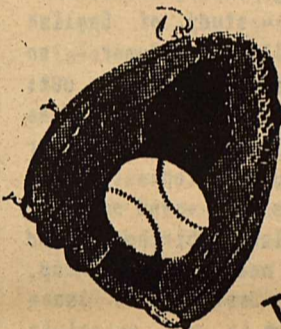

Parents encourage your children to come with you and get a book. Reading lasts forever!

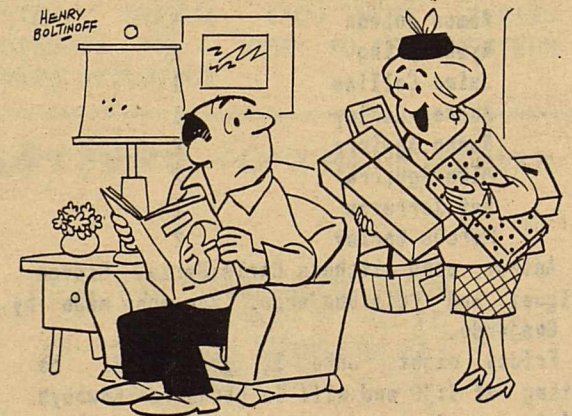

FFA ELECTS NEW OFFICERS

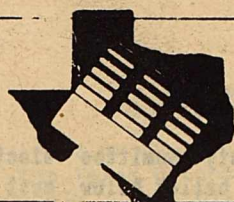

Texas Agricultural Extension Service

Ranchers in sheep and goat counties in this area are concerned about the renewal of the Farm Bill which contains the Wool & Mohair incentive program. There have been heated negotiations on the overall concept and major provisions of the new farm bill from various interest groups. "From what I have received from our extension economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, House Ag Committee members remain split on a number of farm bill issues", said Alan McWilliams, Kinney County Extension Agent.

McWilliams states that if the House Ag Committee members cannot come to an agreement on basic farm bill provisions to present Congress at this late date, the probability of a one year extension of the current farm bill program improves every day.

The rancher's concerns stem from a recent termination recommendation by the General Accounting office (GAO). The GAO recommended the termination of the wool, mohair and honey price support programs in 25 part recommendation report to Congress on April 20, 1990.

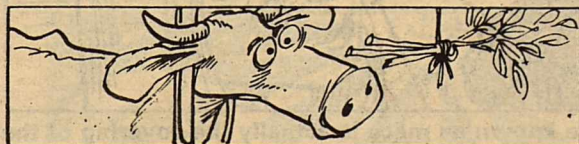
Fortunately, the Senate Agriculture Committee and the House Agricultural Subcommittee on Dairy, Livestock and Poultry approved sections of the 1990 farm bill setting subsidy levels for producers of wool, mohair and honey. "The wool and mohair titles were left essentially as they are under the 1985 Farm Bill", states McWilliams.

McWilliams also stated that the Senate Agricultural Committee accepted retention of the wool and mohair program during their regular session on April 24, 1990.

Wool and mohair producers receive an incentive payment based on the quantity and quality of wool and mohair produced. The program is funded by an import tariff provision in which the cost of the program is off-set by tariff revenues.

The Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman indicated that he would offer an amendment to the 1990 Farm Bill at a later time which would impose a payment limitation on producers of wool and mohair. Currently, program crop producers are subject to a \$50,000 limit on producer subsidies, while wool and mohair program participants have not been made subject to such payment limits.

All indications look good at this point, but McWilliams states that producers should keep in mind once a compromise proposal is accepted by the House and Senate Committees, the bill must still be passed by Congress before it becomes law.

NEW AREA CODE

"Our studies indicated we will run out of numbers in the 214 area code late in 1991, and we've experienced renewed economic growth since that time," O'Neill said. "The new demand for numbers, coupled with an already exhausting supply, brought about the need for the new 903 area code."

For several months after the November 4 conversion, calls made to the old area code number will still be completed. After a transitional period, it will be necessary for everyone to use the new 903 code. Calls to the old 214 number will not go through after a few months.

Southwestern Bell, and the 11 independent telephone companies serving this area, are encouraging customers to keep the area code change in mind in all of their personal business planning.

