JUDGE CARR AND REPRESENTATIVE GARCIA VISIT KINNEY COUNTY



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

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

Brackettville- The Fightin' Tigers hosted Medina last Friday in a controlled scrimmage. The Brackettville athletes crossed the goal line twelve times, while the Tigers never allowed the Medina offense to pass midfield.

Clay Hunt led the Tiger's offensive attack as he completed seven of eleven passes for 156 yards and five touchdowns. Hunt completed TD passes to Buddy Brandt, 17 yards; Tevin Senne, 19 yards; Billy LaGioia, 9 yards; and Arturo Falcon, 70 and 4 yards.

Adrian Pena scored twice on runs of 65 and 72 yards. Steve Clementz scored on a 10 yard run and then from the inch line. Lesley Floyd had a 70 yard touchdown as his brother Lynn threw a 37 yard TD pass to Jesse Terrazas. Geovani Wardlaw also had a touchdown on a 29 yard run.

FORT CLARK NEWS BY LASHAWN WARDLAW

Like to walk, swim or ride a bike? The Volksmarch on September 22 & 23 at Fort Clark Springs is for you! The Selma Pathfinders, a nember club of the American Volksport Association, is sponsoring six non-competitive events designed to involve the whole family in outdoor recreation. The events, 10 kilometer walks, a 25 kilometer bike ride, and 200 meter lap swims, will start anytime participants choose between 7:00 a.m. and Noon on Saturday, September 22 and Sunday, September 23. A aturday evening "Nite Walk" will allow hikers to start between 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. to finish before 8:00 p.m.

Volksports are organized events designed to appeal to everyone, regardless of age. These aren't contests of speed or endurance, but opportunities to enjoy nature and earn a sense of pride in accomplishing an event. Participants go at their own pace, but must complete the event before the set finish time. Swimmers, for example, can pause between laps, but must remain in the pool to complete the event. Anyone who pays the registration fee and completes the required distance is declared a winner, and will receive a medal embossed with the Empty Saddle Statue which stands at the entrance of Fort Clark. Those who complete more than one event will receive bars that attach to the medal.

Registration for the initial event medal and bar is \$5.50, \$6.00 after September 15. Additional event bars are \$2.00 before September 15 and \$2.50 after September 15. Participation without an award or credit is free. IVV credit is \$1.50. Dogs, on leashes, are allowed on Volksmarch trails.

Friendly Selma Pathfinder club members will man control points and offer free candy and drinks to participants. The 10 kilometer

walks will be along the wooden paths and back roads of Fort Clark. The 25 kilometer bike ride will include a stretch of Highway 131, which leads from the Fort to Spafford. Swimming events will be held in the giant, spring-fed swimming pool.

The registration/start point will be the Nat Mendelsohn Activity Center on Scales Road. Food and drinks will be available all day.



LYME DISEASE—We seem to hear it everyday. I spoke to our district extension entomologist, Dr.J.E. Stewart, the other day and he told me that precaution is probably the best defense against a public outbreak of the disease.

Lyme disease, once thought to be a problem only in the northeastern United States, continue to be reported in Texas.

Dr. Stewart said that the incidence of the disease is still low in Texas, as far as we know. But it's causing so much concern because it's popping up randomly all over the state. This makes it very hard to estimate what it will do.

Eighty-two cases of the disease were reported in 1989, up from 25 cases in 1988. So far, according to public health officials with the Texas Department of Public Health, eleven cases of LYME disease have been confirmed in the state for 1990.

One of the hotspots for the disease is northeast Texas, in the Dallas area. Experts are stumped as to the exact reason the disease incidence is higher there, but it could stem from the fact that there is a higher number of campers than say, the Houston area.

Symptoms of the disease were first reported in Sweden in 1909 and the disease still exists in that country. The disease remained a mystery and was first reported in the United States in Connecticut about 1975.

Numerous cases of a strange, new disease manifested as rheumatoid arthritis near Lyme, Connecticut, prompted researchers to search for the organism responsible for the trouble. Dr. Willie Burgdorter discovered very tiny spirochetes in a deer common to the northeastern states. Ixodes ticks infected with the spirochetes were found guilty of transmitting the disease organism, from field rodents to man through their bite.

Lyme disease is caused by certain bacteria called spirochetes that are carried by the deer tick. The deer tick is a small, eight legged relative of spiders. During the stages when it is most likely to bite people, it is only about 1 mm. across or about the size of a sesame seed.

If the tick attaches to a human for 24-48 hours, the bacteria may enter the human's bloodstream and cause infection. Dr. Stewart pointed out that it is not possible to catch

LYME disease by contact with an infected person.

