and not returned.

books would cost \$1,850.00 to These replace.

The Library will offer the entire month of May as a moratorium on all existing fines in order to try to get these books back into the Library and into circulation.

"After June 4th, we will be actively trying to locate the persons who have these books and collect either the book or the replacement price" says Librarian Mary Mitchell.

"When a Library our size has this many books out of circulation, it hurts everyone," states Mrs. Mitchell. "We are small enough that 200 books really represents a large portion of our total book population and it means that lots of people are not able to use books which we indicate we have, but which, in face, are not here."

"We would appreciate everyone's looking around their houses, in cabinets and under their car seats to see if they have books they thought they had returned and had not. " We are not trying to punish people," Mrs. Mitchell adds, "We just want to remind them that the Library and all its books belong to everyone and we need to insure that we have as many books as possible in circulation at all times."

All returned books can be dropped in the Book Drop or brought inside to be returned. Mrs. Mitchell said, "We don't want people to be embarrassed by returning late books, we want them to be glad they found them and provide them for the other citizens of the County."

"Sometimes, all of us forget, we are giving the month of May to everyone to help them remember their Library and return overdue books."

"Beginning June 5th, we will be contacting people concerning overdue books not received both by telephone and in person. We need to insure that we have the books or replacement costs immediately so that we can best serve our people."

"Come by and see us and let us know any other way we can serve you."

The Kinney County Library will be sponsoring again the Summer Reading Program for children from the ages of two to fourteen.

This program will begin on Monday, June 18th and end on Monday, August Registration for this program will begin in the Library on Monday June 11 and end on Friday June 15.

Mothers and/or caregivers must accompany all children under the age of six years who will be enrolled in the "Read To Me" portion of the program.


MOVIE THIS SATURDAY





Texas Agricultural Extension Service

On Tuesday, April 24, 1990, key leaders in Kinney County met in County study groups to identify important issues of concern to the people of this County over the next 4 years.

The strength of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's efforts to provide educational programs that are interesting and worthwhile to the community comes from involvement of clientele in developing longrange programs that address the critical issues that may face residents within the next 4 years.

The study groups divided into task forces to identify the most critical issues facing the County in broad fields of agriculture and natural resources, community development, youth and home economics. The groups identified issues and discussed how they will impact Kinney County's economy, environment, and social welfare.

The work of the study group is one of the first major steps in an intensive effort for determining Extension Service programs of 1991-94. each County in Texas will develop a longrange Extension program by October and all will be considered in the development of the Extension Service's statewide program plan.

In 1986, more than 12,000 Texans participated in these County study meetings across the state and identified almost 5,000

Based on these issues, a 1987-90 Long Range Extension Program (LREP) was prepared by each County. County issues were grouped into 12 broad statewide issues to form a state plan of action for directing programming for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service through

Issue-based programming has been highly successful for the extension Service in directing educational program efforts.

Locally, members of the Agriculture and Natural Resources study group included W. A. Belcher, Jimmy Bader, Car Esser, Bret Trant, Jack Whitworth, James Crumley, and Manuel Pena.

The Youth Study Group members were: Chuck Hall, David Dorrough, Kasey Hall, and Karla

Tully Shahan, who presently chairs the Extension Program Council, gave a welcome to the group and gave the members a brief talk on long range planning and critical issue identifications.

Nelson is definitely working for the good


of the Association. "My goal is to learn everything about the Association and try to improve upon what is already a great thing."