No change are necessary in the basic seven-digit telephone number. Customers will retain their current local numbers.

Introduction of the new 903 area code for north and Northeast Texas is only six months away and will impact calling habits for customers in Texas generally north, east and southeast of the Dallas metro area, according to Karen O'Neill, area manager at Southwestern Bell Telephone.

The area code for the immediate area in and around Dallas and 30 nearby cities will be unchanged and remain 214.

THE LAW OF THE LAND

If you happen to be involved in an automobile accident in Texas today, your chances are one in four that the collision will involve an uninsured motorist. In some areas of the state, the likelihood is much higher, with approximately seven out of ten motorists driving without insurance.

Last year, there were more than 125,000 uninsured drivers involved in automobile accidents in Texas, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety. This caused thousands of individuals and families great financial and emotional stress. Moreover, the high percentage of uninsured motorists contributed to higher overall insurance premiums for insured motorists, since it raises the amount that insured drivers pay for the uninsured motorists' coverage in their policies.

The situation was about the same in 1981, when the Legislature passed the Compulsory Auto Insurance/Financial Responsibility Law in Texas. Before the law was passed, 26 percent of Texas motorists were uninsured. In the initial months following the law's enactment, the percentage of uninsured motorists dropped significantly, with some areas of the state achieving 90 percent compliance. Eight years later, however, we're back to where we were before. Why? partly because a lot of people are not aware of what the law is today, either because they are new residents of Texas, or because they are young and new to the system.

In other cases, motorists may be unable to afford the coverage, may unknowingly let their insurance policies lapse, or may choose for a variety of reasons to disregard the law.

To call attention to this matter, the Office of Consumer Protection has launched a statewide campaign to raise public awareness of the automobile liability law in Texas. The summer-long campaign has received the backing of the editorial boards of several of the largest newspapers in Texas. In addition, Gov. Bill Clements and the mayors of 10 of the largest cities in the state issued proclamations in support of this effort. In the weeks and months ahead, you will be seeing a new television public service announcement

featuring the campaign slogan, "Liability: the Law of the Road." A series of radio PSAs will also be a part of this educational effort.

As a driver in Texas, you are required by law to carry minimum liability insurance in the following amounts: \$20,000 for the bodily injury or death of one person; \$40,000 for the bodily injury or death of two or more individuals per occurrence; and \$15,000 for damage to the property of others. A first violation of the law is punishable by a fine of \$75 plus court costs, and subsequent violations are punishable by fines of \$200 plus court costs, as well as the possible suspension of the driver's license.

We know that no compulsory law can guarantee 100 percent compliance. But several states have been successful at increasing compliance through close monitoring and/or tougher laws. In North Carolina, for example, strict monitoring of compliance has resulted in a consistent uninsured motorists rate of 3 percent, the lowest in the country. In Hawaii, uninsured drivers are facing stiff new penalties, although the jury is still out as to their long-term effects. The initial penalty in that state for driving without insurance is now \$1,000 with subsequent offenses punishable by fines of at least \$3,000.

Last year, several bills were introduced in the Texas Legislature making it tougher on uninsured motorists to disregard the law, but none were enacted into law. The adequacy of the Compulsory Auto Insurance/Financial Responsibility Law is something that legislators will likely grapple with in succeeding sessions. Regardless of what happens, however, the uninsured motorists' problem in Texas is bad enough that something must be done about the problem now, with the laws that we currently have in place.

For this reason, our educational campaign will target the responsible, law-abiding driver who is currently uninsured. As Public Counsel for insurance consumers in Texas, I ask for your support in this effort. If you know someone who is currently driving without insurance, please let them know that obtaining liability insurance is not only the socially responsible thing to do, but that in Texas, it's the law of the road.