These ticks feed primarily on rodents, birds and certain lizards while immature. The adult tick feeds primarily on white-tailed deer. The species can occur in large numbers on deer that are sickly or malnourished, but also can attach healthy deer. Hosts for the tick also include man, dogs, cats, cattle and horses. Disease symptoms in the first stage include lesions on the skin and joint pains.

REFLECTIONS BY PRESTON TAYLOR FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

Do you have any friends who speak Chinese, Swahili or Arabic?

The Koran, the Bible of the Moslems or Mohamedans, is written in Arabic. That language is the primary bond that holds together the several hundred million Islamic people.

It's not an impossible job for a person to speak two or three languages. In fact, a person may learn to speak five or six languages and speak them fluently if that one begins on time."

Do you know anyone who can speak all the languages of mankind? We say, "That's impossible!" True. Man can't do this. And yet, God can. He understands the hundreds of languages which are spoken in all 154 countries of the world. (the Bible totally or in parts has been translated in more than 1,100 of the spoken tongues).

We don't have to be first class speakers or linguists for God to understand us. I grew up on a farm in Arkansas. Neither of my parents finished high school. And yet, God understood their "broken English."

God understands anyone who talks to Him. It doesn't matter what our language or dialect may be nor the level of our education. God

understands when we speak-to Him and He can also communicate with us.

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
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FORT CLARK SPRINGS V.F.W. ATTENDS DISTRICT MEETING











Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed an application with the Texas Public Utility Commission to introduce new optional services – Call Control Options. The initial service areas will be Laredo, McAllen and Austin. Expansion into other service areas will be based on availability. Customers in other areas will be notified when these services become available.

Call Control Options include six new services – Call Blocker, Call Cue, Call Return, Priority Call, Call Trace and Selective Call Forwarding. The features will be available to single-line residence and business customers.

Call Blocker – enables the customer to block incoming calls from a maximum of three specified telephone numbers and/ or to block the last incoming call.

Call Cue – enables the customer to automatically redial the last outgoing telephone number dialed. If the recalled number is busy, equipment will monitor the line for a maximum of 30 minutes and will let the customer know when the call can go through.

Call Return – enables the customer to automatically redial the telephone number of the most recent incoming call. If the number is busy, Call Return will continue to dial the number for up to 30 minutes, or until it completes the call.

Priority Call – provides the customer with a distinctive alerting signal, ring or Call Waiting Tone (if the customer has subscribed to Call Waiting), when the customer is called from a maximum of three preselected telephone numbers.*

Call Trace – enables the customer to initiate a trace of the last incoming call received. The number, date and time will be recorded by Southwestern Bell Telephone so that the call's origin can be identified.

Selective Call Forwarding – enables the customer to forward incoming calls from specified telephone numbers (maximum of three) to another telephone number.



Samuel Argoll records seeing buffalo as early as 1612. The French missionary Father Hennepin saw buffalo near the great lakes, Colonel William Byrd recorded seeing buffalo between the North Carolina and Virginia lines in 1729. There is a record of a prairie dog town of the Texas plains in the year 1901 between San Angelo and Clarendon, which covered 25,000 square miles and was estimated to contain 400,000,000 prairie dogs.

The prairie dog isn't really a dog at all. He's really a squirrel, very clean and eats nothing but grass. He needs little water and can live in a dry environment.

When the settlers first saw this little creature they said he was a prairie dog because he lived under ground and not in trees like the eastern squirrel.

At one time the 800,000,000 prairie dogs would eat as much grass as 3,125,000 cattle. So you can see why the plainsman considered the prairie dog such a menace. By the use of poison, state bounties and professional hunters and trappers the problem was met.

Brackett ISD welcomes David Burton as their new Physical Education Teacher. Mr. Burton will be teaching physical education to grades K thru 5th.



USE THAT AREA CODE

Beginning at 12:01 a.m. Sunday, Sept. 9, all long distance telephone calls dialed in the "512" area must be dialed with the area code - "1 plus 512" or "0 plus 512."

"We're nearing the point where we will be running out of phone numbers in '512'," said Karen O'Neill, area manager for Southwestern Bell. "We have implemented this change to match growth without creating a new area code."

O'Neill said dialing "512" is now required because new local dialing prefixes that resemble area codes will be created for new phone numbers in South Texas.

"The new prefixes will have an '0' or a '1' as a middle digit, ad do area codes. Local number prefixes in this area do not have such a configuration at this time," O'Neill said. "As we create such prefixes, it's necessary to dial '512' to avoid confusing telephone switching equipment.

"This means preprogammed long distance numbers within the area, such as those used with Speed Dialing or Call Forwarding,. must also include the '512' area code."

"Without dialing '512', you'll reach a recording saying you must dial '512' to complete your call," O'Neill said.