RICHARD HIRSCH GRADUATES AND RECEIVES AIR FORCE COMMISSION

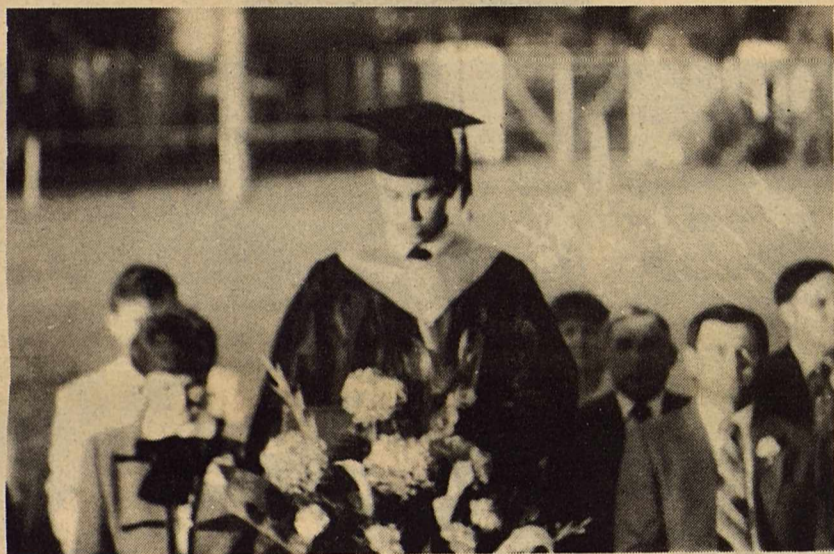

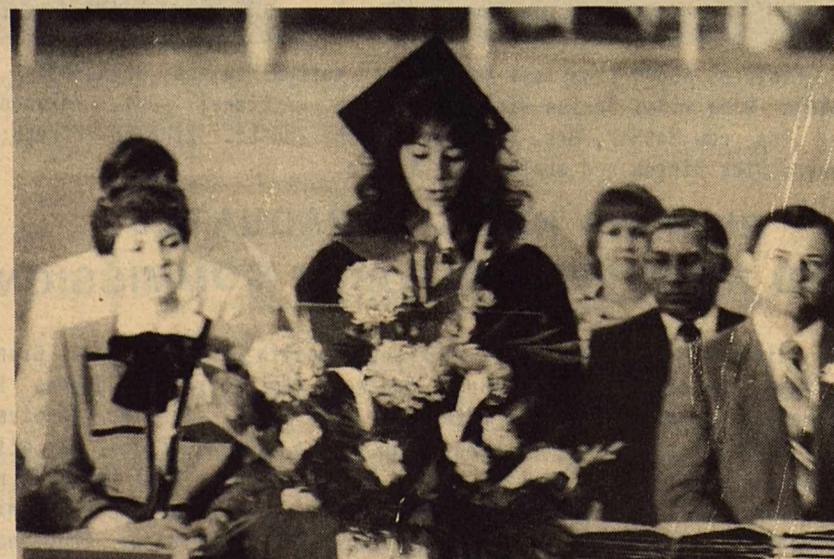

TOXIC WASTE

The following is reprinted from the Sanderson Times "Letters to the Editor":

DETAILED INFO GIVEN ON DUMP
FOR TOXIC WASTE NEAR DRYDEN

(Note from J.A.Gilbreath, The Sanderson Times: "We think this should be of interest to all on the Trinity-Edwards Aquifer and downstream on the Rio Grande.")

Because of the nature of the information given in the following "Letter to the Editor", it is being printed as a feature story.

I own land south of Sanderson and have been keeping in touch with the Texas Water Commission about a permit for the proposed Dryden dump. Richard Andersen (512/643-8144) at the Commission tells me that on April 11 he and Minor Hibbs, chief of the Commission's Hazardous and Solid Wastes permits section, met with representatives of Allan Construction and Chemical Waste management who were there because they fully intend to go ahead with the Dryden facility and are actively pursuing a permit. The Commission had not heard from Allan Construction for some time, and this was their first official indication that Chemical Waste Management, one of the--of not THE--country's largest managers of hazardous waste dumps, had become involved.

Bobby Ruby of Allan and several representatives of Chemical Waste, including Bill Walls, the Environmental Senior Manager, and Ron Weddell, a geologist, were at the meeting. It was stated that the dump would be used for hazardous waste and for other toxic waste not classified as hazardous, but that no radioactive waste would be stored in Dryden. Chemical Waste currently is doing exploratory borings on the site, including four deep borings at the corners, thought to be going down at least 600 feet or further to ground water, and a larger number of borings within the proposed site. Allan and Chemical Waste are expected to bring the results of those borings back to the Water Commission within a few weeks. Allan and Chemical Waste mentioned the date of August 1 as being a possible date on

which they might file for a permit.

I also talked to Bill Walls (P.O. Box 2563, Port Arthur, TX 77643, 409/736-2821) who confirmed they were doing "a more in-depth geological investigation of the facility. We have a couple of drillings out there doing exploratory borings." If all went well, he said, they had "a plan developed" to file for a permit by August. Mr. Walls also said they would be providing a "community contact person" in the Sanderson area to answer questions.

The permit process is such that after the permit is applied for, Water Commission staff spend time developing a draft permit. The public hearing on the application does not come until approximately 12-18 months later. That means, says Bill Colbert, at the Water Commission's Office of Public Information (512/463-8028), that whilst citizens can file petitions generally opposed to the dump at any time, it is the technical aspects that are of most interest now, meaning any information about habitat, ground water, surface water, and the environment in general. (Address is Texas Water Commission, Hazardous and Solid Wastes Division, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, TX 78711.) Those persons with interest in the project also should know that they are in a better position to make representations to the Commission and at the public hearing if they are organized in some way and have held meetings.

One person who has extensive knowledge about the ground water in the area is George Veni, a hydro-geologist who lives in San Antonio. Since 1978 he has explored, mapped, and investigated Sorcerer's Cave near Dryden, which is the longest and deepest cave in the state. Within the cave, Mr. Veni has found an underground river named Sirion, with a water flow of about 4,000 gallons/minute. Mr. Veni told me in a telephone conversation that judging from the line of the underground stream, the Sirion goes roughly toward the dump site. "But this is the least accurate way to determine where the river goes," says Mr. Veni. A more accurate way would be to inject a non-toxic dye into the Sirion, having already placed dye detectors in wells along the probable flow of the river and at springs along

the Rio Grande. A third way would be to continue the exploration of the cave by physically following the river using diving gear and boring holes along the way so the cavers could have easier access. This last way would be expensive.

Mr. Veni describes the area near Dryden as a karst area, meaning an area of limestone formations characterized by sinks, ravines, and underground streams. "Karst areas tend to be environmentally sensitive and you want to avoid them," he says. In addition to Sorcerer's, Mr. Veni knows of two other hydrologically significant caves in the area, but has done no work on them.

Mr. Veni says he is familiar with the fact that one of the deepest wells in Texas is in the Dryden area. It is "utter nonsense," he says, to imply that deep wells mean the area is safer than if the wells were less deep. "That's like saying if you fall out of an airplane you don't have to worry because it's so far down," he says. "You're dealing with open-pipe flow along the joints and cracks," he says, which means liquid can go very far, very fast.

Other telephone conversations:

--State senator Bill Sims (during the special session: P.O. Box 12068, Austin, TX 78711, 512/658-5852) says he has talked to Chemical Waste's engineer who claims "there are no faults and that the ground water is 800 feet there." Mr. Sims said he believed part of the reason Dudley Harrison was defeated as state representative was because of local opposition to the dump, which Mr. Harrison has been neutral about. Mr. Sims has not received many letters about the dump, and welcomes any and all opinions.

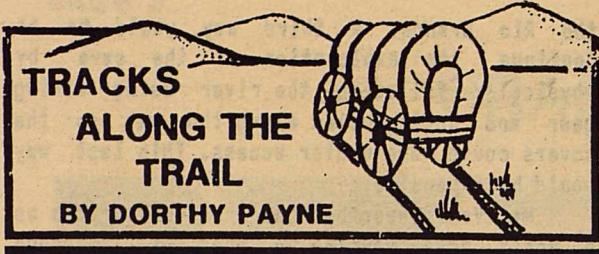
--Barry Miller, consultant for Texas Black Bass Unlimited, an umbrella group for several state bass groups, (100 Congress Avenue, Suite 1500, Austin, TX 78701, 512/322-8095) says that he has had letters regarding the possible contamination of Amistad Reservoir from the Dryden dump and will bring the matter to the attention of his board in Waco on May 22. The board will decide if they wish to take a position on the Dryden dump.

One further thought: The Texas Observer, May 5, 1990, has a story on the opposition to a proposed nuclear waste site at Fort Hancock near El Paso. Roberto Gamboa Mascarenas, Mexico's new Consul-General in El Paso, is concerned about the tentative approval Mexico gave to the Fort Hancock site, and has asked SEDUE, the Mexican equivalent of the US Environmental Protection Agency, to have another look. Part of the reason for Mexico's re-evaluation is the Environmental Cooperation agreement between the U.S. and Mexico which was signed in La Paz August 14, 1983. This Agreement covers land 100 kilometers (62 miles) on either side of the border and so also applies to the Dryden site.

Mr. Veni, the hydro-geologist and caver, will be in Terrell County for Memorial Day and is willing to meet with anyone interested in the county's ground water resources on Friday, May 25. Please get in touch with Shirley Spence (915/345-2549) or Amanda Couch (915/345-2410) for the exact time and location of the meeting.

South of Muskogee, Oklahoma on U.S. 69 which follows the route of the old Texas road through 3 Forks country is the town of Oktaha named after the creek full blood Otkarhasor Harjo, a leader of Indian uprisings, who was usually called "Old Sands".

Near here on July 17, 1863 between Wolf Gap and Elk Creek was fought what historians consider the greatest battle of the Civil War in Indian territory.

In the summer of 1863, the Confederates had greatly increased their strength in the Indian country and it was learned by Union Commanders that an attack was planned on Fort Gibson which was held by Federal Troops.

Several thousands Confederate troops were stationed at Fort Davis near present Muskogee, and across the Arkansas river from Fort Gibson and a Congedate outpost was maintained on Coodey's creek on the south edge of Muskogee. Several more troops were stationed at Honey Springs under the command of General Douglas H. Cooper where he maintained his headquarters.

General Cooper was waiting on even more inforcements because a victory was necessary to stop the desertion in large numbers of Indian soldiers who were joining the union.

When General James H. Blunt arrived with more Cavalry and artillery things began to change and on the night of July 16, 1863 and the morning of July 17, Blunt made his move. Crossing the Arkansas river and arriving at Oktaha at daybreak. The battle began about 8 a.m.. The Confederates were at a disadvantage because their powder was damp and inferior quality. As a result Blunt drove the Confederates back across Elk creek and they retreated back to Honey creek. They burned all but one of their warehouses and retreated further down the road to Briartown.

The fighting ceased about 2 p.m. and Blunt remained on the battle field until he buried the dead of both armies.

General Blunt reported his losses at 17 killed and 60 wounded, with 77 prisoners taken. General Cooper reported his losses at 134 killed and wounded.

The Union victory at Honey Springs and the holding of Fort Gibson can be compared to the same result of the Battle of Pea Ridge in the Ozarks. This victory proved the Union forces could move just about anywhere west of the Mississippi at will, which they soon demonstrated.

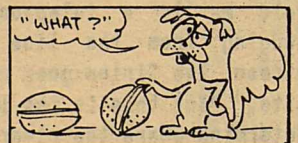

- 1 package (9 oz.) single layer yellow cake mix

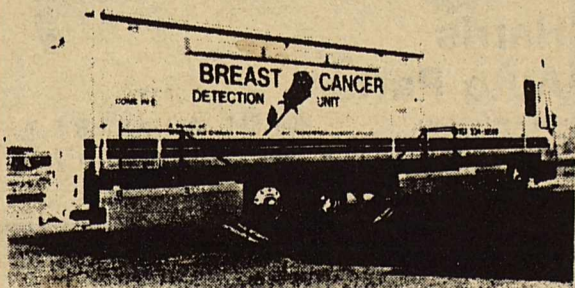

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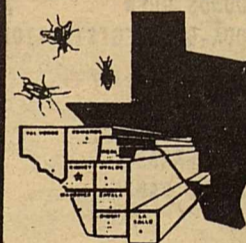
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
